



Benson Favors Trade

Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson has come out in favor of trade with the Soviet or Soviet satellites. There are two factors to this idea of trade with the Reds which Mr. Benson ought to keep in mind. One of the factors he has already expressed. That is, that he believes exchanges should always be favorable to us.

This is, of course, fundamental. There isn't any point in any kind of a deal or swap if we are going to lose. by the exchange. All transactions in a free market should be of benefit to both sides. If we trade with other countries we should certainly do it, on a basis that such trade will help us. And we shouldn't be too concerned with the transaction otherwise. Let's trade for our own

The other factor Mr. Benson has apparently overlooked. But it is even more important than the one he has mentioned. That is that such trade in other countries should be conduced by the persons involved, and not by the governments of the countries involved. In other words, when we come out for free trade we should insist that the trade actually be conducted in a free market and not one which is government owned and controlled.

We could not favor any kind of an exchange which would serve to entrench the Soviet or any other government in power. This could lead to disaster in more ways.

Thus, if a manufacturer of automobile seat covers in this country found that certain reeds grown in South Russia were highly desirable in the making of his product, we see no reason why he should not contact the owner or grower of these reeds and endeavor to make a deal with him. However, we would seriously question the desirability of this manufacturer going first to our own government, and through it to the Kremlin in an effort to get those reeds. The reputations of all governments in such instances leave much to be desired. The reeds in question thus become an instrument of international

The Kremlin would undoubtedly steal the reeds from the grower, on the theory that everything in Russia belongs to the "people's democracy." Then the Kremlin, intent on a Red revolution which envisages a single world government, would attempt to make use of those reeds to extract from the American government such goods or payments as would most surely be politically or militarily advantageous to the Kremlin.

Similarly our own government would bargain, seekadvantage, but at the same time seeking to entrench The two persons intent on trade would be overshadow-

ed by the great government grappling and grasping for power. Assuming that the political feasibility of the deal were ultimately attained, then it would be put through. The grower of the reeds would have lost everything. The manufacturer in this country would be taxed as would everybody else, to pay for the government interference, and the reeds, when imported would be embargoed upon, levied upon, inspected, examined devermined, weighed, counted, re-checked and finally sent on to the buyer. Every process would cost the buyer money. The cost would be passed on to the purchaser of seat covers. In the end, no one would benefit except the two governments involved. Yes, we're for free trade, but when we say free, we mean FREE!



ADOPTION OF OUR INCOME TAX AMENDMENT

(The Southern Conservative)

Up until 1913, the Constitution of the United States provided that Congress could not levy direct taxes on the people, such as the income tax.

Meantime, Lenin had issued this imatum on the subject: ". . . the abolition of indirect taxation and the introduction of a graduat-

Lenin made this demand in 1903 and within ten short years, the United States had abandoned its Constitutonal provision against the levying of direct taxes and had adopted the Sixteenth Amendment providing for an income tax which is Socialistic and designed to redistribute the wealth.

This program of World Socialism or Communism or whatever you want to call it, is not new by any means, as this major accomplishment by Lenin proves.

At the time the 16th Amendment was adopted, there was no general knowledge in this country of plans for World Communism and the Leninists found it comparatively easy to bend American lawmakers to their will.

It's harder now, of course, as millions of Americans have been alerted to this plan for World, Communism, but practially every policy put in effect in this country for the past twenty - two years has been dictated in Moscow. This is an irrefutable fact which can be confirmed by comparing our major economic and social legislation with the official pronouncements of the Communist Party.







Illinois Red **Faces Court Test Monday**

CHICAGO, Jan. 5- UP-Claude Lightfoot, executive secretary of the Illinois Communist Party, goes on trial next Monday under an untested clause of the Smith Act which makes mere membership in the party a crime.

All of the 81 persons thus far convicted under the Smith Act were tried for organizing groups which "teach, advocate or encourage" the violent overthrow of the U. S. government.

Lightfoot, 44, is the first person to face trial under a clause making it a crime "to become a member of, or affiliate with" any such

Lightfoot was indicted last May and arrested June 16. U. S. District Judge Philip L.

Sullivan, who will hear the trial opening Monday, rejected a defense motion in October to dismiss the indictment. But he permitted Lightfoot to go

free on \$30,000 bond. Lightfoot, a Negro, was born in Lake Village, Ark., and brought to Chicago during the First World War. He attended high school here. then joined the Young Communist League for which he became a section organizer in 1934 in the

city's hero "Bronzeville." At present, Lightfoot is one of nine alternates to the 13 members on the party's national commit-
