Many people have heard the saying, "If I could save time in a bottle..." Well one 15-year-old boy in Muleshoe wants to save time in a vault, literally.

Corey Williams has been a Boy Scout for 10 years and is currently working toward the Scout's highest rank, an Eagle Scout. In order to achieve this rank, Corey must complete a community project. For his project, Corey has decided he would like to bury a time capsule, filled with replicas of this decade. preserve a piece of history.

The time capsule, which is scheduled to be buried on June 12, 1994, will not be opened until June 12, 2044, exactly 50 years from the time it is buried. When the time capsule is open in the year 2044, Corey will be 65 years

After a second meeting on Wednesday night on redistricting of the Muleshoe Area Medical Center Hospital Districts, many participants seem to favor a plan which will create two Hispanic minority majority districts.

The hospital is currently in the process of realigning and redistricting voting precincts in accordance with the Voting Rights Act. The changes are necessary in order to adjust for population changes following the 1990 census.

At Wednesday's meeting, the Census Planning Committee met with members of the hospital board of directors.

In presenting the plans on Wednesday, Virginia Daugherty of Daugherty and Associates of Amarillo said, "We need to get as close to equal populations in each district as possible and comply with the Voting Rights Act to make sure there are no minority groups which will be worse off than before."



Recently, though, I remembered the once-popular bumper sticker which invited its readers to "Honk if you love Jesus" when I was reading an interesting little anecdote about one of the best "honkers" of the animal kingdom, one with which we Muleshoe folks should be most familiar, the sandhill crane.

Veterans of sandhill crane hunts, and anyone else who has ever watched these amazing birds, can testify that they have a honking sort of call which is absolutely unique. As the sun rises early in the morning and the sky fills with

birds, the morning solitude is broken by hundreds of cranes honking out their unforgettable call. You can see why I was interested to see the following excerpt from Bruce which he writes about these unique birds. He writes:

"These large birds, who fly great distances across continents, have three remarkable qualities. First, they rotate leadership. No one bird stays out in front all the time. Second, they choose leaders who can handle turbulence. And then, all during the time one bird is leading, the rest are honking their affirmation. That's not a bad model for the church. Certainly leadership ought to be shared. But most of all, we need a church where we are all honking encouragement."

You see, honking if you love Jesus may be fine (though we'd probably best bless the community by staying off the horn!), but in the church a big part of loving Jesus means "honking" if you love your brother! Isn't that what Paul is telling us when he urges us to "encourage one another and build each other up . . . " (1 Thessalonians 5:11)? So, go ahead! Honk out some encouragement this week!



Hopes for '94 cotton crop turning to dust on High Plains

crop are rapidly turning to dust for growers on the Texas High Plains. Following a record '93 crop, cotton farmers in this threemillion-acre "cotton patch" are looking all the way back to 1974 to find fields as dry as they are now, says a cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extnesion Service. That year was a disaster.

"Only two of the 25 High Plains counties - Floyd and Briscoe - have moderate soil moisture," said Kater Hake, Extension Service cotton specialist. From last August until now, only 3.4 inches of rain have fallen at Lubbock.

"Rains have largely jumped over the entire High Plains," Hake said. "Most cotton counties (on the High Plains) have a soil moisture deficit of between six to 10 inches." The soil moisture deficit is the difference between what could be stored and what is stored.

Only seven inches of rain fell across the 25-county area from August 1973 until August 1974. Then in August, September and October 1974, when cotton bolls were maturing and opening, 16 inches of rain fell.

The area yield that year was only 264 pounds of lint an acre and quality was poor. Last year, the area's record crop of more than 3.6 million bales averaged 658 pounds an acre for irrigated fields and 503 pounds an acre for dryland fields, with outstanding strength and micronaire (fineness).

"That 1993 dryland crop had healthy, deep roots that extracted all of the surface soil and most of the deep soil moisture," Hale said. "The surface hasn't received any moisture for planting, and is powder dry."

With only scant rain after July last year, irrigated fields were also dry at harvest, the cotton specialist noted. "Those fields also had excellent root systems that extracted deep moisture," he said. By the time that crop was complete, wells


