Odessa-Amarillo Battle Number One Game of 40 Scheduled for Tonight

Four undefeated teams clash in a pair of games tonight that will go a long way toward shaping the state school football race.

Odessa—defending state champion—meets unbeaten, but little heralded, Amarillo in the No. 1 game of 40 scheduled today.

Corpus Christi, the South Texas powerhouse, plays undefeated once more against the Texas State team in a 15-AA game that tops district tilts.

Three games last night opened the week's card of 47 games.

Arlington Heights easily downed Carter-Riverside in an all Fort Worth contest that counted in Dist. 7-AA, 25-0.

Austin (El Paso) kept its undefeated record with a narrow, 7-0, win over Carlsbad, N. M., and Lamar (Houston) dumped San Jacinto (Houston), 14-0, in a 13-AA game.

Should Thomas Jefferson upset Corpus Christi, the Pirates would have to give up their 15-AA status. Five other conference games tonight are expected to shape district standings.

Waxahachie's undefeated eleven meets Wax in what is almost 10-AA championship game.

Poly and North Side should decide the winner in 7-AA, while the same holds true for Mineral Wells—Weatherford in 9-AA and Beaumont-Goose Creek in 14-AA.

Texas's one-beater, eleven tackles Tyler in 11-AA's top game. A defeat for either team would be just another such title hopes.

Other undefeated teams which play tonight are:

Wichita Falls vs. Electra; Corsicana vs. Hillsboro; Longview vs. Henderson; Marshall vs. Glade-water; and McAllen vs. Robstown.

Austin's Maroons have an open date this week. They open 15-AA play next week against Brackenridge.

Thirty of the 47 games this week are conference affairs.

PRINCETON, RUTGERS RENEW THE OLD RIVALRY NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J.—Renewing the oldest college football rivalry here, Princeton held an overwhelming edge over Rutgers. With the Tigers victory string standing at 34 straight, an underdog Scarlet side snatched the Bengals, 20-13, in a game dedicating the present Rutgers Stadium in 1938. The series dates back to November, 1869. The first contest, played under primitive rules which bore little resemblance to those of present-day football, was staged in New Brunswick with Rutgers prevailing, six goals to four. Nearly 70 years elapsed before the Orange and Black returned to New Brunswick. All but two of the 38 games have been played in Tigertown.

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Only Two SWC Teams Have Possibility Of Staying Unbeaten After Saturday

The Southwest Conference gets down to brass tacks tomorrow with three games counting in the standings and with the possibility of leaving only two undefeated teams when the firing dies out.

Baylor will have an unbeaten record in conference warfare for a certainty since the Bears play outside the circuit, meeting Texas Tech of the Border Conference. The winner of the Rice-Southern Methodist game at Dallas will have an unblemished standing.

But in the two other games—Texas vs. Arkansas at Memphis, Tenn., and Texas A. and M. vs. Texas Christian at Fort Worth—victories for Arkansas and T. C. U. would cut the unbeaten elements to two.

Baylor has played and won one conference game, Rice and S. M. U. will be opening the championship race. Texas hasn't played a conference game yet and neither has Texas A. and M. whereas Arkansas has won one and lost one and T. C. U. has lost its only test.

Crowds totaling more than 90,000 are expected to see the four games with the largest outpouring at Fort Worth where 30,000 are due to watch the Flogs try to get back into the conference race against the rough and ready Aggies. The Rice-SMU tilt will have 25,000 and 26,000 will turn out at Memphis to watch Arkansas make its last stand.

At Lubbock a crowd of about 12,000 is due to see Baylor's undefeated, untied Bears move against the comeback kids of Tech. The Red Raiders, who licked Tulsa last week, may be hard for Baylor to handle, especially since it's not a conference game and the Bruins can't be expected to be very "high" after that terrific struggle with Arkansas last week out of six last week made us feel like an expert. Rice vs. Southern Methodist at Dallas—600 much manpower; Rice by a touchdown or so.

Texas vs. Arkansas at Memphis—Not this week. Razorbacks; Texas by four touchdowns.

Push-Button War. Means to the End

In its issue of September 6, the Saturday Evening Post printed an article that an editorial note characterized as "perhaps the most desperately important message" it will publish this year. Entitled "Are We Ready for a Push-Button War?" and written by Joseph and Stewart Alsop, it deals with the much publicized and little understood topic of guided missiles.

The principle of guided missile warfare is simple enough. A button on a switchboard will be pushed, and a few minutes later a rain of missiles of incredible destructiveness will descend upon enemy targets. There will be no need of pilots. The missiles will travel infinitely faster than sound, and so will arrive in complete silence.

Factories, bridges, power plants, railroads, communication lines, even whole cities will be instantly destroyed—along with thousands and perhaps millions of people. The enemy's capacity to make war will cease to exist, and the conflict will be decided in a matter of hours.

That is the concept. We already have, in the atomic bomb and other weapons, the charges these missiles will carry. The problem is to produce a suitable missile. It is in other words, a purely technical problem of developing a vehicle.

The Alsops begin their remarkable article with two statements made to them by a researcher in the field. He said "The first thing to understand about guided missiles is that there aren't any. But the second thing to understand about guided missiles is that there will be."

When will practical missiles be ready to take to the air—to the spaces beyond? The Alsops offer an answer to that based on extensive interrogation of the scientists. It is expected that an anti-aircraft missile which will be guided by wonderfully perfected radar, and whose purpose will be to destroy invading planes, will be ready in two to five years. The intermediate strategic missile which will be fired from planes, ships or forward bases, may be practical in six to ten years. Finally, missiles of the ultimate destructive power, with ranges up to 5,000 miles, which will make possible direct intercontinental warfare, may appear in ten to eighteen years.

Readers may wonder why no mention has been made here of the German V-2 missile which caused tremendous destruction in England in the last stages of the war. The reason is that researchers regard it as having been primitive in the extreme, even though it was a marvel of mechanical ingenuity and daring. Its range was short, and it could not be accurately guided. The V-2 by comparison with the missiles now on the drawing boards, will be like a muzzle loading blunderbuss opposed to a naval rifle.

The technical problems connected with the development of missiles, literally, stretch the human mind. Even the Alsops, in a long article, have room only to touch some of the high spots. Ordinary metals would burst into flames at speeds far below those projected. Launching a missile which will proceed in seconds from the ground to heights of 60,000 feet or more and there start for a target, is an incredibly complex

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG news behind the news

SPOKANE—Decent West Coast Democrats and honest labor leaders have started to get together to break their long and painful alliance with Communists, fellow-travelers and trouble-making radicals. They hope to set up their program during the 1948 national and state elections lest the cheap cost them votes in an area which seems to be veering toward the right of center.

Somebody may get hurt in this Casarsan operation, and it may be President Truman and his associated office-seekers in Washington, Oregon and California. Democrats in this leftish support, which flocked to Franklin D. Roosevelt whenever he ran, and especially after he became so friendly with Uncle Joe Stalin during the war, may give the edge to the G. O. P.

Old-fashioned Democrats, however, declare that defeat in a few decades will have to be demanded to them in the long run a few political association with the "Commies." As President Truman has discovered in postwar dealings with Moscow, dictatorial Democrats have learned that they cannot do decent business with the Red Friends.

ALLIANCE — In the State of Washington, the Republicans plan to make capital of the alliance at the very moment when the Democrats want to call it quits. The Legislature has created a Committee on Un-American Activities, paralleling the J. Parnell Thomas investigating body at Washington. It has already given a preview of its program, but when it begins full-scale operations, it expects to expose a three-way tie involving the Democrats, certain labor leaders and the Communist Party of the United States operating through front organizations.

The preview was provided by Jess Fletcher of Seattle, third international vice-president of the Building Service Employees' Union, which consists of charwomen, janitors, elevator operators etc. George Scallie, whom Governor Thomas E. Dewey sent to Sing Sing, once headed it. In a dramatic emotional interview with Ashley E. Holden of the Spokane Spokesman-Review, Mr. Fletcher told how the "Commies" had penetrated his local. With tears in his eyes, he begged America's workers to wake up and "fight the Reds."

Mr. Fletcher is a key Democrat as well as a prominent labor leader. He was a visitor to the White House during the Roosevelt Administration, and he was a delegate to the 1944 Democratic national convention. When Eleanor Roosevelt visited Seattle, she sometimes stayed at his home. He was a great friend of John and Anna Roosevelt Bec-tiger when they ran the Hearst paper in Seattle.

SABOTAGE—He admits that he played with the "Commies" because it was vote-getting politics. He says that he "crawled into bed with them and pulled the sheets over us." But now, he claims: "Unless America wakes up, we are going to sink behind the 'iron operation. Desirable fuels — capable of giving both sufficient thrust and range—are still in the laboratory phase. And dwarfing all other difficulties, is that of guiding the missile with bullet-like accuracy to a target thousands of miles away. The cost of testing for testing will cost more than \$1,000,000,000, not counting maintenance. The total cost will obviously be incredibly great—greatly perhaps, than the cost of developing and making the atomic bomb. The science of utter destruction becomes more and more expensive.

RELATIONS WITH THE JUG by Peter Edson

WASHINGTON, (NEA) — How much annoyance from small-time dictators is the United States supposed to put up with before it begins to get mad? The question was raised by the two-and-a-half-year record of gratuitous insults to this government by Marshal Tito's Federal Peoples' Republic of Yugoslavia—famously known to the G. I.'s as "Trieste as the Jug." Against the background of the admittedly touchy situations at Trieste and in Greece, there has been a long list of incidents that have worn U. S. diplomatic nerves raw, trying to keep the peace.

Profits of Utilities Not Guaranteed

I received a letter from a man signing his name as George K. Smith commenting on the American Telephone Company's request for high rates.

Mr. Smith says "the company profits can be lessened, even to reducing dividends to five per cent which you know is a good return." He also says "no public utility should be permitted to make and pay more (profits and dividends) particularly when it is a monopoly."

Then he goes on to say "granted that every investor and business man is entitled to a fair profit, — what is fair profit in the case of a public utility monopoly? Their profits are guaranteed, and they have no risks."

That shows how much Mr. Smith knows about what he is saying. The profits in a utility company are not guaranteed. Every railroad that has had unusual automobile competition or water competition or airplane competition as not guaranteed, as Mr. Smith contends, a rate of return on its investment. Most railroads are operating at much less than five per cent profit.

And if the radio should take the place of the telephone by invention, there is no government that could guarantee the telephone company profits.

Mr. Smith howls about the telephone company paying \$9 dividend. He implies that that is a return of nine per cent. He does not seem to realize that the invested capital of the telephone company is \$133 a share and that it has nearly half of its total capital as prior liens that only earn less than three per cent on an average. Since both the stock value per share of the corporation has only increased \$1.00. That is a hazardous position for any company to be in whose business is expanding. Of course Federal government is not paying out more dividends than it needs in order to get the capital necessary to operate the business.

In fact, it is between the devil and the deep blue sea as most business men see it. If they get their rates too high they can't get the business; if they can't get the capital. Every time the telephone company adds a new customer it is giving every present customer better value because he is able to talk to more people.

It might seem foolish to answer a man's comments who is not listed in the city directory and who probably signs a fictitious name. However, most people are confused as this man is confused as to profits. Profits are not guaranteed by the Federal government. The public will take care of any unreasonable profits that any business tries to make. It is to the interest of every business to keep prices down as low as possible and make profits on volume rather than by arbitrary high prices.

The real question as to world peace is whether or not Russia wants war. If Russia wants war, there is, unfortunately, little we can do about it.
