## Independents begin presenting case to energy commission

WASHINGTON — Independent oil producers from West Texas faced off against a major gas company in a battle over 8.6 billion cubic feet of gas estimated to be worth millions of dollars.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission began on Tuesday hearing Dorchester Gas Producing Corp.'s complaint that oil producers are illegally tapping into its natural gas reserves and diverting the gas from interstate markets.

The hearing involves 50,000 acres in Gray and Carson Counties of the Texas Panhandle, where Dorchester owns the gas rights and 37 independent oil companies have oil drilling privileges.

Philip Ehrenkranz, a Washington attorney representing Dorchester, contends the "so-called oil well operators" are "taking gas out from under Dorchester" by tapping into gas reserves Dorchester owns and sells to an interstate pipeline

company under a 1952 contract

The independents maintain they are producing "casinghead" gas, a byproduct of oil drilling to which they are entitled under law. Under federal regulations, casinghead gas can be sold at much higher prices than "dry" gas, which is produced from a geological stratum that does not produce oil.

Dorchester had filed a series of lawsuits in state court against several independents. But in a separate case, a Texas court ruled in favor of the oil producers and Dorchester took its complaints to

Dorchester and the FERC staff allege the oil drillers have drained 8.6 billion cubic feet of gas from Dorchester's reserves. Ehrenkranz said the oil producers tapped into the "brown dolomite" gas stratum after producing "a little oil and a little gas"

from the deeper "granite wash" stratum Charlie Moore, former FERC general counsel now

representing the oil producers, says FERC itself approved the classification of the oil wells and thus the gas produced by them as casinghead gas and has no further jurisdiction in the case

'We're here prepared to meet the case head-on anyway," he said

The FERC order setting the hearing said the evidence phase would be followed by a remedies phase if violations of law are found. Remedies could include "requiring disgorgement by the respondents of any revenues unlawfully collected," the FERC order said.

Moore said he has heard estimates that those revenues could amount to \$100 million. But Moore also said the FERC is using the 50,000 acres in question as a test case and if similar remedies were applied to the entire Panhandle field, estimates of revenues involved range up to \$27 billion

Also at issue is the Texas Railroad Commission's

classification of wells. The state commission decides, according to "gas-oil ratio" tests, whether the well is an oil or gas well.

If FERC decides in favor of Dorchester, it would, in effect, be a refutation of the Railroad

Commission's classification of the wells. "I suspect this case is going to go to the

courthouse, one way or another," Moore said. So far, the state has not been active in the case, though it is a listed as an intervenor. Larry Laurent, representing the Attorney General's Office,

attended the hearing, but said the state was only

'monitoring' the proceedings. Parties to the case estimate that it could take eight to 12 weeks for Administrative Law Judge Brenda Murray to hear the 47 witnesses scheduled for

testimony Ms. Murray will make a recommendation to the commission, which will issue a ruling

# blind youth's surgery

An operation performed in Austin Tuesday may enable a 16-year -

old Pampa boy to see the world for the first time in his life. The family of Jimmy Vinson, 16, blind since birth, is overjoyed today following an optimistic prognosis offered by the Austin eye surgeon who performed the operation at the Seton Medical Center.

The doctor said he didn't see any reason in the world why Jimmy couldn't recover full sight in his right eye." Karla Cho of Pampa said after her brother's surgery.

She said the surgeon who repaired the eye's retina, which was detached since birth, said the operation was one of the most successful he ever performed.

Cho said the Austin surgeon found no defects in the repaired eye,

except for the detached retina.

"There was no light going through." she said.

"We never dreamed this would happen — we dreamed it — but that's all it was — a dream," the sister said.

Jimmy, son of Robert and Leona Ray, 911 E. Browning, was born premature and blind. Doctors always thought his blindness resulted from a lack of oxygen at birth, not a detached retina

The bandages wrapped around his eyes after the three and a half hour operation will come off in about a week. The surgeon told the family that Jimmy won't have his sight the instant the bandages are peeled away, as in the movies. Instead, his vision should come gradually over about three months, as the repaired retina heals itself. Cho said.

"A little bit of vision could come in the next week or two," she said. Jimmy never has said what he wanted to see first, Cho said, but she expects that it would be the faces of his family members.

The Pampa youth, a student at the School for the Blind in Austin, is a gifted student and talented musician who can play most any instrument. He once met another blind musician, Ronnie Milsap. who promised to help Jimmy publish his first song, "There's No Living Without You.'

The Rays are on a fixed income and without major modical insurance. Friends of the family have established a fund at the First National Bank to help pay for the expenses related to Jimmy's 'miracle' operation.

About 2:20 this morning, Carr answered a knock on the door, he said. The door was opened and anywhere from four to 10 men burst into the home and grabbed Smith, the Laramore added.

'They got him and started thumping on his head," Laramore

He said the gang dragged Smith out into the yard and continued stomping and beating the man

trunk of a car, he said Somehow. Smith escaped, ran back into the house, and got a gun, Laramore

man ran east down the street, firing the weapon into the air, he said

Police received a call about the gunfire. By the time officers arrived, an injured Smith was back inside the Prairie Drive residence. sitting in a bathtub full of water, police reported.

The victim was taken to Coronado Community Hospital, but he refused treatment

Smith also refused to sign a complaint and for some reason. reportedly said he couldn't remember what happened, Laramore said

# Doctor hopeful after Four killed by gunman

HOT SPRINGS, Ark. (AP) - A gunman who was wounded in a shootout with police but escaped to kill four people at a motel before dying himself had twice been thrown out of the motel's bar for obnoxious behavior, a waitress

A policeman also wounded in Tuesday's shootout was in critical condition today. A passenger in the gunman's car and a bar patron were also injured, authorities said.

It was not known whether the gunman, whose name was not released, killed himself or was shot by officers, said police spokesman Paul Jackson

The bloodbath began when Sgt Wayne Warwick radioed that he was stopping a green Dodge carrying four men for a traffic infraction on a downtown street in this resort town, police said.

But when the men got out of the car, the driver, described as about 30 years old with dirty blond hair and a stringy beard, suddenly pulled a 45-caliber automatic pistol.

In the ensuing shootout, Warwick. 36, was critically wounded in the neck, abdomen and leg but emptied his 38-caliber revolver before collapsing. One passenger was wounded, and he and another passenger were immediately apprehended, police said. The third passenger fled on foot, but was caught a couple of hours later, police said.

The driver was also wounded but although bleeding, got back in his car and drove four blocks to the Grand Central Motor Lodge

He entered the motel's lounge and opened fire with his pistol, then went back to his car, got a shotgun and returned to continue shooting. Jackson said

The dead included the bartender. the lounge proprietor, a truck driver and a woman, none of whom were identified, police and witnesses said. A bar patron was also wounded. Jackson said.

Linda Schmidt, a waitress who had served the gunman on previous occasions but didn't know his name, said she left the bar when

she saw him coming in. "He gave me the creeps... was not a nice guy; in fact, he was pretty vulgar. He was always very dirty. I didn't want to deal with him," she said.

While Jackson said police were still trying to determine a motive for the shootings. Ms. Schmidt said the slain bartender and proprietor had both thrown the gunman out of the bar previously


'Both of them had ordered him out of there, had banned him. once for being loud and vulgar, she

Jackson said he didn't know whether the officers had fired any shots, and detectives were investigating whether the gunman had committed suicide

## Dog-killing case going to grand jury

The newly - selected 223rd District grand jury Tuesday will consider the case of a Pampa man who went into his neighbor's vard and shot a dog on a chain, Gray County Sheriff Rufe Jordan said

James Eubanks, 48, admits that he shot and killed his neighbor's chained animal. He offered a simple explanation for the act that happened about 7:30 p.m. July 17.

The dog bit me. I shot the dog. Eubanks said The man investigated in

connection with the shooting lives in a house behind Prairie Drive, just outside the city limits, and about 50 yards behind the home of Johnny Smith, 22, and his wife and

Eubanks said he had to walk through the Smiths' yard and past their chained dog to reach a dumpster and empty his trash.

No fences or other obstructions blocked the man from going

around the other side of the house to reach the dumpster in the alley, but Eubanks claims he couldn't avoid walking past the dog. He said he couldn't cross behind the home because he feared "trespassing" on a third party's property.

Eubanks said the dog bit him when walked by with the load of

'I got mad. I came back to the house and got my son's .22 - caliber pistol," he said

Eubanks said he returned to the Smiths' yard and blasted the dog, but he denied pointing the weapon at Smith or the younger man's father - in - law, Al Williams.

Williams previously said that he heard gunshots from his home nearby and ran to the Smiths' yard to protect his son - in - law and grandchild. He confronted the man with the gun, telling him to put down the weapon and take a whipping, Williams said. He said

## Reagan, Mondale fire first shots over increasing taxes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Ronald Reagan and Walter Mondale have had their first clash over what is likely to be a key battleground of the fall campaign - taxes. Reagan says he has "no plans" to raise them. Mondale says the president is telling a "fish story

Mondale says a tax increase is inevitable next year, no matter who is president. But Reagan, trying to picture Mondale as a free-spending liberal, says that isn't the case

During a televised news conference Tuesday night, Reagan charged that Mondale has "repeatedly and over the years supported tax increases on

any number of occasions." Asked if he would flatly rule out a 1985 request for a tax increase, Reagan at first said "Yes."

"I have no plans for a tax increase," he said. "I believe it

would be counterproductive" for the economic recovery

However, moments later, the president appeared to hedge. saying, "you would have to look at the tax structure' if a substantial deficit remained after all possible spending cuts had been made.

"But I think we are a long way from that point with regard to bringing government down to where it ought to be brought down," Reagan said.

Mondale, who is on a fishing vacation in Minnesota, accused Reagan of waffling on the issue.

"I've been hearing fish stories all week, but tonight Mr. Reagan told a big one," Mondale said in a statement. "He said that no tax increases would be necessary but then proceeded to open the door for unfair taxes after the

issue during his nomination acceptance speech to the Democratic convention, where "Mr. Reagan will raise taxes,

and so will I. He won't tell you. I

In addition to defending his administration's economic accomplishments, the president used his 26th televised news conference to issue a challenge to the election-year Congress to pass a batch of pending legislation - including the so-called balanced budget amendment to the Constitution, tax breaks for parents of lower and middle income private school students, increased retirement benefits for housewives and a bill permitting student religious groups to meet after hours in schools

On other topics, Reagan said: - He will ask Congress to give Social Security recipients a cost-of-living increase next January regardless of what inflation, does. Federal law provides no increase if inflation falls below 3 percent for the 12 months ending in September. Inflation is currently running at about 3.2 percent, meaning the increase will be automatic unless it dips in the next three months. He stands behind his

nomination of former Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Anne M. Burford to a government advisory panel despite a 74-19 vote by the Senate Tuesday demanding that he withdraw her name. The president also predicted that Edwin Meese III, his nominee for attorney general, would be found innocent of any wrongdoing after an investigation into his financial dealings is completed.

## Immigration bill may be dead

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Simpson-Mazzoli immigration bill appeared to be dead for this session after Senate leaders said today they would not accept the House version of the legislation.

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance, D-Lubbock, had announced this morning that a group of organizations ranging from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce to La Raza Unida Party had joined a coalition to defeat the controversial bill, which was passed by the House on June 20 in a 216-211 vote.

Hance maintained that he had enough votes to defeat the bill when it returned to the House after a

House-Senate conference. If so, that would mean the bill could only be cleared for the White House through Senate acceptance of the House version, without any

But assistant Senate Republican leader Ted Stevens of Alaska said

the House version was not acceptable to the White House or the Senate sponsor, Sen. Alan K. Simpson, R-Wyo

Stevens said Simpson and House sponsor Rep. Romano L. Mazzoli, D-Ky., are expected to reintroduce their immigration proposal in

Don Hardy, an aide to Simpson, said Simpson and Mazzoli planned to issue a joint statement later in the day about the future of the legislation

The bill as passed by the House would give illegal aliens who have been living in the United States since before 1982 an opportunity to apply for legal status, and it would impose sanctions on employers who hire illegal aliens.

The Senate bill offers legal status for aliens living in the U.S. since

Opponents range from those who oppose the "amnesty" provision as rewarding lawbreakers and

threatening U.S. citizens' jobs to Hispanic and civil rights groups who are concerned that the employer sanctions will result in job discrimination.

Hance issued the list of groups at a news conference on Capitol Hill. He said they "have different reasons for opposing the bill, but they all think it's a bad bill and should not pass.

## DAILY RECORD Contract approval assures Wheeler County water vote

WHEELER - A proposition to build the Sweetwater Creek Dam is ready to face the voters as the Wheeler County Water Supply District approved a dam construction and maintenance contract with the Red River Authority.

Voters in Wheeler and Shamrock will go to the polls Aug. 11 to decide decide on a \$18 million bond issue to fund the Sweetwater Creek Reservoir, a proposed 2,500 acre lake to be located northeast of Wheeler, the bonds will be paid through an ad valorem maintenance tax of 4½ cents per \$100 property valuation. Voters may obtain absentee ballots this week from Wheeler County Clerk

T.J. Daugherty. Members of the Wheeler County Water Supply District made the August 11 election date official Monday as they approved the reservoir contract with the Red River Authority. The RRA is expected to discuss passage of the contract at a meeting today in Wichita Falls. Jim Campbell of

Pampa is a member of that board. Authority general manager Ron Glenn said the RRA and the District is "pretty close" to agreeing on a contract. He said the RRA board will meet after RRA attorneys and District attorneys meet in provate.

"From what I gather they (the attorneys) are interested in seeing that the Authority's financial

integrity is intact," he said. Under the contract, the RRA would agree to acquire and construct the Sweetwater Dam while the local district would receive the "benefits" (water supply, recreation) and make payments to the RRA.

'The District would levy the tax and we would operate the dam,' Glenn said. "The RRA is the vehicle to operate the dam until the district can get on its feet.'

"This of course is contingent on the election in August," he added.

Glenn said the key point of the contract is project financing.

The RRA is not questioning Wheeler County's ability to finance the project, Glenn said. "We go through this every time we issue bonds.

Located seven miles east and two miles north of Wheeler, the lake would have a 32-mile shoreline and a drainage area of 281 miles. Depth of the lake is estimated at 26 feet.

Lake engineers estimate that the lake will cost about \$27 million to develop. District officials anticipate \$10 million to be paid by the Texas Water Resources Board.

Although it will primarily provide water to Wheeler and Shamrock, the reservoir can provide water to such nearby communitues as Mobeetie, Briscoe, Kelton and Allison depending on these communities'

willingness to support the project. Water pressure in Wheeler is so low that courthouse drinking fountains cannot operate when courthouse lawn sprinklers are on.

## Lawyers for Mattox seeking to delay trial

AUSTIN (AP) - Lawyers for Attorney General Jim Mattox say they have asked that his trial on commercial bribery charges be

delayed from Sept. 17 until Feb. 11. Attorney Roy Minton said he filed the motion Tuesday with State District Judge Mace B. Thurman to give him time to work on two other suits - one where he represents Travis County in a pending federal suit and the other which is set for state court trial in October.

Thurman scheduled a hearing for Thursday on Minton's motion, and Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle said he

would oppose the motion. Mattox said he was disappointed that his trial might be delayed but remained confident that he would be vindicated.



#### Restrictions on water use continue

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AUSTIN (AP) - Dark clouds that developed over the parched state capital Tuesday turned out to be mere teaser drops that left Austin residents still hoping for the rain that might revoke a mandatory water conservation

In West Texas, Abilene Mayor David Stubbeman invoked a mandatory water-rationing plan, but he had to read his proclamation indoors - because of rain. However, it was not enough precipitation to change Stubbeman's mind.

Austin city officials said Tuesday it would take a tropical storm to produce enough rain to set the city's rainfall level back to normal Only .61 inch of moisture fell there. More rain was expected today but forecasters were not optmistic that one day would bring the needed

In Corpus Christi, the city outlined new water rules Tuesday that could slap \$300-a-month water bills on residents who don't take water conservation seriously

Tom Larkin, a meteorologist with the Texas Department of Water Resources, said Austin and much of Central Texas was 8 to 10 inches behind normal rainfall amounts.

John Williams, a representative of the Lower Colorado River Authority, said Tuesday's rain would not make any change in the long-range outlook for the Highland lakes.

Lakes Travis and Buchanan are well below normal July levels and are continuing to drop as water is released for rice irrigation downstream on the Colorado

City officials say there is no shortage of water in Lake Travis and Lake Austin, but the city water distribution system has not kept pace with Austin's rapid population growth since 1980

City officials also said Austin's lawn watering restrictions, once every five days, would remain in effect

"It will take more than this to change the pattern," said Faith George, water conservation program coordinator for the city. The state's capital has had only

8.96 inches of rain since the first of the year, 8.64 inches short of the normal rainfall at this time of year. Temperatures throughout July have risen to near 100 degrees daily in Austin, with a high of 103 degrees

The city has been under mandatory water restrictions since July 16, after city water use surpassed 150 million gallons daily for three consecutive days.

Under the proposed new rules in Corpus Christi, the city would set a per household water use ceiling of 4,000 gallons a month. After that, customers would see escalating surcharges that could quickly mount to a \$291-a-month bill for 20,000 gallons of water.

Water officials asked the Corpus Christi City Council to vote next week on the program so it can go into effect Aug. 15

Abilene's annual rainfall has been 8 inches below normal this year. The city's main source of water, Lake Fort Phantom Hill, dropped 17.7 feet below the spillway Monday.



## Helicopter crash kills two Dallas policemen

DALLAS (AP) — Investigators were trying to determine today what caused a freak helicopter crash that killed the founder of the Dallas police helicopter and the lieutenant in charge of the unit.

Lt. Bob Cormier, commander of the Dallas Police Department's helicopter section, and James "Chuck" Taylor, were killed just before noon Tuesday when their helicopter clipped a 523-foot radio tower, plummeted 450 feet to the ground and exploded in flames in a warehouse district in East Dallas.

Cormier, 46, had to perform a training exercise for the upcoming Republican National Convention, and usually he summoned Taylor, officials said.

Officials said they didn't know what caused the crash. But a National Transportation Safety Board investigator said there was no evidence that the aircraft

A witness said the helicopter, one of three department choppers, was circling a new police communications tower at the department's Central Service Center when one of the rotor blades nicked the tower

'It seemed to be flying perfectly well," said Rich Chordas, an insurance adjustor who saw the crash from nearby Interstate 30 Then the top blade of the helicopter just got too close.

**Executive Assistant Police Chief** Harold Warren said Cormier and Taylor had just been to a meeting concerning "dignitary protection" for the Aug. 20-23 GOP convention, which will be conducted just blocks from the crash site in the Dallas Convention Center.

"They were checking landing and takeoff paths for dignitaries,' Warren said. "They were looking into wind shift, wind velocities and so on. They were in the process of circling the tower and veered into

Police Chief Billy Prince, notified of the accident while at a meeting said. "It was a brand new tower. Maybe they weren't used to having it there.

But Warren said the pilot knew the tower was there. Witnesses said the pilot appeared to be looking back at the landing site and did see how close he was to the

Warren said the crash would not disrupt security plans for the convention. Federal Aviation Administration investigators were looking into the cause of the crash and an internal police investigation was immediately launched.

Warren said he had flown with Taylor, 45, and the pilot was "one of the best" he'd ever seen. Taylor was the department's first chopper pilot, a police spokesman said.

The FAA recently gave the police helicopter division an award for 33,000 hours of accident-free flying. Warren said it was the first fatal crash of a Dallas Police helicopter in 15 years of chopper operations.

## Reagan-Bush campaign takes on 'Democratic stronghold'

Reagan and Vice President George Bush — eschewing safely Republican bastions in Texas today headed for the state's capital city, territory the GOP concedes has long been a "Democratic stronghold.

"This is a great opportunity to kick it off in the heart of Texas where Democrats dominate." Texas Republican Party Chairman George Strake said Tuesday of the year's first joint Reagan-Bush campaign appearance.

"It's not enemy territory, but certainly Austin is a Democratic stronghold. They're going into the heart of the Democratic camp, in a

Reagan and Bush will appear at a lunchtime, outdoor rally on the shores of Town Lake near downtown Austin.

"I can't figure out why they're coming here," said Dwayne Holman, a Gov. Mark White aide who ran the Walter Mondale campaign here this spring. "They could have certainly drawn bigger crowds elsewhere.

That's the point, says GOP U.S. Senate candidate Phil Gramm, who will share the stage with

Reagan and Bush. "If you come to convert, you don't want to preach to the choir,'

Republicans want to make sure Texans remember that Bush is one of their own

"First of all, the significance is to emphasize the point that the Democorats had a chance to pick a Texan for vice president and didn't,'' Strake said. The Reagan-Bush camp "is utilizing this opportunity to point out the fact that apparently we want Texas more than the Democrats do.

The trip also will "point out that the Reagan-Bush ticket appeals to independents and conservative Democrats," Strake added.

But the visit might also bring out anti-Reagan protesters. Free tickets to the rally have been available at several locations.

The Young Democrats of American did not wait for the president to get to town. In a Tuesday news release, the group said, "The last four years have been a disaster for young people, and the blame is squarely his.

If nothing else, the campaign stop highlights the importance of the Texas vote in the presidential "Texas is the battleground."

Holman said. "I think you're going to see Fritz and Ferraro here ad infinitum also.

The Democratic nominees will make a Texas trip within a few

Austin and Travis County have been good for the Democrats even in bad years. When Reagan swept to a Texas win in 1980, Jimmy Carter carried the vote here.

Nevertheless, Gramm said Reagan had a good chance of capturing the Austin vote this year. For many years, the Capitol and the University of Texas dominated the local economic and political scene - making Travis County a Democratic stronghold. But the recent growth of electronics and computer industries here has brought in professionals who Gramm thinks might be vote for him and Reagan.

"If people are going to vote for Reagan for president on the basis of the achievments of our program. the same people will tend to vote for me for senator," said the College Station congressman who co-sponsored Reagan's economic

On the Democratic side, a spokesman for Lloyd Doggett, Gramm's opponent, said frequent Reagan-Bush visits to Austin wouldn't hurt Doggett.

'Voters have a way of cutting through this," said James Carville, Doggett's campaign manager

## Two girls bitten in separate shark attacks

SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, Texas (AP) - An 18-year-old Mexico City woman was in guarded condition Tuesday after she was attacked by a shark while swimming in chest-deep water, officials said.

A 13-year-old girl also was bitten Tuesday in a separate attack, but she was treated and released from an area hospital.

The 18-year-old, Carmen Gaytan of Mexico City, underwent surgery for six hours for "severe leg injury" at the Valley Community Hospital in Brownsville.

Gaytan required up to 60 stiches in both legs, including her ankle. which was severely mangled, hospital officials said.

She was swimming shortly after noon Tuesday outside the South Padre Hotel when beach-goers heard her screams for help.

Cidonio Barron Leon of Reynosa. Mexico, said he saw the shark when he grabbed Gaytan's arm to pull her out. He had just left his wife on the beach to go for a swim when Gaytan cried out.

"Help me please, a fish is killing me," he quoted Gaytan as saying in Spanish. He said he was about 15 feet from her at the time.

Gerardo Hernandez Beltran, 19, a tourist from Monterrey, Mexico, who helped rescue the girl, said, " heard a girl screaming, but I thought she was playing. But then she screamed for a long a time so I knew there was something wrong. People were just standing around

Running and half-swimming through the water to Gaytan,

Barron grabbed an arm while Hernandez lifted her legs, "and when I saw her feet I wrapped my hand around them and squeezed to stop the bleeding," Hernandez

About two and a half hours later. some 31/2 half miles from the South Padre Hotel, a 13-year-old girl was also attacked by a shark near the Tiki Motel, officials said. The girl, whose identity was unknown, was treated at the Port Isabel Medical Center and was released, said Dr. Ralph Landberg.

'She had a lot of teeth marks around her right foot up to her ankle. There were many lacerations," said Landberg, adding the girl required up to 70 stitches. "I think she was very lucky

Police said they would be patrolling the beaches through the

My personal feeling is that this is an isolated attack. I don't believe there's a roving pack of attacking sharks out there," said a South Padre police spokesman

U.S. Coast guard, police and Texas Parks and Wildlife searched on boats and planes for the shark until 6 p.m. Tuesday, but "nothing but dolphins" were seen along the shore, a police dispatcher said.

The five-hour search was conducted "to make sure this was an isolated incident." said Joe Rubio, a South Padre Island Building official who was acting as public affairs spokesman for police. "It was a shark, but not more than 4-feet long.


Gary Glick, who owns a deep-sea fishing charter boat in Port Isabel, said "that was no 4-footer. A 4-foot" shark doesn't have a mouth big enough. It wouldn't bite your toes

"Deep-ocean water moved inshore a few days ago and it brings a deeper ocean specie." said Glick. "The basic migrations are pretty much exclusively controlled by the movement of the water.

## True meaning of patriotism

Democratic presidential candidate Walter Mondale said something during his acceptance speech last week that deserves notice. He castigated Ronald Reagan for telling the American people "they should love their country, but hate their government.

Mondale was, of course, stretching the truth a bit as politicians are prone to do. Reagan does not tell the American people to "hate" their government. But he does tell them government is not very good at solving problems and that they should be wary of it getting too big and powerful. It is that aspect of the Reagan philosophy Mondale was criticizing.

What Mondale really meant is that he believes if you love your country, you must also love your government. It is a familiar refrain that was last heard from the conservative side of the political spectrum during the Viet Nam war. You remember: "Right or wrong, we must support our country.

Both views, of course, are pure hogwash and will be rejected by any thinking American.

Professional politicians like Mondale would like to have the American people believe that is is somehow unpatriotic to criticize the government of the United States. That would leave the politicians free to do just about anything they wanted and enable them to paint their critics as traitors.

Love of country and love of government, though, are two entirely different things. A true American patriot loves the things the country is supposed to stand for-things like freedom and individual rights. He is not compelled to support actions of government that are wrong. In fact, any citizen who reveres the concept of freedom on which the United States was founded very probably feels a responsibility to do what he can to restrain government because government and freedom are incompatible: the more you have of one, the less you have of the other.

Criticism of government is not usually wrong and praise of government is not always right. A person who really loves this country will feel an obligation to speak out in protest each time a politician wraps the flag around himself while he systematically destroys the very things that flag represents. That is something that happens every day. Mr. Mondale's views notwithstanding, it should be criticized more, not less.

# MF bailout total failure

A year ago, conservative columnists were warning Congress not to "buy" President Reagan's plan to bail out the big banks by giving the International Monetary Fund (IMF) \$8.3 billion in new lending authority. We said that IMF would merely make the problem worse by still more debt and with stringent new anti - growth economic policies. Now we can say,"We told you

Last month, Reagan extolled his own economic recovery to the Europeans and showed how his new program of supply - side tax cuts has created 6.7 - million jobs and 9.3 - percent real GNP growth. The Germans and French were so impressed they initiated their own tax - cut plans to put their over - taxed countries back on a real growth track.

Yet, at the same time, the Reagan administration had become directly involved in promoting exactly the OPPOSITE policies in the Third World. The Agency for International Development (AID) in full cooperation with IMF is now forcing Third - World and developing nations to RAISE taxes, devalue their currencies, and curb their economic growth with draconian austerity programs. And, for what?

To protect U.S. and European banks - but with policies which may well be pushing many of these countries right into the arms of the Communists faster than any Marxist guerrillas could

In the Dominican Republic in April, more than 60 people were killed as rioting broke out in protest of the IMF - imposed policies of higher taxes, higher prices, and lower services.

In Jamaica, Ronald Reagan's conservative colleague, Edward Seaga, is being pushed by AID and IMF to raise already high tax rates. Yet a World Bank Study of 20 countries by Keith Marsden in September 1983 clearly showed that those with the lowest tax rates experienced the fastest economic growth.

Personal income tax rates in Jamaica are already 30 percent on an income of \$2,100 (U.S.), and 57.5 percent at \$4,200 (U.S.), both incomes well below the American poverty line. Yet, AID sill takes its money out of Jamaica's Education and Human Resources accounts to hire more tax collectors, when what that economy desperately needs is lower taxes and more growth.

But Jamaica is not alone. In Brazil, Argentina, and the Philippines, ordinary citizens are facing tough new austerity programs just to preserve the fiction of meeting their Western debt obligations.

As the Wall Street Journal wondered aloud in a comprehensive special report on the World Debt Crisis: "The costs for debtor - countries is slower growth and more poverty. Can you have recessions and budding democracies (as in Argentina and Brazil) without social disorder?"

Many of President Reagan's closest supporters on the supply - side say you can't - that the IMF has become communism's promoter. And, as the International debt crisis continues to mount, they are reminding the president that throughout 1983, they, alone, had the courage to argue against the "IMF bailout."

That plan consisted of lending still more U.S. and European taxpayers' money to debtor nations, just to help them pay their debt interest to Western banks to keep those loans "current." In return, IMF would impose "austerity measures" on those it bailed out, especially higher taxes, lower services, and devaluation.

In effect, the IMF bureaucracy used this debt crisis to become the fiscal and economic managers of literally dozens of Third - World countries, hardly a sign of "budding democracy."
As former Treasury Secretary William Simon

warned in 1983,"In the guise of avoiding default we are turning the IMF into an aid agency. There is no point to a bailout that increases world debt. when the problem is too much indebtedness

Precisely as Prof. Paul Craig Roberts of Georgetown had warned, "The IMF's solution to the world debt crisis quickly ran afoul of political reality. The IMF conditions impose austerity on people widely perceived to be poor - in order to pay multi - billions of dollars in interst to New York Banks - institutions widel perceived to be rich. The IMF soon found itself portrayed as the tool of Yankee banks - and domestic politics in debtor countries elevated those who resisted IMF conditions, and pulled down those who cooperated

This is why Argentina's new president, Raul Alfonsin, told IMF he wouldn't meet their terms, and why the meeting of the debtor nations at Cartagena last month came dangerously close to forming a debtor cartel and bringing down the Western financial systems.

Fortunately, the total failure of the IMF bailout program is now self - evident. Banks are beginning to write off a share of this uncollectible debt - and the debtor - nations are beginning to talk directly to their banks about stretch - out plans. This is exactly the advice that was given in 1983 by George Champion, former chairman of Chase Manhattan, a major critic of the IMF plan.

But, as Paul Craig Roberts correctly points out today, "If this process had begun two years ago, today the banks would not be experiencing the market's lack of confidence. Unfortunately the responsible approach was delayed by the hubris of policy managers who tried to substitute a bailout for sound banking principles:

Remember, some of us "told you so."

hands over the head is sufficient. 10. The important thing is make the public aware that you and Rep. Ferraro are equal partners in the election process and that you as a reporter are colorblind when it comes to sex.

11. It may be awkward at first to avoid any reference to Mrs. Ferraro as a woman in your column, but as the campaign progresses, it will be easier. British reporters had the same problem when Margaret Thatcher first became prime minister. But now it's rare to see a British journalist kiss or hug Mrs. Thatcher in front of No. 10 Downing Street.

12. Language is very important when

addressing the Democratic vice presidential candidate. Do not refer to her as "Honey,"
"Dear," "Babe," or "Toots." A simple "Ma'am" will set the right tone.

13. Also, keep in mind that only Geraldine Ferraro's husband John Zaccaro may introduce his wife to someone else as "My better half.

14. Although the kissing and hugging prohibition rules must be strictly adhered to concerning Mrs. Ferraro, they do not apply to other female candidates running for lesser office. You may still buss a congresswoman or a senator or the mayoral candidate of the opposite sex and even put your arm around her waist if it will help you get your story.

15. There are absolutely no restrictions on male reporters kissing George Bush as you have done in the past, since people will not misread your intentions

16. To sum up, keep your hands off Rep. Ferraro during the campaign, and don't give the public the slightest excuse to think there is anything going on between the two of you other than you trying to find out where she really stands on the nuclear

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## Most environmentalists are socialists

There is great concern over the "environment," which is the natural world about us - the soil, rocks, grass, trees - the rivers, lakes and waterfalls - the animals, fish, birds, insects. Some are worried that we are not taking proper care of these things and that consequently our world is deteriorating.

Invariably, your environmentalist appeals to government to rectify this situation. Often he implies that man is both careless and corrupt, and that absorbed in his selfishness, he is letting his

natural world go to pot.

Is this true? I think the common man has his own ideas about the environment and how it should be treated, and these ideas do not necessarily coincide with those of the Sierra Club. Every farmer takes care of his land, especially if he is the owner, not a renter. Our best farm land, I think, is becoming more productive, not less so-

Privately owned tracts of timber are as a rule well-cared for, the mature trees being harvested, they having attained their maximum value, and the young growth being encouraged to grow, although in some cases it is hard to say whether a tract is best for trees or for livestock pasture. Homes are kept painted and in good repair when owned by the occupants.

The fact that the environment is best cared for when it is owned as private property is seldom mentioned by the environmentalists. They always talk in terms of what "the government" should do, If ownership is mentioned, usually it is to castigate the private property owner. Most environmentalists are, in fact, socialists. They would have the government, either federal or state, take over every acre of land and manage it for the benefit of "society."

They would like to have a commission named to design to what use each acre should be put.

The commission members would not own any part of the environment

They would be theorists - do - gooders. They would come to their job with an anti - capitalists bias, fully convinced in advance that the first thing to do is to eliminate the private owners. whom they look upon as arch - enemies of the environment

Your environmentalist has a one - track mind and it is a socialist track. They look upon every state as a welfare state. It has never occurred to them that the desire to promote the general welfare is not nearly as strong as the desire to promote a business and to make money.

The better the environment, the more money the owner will make. His strongest motive, profit making, is voked to environment protection and

## Labor outpolls Likud; Shamir needs partners

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir hunted today for coalition partners to help him stay in power after the indecisive national election, but there were increasing calls for his Likud bloc to join the Labor Party in a unity government.

Labor narrowly outpolled Likud in Monday's election, but Shamir appeared better poised to form a new government because he is ideologically closer to most of the religious parties with crucial swing votes in Parliament.

According to Israel television, a full count of civilian ballots gave Labor a 45-41 lead over Likud in the 120-seat Knesset, or parliament. Labor, led by Shimon Peres, took 35.4 percent of the vote and Likud

got 31.9 percent. The results meant both Shamir and Peres would have to court Israel's 13 small rightist and leftist parties to gain a majority of 61 Knesset seats. These parties won about 34 seats

Both Labor and Likud insisted they won the election and should be chosen by President Chaim Herzog to form Israel's 21st government since independence in 1948.

"There is a much better chance that Likud will form the next government," said Likud's former finance minister, Yoram Aridor.

Abba Eban, former foreign minister of the Labor Party, replied, "I think the chances are good" for a Labor government.

Aridor said Likud was favored a "unity" government; Eban was noncommittal. But several of the small parties in line for Cabinet posts said they would press for a bipartisan coalition government. and four of Israel's leading writers, all of them prominent Labor Party figures, called for a unity Cabinet.

Shamir met Tuesday with Likud Cabinet ministers to discuss the initial contacts with potential coalition allies. Transport Minister Haim Corfu said the party would wait for the final result before making decisions.

A Labor spokesman, Shmuel Elgrably, said, "Our main goal right now is to form a bloc against Likud" as Shamir works to form a government.

Labor blames Likud for Israel's economic woes, the costly Lebanon war and the deadlock in Middle East peace moves.

Likud spokesmen said they were not prepared to serve under Labor. and such a partnership seemed unlikely in light of the vast ideological gap between the two parties, worsened by the ill-will stoked up during the campaign.

With the election over, the government was free politically to crack down on the economy.

The Bank of Israel suspended foreign currency trading for the day, and the government announced several measures to cut the flow abroad of foreign

Israelis lost the right to send \$2,000 annually to dependents abroad and will have to pay a 15 percent tax on foreign currency purchased for overseas travel.

#### Crossing rebuilt

BERLIN (AP) — The Checkpoint Charlie" border crossing between East and West Berlin will be reconstructed beginning Aug. 1, possibly causing delays in transit, the East German Foreign Ministry says.

The ministry did not say what kind of work was to be done at the crossing or how long it would last, Western diplomats said.

The border crossing at Friedrichsstrasse, nicknamed Checkpoint Charlie by American troops occupying West Berlin after World War II, can only be used by foreign diplomats and tourists. Germans must use other crossing


Checkpoint Charlie's fame dates from the Cold War, when American and Soviet tanks stood on either side of the border with their gun barrels pointed at each other.

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## Reagan 'turns the other cheek' to Ferraro

WASHINGTON (AP President Reagan, declaring his "tokenism" reference to women candidates was misunderstood, has unveiled a new campaign strategy for dealing with Rep. Geraldine Ferraro: He wants the high road and he's willing to turn

the other cheek to get there.
Let Vice President George Bush criticize the woman nominated by the Democrats for vice president as a free-spending liberal.

Let his campaign director, Edward Rollins, talk about her as a

He doesn't disavow them because criticism has to be answered, he says. But for now, he wants to stress his record, not attack Walter Mondale, the Democratic presidential candidate, and Ferraro, the congresswoman from Queens,

The Democrats knew in nominating Ferraro, the first woman picked by either major party for vice president, that it would pose problems for Reagan strategists in deciding how to campaign against her.

But the strategy was in place and Reagan was ready when the question was asked at his press conference Tuesday night.

He was gracious in his assessment of the Ferraro nomination. He said it was "just Analysis

another step forward in the recognition of the new place of women that has been long overdue. I think it is significant.

As for responding to Ferraro's suggestion last week that he wasn't a good Christian because of his budget cuts, Reagan said "I turned the other cheek.

"I have never been one to campaign against opponents,"
Reagan said.

Whether that strategy will endure through the campaign, and whether it will apply to Vice President George Bush and other GOP campaigners, remains to be Bush already has taken a different tack, telling an audience in Texas on Tuesday that Mondale

and Ferraro represented the extreme liberal wing of the Democratic party. Rollins said in a remark at the White House earlier in the day that

prove "the biggest bust politically in recent history," a statement he quickly retracted

Reagan's country-gentleman approach toward Ferraro represented a bit of a turn-about. and an obvious decision by his advisers that any criticism of Ferraro the candidate could be interpreted as criticism of Ferraro

## Anti-Sandinista says rebels want cease-fire

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) -An opposition presidential candidate says rebel leaders have told him to negotiate a cease-fire if Nicaragua's leftist government guarantees a free election.

The candidate, Arturo Cruz, said Tuesday that the anti-Sandinista rebels, backed by the Reagan administration, "are ready to put down their weapons if the government accepts the demands of the opposition for free elections." Elections are scheduled for Nov. 4.

Cruz, candidate of an anti-Sandinista coalition in

Nicaragua, said he was authorized to negotiate by top officials of the Honduras-based Nicaraguan Democratic Force and the Costa Rica-based Revolutionary Democratic Alliance. The two groups are fighting to overthrow the Sandinistas, who took power in a 1979 revolution against rightist President Anastasio Somoza.

The Democratic Coordinator, the coalition backing Cruz, has said it might not participate in the election unless restrictions are lifted on the press and civil

In El Salvador, a radio station

broadcast an interview Tuesday with a leader of leftist rebels who made what appeared to be a conciliatory call for talks with the U.S.-backed government.

Guillermo Ungo, president of a leftist coalition called the Democratic Revolutionary Front. spoke by telephone from Panama to a Roman Catholic radio station in San Salvador. The interview was the first non-clandestine broadcast by a rebel leader in more than four

Ungo did not mention President Jose Napoleon Duarte's demand that rebels put down their arms.

#### Steelers' Bradshaw retires

NEW YORK (AP) - Terry Bradshaw, officially retired from the National Football League after guiding the Pittsburgh Steelers to four Super Bowl victories, hopes his new employer will be as patient as his former one.

Bradshaw announced his retirement Tuesday and move from the field to the broadcast booth as a television commentator for CBS Sports.

"I can remember the coin flip in 1970 between George Halas of the Bears and Arthur Rooney of the Steelers," Bradshaw said Tuesday at a news conference. "I can laugh now, but back then I had no idea what it meant to be the No. 1 draft choice in the NFL. The Steelers were very patient with me. I hope CBS will show the patience with me that the Steelers did in my younger vears.

The 14-year NFL veteran said an elbow injury that limited him to one game last season led to his decision. He said he decided to retire when, despite months of rehabilitation, he was unable to throw without pain.

"It's a proud moment for me, but a sad one, too," Bradshaw said. 'It's not a one-year retirement. It's forever. I regret it, but it's got to be

Bradshaw, 35, retires ranked ninth on the all-time NFL list with 212 touchdown passes, 12th in pass attempts with 3,901, 15th in completions with 2,025, and 13th in passing yards, 27,989.

In playoff action Bradshaw was especially effective, passing for 3,8 yds and 30 touchdown's in 19 postseason games. He completed 49 of 84 passes and threw for nine touchdowns in pacing the Steelers to league championships in 1975, 1976. 1979 and 1980. He holds the Super Bowl career record of 932 passing yards and also established single-game marks by throwing for 318 yards and four touchdowns

against Dallas in 1979. 'We had so many great things happen for the city of Pittsburgh, which for so long had been a loser, he said. "It was great to not only play with a great football team, but to play a part in rebuilding the image of the city.

"Terry was a great player and a rare talent. His enthusiasm and confidence were big factors in our success," said Steelers President Dan Rooney. "We will always think of him as a Steeler. We wish him success with CBS and know he will do well in whatever career he

Injuries began plaguing Bradshaw in 1980, when he suffered a broken thumb. A broken hand sidelined him for much of 1981.

He passed for 1,768 yards and 17 touchdowns during the strike-shortened 1982 campaign before suffering the elbow injury that eventually ended his career.

In his final appearance in a Steelers uniform, Bradshaw completed five of eight passes for 77 yards and two touchdowns in a 34-7 romp over the New York Jets. But he reinjured his elbow on the second touchdown throw.

Bradshaw had previously worked with CBS as a guest commentator in 1981 and 1982 after the Steelers were eliminated from the playoffs





## Hilton's first hotel to get a facelift in Cisco

CISCO, Texas (AP) - When hotel baron Conrad Hilton purchased his first inn in 1919, he proclaimed it a "cross between a flophouse and a gold mine.'

Today, the hotel, located in this small West Texas town, is much more the former than the latter, dominated by dirt, leaky pipes and rotting floorboards.

The two-story, red-brick structure sits idle, reduced by the ravages of time and neglect from a favorite stopping place for wealthy oilmen to a resting place for modern-day vagrants.

Weeds have replaced rock gardens. Windows are boarded shut and a large padlock hangs from the main door as a warning to would-be intruders.

Since 1925, when Hilton sold the hotel, it has changed hands numerous times. In the 1960s, the building served as the Golden Age Nursing Home

In the 1970s, it was occupied briefly by an Alaskan prospector who bought it as "a place to winter in and as an investment

For almost the last decade, it has been closed, gathering cobwebs and dust. Occasional vagrants and teen-agers have been its only occupants.

But now, the hotel that Hilton, in his 1957 autobiography "Be My Guest," called "a great lady" and "the ideal hotel to practice on." is about to be reborn - not in the style that Hilton might have wanted but in a way that will suit the 4,500 residents who populate this small farm and ranch

"The structure is an eyesore and in terrible disrepair, but it's still close to the hearts of the citizens of Cisco,' Mayor Eris Ritchie said recently. "We're going to turn it into a community center where senior citizens and residents can gather. We'll try to retain the character of the original structure but make into a place that everyone can enjoy.

The building will contain offices for Cisco's Chamber of Commerce and a small museum dedicated to Hilton's memory, Ritchie said. It will include Hilton memorabilia, documents, photos and furniture, he said.

The rebirth was the brainchild of the Hilton Foundation. After the death of Conrad Hilton on Jan. 3, 1979, the foundation bought the building.

The original idea conceived by the Hilton family was to turn the hotel into a \$3.5 million museum honoring Hilton. But by 1983, the museum idea was scrapped in favor of a plan to retain the property as a memorial to be decided by the City of Cisco, Ritchie said.

After a public opinion poll revealed that town residents preferred to restore the original structure and property into an all-purpose town half, the Hilton estate in May 1983 awarded Cisco \$1.2 million for the development of a park and community center

To supplement the grant, the city is trying to raise \$100,000 for an annual endowment, and the city council has pledged \$10,000 a year, which officials plan to raise by increasing hotel and motel taxes 1 percent to 2 percent, Ritchie said.

The dilapidated structure still bears its original sign — Mobley Hotel — in honor of its founder, Henry L. Mobley.

Mobley built the hotel in 1916 just before the 1917-1920 Texas oil boom on a prime location, a few yards from the railroad station. It was the first building that greeted visitors as they stepped off the train.

Hilton, whose hometown was San Antonio, N.M., was one of thousands who came to Texas seeking a fortune during the oil boom years. But unlike those who came in search of black gold, Hilton was looking for a bank.

\$80,000, Hilton pulled out.

Disappointed, he headed for the Mobley to get some rest. But instead of finding a room, Hilton, then 32, found himself in line behind crowds of tired oilmen. With only one other lodge in town, rooms were at a premium,

"They slept in tiers here," said Ples Ray, 85, a lifetime resident of Cisco who remembers Hilton. "There was a stream of people coming through. They had three different shifts every 24

"We all heard the story about Hilton. The bank deal fell through and after seeing the hotel, he figured 'ah heck, this is better than a bank.

As Hilton observed what he told a friend was "a cross between a flophouse and a gold mine." he made up his mind. A few hours later, after quickly pulling together four other investors, including his mother, Hilton had bought his first inn for \$40,000.

Many years later Hilton recalled in his autobiography that when he purchased the Mobley, "I had the audacity that night to dream of a Texas that would someday wear a bright

## Chagra gets life for plot to kill former prosecutor

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) -Convicted narcotics smuggler Jamiel "Jimmy" Chagra was expecting the life term he drew for conspiring to gun down a former federal prosecutor, his attorney

"He was expecting that, but he was hoping for better," said Oscar Goodman, Chagra's Las Vegas attorney, after the sentencing

Chagra had no comment before U.S. District Judge William Sessions ordered the life term, the maximum he could have assessed.

The former high stakes gambler from El Paso pleaded guilty in June to conspiring to assassinate former assistant U.S. attorney James Kerr. Kerr escaped serious injury Nov. 21, 1978, when a hail of gunfire was sprayed at his car near his San Antonio home.

Prosecutors have said Kerr was handling a narcotics investigation targeting Chagra's widespread drug-trafficking activities at the time of the ambush

Chagra was acquitted of charges that he also plotted and paid for the May 29, 1979, murder of federal judge John Wood Jr.

However, Chagra was convicted of obstruction of justice in the investigation of the Wood assassination.

He is serving a 47-year term for that conviction, in addition to drug and tax evasion convictions. Sessions said the life term would

run concurrently with the sentences Chagra already is

The concurrent sentencing was part of an 11-point plea agreement reached when Chagra pleaded guilty June 16.

Sessions read only parts of the agreement during the hearing. The bargain called for the following: - Chagra would testify against

James Kearns, accused of being the triggerman in the Kerr attack. - Chagra would never have to testify against his brother Joe Chagra, who is serving a 10-year term for conspiring to kill Wood.

Joe Chagra was named as an unindicted co-conspirator in connection with the Kerr case. - The government would drop a second count in the Kerr indictment accusing Chagra of aiding and abetting the assassination attempt.

 Sessions would recommend a sentence reduction from 30 to 20 years for Chagra's wife, Elizabeth. She is serving 30 years for murder
