Medics Still Uncertain On Lockjaw Shot

NEW YORK -- UP -- After more than 40 years of vaccinating against lockjaw, medical scientists still can't be sure how long the vaccinated remain immune to the disease.
Maybe they'll know the staying powers of the Salk anti-polio vaccine sooner than that, but immunization scientists would bet against it.
Dr. Edward S. Stafford, of the Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, a leading authority on tetanus or lockjaw, believes that each of the millions of men and women who got the tetanus shots in the armed forces during World War II should be getting "booster" shots now. He suspects that their immunity may be running out.
That goes also for all persons over ten years old who were immunized against tetanus as infants. He called attention to the lack of certainty as to how long tetanus immunity persists in a learned discussion in "Surgery, Gynecology, and Obstetrics," the scientific organ of the American College of Surgeons.
Nowadays most infants are given a combined diphtheria-tetanus vaccination. "Eventually nearly all Americans will possess active immunity against tetanus," he said, "but whether this immunity is permanent or not cannot be decided on a factual basis for many years yet." However, "this valuable health asset now enjoyed by many millions of Americans can be preserved with certainty by a booster injection of tetanus toxoid at intervals of five, or even 10 years."

Isle Mayor Runs Into Opposition

GALVESTON, Tex. -- UP -- Mayor-elect George Roy Cough, who said he will re-open Galveston's red-light district, Friday ran into opposition from the police commissioner and the Ministerial Association.
Police Commissioner Walter Johnston said flatly that "The bawdy house district will never open again as long as I'm police commissioner. I don't take orders from Clough or anybody else. They take orders from me."
The Rev. George Scotchmer, president of the Ministerial Association in this Gulf Coast playtown of 70,000 residents, said "We stand at all times against civic endorsement of prostitution."
The minister asked Cough to meet with members of the association Friday to talk over the situation.
Cough, 64-year-old operator of radio station KLUF, answered the police commissioner's statement by saying: "I am going to order Johnston to get the girls back in the district. If he refuses, I will give the same order to Police Chief Willie Burns. If Burns refuses, I'll remove him from office."
Johnston, who can't be fired by Cough, because he is an elected official, once favored an open red-light district. But now he said he is against it because he believed it would encourage juvenile delinquency.
Clough said he didn't know how many girls would move into the Post Office street area, once renowned as a center of prostitution, but he said he thinks there are a "helluva lot."
The Texas Rangers once closed up the open houses of prostitution on Postoffice street, and also closed big-time gambling to the public view. But the businesses have been flourishing in private, anyway.
Clough, who was elected on a platform of "clean, but liberal" city government, defeated the incumbent mayor, who called for a wide-open city.

Tidelands Lease Sale Set July 12

WASHINGTON -- UP -- Sale of oil and gas leases on 674,095 acres of submerged lands off the coasts of Texas and Louisiana has been set for July 12 at New Orleans.
Interior Secretary Douglas McKay said the bulk of the lands to be leased consist of 458,095 acres off Louisiana. The submerged lands extend as far as 60 miles from shore and as deep as 100 feet. The terms for the sale provide for leases of five years and as long thereafter as oil or gas is produced in paying quantities.
The terms also call for payment to the government of 16 1/2 percent royalty on production, in addition to \$5 an acre annual rental fee. No less than \$15 an acre will be considered, McKay said.
For the purpose of the sale, the lands have been divided into 210 tracts varying in size from 937 to 5,760 acres.
McKay said sealed bids will be received by the Bureau of Land Management, Outer Continental Shelf Office, 608 Masonic Building, New Orleans, until the hour of the sale.
Two previous sales of leases on 486,870 acres of oil and gas lands and 25,000 acres of sulphur lands on the outer continental shelf off Louisiana and Texas brought the government \$142,405,530.

Lefors' New Water Well Rated Good

LEFORS -- The new city water well at Lefors has been reported to be a "good well" by Mayor Fred Blackwell.
Located approximately 300 ft. north of the northeast corner of the city limits, the new well is producing 900 barrels a minute in a 48-hour acceptance test to end today at 7 p.m.
The well was drilled by Kennemer-Courson Drilling Contractors of Pampa. It was drilled to a depth of 135 ft. but gravel filled back to the present depth of 106 ft.
The well, Lefors' fourth, will be in active service in time for the heavy consumption this summer, according to Blackwell.
"It may take us about 30 days to tie the well in to the main water line but we will be ready in plenty of time for it to help out this summer. This well could easily supply a town twice our size," Blackwell added.
Current plans include the laying of a 6 inch water line to the northeast corner of the city limits where it will tie in to the present water system. The right of way for the tie in line and the well site were purchased by the city from Mrs. L. Upham.

Ditch Co. Doing Big Business

PARIS -- UP -- A company that got rich by digging a ditch is doing more business than ever before. But at the height of the boom, directors of the company are meeting in Paris to talk about going out of business.
The ditch is the Suez Canal. The company that built it -- "Compagnie Universelle Du Canal Maritime De Suez" -- is facing the prospect of giving it away.
It hasn't much choice. The company owns and operates the canal under a 99-year lease from the Egyptian government which became effective when the waterway between the Mediterranean and Red Seas opened in 1869.
When the lease expires in 1968 the canal will automatically become the property of the Egyptian government unless some new agreement is negotiated. Company officials are doubtful Egypt is interested in extending the lease.
"The present Egyptian government certainly wouldn't be," said Jacques Georges-Picot, the company's top executive. But he pointed out that 1968 is still 13 years away and a lot might happen in 13 years.
Meanwhile the company is working on the assumption the canal will be turned over to the Egyptians.
The section of the country with the largest proportion of older persons is New England, although many older people have settled in both California and Florida in recent years.

US Chamber Hits Gas Control Idea

WASHINGTON -- UP -- The chamber of commerce of the United States told Congress Thursday that federal regulation of natural gas prices will "set a dangerous precedent."
A chamber spokesman, H. B. Fell, president of Simpson-Fell Oil Co., Ardmore, Okla., said "If the prices of fuels are to be regulated by the federal government, then the prices of other commodities entering into interstate commerce might likewise be regulated."
Fell, in testimony before the Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce, said federal regulation will divert gas to interstate uses, discourage exploration of new gas sources and interfere with state conservation measures.
The result, he said, would be higher prices to consumers.
He testified in favor of a bill exempting producers of natural gas from federal regulation.

Bank Robbery Suspect Held

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. -- UP -- Joseph Francis Campbell, 20, was held under \$20,000 bond Friday after being arrested by FBI agents in connection with the \$26,500 robbery of a Paducah, Ky., bank.
W. W. Burke, agent in charge of the Little Rock FBI office, said Campbell had been living here 17 months under the name of "Robert Myers."
Burke said Campbell implicated another man in the robbery last May 25 of the West End branch of the Peoples First National Bank and Trust Co. in Paducah. He said the other man had been living here as Campbell's brother under the alias of "Kenneth Myers."
Burke said both men escaped from a prison camp near Live Oak, Fla., about Dec. 15, 1953. He said Campbell is a native of Philadelphia.



Einstein Felt A-Bomb A Mistake

LOS ANGELES -- UP -- Five months before his death Albert Einstein felt the "one great mistake" of his life was recommending to President Roosevelt that the atom bomb be made, Nobel prize winner Dr. Linus Pauling said Thursday night.
Pauling, who heads the chemistry department at California Institute of Technology and received the Nobel prize in that field, spoke at memorial services for the great mathematician sponsored by the American Civil Liberties Union Southern California chapter.
The chemist said he last saw Einstein on Nov. 15, 1954, and they "talked about the danger to civilization of militarism and the hydrogen bomb, about the difficulty of understanding our foreign policy and our failure to take positive action toward the future of peace."
"Einstein spoke again about his deep convictions that the people of the world, in order to save the world, would have to learn to get along with one another."
"Then Einstein said, 'I have made one great mistake when I signed the letter to President Roosevelt recommending that atom bombs be made.'"
Pauling said the mathematician then added that he felt there was some justification because of the danger the Germans might have the atom bomb first.
Einstein also believed "the conquest of the atom would turn out to be also the conquest of war," the chemist said.

Doss Probe Continues

TULSA -- UP -- Oklahoma authorities will question acquaintances of Nannie Doss in Alabama within the next two weeks to obtain information to be used in the accused prisoner's murder trial here June 6.
County Attorney J. Howard Edmondson said he and State Crime Bureau Agent Ray Page will go to Anniston, Ala., possibly May 21. Edmondson said they would talk to persons who know the 49-year-old grandmother and "it is possible we may use some of them as witnesses in the murder trial."
Mrs. Doss will answer charges of poisoning her last husband, Sam Doss, a highway worker she met through a lonely hearts club, in her Tulsa trial.
She also is charged with murdering former husband, Richard Morton, Emporia, Kan.; Arlie Lanning, Lexington, N. C.; and Frank Harrison, Jacksonville, Ala. She has admitted poisoning all four.

Vet Land Deal Void, Court Says

AUSTIN -- UP -- A \$34,000 block transaction under the Veterans Land program was voided by 13th District Judge J. Harris Gardner in the first civil action of its kind.
Gardner entered his ruling Wednesday.
The state brought suit against Sam R. Ward of Crystal City and it was the first such action to go to trial.
Gardner held that fraud and misrepresentation were involved in applications of five veterans for 160 acres of irrigated land in Zavala county owned by Ward and his wife, Gertrude Ward. A sum of \$33,829 was involved in the October, 1953, transaction.
Gardner expressed "sympathy" for the 64-year-old Ward, but ruled it was the seller's responsibility to see that the veterans' application for purchase of land were made "in good faith. He upheld the state contention that Ward misrepresented to the state that each of the veterans desired to purchase the land under the veterans land program.
Four veterans, testifying as state witnesses, said during three days of testimony that they were paid \$300 each for signing certain papers in connection with sale to the state of Ward's property.
Ward, a Crystal City rancher, testified that he never dealt directly with the veterans, and left all details of the negotiations to agents.
The \$33,829 was tendered recently by Ward, but Gardner refused to accept the money without trial of the case. The money was tendered with a general denial of the state's allegations.
Gardner Wednesday ordered the land returned to Ward as the owner "on the ground the applications were not executed as bona fide applications."
He also awarded the state 6 percent interest from the time state warrants (checks) for payment of the land were issued -- Jan. 27, 1954. The interest was expected to total about \$2,500.

Shivers said the people of Texas "gave me a mandate" in last summer's gubernatorial primary, when the Port Arthur strike was a campaign issue, "to try to get adequate laws enacted to prevent such strikes from taking place in the future."
