**Defense Jobs Open For Home People At Cosden Plant**

It isn't necessary for people living in and around Big Spring to break up homes, dispose of belongings and travel to a jam-packed, no-living-accommodations area in order to get employment

in a defense industry. There's a defense industry here at home, one that is wanting workers of various classifications. It's the Cosden Petroleum Corporation's refinery, which, like all other businesses, has been hard hit by loss of employees. Many Cosden men are in the armed services, others have moved into other work.

If the impression prevails that the Cosden refinery jobs are not essential, this is erroneous, personnel officials said. Production and refining of oil badly needed in the war effort is extremely essential, and jobs vital to refining are regarded as such.

Cosden officials suggested that men in this area examine the possibilities of employment at the plant before making a move. Frequently, it was pointed out, when a man goes to a distant city to enter a war industry, he either gives up his home or else has to separate from his family. The expense of moving is always high, and more often than not living conditions are crowded war centers are far from satisfactory. It is much more pleasant, and probably more profitable, for a worker to find himself an essential job at home.

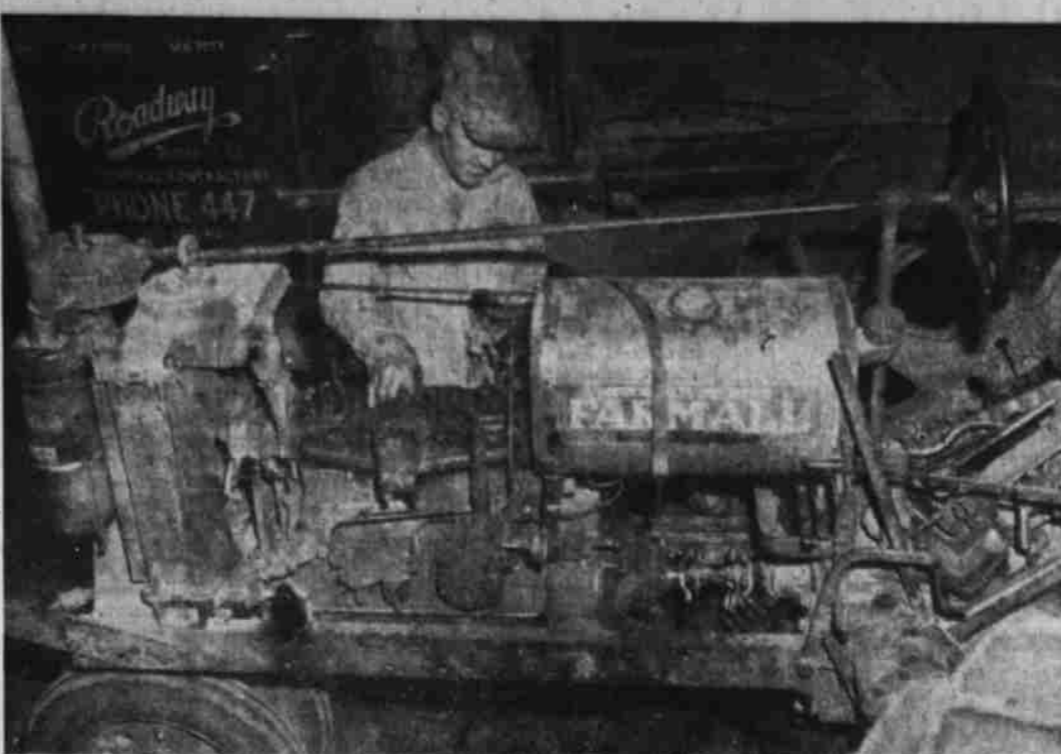

During his 14 years with Dairyland creamery, four years as manager of the local plant, Kinsey has learned and put into operation the latest methods of bottling milk, using the best equipment on the market.

regulations. According to Kinsey, who is proud of his staff of 14 employees, the creamery has a surprisingly small number of accidents, and signs are posted about the plant warning workers against smoking and other hazards.

Not only does the creamery serve the Big Spring Bombardier School but also the largest percent of local cafes, restaurants and coffee shops.

Cooperating with a government request, Dairyland was one of Big Spring's first firms to start the payroll savings plan, deducting a certain amount from employees' paychecks for the purchase of war stamps and bonds.

Going all out in the war effort, the plant replaced regular bottle caps with new and colorful ones recently, featuring red and blue planes encircled with the print "Big Spring Air Flying School—Keep 'Em Flying."

The bakery business in war time is like a lot of other businesses. It has tangled with government restrictions, shortages of materials, and the ever present labor insufficiency.

But, notwithstanding, the majority of customers have been considerate, according to A. S. Darby, owner and manager of the Darby Bakery, the makers of Sally Ann bread.

Pastries and iced cakes and cookies were the first casualties of war in the bakery business due to lack of sugar and time to make delicacies. But whenever time and materials permit, the bakery does try to provide for special orders to accommodate regular customers. According to Darby, customers know and understand the problem and he seldom hears any complaint.

In addition, soon after ration-

ing of sugar, the bakery was able to find a substitute for sugar in fine quality syrup that does not change the fine texture, taste or quality of the bakery goods.

Although under government restrictions, the bakeries were no longer able to make twisted bread, the bread that is not twisted has not changed its high taste standards or vitamin content that makes for healthy bodies.

Business has increased at the bakery since the war, due to an increased population in Big Spring and more customers with ready cash to spend. The demand for pastry alone exceeds five or six times the amount that the bakery can supply.

In the owner's opinion, "we are just rocking along and doing the best we can with what we have." He hopes some day to be able again to fill all customer's orders, regardless of type and quantity, after the war is won.

Cars Will Be Checked For Tax Stamps

A great number of motor vehicle owners are delinquent in purchase of Federal Use stamps for the year beginning July 1st, 1943, according to an announcement from the Treasury Department's internal revenue service.

Internal revenue regulations impose a penalty for the use of any motor vehicle without proper display of the Use Stamp of 25¢ fine or thirty days in jail or both.

All funds collected from the sale of stamps go directly to the treasury department for use in the war. All owners of cars, trucks, motorcycles, and motor bikes are urged to buy the Use Stamp at once if they have not already done so.

Independence Day Celebrated By Americans Over The Globe

Americans around the world celebrated the 167th anniversary of their nation's independence yesterday enthusiastically assisted by their Allies.

In Moscow's Philharmonic Hall, London's Hyde Park, at allied headquarters in North Africa, and in the capitals of Latin-America, Americans and their friends gathered to celebrate the day which has become a symbol in the present-day battle for the four freedoms.

British and French officers and men joined the celebration at allied headquarters in North Africa at which General Dwight D. Eisenhower was the principal speaker. The British Royal Navy under Admiral Sir Andrew Browne Cunningham punctuated the ceremonies by firing a 48-gun salute.

In London 25 American enlisted men were hosts to a like number of British girls on an old-fashioned hayride—in Hyde Park—the first seen in England—while many others toured historic spots along the Thames river as guests of Vice Admiral Sir Geoffrey Blake, ending at Windsor Castle where they were presented to King George and Queen Elizabeth. Red Cross caissons held open house.

At historic St. Paul's Cathedral half of the service was broadcast from there and the remaining half received from Washington Cathedral in Washington, D. C. At Sulgrave, Northamptonshire, ancestral home of George Washington,

British and American flags were raised. Admiral William H. Standley, U.S. ambassador to Russia, held open house at the American embassy in Moscow.

Later Russian artists presented an all-American program at Philharmonic Hall featuring George Geretwin's "Rhapsody In Blue," and American folk songs sung by Natalis Schiller, Moscow opera prima donna.

Latin America gave a demonstration of hemispheric solidarity. Messages of felicitation poured in from practically every capital. Many arranged special broadcasts and newspapers featured editorials and paid advertisements by merchants stressing the bonds between the American continents.

Even Argentina, thus far the only American nation which has not actively joined the anti-axis block, planned a celebration.

Farm Products At A Higher Level AUSTIN, July 5 (AP)—The price paid Texas farmers for wheat averaged \$1.21 per bushel in the month ending June 15, an increase of three cents over the previous month and 24 cents higher than a year ago, the U.S. department of agriculture reported today.

Irregular prices for meat animals were noted, while prices for milk were steady and those for eggs and chickens gained slightly. Beef cattle per hundred pounds at \$11.90 were unchanged from the previous month; hogs at \$13.30 were down 30 cents; veal calves at \$13.80 were up ten cents; lambs at \$11.30 were down 60 cents; and sheep were unchanged at \$8.20.

Wool prices increased from 40 cents to 43.

Gas Renewals Must Be Made By 22nd WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—Approximately 20,000,000 motor car and motorcycle owners outside the eastern shortage area must renew their present basic "A" and "D" gasoline ration before July 22.

In announcing this today, the Office of Price Administration (OPA) said the entire transaction may be handled by mail since copies of the application form will be available at filling stations.
