Hospital hopes to squeeze its way out of the red

Muleshoe Area Medical Center Hospital District ended up in the hole by \$157,000 after paying taxes last year. The hospital's board of directors met on Thursday night and discussed ways the hospital could tighten up and improve bill collection procedures.

According to hospital administrator Richard Murphy, the collection agency the hospital currently uses is not collecting much payments. The hospital board on Thursday agreed to look into other agencies and to become more aggressive in the collection procedure. This includes pursuing legal action when effort through a collection agency fails.

The nursing home lost a reported \$60,000 last year but outpatient services at the hos-

pital were up, which helped the hospital. Murphy also reminded the board Thursday night that the hospital was without a surgeon for nine months until the hiring of the new surgeon a few months ago.

In addition, the hospital has received new computer software which will help make inventory control more effective. At one point approximately \$47,000 of inventory was not accounted for. However Murphy said that the inventory was located and should have been counted.

"We are basically tightening up on our business principles and collecting accounts from people who aren't paying," Murphy said. "And the inventory control is to be sure patients are charged for the things they use."

Campaign to help employers avoid discrimination

COLLEGE STATION — State and federal officials are waging that employers in Texas will "work smart" to improve their hiring practices once they are better-informed about federal immigration law.

The federal government is working with the Texas Office of Immigration and Refugee Affairs to get more and better information about the Immigration Reform and Control Act into the hands of employers in the state. The theme of the campaign, which is linked to similar nationwide efforts, is "Look at the facts, not at the faces."

Radio and Television advertising began running last month, and written information is being circulated statewide through organizations such as

county offices of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and trade associations that communicate directly with employers. More information is available through the U.S. Department of Justice.

Federal studies show that Texas employers have problems complying with IRCA, which set out an array of measures to curb illegal immigration.

Before Congress passed the law in 1986, opponents worried that its provision for sanctions against employers of undocumented workers would produce a backlash of discrimination.

If an employer could be fined for hiring an undocumented worker, the opponents argued, the employer might just

refuse to hire anyone with a "foreign" accent or appearance.

To address that concern, the bill that went to President Ronald Reagan's desk for signature prohibited employers from discriminating against workers based on their national origin or citizenship status.

The U.S. General Accounting Office, acting on behalf of Congress, recently checked out the effect of IRCA on employers and workers. The GAO found that the law has cut down on illegal immigration, but has produced discrimination against workers and prospective workers.

The U.S. Department of Justice enforces IRCA through the Office of Special Counsel for Immigration-Related Unfair Employment Practices.

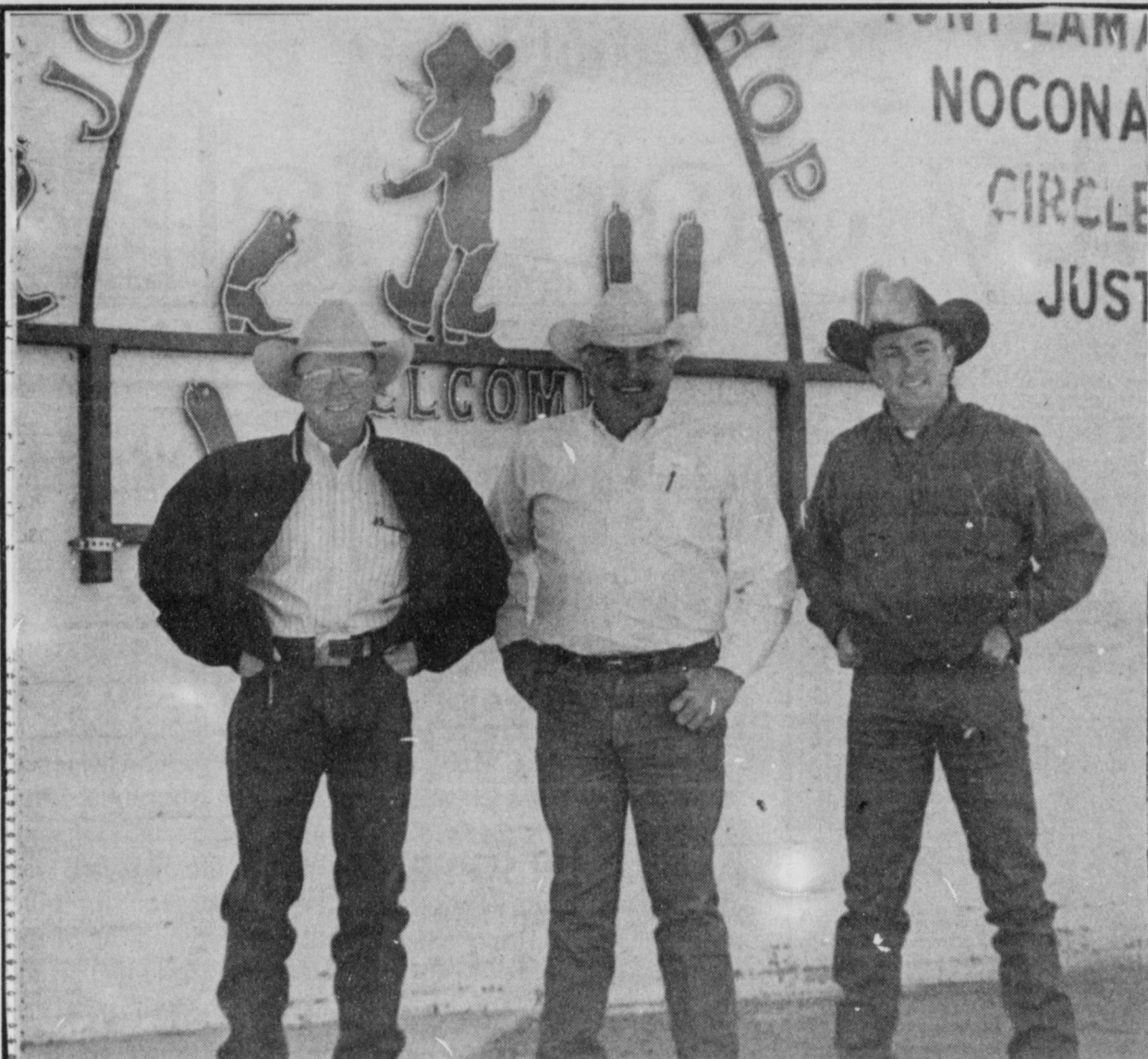
Special Counsel William Ho-Gonzalez says discrimination is "an altogether too common phenomenon."

"The GAO found that 19 percent of employers around the country admit to these kinds of practices," Ho-Gonzalez says. In Texas, that figure is 28 percent. "And this is not unique to the agriculture industry. This happens everywhere—the service industry, manufacturing, aerospace—at all levels."

Ho-Gonzalez says fear of fines and assessments of back pay, combined with ignorance of the law and methods of complying with it, are at the root of the pattern of illegal behavior by employers.

He offered these basic

guidelines for employers:

* Keep the hiring decision separate from the process of checking documents. First, decide whether to hire the worker based on experience and skills. After making the job offer and having it accepted, then check the identity and eligibility documents as explained on the back of the I-9

form and in the INS Handbook for Employers.

* Don't pick and choose among the acceptable documents listed in back of the I-9. If you reasonable believe a document to be valid, and it is on the list, you must accept it. If a document is due to expire during the worker's term of employment, that is not a valid reason to refuse to hire the worker. You may remind the worker as the expiration date approaches, and you must dismiss the worker if the document expires and is not renewed.

* Treat all workers the same as far as documentation is concerned. Do not ask some workers to show documents before they start work (in most cases, they are allowed three working days to produce the documents), or otherwise single people out.

* If you need more information, get it - through your local county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension service, or by calling the Employer Hotline at the Office of Special Counsel for Immigration-Related Unfair Employment Practices at (800) 255-8155.

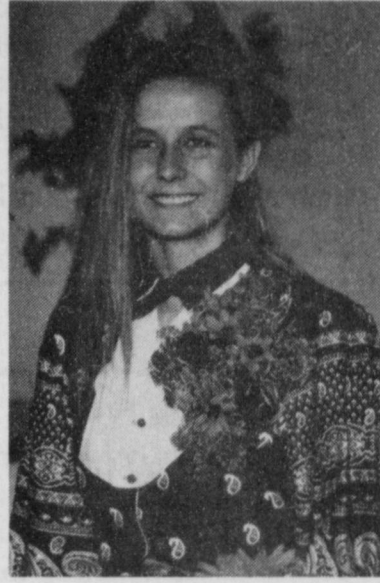

A Tale of Two Judges

Jesus' story of the unjust judge in Luke 18 is a parable that used to perplex me.

In the story, a poor widow is being preyed upon by some wicked enemy. Unable to defend herself, she takes her case to a judge. Judges at this time in this culture were often sorry characters who could easily be bought; moreover,

obviously represents the person who prays. The judge? He represents God, doesn't he? There's the problem.

What is God like? Is he unjust? Of course not. How does he feel about his people approaching him in prayer? Does it bother him? He has told us to "pray without ceasing," but does he have days when he'd rather we'd simply leave him alone? Of course not. God has assured us that our prayers rise up to him like incense. How, then, can Jesus compare God to this unjust jurist?

I used to wonder. Then I read further and I found out that Jesus is *not* comparing God to this worthless judge. He is drawing a contrast. Even an unjust judge listened to the widow, he is saying. "Do you suppose God, patient as he is, will not see justice done for his chosen, who appeal to him day and night?" (Luke 18:7).

We need never hesitate to approach reverently in prayer the throne of the Righteous Judge. He's on our side.
