NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG news behind the news

CHICAGO—The Republican leadership on Capitol Hill has finally negotiated a novel arrangement with Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder which should speed enactment of appropriation bills and make possible greater savings in government costs.

House Speaker Martin hopes that the new system, despite the financial burdens of the Marshall Plan, will enable Congress to pass another tax reduction bill to approximately \$1 billion. His canvass leads him to believe that the next session will override a third presidential veto, although he is not entirely sure of the Senate.

Under the new scheme, members of the House Appropriations Committee will sit in with Budget Bureau officials when Cabinet officers, and the department and finance experts present their original demands for money. It is an innovation in procedure that can have an extremely important effect on the system of appropriation, taxation and legislation.

CONTROL—This arrangement rescinds a Franklin D. Roosevelt ruling under which departmental chiefs or their assistants could not appear before Congressional committees after the Budget Bureau had made its final recommendations and object to that agency's treatment of their original requests. The Congressmen will henceforth be present to learn downtown's financial needs at first hand. The Budget Bureau, which is responsible to the President, can no longer act as a screen between the White House and Congress.

F.A.R.—made this ruling because he wanted absolute control of the federal purse, despite the fact that this power is vested in Congress by the Constitution. Under this decree, the Budget Bureau serves as the policymaking body of the government, instead of as a financial agency. It frequently banned requests for funds on the ground that they were "not in accord with Administration policy."

FAVORED—This system also enabled F.A.R. to channel funds into favored activities. Thus, in early New Deal days, he obtained billions for such vote-getting agencies as PWA, WPA, AAA and Interior, while starving the government units which are supposed to serve industry, business and finance—State, Treasury, Commerce, etc. Strange as it may seem in retrospect, the Army, Navy and Air Corps suffered from this system of budgetary secrecy and censorship in the very years 1934-1941 when Hitler, Mussolini and Hirohito were preparing for a war that would engulf the United States.

In those eight years, and ever since World War I, Chiefs of Staff Douglas A. MacArthur, Marlin Craig and George C. Marshall constantly deplored the unsatisfactory state of our national defense system in their annual reports to the Secretary of War. In would be rendered powerless to defend itself.

This, as we understand it, is another revealing glimpse of the Wallace-Pepper foreign policy. It is clearly a policy which would control the country by abandoning the free peoples of the world to the unchecked advance of totalitarian communism.

Meet the Manager of The United Nations

In the October issue of Plain Talk Sheppard Marley tells what the United Nations is all about. The head is the Secretary-General. He has the power to select all employees of the UNO, to control its finances and to execute its decisions.

Mr. Marley reports that Russia object d to the man whom the majority of the General Assembly wanted for its General Secretary. They had practically agreed upon Lester B. Pearson, Canadian Ambassador to Washington. Mr. Pearson had the support of eight of the eleven members of the Security Council for the post of Secretary-General. When Russia objected then Trygve Lie was elected as Secretary-General.

Mr. Marley claims Andrei Gromyko "wielded the veto club off his record when the eleven-nations Security Council met at Church House in London." Stalin's representatives proposed the election by acclamation of Trygve Lie as Secretary-General of the General Assembly. The rules called for a secret ballot.

Mr. Lie is a Norwegian. He was leader in the labor movement in Norway. Leon Trotsky was in reality deported out of Norway in 1925 when Lie was Minister of Justice of Norway. Trotsky reports that Lie who deported him had been a member of the Communist International. Lie attempted to censor all of Trotsky's writings and object to that agency's treatment of his original requests.

According to Mr. Marley, practically all of the decisions Lie makes for the General Assembly are in favor of the Russian government. The article goes on to say that as "the Trotsky incident stands out in Trygve Lie's present career of service to the Soviet Union, so his appointments to the secretariat of the Commission to investigate the current Balkan warfare stands out as the greatest service to Russia thus far in his career as U.N. diplomat."

Mr. Marley reports that according to F. A. Voigt, independent British editor, writing in The New Leader: "The secretariat was, in effect, a Communist cell, and did all in its power to vitiate the task of the Commission." Mr. Voigt then reports that when the Commission held its first meeting, the EAM, Communist-controlled political group, and all the mail that he received from the balcony and addressed the demonstration.

BATTLE OF THE FBI

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Disclosure that 12 employees have been dropped from the government's Federal Broadcast Intelligence Bureau, "for security reasons," brings into the open a battle that would control the air for months. The inside story is important, because it reveals what is happening in practically every branch of government today, in connection with the loyalty probe of federal employees.

FBI was created during the war as Federal Broadcast Intelligence Service, a branch of the Federal Communications Commission. It had no connection with J. Edgar Hoover's FBI. Its job was to monitor Axis radio broadcasts to see what line enemy propaganda was taking.

Its head was Dr. Robert D. Leigh, former president of Bennington College, Vt., and more recently one of the principal authors of the University of Chicago report on the atom bomb.

As soon as the war was over, Congress wanted to abolish FBIIS to save money. PICKED UP VALUABLE INFORMATION

An agreement was made to transfer the outfit to Army Intelligence and it was renamed FBIIS. When the organization came before Congress for its appropriation, all it had to do was cite some 50 pieces of intelligence it had picked out of the air, of value to the country.

When the new Central Intelligence Group was created, FBIIS was transferred to that hush hush organization.

Young Sheppard was ambitious and naturally out to make a good record as an administrator. One of his acts was to demote four of his principal assistants and put them under men they had formerly supervised. The down graders naturally didn't like that and protested. Sheppard then moved to fire them. That was last April.

The four wrote a letter of protest to Lt. Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, who was then head of CIG. Vandenberg ordered an investigation by his executive officer, Brig. Gen. E. J. Seibert. Vandenberg was given a clean bill of health. The four complainants were then called in and allowed to resign.

The four men who had been let out took their case to Rep. Fred E. Busby, Chicago Republican. He is a member of Rep. Clare Hoffman's committee on expenditures in the executive departments. In the last session he was active in making charges against state and other government department employees who, he said, were Communists.

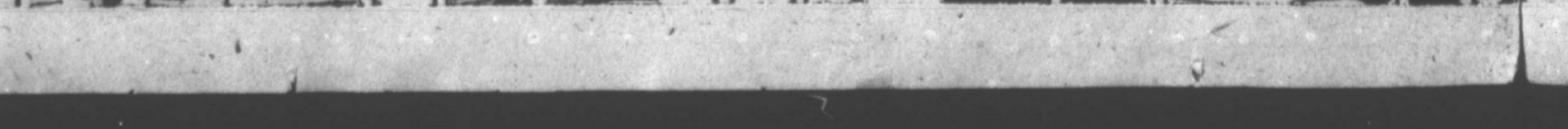
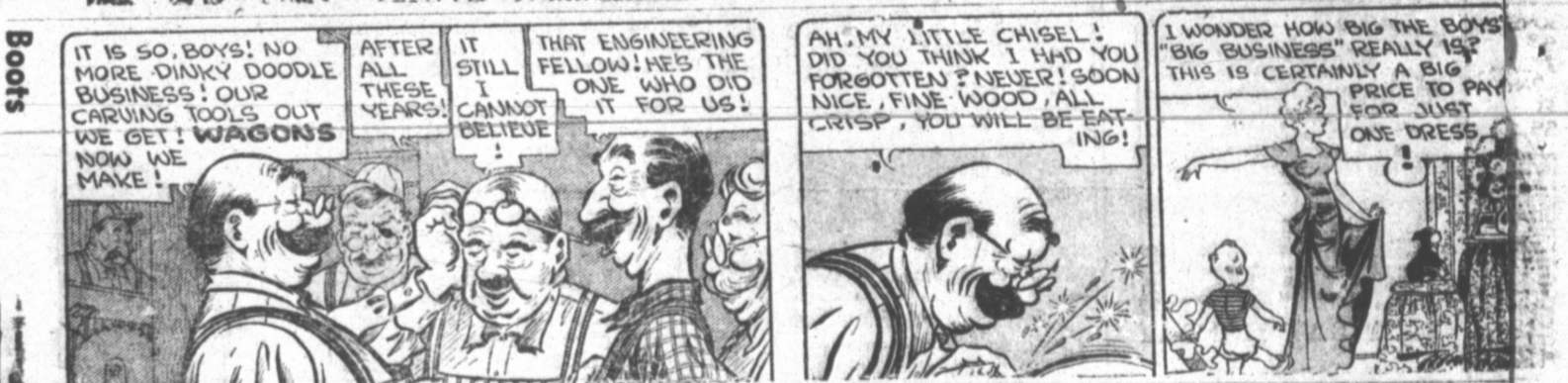
Among the charges made against FBIIS, two were serious. First, that FBIIS translators were taking their translations of foreign broadcasts. If Russia broadcast something nasty about the U. S., it was said the translators would either tone it down, or write in "Unclear," indicating a bad reception they couldn't understand.

The second charge was that the translators would hold up transcripts of damaging broadcasts during important diplomatic negotiations. If Radio Moscow or one of its satellites was handing out a line which might stiffen the American attitude, the translation would be delayed a few days until the issue was decided.

Navy Capt. Walter Ford, now executive officer of CIG and the only authorized spokesman for FBIIS, admits none of these charges and even denies that there has been any trouble in FBIIS.

But it is known that Sheppard has been allowed to resign with a clean record, but for the good of the service and to keep peace with Congress. As long as any member of Congress has anything against a government administrator, the future of his agency is in danger. The 12 other employees have been dropped "as bad security risks" as a further peace offering to Congress. There are no specific charges against them. That's what working for the government is like today.

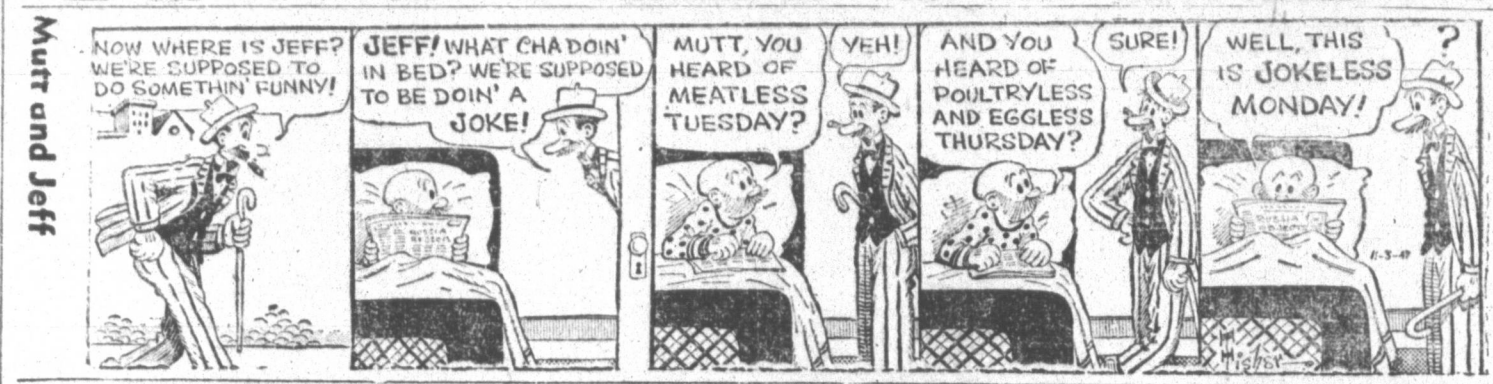
