# Tornado levels small town in Oklahoma

## At least six people dead; Morris, Okla. devastated

were evacuated today from this town of 1,300 after a tornado swept through. killing at least six people and leaving the downtown "devastated." Utilities were shut off and only rescue vehicles were allowed in.

'It's almost all gone,' Okmulgee County Sheriff Gene Rice said of the town, about 40 miles south of Tulsa, where the twister struck shortly before midnight Thursday.

Six people died in Morris and three more confirmed tornado deaths were 'scattered around" the county, Rice said. A 10th Oklahoma death occurred in Terlton, a town of 155 people about 30 miles west of Tulsa, where 25 injuries were reported.

Fifty to 60 percent of the buildings in Morris were leveled, said Highway Patrol Lt. Leon Spencer. He said the death toll could rise as emergency crews picked through the rubble this morning.

Officials at Okmulgee General Hospital, where people wept and hugged relatives they feared they had lost, said they were too swamped to begin to estimate the number of injured people they had treated.

'It just caught everybody in bed,

THE TORNADOES BEGAN at 5:45 p.m. Thursday, sweeping eastward in two waves of heavy thunderstorms, hail and winds gusting to 72 mph. Most of the damage occurred between 11 p.m. Thursday and 3:30 a.m. today, when the turbulence cleared the state

Injuries and damage were reported in seven other towns, with 15 communities in all reporting funnel

clouds or ternadoes Morris looked today like a blackened neighboring towns.

Patrolman Bill Burtchett, his head swathed in bandages and his left arm in a sling, sat quietly in the hospital. He had been 30 minutes into his patrol when the tornado struck without warning

The twister picked up his patrol car, slammed it against two buildings and then flipped it over before a tree fell on it, he said.

"I've been shot at and cut, but I ain't never been so scared in my life. The man upstairs was sitting next to me tonight," said Burtchett, a nine-year police veteran

Gov. George Nigh ordered up to 20 National Guardsmen into northeastern Oklahoma

LITTLE INFORMATION was immediately available from Terlton, where the twister struck at 11:05 p.m. Thursday, Greg Sturge, of the Civil Defense office in Tulsa, said telephone lines were down and it was difficult to get an accurate picture of what happened there

Another twister destroyed about 15 homes and a convenience store early today in far western Wagoner County, which includes a part of the city of Tulsa, Deputy Sheriff Carl Munoz reported.

Near the Missouri border in far northeastern Oklahoma, police dispatcher Coleen Cole said a tornado touched down five miles north of Grove at 1:25 a.m., injuring an undetermined number of people and damaging eight mobile homes in the Iron Horse resort.

Tom Lester of the Tulsa Civil Defense said one house was destroyed in Cleveland, north of Terlton. He said he did not know whether anyone was injured

## 'Sick' prankster hits in Pampa

Johnnie Mae Jackson had to blink en she read a story in Wednesday's mpa News about a "sick" prankster who has phoned several people in San Antonio and told a convincing, but phony, story that a loved-one was badly injured or dead

Jackson, a Pampa maid, and her family suffered a similar, cruel hoax just two days earlier.

The woman said phoned the Ingersoll - Rand Plant where her husband works and left a message that Jackson had been critically injured in a car accident. The caller identified herself as a hospital employee. The pranskter left a message for Jackson's husband. Herdis, that his wife was near death and undergoing treatment in the emergency room at Coronado

Community Hospital. The switchboard operator who took the "emergency message" at Ingersoll

Rand said the caller seemed cool and composed when she made the false

"I thought she was the head nurse at the hospital," Lula Motley said.

The frightening message was relayed to Jackson, and he raced away to the

"He drove from the plant to the hospital in six minutes. He could have had an accident," Mrs. Jackson said.

The joker also phoned Jackson's mother - in - law, Melinda Jackson, and played the same heart - stopping trick

"She almost had a heart attack Mrs. Jackson said about the elderly

woman's reaction. The Pampa woman's relatives converged on the hospital and talked to a bewildered head nurse. The nurse, emergency room supervisor Cathy Land, told the panicking relatives that Jackson hadn't been admitted. Land phoned local law enforcement agencies and the ambulance service, which also had no record of the reported victim

Herdis Jackson left the hospital and finally collected his wits enough to drive to the house where his wife works.

"He was beating on the door. When he saw me, he had to catch his breath. He said, 'You're all right!...Let me sit down. Somebody called and said you were in a serious accident," "Jackson said her shaken husband muttered in

Two days after the shocking experience, the Jacksons read about the San Antonio prankster and the similar stunts there

"I said, 'Honey, that's the same thing that happened to us... It was dangerous. It was malicious," Jackson said about the tragic trick.

The San Antonio caller, also a woman, has caused several people grief and sent some flying off to check on 'dead'' or "critically - ill" relatives as far away as California

The Jacksons reported the incident to Pampa police, who told her that the caller probably knows them





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## **Ousted Libyans leave** their London embassy

LONDON (AP) - Libyans left their London embassy today to start their journey home, ending an 11-day siege that began when a sniper in the building sprayed gunfire at dissidents and killed a British policewoman.

"The siege is over," declared a spokesman for Scotland Yard. "All the Libyans have left the embassy

The Libyans began emerging from the embassy at St. James's Square at midmorning in groups of five, led by an unidentified Libyan who had been acting as go-between. A total of 30 Libyans were escorted into waiting vans. Video pictures of the evacuation were aired by the British Broadcasting

Police motorcyclists cleared the way for the convoy, which headed west across town in the direction of the Heathrow airport. A dozen white police vehicles escorted the convoy and a police helicopter circled overhead.

A Libyan plane was due at Heathrow at 4 p.m. (10 a.m. EST.) The plane filed a flight plan to leave four hours later. airport officials said.

The siege began April 17 when policewoman Yvonne Fletcher, 25, was killed during a peaceful demonstration against the regime of Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy. The shots that killed her were fired from an embassy window. British police and sharpshooters immediately ringed the

Britain broke relations with Libya on Sunday and demanded the Liybans holed up in the London embassy leave the country within a week. The beachfront British Embassy in Tripoli, Libya, also was to be closed.

Departures from the two countries began Thursday as Britons and Libyans flew back to their home countries Eighteen lead-lined canvas diplomatic bags also were removed from the Libyan "People's Bureau," loaded in an air-freight van and taken to Heathrow airport for return to Libya.

In accordance with diplomatic conventions, the large white bags were not searched, despite British officials' fears that the Libyans would use the bags to ship arms and explosives out of

Thirty Britons from Tripoli, led by Ambassador Oliver Miles' sons Hugh. Tom and Joe, emerged from a plane London's Gatwick Airport waving a big Union Jack and were greeted by Foreign Office ministers.

"It's marvelous to be back," said Miles' wife, Julia. "We've all been hoping this moment would come. It's been quite an ordeal." Miles stayed in Tripoli to oversee the embassy shutdown. He and 13 other diplomats are expected to leave Saturday.

Mrs. Miles said she had "no fears" for the 8.000 Britons still in Libya. "They're a tough lot and they know they're taking a calculated risk. They know they've got problems.

The Britons sang "Rule Britannia" and "God Save The Queen" as they boarded their jetliner in Tripoli.

In London, 137 Libyans surrounded by police at Heathrow airport left aboard a white-and-gold Libyan Arab Airlines jet. In Tripoli, they were greeted as heroes by a crowd chanting "revolution forever" and "power to the people," British radio reports said.

## Lefors school bid accepted

LEFORS - Trustees of the Lefors Independent School District awarded a bid for construction of the new elementary school to Binkley, Inc., of Amarillo in a special called meeting Thursday night.

Total cost of construction will be \$483,900 with three options accepted by the board members, Supt. Jimmy Collins said

Binkley submitted the low base bid of \$478,000 for building construction, without options. Three options were put up for alternate bids beyond the base figure, with the board deciding to

accept all three in Binkley's bid. The options are a roofing bond to guarantee the roof for 10 years, \$1,200; heavy duty carpet for extended wear, \$3,500; and prefinished colored sheet metal for exterior use, \$1,200.

The exterior metal should not need to be repainted, Supt. Collins said.

Collins said contractor Dale Binkley reported contruction is expected to start the first of June, with 270 calendar days alloted for construction of the 9,216 square foot building.

## U.S. will sell nuclear technology to China

PEKING (AP) — President Reagan extolled the virtues of capitalism and democracy to a Chinese audience today and announced an agreement allowing sales of American nuclear technology to the world's most populous nation.

Reagan said the United States and China were writing "a new chapter" in their relationship, but Chinese Premier Zhao Ziyang cautioned separately that U.S. ties with Taiwan were an obstacle to progress.

In a speech to a group of several

hundred Chinese scientists intellectuals and other officials, Reagan said, "Today, China's economy

crackles with the dynamics of change China is beginning to reach out toward new horizons and we salute your

Reagan was warmly applauded by the handpicked audience, many of whom understood English, when he said, "As China moves forward on this new path. America welcomes the opportunity to walk by your side.

"You will choose your own path to development," Reagan said "But we are not surprised to see the fresh breezes of incentives and innovation sweeping positive changes across China.

Reagan also received standing applause at the end of the speech, delivered in the Great Hall of the People with the American and Chinese flags displayed side-by-side behind him on the podium.

Outside, several thousand people

stood in Tiananmen Square behind barricades, waiting for a glimpse of the American leader who arrived here Thursday on a six-day visit.

Reagan's speech was to be broadcast later on Chinese television to an audience that White House officials estimated might number 200 million.

Reagan said the nuclear energy agreement, the product of three years of negotiations, would create broad opportunities for American firms to sell nuclear equipment to China.

## Authorities detect pain killer, cocaine in body of Kennedy

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) - As the Kennedy family prepared again to bury one of its own, authorities announced that cocaine and a pain killer were detected in the body of 28-year-old David Kennedy, whose death was being treated as a "a drug-related incident."

A private Mass for the drug- and alcohol-troubled member of one of America's foremost families was planned today at his mother's mansion.

Hickory Hill, in McLean, Va. Later, the son of Ethel and the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was to be laid to rest in the family's plot in Holyhood Cemetery in Brookline, Mass., where his grandfather Joseph P. Kennedy is

Tests also showed that a small quantity of white powder found in the hotel room where David Kennedy was found dead Wednesday was 1.3 grams of "high purity" cocaine. Pintacuda

The cocaine and Demerol, but no alcohol, showed up in tests performed Thursday, Pintacuda said, "The combination of the two drugs has more effect on the body than a single drug."

Kennedy, who spent Easter weekend at the hotel several miles from the family's seaside winter mansion, was found dead Wednesday morning, lying on the floor between two beds in a multiroom suite.

A Harvard University dropout who had ambitions for a career in journalism, Kennedy had a history of problems with drugs and alcohol. Some friends and biographers said the young man had been particularly close to his father and never recovered from the senator's assassination in 1968.

The body, in a casket packed in a cardboard shipping box, was sent aboard a commercial jet for the two-hour flight to Washington on Thursday

Mrs. Kennedy and several family members and friends knelt at the grave of Robert Kennedy in Arlington National Cemetery before the body was returned

When the coffin arrived at Hickory Hill mansion, it was carried inside by a group of Kennedy brothers and cousins. Later, members of the family and close friends gathered outside in the bright sunshine.

"It had the pastoral feeling of an outdoor wake on a beautiful day," said one man present, quoted anonymously in today's edition of The New York Times. "There were babies crawling on the lawn, dozens of dogs running around and through everything. There was something timeless about the day, something both tragic and exquisite."

## Lilac rows planted years ago

False blue Purple, Colour of lilac . . . A reticent flower . . .

Lilacs,

Standing beside clean doorways . . . Making poetry out of a bit of And a hundred or two sharp blossoms.

Pampa residents traveling about the town this time of year near the Buckler and Somerville streets intersection can see a yard filled with hundreds of lilac blossoms, the wind wafting their scent through the surrounding area

Most residents, especially 'newcomers," don't realize the rows of trimmed bushes are the results of a woman who first planted two lilac bushes there nearly 70 years ago - in

Cecil P. Buckler, one of the early

leaders of the White Deer Land Co., married Annie Thut, daughter of pioneer Henry Thut, in 1909. In 1915 they moved into the newly built house located at 410 Buckler Mrs. Buckler was living in Lefors at

the time of her marriage. After she moved into her new house, she went down to Lefors and brought back two lilac bushes from her parents' home She planted them in front of the

house. Over the years, she divided them, placing the sprigs along the driveway and sidewalks and around the yard until the lot seemed to be almost filled with hedges of lilacs. "She loved beautiful things. especially flowers," said her

son-in-law, Ben Guill, who now lives in the house with his wife Marjorie. Mrs. Guill, daughter of the Bucklers, was born in the house in 1916. The house was "in the country

then," Mrs. Guill said. They had cows and an alfalfa field. "Coyotes would come up then." Now, of course, it is in the center area of town, the city having expanded around it. Her mother spent more than 40

years working on the lilacs, dividing them, planting them, pruning them, until the bushes surrounded the front and side vards and lined the walks and driveway

But in addition to beautifying her own house with the lilacs, Mrs. Buckler gave lilac sprigs away to other residents in the town. Many of the older lilacs throughout the city come from those two bushes she brought up from Lefors.

"You didn't order plants then," Mrs. Guill said. "You got them where you could get them.'

Mrs. Buckler died on Christmas Day, 1958. Her husband remained in the house until his death on Dec. 27,

The house remained vacant for five years until the Guills moved back to Pampa in 1973. The bushes had lost some of their former bloom, so the Guills went to work on them. deep-feeding them, trimming them, thinning them out some, until they blossomed forth in their glory again.

You can divide a lot of flowers in 70 years," Guill said

People had come to look for the blooming of the lilacs in the spring, often stopping by to look at them. "People still do," Guill said, adding

## U.S. trade deficit new record for third consecutive month

The United States posted a record \$10.3 billion trade deficit in March, the third straight record-breaking month, the government said today, as the nation appeared headed for its worst trading year in history.

The March deficit was \$200 million higher than the February total of \$10.1 billion, the first month the red ink had ever gone into double digits. In January, the deficit was \$9.5 billion.

The continuing trading woes have led analysts to predict the deficit for the full year should reach \$110 billion, far surpassing last year's record \$69.4

Imports surged to their highest level ever in March - \$28 billion - 2.6 percent higher than the February total of \$27.3 billion and 37.3 percent higher than the total a year ago. Exports were up 2.9 percent from February to \$17.7

Most economists blame the country's poor trading performance on a high-valued U.S. dollar and slower

economic recovery in the rest of the world. The high dollar makes it more difficult for U.S. businesses to sell their goods overseas while making imports less expensive. The slower economic recovery has also hindered U.S. businesses in expanding foreign

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige said the growing imports reflected "the strong U.S. economy" as foreign goods continued to satisfy part of the surge in domestic consumer

Baldrige noted that the deficit for January-March, expressed at an annual rate, would be \$119.3 billion, compared to an annual pace of \$89.3 billion from October through December

But Baldrige said there was some reason for hope in the fact that exports increased in March. "Faster economic growth among our trading partners should limit further widening of the U.S. trade gap and may help to bring some improvement by the end of this

Meanwhile, First-quarter earnings statements in the auto and oil industrie provided fresh evidence of a surgin economy, but the rise in business productivity was continuing at a slightly slower pace than last year.

The 2.6 percent annual rate gain in productivity in the first quarter was down from the advance in the fourth quarter of 1983, the Labor Department

Nevertheless, the figures released Thursday suggested continued improvement in the business indicator that private and government economists contend is a vital barometer of the ability of American business to cope with steadily mounting international competition.

Ford Motor Co. on Thursday announced record first-quarter earnings of \$897 million in the first quarter, putting the nation's No. 2 automaker in position to break its record profit for a full year before the summer is out.



## Governor welcomes House draft of state education reform bill

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Mark White ays a \$2.4 billion "working draft" of ublic school reform laid before a House committee should help gather support needed to call a special legislative session.

This is a timely working document that adds further impetus toward our agenda for education reform and advances our search for a consensus." White said Thursday.

Rep. Bill Haley, D-Center, chairman of the House Public Education committee, told a news conference the 76-page document would be a starting point for his committee when it begins meeting May 7.

"My staff and I have been working closely with the speaker's office, the lieutenant governor's office and the commissioner of education on the specifics of a reform package," White said. "Representative Haley's proposal parallels our ongoing discussions, and I look forward to working with him in this

Haley said the draft, drawn with the

help of the Texas Education Agency and the Legislative Budget Board, adopted numerous recommendations of the Select Committee on Public Education - but a number of controversial proposals were ignored.

"These were just not practical from a cost standpoint," Haley said of the overlooked SCOPE suggestions.

Among the SCOPE recommendations left out was one that would abandon the elected State Board of Education in favor of an appointed smaller board, Other spurned proposals called for a longer school day, a longer school year and full-time kindergarten for

White has said he will call a special session of the Legislature in late May or June to consider public school education and teachers pay, if there is a consensus of agreement by House and Senate leaders. He also has said he will seek a one-cent increase in the state sales tax and a five-cent increase in the

gasoline tax to finance the school

Lobby sources in Austin said Thursday the expected start of the 30-day special session is Monday, June

Haley estimated the working draft would cost about \$720 million to put the changes into effect before the end of this fiscal year, Aug. 31, 1985, of which about \$600 million would be for

The bill calls for starting teachers pay of \$1,520 a month, compared to the present \$1,111, and the basic pay teachers could advance to \$2,660 in 10 steps by additional experience and training

In addition the measure also calls for a four-step "career ladder" whereby teachers would win \$2,000 bonuses for each step they take after special examinations and appraisals. Haley, a former history teacher, said it probably would take at least a year to put the career ladder system into effect, if approved by the Legislature.

AUSTIN (AP) - The former admininstrator of the Texas Employment Commission, fired after a 30-year career with the agency, will start his job-hunting in the courtroom. looking to get his \$52,300-a-year job

Ernie Tullis, the apparent loser in a power struggle with the three employment commissioners, said he was "a little surprised" when the commissioners axed him Thursday.

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"I said 'a little surprised," Tullis, 50, told reporters. "I didn't say I was totally surprised.

The commissioners fired Tullis during an emergency meeting called after Attorney General Jim Mattox said in an opinion Wednesday that the commissioners - not the administrator are in charge of the agency that hands out unemployment checks.

In a lawsuit filed April 17, Tullis alleged the commissioners had violated the Open Meetings Act and overstepped their authority.

The five-minute Thursday meeting ended with a 2-1 vote that ended Tullis' career, which started with a \$1.10-an-hour temporary clerk job.

Diane Van Helden of Austin, Tullis' lawyer, said she will ask a state district judge to rule that the commissioners illegally fired Tullis at an improper

"I think his concern is not as much with having the pleasure of working with those people as it is for the implications for the State of Texas and its (federal) unemployment grant," she

The lawyer said the U.S. Department of Labor, which sends unemployment funds to the TEC, might frown upon the firing of the man with whom they deal.

She said Tullis' lawsuit also will cite the state "whistle-blowers" act which protects employees who point out wrongdoing

The spark that ignited the Thursday firing was a Wednesday letter from Tullis to the State Purchasing and General Services Commission in which Tullis offered to sell TEC's three buildings near the Capitol. The commissioners and the adminsitrator have been squabbling over the sale for

Tullis said the 1983 Legislature authorized negotiations for the sale of the agency buildings, owned by the federal government, to the State Purchasing and General Services

TEC Chairman Ed Grisham said during the meeting that the letter was sent without commission approval. "I was not consulted, although it

purports to be an action of the commission," he said. Tullis' actions left TEC without the

atmosphere ''necessary for harmonious operation of the agency,' Grisham said before making the motion to fire Tullis. "There cannot be a harmonious working relationship with the present agency administrator.

Commissioner Ken Clapp was the lone vote against firing Tullis.

## Catholic nun turns government witness in alien smuggling case

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - A federal prosecutor says a Catholic nun has agreed to turn government witness under an arrangement which could free her from a charge of conspiracy to transport illegal aliens.

Sister Dianne Muhlenkamp, 36, of Fort Wayne Ind., applied for "pre-trial diversion," on Thursday, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Jack Wolfe.

Under the agreement, the nun waived her right to a speedy trial and will be on probation for one year, Wolfe said. If the probation period is completed to the government's satisfaction, the charge against Sister Dianne will be dropped, the prosecutor said.

Muhlenkamp's attorney, Robert Yzaguirre, wouldn't comment on the

## Communists rule, but can't govern

The concentration camp that passes for Poland may appear relatively calm on the surface in the wake of Warsaw's ham-fisted policies, but the communist jailers still have the same problem: They can rule but they cannot govern effectively

The latest example of this truth took place when Warsaw withdrew its prohibition against placing crucifixes in government schools and hospitals. Poland's Roman Catholic officials and government functionaries reached a "compromise" wherein the crosses will be allowed in reading rooms and dormitories. Moreover, the government reopened the Stanislaw Stazic Agricultural School in Mietne, some 40 miles south of Warsaw, which had been closed for a month following student protests there against the crucifix ban.

The brouhaha began in early March when the government barred public displays of crosses in state schools. Irate students immediately took to the streets protesting the ban and a Polish bishop went on a bread-and-water fast to support the demonstrations. Within weeks, more than 450 clergymen had joined the fast and government officials soon began to backpedal,

seeking a graceful exit. After some initial posturing, the communists relaxed the ban and dropped their demand that students sign a declaration agreeing not to display crucifixes and pledging not to protest. Warsaw promised there would be no reprisals against the demonstrators and that the two teachers who were transferred for supporting the students would get their jobs back

About the same time, the Polish parliament approved a church-sponsored foundation's application to channel some \$2 billion in Western assistance to Polish farmers during the next five years. Although the government had previously prohibited such aid on ideological grounds, a severe winter drought threatens the spring weat crop that is prennially hampered by the the state's cumbersome collective-farm system. Fearing consumer unrest over additional food shortages, the government is igerly agreeing to the church's good offices to secure Western financial assistance

Such assistance, of course, can only strengthen the church's stature. We see again how in Poland the human spirit is mightier than the sword.

# Don't take Mario Cuomo lightly

NEW YORK (NEA) - Mario Cuomo is now well past the halfway mark on his term of governor of New York, and it is high time to reassess this interesting and (just possibly) dangerous man. For one thing, isn't conceivable that he might wind up as the Democrats' vice presidential candidate of liberal rhetoric that is as ingenious as it is vicious, and it behooves conservatives to pay careful attention to countering it.

I plead guilty to having underestimated Cuomo when he squeked past conservative Republican Lew Lehrman and into the governorship of New York in 1982. My impression was that he was just another liberal wimp, and that Lehrman would probably have little trouble sending him to the showers in a rematch in 1986. Today, I am much less sure of that

My original low estimate of Cuomo was fortified by the cautious tenor of his 1982 campaign. Knowing that there was a strong conservative tide running in the nation despite the recession, he took care to appear in TV commercials surrounded by his family, and to stress his lifelong allegiance

to "the family values" - a phrase rightly understood by the voters as implying opposition to the permissive code of the counterculture: promiscuity, drugs, pornography, abortion, et al.

In his inaugural address, however, the new governor unveiled a concept of "the family" that must have left many who voted for him feeling like the museum - goers who followed Barnum's sign to "the Egress." "No family that favored its strong children or that in the name of evenhandedness failed to help its vulnerable ones would be worthy of New York, feeling one another's pain,

sharing one another's blessings."

True to this vastly expanded concept of "the family." Cuomo in office has proved himself a devout supporter of almost every imaginable plank in the platform of liberalism, from gay rights and abortion on demand to increased welfare spending and opposition to the death penalty under any circumstances.

What's more, he has unleashed in support of his policies a style of oratory as notable for its vigor as for its deviousness and its divisiveness. As Cuomo sees it, Reagan's policies are not merely mistaken: They are deliberately designed to help the rich at the expense of the poor. "There is a powerful move toward a new ethic," he told a church audience last November, "one that says, 'God helps those whom God has helped, and if God has left you out, who are we to presume on his will by trying to help you?" Not pausing to to identify any specific promoters of this callous view, the governor went on to sum up the state of the nation as he saw it: "More money for bombs, less for babies. More help for the rich, more poor

By this Cuomo was willing to admit there was an economic upswing, but instead that the price was too high: "Is it right to forget that the way you have achieved a so - called success in this country was by inducing a recession? Is it right to foget you kept the boat afloat by tossing people overboard?" And anyway, how real is the recovery? "Go to Grand Central and see the women in rags - carrying all they own in shopping bags. If America is back, these people haven't seen

It was scarcely a surprise, therefore, when Cuomo recently delivered himself of the opinion that one cannot be a Christian and a conservative simultaneously.

Pretty strong stuff, you must admit rabid, old - fashioned hatemongering, of a kind more customary on the extreme fringes of politics than in the considered

utterances of a big - state governor. At a time when most liberal politicians are backpedaling cautiously, Cuomo clearly thinks the best defense is a strong offense.

Conceivably the Democratic presidential nominee, whoever it may be, might consider such a groin - and - eyeball fighter just what the Democratic ticket will need for balance especially if polls show he can help carry New York and other states with large numbers of Italo - American voters. On the

other hand, Cuomo would do little for the ticket in other key regions, and (to descend to a minor point) he has pronounced bags under his eyes that give his face a distinctly fried - egg look. But personally I'm through underestimating Mario Cuomo.

# Overtly running a covert war

An old - timer from Langley, now living in a safe house in McLean, said of Nicaragua, "I've never seen a C.I.A. covert operation more overt in my life.

"I was thinking the same thing myself," I said. "I thought you guys were supposed to have deep cover when you went into the jungles of Central America.'

"That used to be the case. But present U.S. foreign policy demands we let the whole world know we're operating covertly to save El Salvador and bring down Nicaragua. President Reagan wants to make sure friend and foe are aware the U.S. is actively involved

'Why doesn't he just declare an overt war

and let it go at that? "He needs Congress to declare an overt war. He's not going to ask for one during an election year. So the president is conducting a covert war, with all the fanfare of an overt one. The only problem is that when you conduct a covert war you have a lot of restrictions placed on you, in order for it not

to become overt. The mining of Nicaraguan harbors is a good example of that. The president said it was covert - the rest of the world considered it overt.

'And Congress cut off the CIA's funding for its war in Central America.

"It was a big mistake on the president's part because up until then the House and Senate supported the CIA's covert operations in the hemisphere. You see, the government can say it knew nothing about it. But in the case of the mining, everyone in the administration defended it, and there was no way of dumping it on a wild rogue elephant at the CIA.

"The administration's strategy was, the more publicity the covert mining operation received, the stronger message we would be sending to the Sandinista government that we really meant business. Unfortunately, Congress got the same message.

"Does this mean that the CIA's covert war in Central America is over?

"Of course not. But it will have to be done much more covertly. Funds for it will have to be channeled from money buried in the education budget, CIA agents will have to be given cover in the Honduran - American Coffee Bean Exchange, and President Reagan will have to shut up about how well his administration's covert operations are going in the Western Hemisphere.

"That'g going to be hard for the president to do," I said.

"He has no choice. He needs congressional support for his policy in El Salvador to train the army to fight the Nicaraguan - trained Salvadoran rebels."

"You mean the Nicarguans are fighting a covert war against El Salvador, at the same time we're fighting a covert war against Nicaragua?



The Senate had its eye on a picayune political issue, while the major issue of bailouts was ignored. That provides a valuable lesson in the responsbility of national legislators or the lack thereof.

For months, Argentina toyed with U.S. banks and the U.S., in effect threatening not to meet a March 31 deadline on \$500 million owed to its creditors. Twenty - five U.S. banks were owed \$200 million. They are terrified that they would have to classify Argentina's loans as "non - performing" and deduce missing interest payments from

The bailout deal is complicated, involving loans to Argentina from four Latin American countries, which the U.S. will make up in due course. The bailout spares the U.S. banks considerable anguish. It puts off a day of reckoning with Argentina. However, in the words of the Wall Street Journal, "the U.S. Treasury and U.S. taxpayers have undertaken large new obligations and potential exposures to loss."

Congress prefers not to look too closely at such bailouts because it doesn't know the answer to the problem of foreign indebtedness and irresponsible lending - and it is afraid of getting blamed if it gets

involved.

The Treasury, for its part, hasn't any mandate from Congress or the public to take any definite line. The administration also hopes that the problem will go away.

Unfortunately, the latest bailout means that the U.S. will encounter similar situations in the future. The Argentinians, who owe \$46 billion dollars, know that the U.S. will do almost anything cosmetic to cover up the reality of default. They have only sit still, delay payment of their debts and something will be arranged to make it appear that everything is all right.

The Argentinian debt is part of a much bigger debt problem. Overall, the Latin nations owe \$335 billion. Their ability to repay is minimal. If they all declare a moratorium, one of the principal victims will be the U.S. banking system. If the U.S. declares these countries in default and allows their assets in the U.S. to be seized, the embittered nations may be driven into the arms of the Soviet Union

In the Latin debt situation, the U.S. is confronted with an ocean of spilt milk. U.S. banks and government agencies should not have loaned enormous sums to unstable and often unproductive Latin countries. American banking institutions and the U.S.

itself are now held hostage to the Latin

Congress, however, which is so eager to share in the making of foreign policy and declare whether 55 or 70 U.S. servicemen may be based in El Salvador, wants no part of the truly important responsibility for setting lending policy with respect to Latin nations. It wants power in what it deems politically advantageous, but refuses to accept responsibility in far more important

## Naval exercises in Gulf of Fonseca

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) - Two U.S. Navy warships have joined maneuvers in the Gulf of Fonseca aimed at tightening surveillance of Nicaragua's coast and deterring arms shipments to leftist rebels in El Salvador

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The Pentagon says the U.S. ships, which joined Salvadoran and Honduran boats Thursday, will steer clear of Nicaraguan waters of the gulf, which lies between El Salvador and Nicaragua.

A U.S. military source in Honduras, meanwhile, said U.S. reconnaissance plane have been flying over Nicaragua and have sometimes drawn groundfire, according to reports today in The Los Angeles Times and The Washington

The unidentified source said the Pentagon has denied there have been such flights but said Nicaragua's leftist dinista government has denounced

the aircraft take off from Palmerola air base in Honduras and Howard air base in Panama. The source was quoted as saying the reconnaissance flights are likely tied to U.S. intelligence efforts to track down alleged flow of war materiel from Nicaragua to the rebels fighting the U.S.-backed government of El Salvador

Improving the interception of any Nicaraguan shipment of arms to Salvadoran guerrillas is a key aim of the naval exercises, Pentagon officials said. The maneuvers are to last until May 7, the day after presidential runoff elections in El Salvador.

In describing the maneuvers in the Gulf of Fonseca, the Pentagon said no blockades or mining of Nicaraguan waters will be attempted

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

The Senate Intelligence Committee says it will tighten procedures for overseeing U.S. spy activities following CIA Director William J. Casey's admission he did not adequately inform senators about the agency's role in mining Nicaraguan ports

Senators said Casey made the acknowledgment, which one described as an apology, in a closed-door meeting Thursday at which Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., agreed to stay on as the panel's vice chairman.

Sen. Barry Goldwater. R-Ariz, the committee's chairman, said the senators were in a "very happy mood" at the meeting, but Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, said it was a "very spirited, sharp exchange" of views.

There were strong statements made on both sides," Bentsen said. He said "apologized for not having highlighted the question of the mining before.

In its formal statement after the meeting, the committee said

"The committee has

Moynihan said a senator asked whether there were any other covert operations in Central America the committee had not been told about "and the answer was He said he did not 'no.''' remember whether Casev or one of his aides answered the question.

Moynihan, who has supported CIA funds for support of Nicaraguan guerrillas in the past, declined to say whether he

will continue to do so

'That is another and separate question," he said. What is not clear is whether what we voted for is the program we have."

Goldwater predicted the administration, which is asking for \$21 million to continue aid to the rebels in this fiscal year, would get the

"They will either get it in this bill or we will have to do it again," he told reporters.

The bill, which also contains \$61.7 million in emergency military aid for El Salvador and a wide range of other appropriations totaling \$1.3 billion, is in the hands of a House-Senate conference committee.

Rep. Clarence Long. D-Md., chairman of the House Appropriations subcommittee on foreign operations and a key member of the conference panel, when asked how soon the conference committee would meet, said, "I don't think it is going to meet very soon.'

In other developments: -Attorney General William French Smith declined a request by Chairman Peter Rodino,

Democrats on the House Judiciary Committee that he appoint a special prosecutor to investigate whether the administration has violated the Neutrality Act in Nicaragua. Smith said there was "simply no credible support for the proposition that the Neutrality Act proscribes the cmmittee rejected a request by Rep. 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## Brightest people trying to make world

WASHINGTON (AP) Next week, rain or shine, 70 experts on subjects ranging from forestry to population control will pack themselves off to Wye Island, a remote outpost on the Chesapeake Bay, to see if there are solutions to some of the world's most pressing problems or if we simply ought to give up

They hope to persuade the government, the World Bank, ousinessmen and the media that their recommendations deserve attention

The conference was organized by the World Resources Institute on a hopeful note. Once the key problems were identified. said James Gustave Speth, chairman of the steering committee, the next priority

was "to try to move away from a gloom-and-doom psychology towards a more positive vision of an

attainable future." This is not the first time some of the brightest people have tried to make the future livable. Sometimes their efforts are dragged down by politics, sometimes by the

very enormity of the issues Speth, who once clerked for an eternal optimist, the late Supreme Court Justice Hugo L. Black, hopes this time the message will be different.

"There's no cause for despair or pessimism," he said in outlining the conference the other day. "We haven't really scratched the surface of actions that can be taken to correct these problems."

They include growing populations, food supplies, carbon dioxide buildups and preservation of species.

The Reagan administration will have to be convinced it has a stake in solving problems that mostly pinch the Third World

Speth said the United States will not be able to resolve its security concerns in Central America, for instance, "until we have a more profound understanding of the relationship of resources and land-management to the future of people in the

A little more than half the 70 experts are Americans. They include former Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, Robert O.

Atlantic Richfield Co. of Los Angeles, and Russell E. Train, president of the World Wildlife Fund.

The others are from overseas, including a forestry and wildlife specialist from Peru, a drought control director from Upper Volta, a chemist from China's Academy of Sciences and the director general of Mexico's National Institute for Biological Resources.

There will even be an environmental activist from Sri Lanka, who has led a citizen's peace march around the island to promote civil harmony in his troubled



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They would seem to have more on their plate than any 70 specialists can handle in just three days. But the problems are so related to each other the conference has an almost awesome scope. Land problems rub against forestry problems. Fisheries and pollution are inextricably linked.



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## Defiant policeman recovers slain woman officer's cap

LONDON (AP) - A policeman defied orders and sprinted across St. James's Square outside the besieged Libyan Embassy before dawn today to retrieve the cap of a colleague whose death by a bullet fired from the embassy touched off the

The white cap, with a black-and-white checkered band, had lain on the street since April 17 when policewoman Yvonne Fletcher, 25, was shot in the back a sniper.

It had become a poignant symbol of the siege and a talisman to Britons angered by the murder. The constable's dash came only hours before Miss Fletcher's funeral in the 13th century cathedral at Salisbury in

southwest England, her hometown, and before Libyans began evacuating the embassy The unidentified constable "acted on his own initiative" in his 50-yard run from cover at the edge of the square, said Scotland Yard spokesman John Miller

Police chiefs had ordered their men ringing the embassy to let the cap lie in the deserted square until the siege ended.

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
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


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
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



Since then, Shenzhen officials have courted Western investors in an effort to attract business, and a spate of industrial complexes and office buildings has popped up on the region's fertile plains.

Among the most surprising evidence of rapid growth is the zone's population, which Luo said catapulted from 25,000 four years ago to its current figure of 300,000. The landscape also has

changed. Today, the zone also has six tourist resorts and 29

highways, with six more planned, according to statistics released by Shenzhen officials. Shenzhen officials say they

want to attract electronics and oil corporations to the area. Sanyo and PepsiCo. have already established industrial roots in the region and a booming oil exploration industry has lured Shell, Esso, Sun Oil, Sohio, Tenneco, Texaco and on oil companies.

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# River Run aids health

EL PASO, Texas (AP) —
West Texas' Big Bend
country rolls out like an
endless carpet of desert,

country rolls out like an endless carpet of desert, anchored by mountains on the horizons.

'You can hear the

quietness," observed Frank Pulattie, superintendent at the Terlingua School just outside the Big Bend National Park. "It's a shame you can't capture some of these scenes. ... It's some of the prettiest scenery that there is."

Despite this richness, however, the region is poor when it comes to health care. Not counting El Paso, the

Not counting El Paso, the state's five westernmost counties have almost as much land as the nation's five smallest states.

Yet, they have only 10 to 12 doctors and two hospitals, said Charles Mallory, regional immunization director for the Texas Health Department.

Until recently, this boundless borderland also had been a breeding ground for contagious diseases — particularly tuberculosis.

While five revelopments.

While five rural counties had just 5 percent of the West Texas population, it had 10 percent of the TB cases, Dr. Earl Gorby of the state health department said.

That picture is vastly changed today, however thanks to the River Run.

First organized in 1970, the River Run allows state health officials to take their clinics on the road in their battle against disease.

Armed with vaccinations

Armed with vaccinations and a mobile X-ray van, they first battled TB, then later added immunization clinics to control other contagious diseases.

Fourteen years later, the number of TB cases and unvaccinated school children have dwindled to acceptable levels.

For example, West Texas had an average of 42.6 tuberculosis cases per 100,000 people in 1972, compared with a rate of only 21 per 100,000 in the state as a whole.

In Presidio County alone, the TB rate was 425.3 cases per 100,000, state health statistics show. But by 1982, the West Texas TB rate had dropped to 15.5 cases per 100,000. That compares with a rate of 13.7 statewide.

Last month, state health officials from El Paso, Alpine and Marfa again took the River Run on the road. During the two-day trip, health officials had immunization clinics in four outlying villages and vaccinated more than 200 neonle

Along the way, several people were examined for a variety of maladies, but only one of them was a tuberculosis patient.

Years ago, Gorby said, he would have 10 to 15 active cases just in Presidio, a border hamlet about 200 miles southeast of El Paso.

When Dr. John Bradley, the state's regional health director, first started the River Run, the trek wasn't as easy as last week's expedition, health officials said.

Roads were poor, making some areas inaccessible to all but four-wheel-drive vehicles. And many of the clinics had to be outdoors, sometimes off the tailgate of the health department truck.

"What they used to call the River Run was a weeklong of hard driving," recalled Doralene Lassiter, a state health department nurse for Presidio County.

"I was coming out for a week every two months," Gorby added. "Now I come out for two days three times a

Even though the main problems were under control by the late 1970s, the health department continues its expeditions for "maintenance and surveillance"

and surveillance."
In an area where "there's no real border and no real border patrol," as Mallory put it, populations from Texas and Mexico mix with each another and are exposed to each other's diseases.

Health officials still check for tuberculosis on the River Run, their main tool being the TB skin test

Tuberculosis is a slow-moving bacterial illness that usually is spread by coughing or sneezing, Gorby explained.

Once in the body, the natural immune system usually controls it, but some cases develop into

full-fledged infections.

The lungs are the most common place for the infection to settle, and if unattended, tuberculosis will eat them away and leave big cavities.

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
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
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
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
