

Evacuation May Take Two Weeks

TAIPEI, Formosa, Feb. 7 - UP - Communist ships and planes which dominated the Tachen area for weeks fled Monday before ships and planes of the U. S. Seventh Fleet and the Nationalist navy evacuating the Nationalist garrison to Formosa.

No shots were reported fired. Some unofficial ceasefire seemed to be in operation in the early hours of the pullback in which the first three shiploads of Nationalist troops arrived in the northern port of Keelun under U. S. protection.

Military sources reported the operation was running smoothly and that it was expected to be finished this week. All early reports said the area was quiet but observers emphasized the danger was not over and that the danger of war will last throughout the op-







What is termed "administrative opposition" to TVA Is breeding an interesting development on the Ameri-

It is a close co-mingling of funds and follies committed both by American business and by the federal

The TVA, which to now has cost the American taxpayers just under \$2 billion, is facing a hard fisted attitude in the Eisenhower administration. Resistance to its yearly demands in the budget have caused TVA general manager Aubrey J. Wagner and is proponents in Congress to cast about for other ways of getting hold of money.

TVA advocates are now certain that this tax-supported boon-doggle is well enough along to stand on its own financial feet.

Therefore, the proposal now is that instead of going to the Federal treasury, the big power project will seek to win private capital for its support, in the form of bonds. The bonds of course are to be insured by the Federal Government.


The true greatness of the American conception of free enterprise is found in totally unshackled free enterprise. Where the business man teams up with government, he opens the door to Federal regulations and restrictions. While it is frequently a temptation for the business man to try to find support for himself or limitation of his competitors through the medium of government, it is always a two-edged sword which in the end will wound both those against whom it is wielded and those who hold it.

The turning of TVA to free enterprise, while it is an open admission that free enterprise is more to be relied upon than government, is also an attempt to convert a giant Federal swindle into a justifiable private endeavor.

We are not impressed when Free Enterprise in the role of groom woos and weds the Federal Government in a mesalliance of un-like mates.

We are no more impressed when the Federal Government in the person of one of its agencies, plays a groom with a somewhat effeminate portion of American Free Enterprise. These two things are dissimilar in all respects and cannot mix. Offspring of this union tend to rapacity and abnormality.

If the TVA can no longer remain a Federal agency then let us be honest about it and say so. How about selling the monstrous thing to the highest bidder, reimbursing the American taxpayers who have put up the funds, and then letting it operate as a private business

"Christian Values And Economic Life'

Since "Christian Values and Economic Life" is published by the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., and a summary of six books issued by it under the heading of A Series on the Ethics and Economics of Society, and since I never ran across a book that had so many arbitrary statements that were out of harmony with Christian ethics, I want to point out some more of the Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam's errors. I am using the Rule as a guide to determine

Christian and unethical to have great inequality of income. Of course, that would be true if our economy was controlled by the government and not a free economy where all people have an equal right to help establish values. It is hard for a man who has made some study of a laissez-faire economy to see how one man producing wealth many times faster than another man hurts the slow man. Those who will answer questions about their economics know that wealth that is produced must be distributed in order to benefit its owners. The know that in a free economy no man gets a great deal of wealth unless he helps many other people improve their standard of living. It is hard to conceive how any person but an ego-tist would think he was wise enough to determine how wealth should be distributed and divided if it is not to be distributed and divided on a free market basis, where all people help establish values. It is difficult for me to conceive how every other man in the world producing more than that the more others produce, what little I produce will exchange for more, and I am bene-

Limited Number of Bricks But Oxnam, who seems to think that he knows better how wealth should be distributed than Di-

vine Providence knows, writes: "An expert brick mason may lay a certain number of bricks each day, but because work at high speeds makes heavy physieal demands, the number of years in which he may work may therefore be shortened. Or, again, if the pace is too swift, fewer men can handle all the work, and fellow workers may be laid off. The workers therefore may seek to determine the number of bricks that can reasonably be laid in a given day. To some, such attempts appear to be soldiering, or a form of sabotage; to others, they are an






