WE ARE LEARNING TO OBSERVE SIGNALS.

Weeks continue to occur at the street intersections even though the traffic signal lights are in operation and pedestrians continue to violate the law in failing to observe the stop signal.

CONDITIONS—A STATE OF MIND.

If there is anything in psychology, 1929 is going to be a wonderful year. Conditions are usually governed by our state of mind.

AND STILL THERE IS A BEYOND.

Nothing lures like immensity of space. Star-dotted with the wonder of other planets larger than ours.

ENGLAND, CRUISERS AND CANADA.

Probably the sharpest legislative battle of the winter will break loose at Washington shortly when the bill providing for the construction of 15 new cruisers for our navy comes up for action.

It goes without saying that if we are to have a navy at all we must have an "adequate" one; but it is the row about what is adequate and what is not that is causing all the trouble.

And, regarding the possibility of war between England and America, why not consider our Canadian border?

OUR WAR WITH JAPAN.

We haven't heard quite so much in recent years about that American-Japanese war that was accepted as inevitable a short time ago.

A little dispatch from Tokio the other day told how the new Mikado reviewed his fleet. In the line of 180 fighting ships were eight "capital ships"—battleships and battle cruisers armed with huge guns.

But in 1912 the late Mikado reviewed his fleet and there were 21 capital ships in line. All but eleven have been scrapped under the Washington treaty.

FIGHTING ORGANIZED CRIME.

With all her brilliancy and power, America's effort to cope with the ugly problem of crime has been for the most part a tragic failure. The politician and the law enforcement officer were held responsible for this condition by Arthur J. Lashley in an address in Chicago before the Illinois Bar association.

"Gambling and bootlegging are as obvious to the police as to anyone else, and it would not be hard to suppress them if there existed the desire to do so" Mr. Lashley said.

But delays and unnecessary technicalities in court practice are more to blame for the prevalence of crime, than police or juries.

CLUBS VS. GANGS.

A group of prominent Chicago business men are supporting an organization known as the Chicago Boys' club, the purpose of which is to fight delinquency and crime with opportunity, health and character.

The plan of waiting for things to turn up is not going to get you very far. It is the man or community which is up and hustling early and late that carries off the chief prize in this day and age.

We can do a great deal to keep our community moving forward if we will. We won't go far if we are going to make the other fellow carry all the load.

TWO PROJECTS WE SHOULD LAND.

One of our dependable citizens states that if the Chamber of Commerce and the citizenship of Howard county can secure a cotton seed oil mill to provide cheaper feed for those who desire to keep dairy cattle and secure a north and south railroad through Howard county in 1929 they can pat themselves on the back, as the landing of these two projects would do more to insure the future of Big Spring than anything else than you can mention.

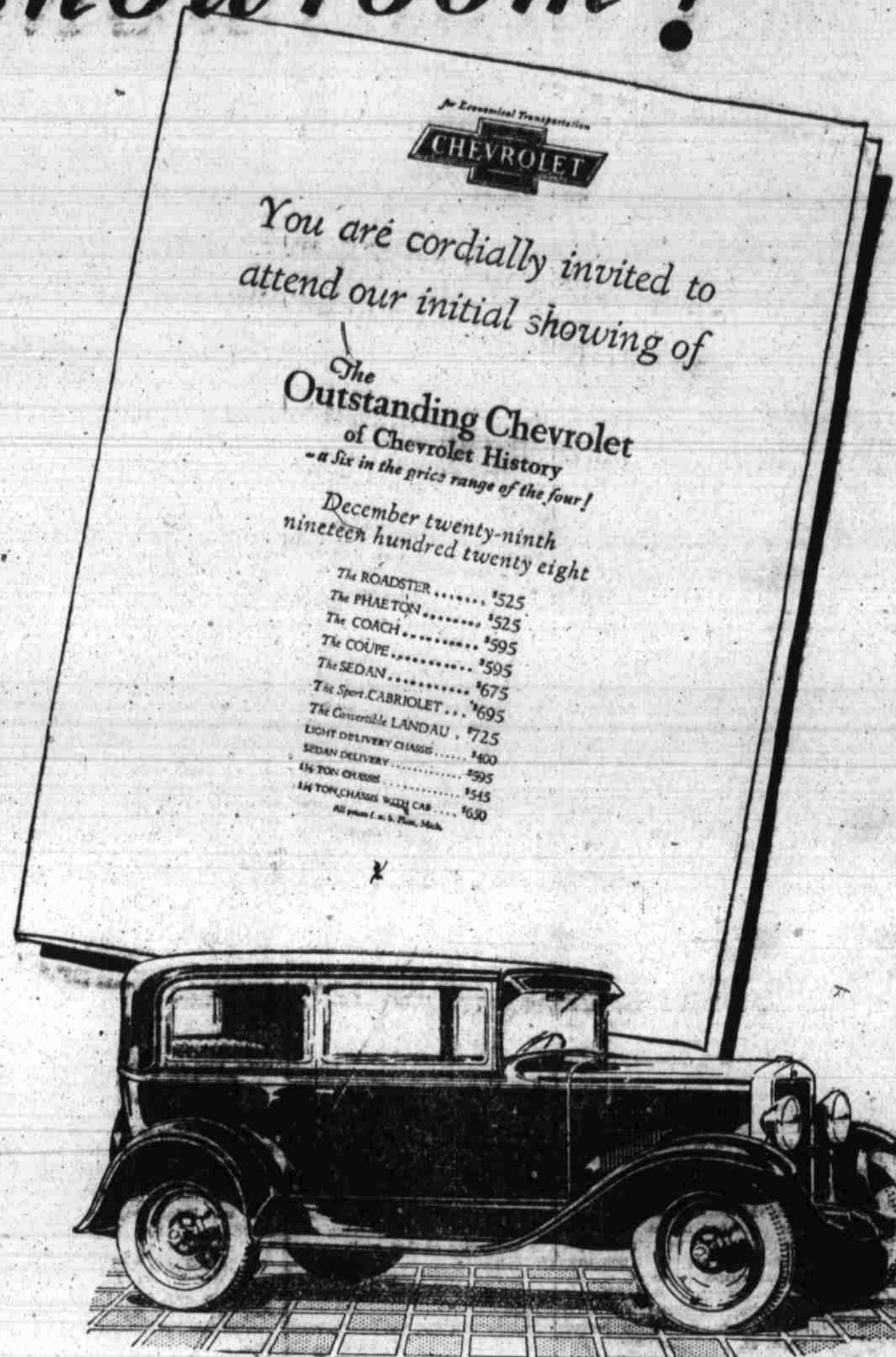

With reference to the attorneys to be heard Dec. 31, I want to say that the counties of the western where oil has been discovered being developed is so unusual the layman can not understand reason for the breakdown in courts. For instance, Howard County district court has two of three weeks each, assigned ago by the legislature when county had only about 6000 and each court term had only 5 felony cases with 8 or 10 suits. Yet at the last term of District Court there were over 100 felony cases and more than 100 civil suits, practically all of them having been filed during the preceding six months. Most of the cases were disposed of, some by agreement, compelled to do so by the prospect of no trial many months, and many of the were carried over to the next court congesting the docket this next term. If the business prosperity in Howard County Big Spring continues to increase during the next twelve months Howard County alone will be sufficient in our practice to keep district judge busy all of his time.

Besides there is a question of speedy trial guaranteed by the constitution of the State to be charged with crime. There are months between the September February terms of court, at present one man remained in jail six and one-half months awaiting the action of the grand jury did not indict him and denying a speedy hearing. This is the case of no one in particular.

The congested docket of Howard County is an example of what exists in Midland County, Ector County, Reeves County and Wichita County.
