Market Experts Fear Tighter U.S. Controls

Greatest Tumble Since '29 Brings On Jitters

NEW YORK - U.P. - Stock market experts expressed fears Tuesday of tighter government stock restrictions on the heels of Monday's sharp market break - the greatest since late 1929. Prices tumbled as much as \$12 Monday in the king-sized selling wave. The total value of stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange dipped \$3 billion.

Administration Watches Stock Market Closely

WASHINGTON - U.P. - Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey testified Tuesday in the wake of the worst break in stock prices since 1929 that the Eisenhower administration is watching the market closely. Humphrey said the market rise reflected "in part the rebirth of confidence in the functioning of our free enterprise system."

DARING DUDS DAY DAWNS

MEMPHIS, Tenn. - U.P. - Male employees of the Memphis Press-Scimitar Tuesday started something that could cause a new trend in business suits. Luther Southworth, news editor, instigated "Daring Duds Day" in which fellow workers broke out their red jackets, pink and blue shirts and made the ladies jealous.

Air Force Unveils 'Thinking' Missile

WASHINGTON - U.P. - The Air Force unveiled a super-sonic guided missile Tuesday that can "think" for itself and soon will be available to destroy enemy bombers at great distances from American targets. Making public first official details on the Falcon guided aircraft rocket (GAR), the Air Force described it as "the smallest guided missile in production and the only air-to-air missile with a 'brain' of its own."

Third Housing Addition To City Planned

The word of a third housing addition to the City of Pampa came to light today in the weekly meeting of the Pampa City Commission. City Manager Fred Brock, in discussing the need for more water and sewer pipe, commented that the proposed Pampa Heights Addition would be "presented in the very near future" to the commission for action on annexation.

Committee Approves 30 New Agencies

WASHINGTON - U.P. - The House appropriations committee Tuesday approved \$85,212,429 in extra funds for more than 30 federal agencies and branches, including congress itself. The supplemental funds are designed to tide them over until the end of the 1955 fiscal year on June 30. The \$1,568,000 for congress will cover the cost of the \$7,500-a-year pay raises which the law-makers recently voted themselves.

Land Probe Asked

AUSTIN - U.P. - Texas Rudder went on record Tuesday with a request to the legislature, the governor, and the attorney general for a "thorough investigation" of all general land office activities. Rudder, who succeeded the resigned Bascom Giles the first of the year, made his request in the form of a letter, which did not elaborate. But Rudder later explained that he wanted the public to know that he didn't want to halt any investigation of land office activities.

Irishmen Visit To Plug 'Day'

Delegates from the all Irish City - at least one day a year - of Shamrock will bring their "caravan" to Pampa this afternoon to give Pampans a glimpse of the extent of this year's St. Patrick's Day celebration, March 17. This morning Shamrock's Mayor Bob Douglas along with "Irishmen" Seibert Worley and Bill Walker appeared on Radio Station KPND's staff breakfast to give the Top o' Texas city a glimpse of the festivities arranged for the one-day celebration whose size is out-ranked only by Dublin, Boston and New York.

Late Hours Thursday

Beginning Thursday Pampa will have one night a week when shoppers can do their purchasing up till 9 p.m. Joe Tooley, chairman of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce merchant activities committee, today said the hours this Thursday and every Thursday hereafter for a period of 120 days will be from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Stevens Is Target In Press Hearing

WASHINGTON - U.P. - Senate investigators Tuesday opened a new investigation of the Peress case on an old note accusing Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens of withholding a pertinent document. This time it was a Democratic chairman, Sen. John L. McClellan (Ark.), instead of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.), who accused Stevens of less than full cooperation in disclosing all about the Army career of former Maj. Irving Peress.

Rudder Wants Scandals Cleared

Rudder, who succeeded the resigned Bascom Giles the first of the year, made his request in the form of a letter, which did not elaborate. But Rudder later explained that he wanted the public to know that he didn't want to halt any investigation of land office activities. In general, Rudder's letter to Gov. Allan Shivers, Attorney General Ben Sheppard and members of the legislature was in the form of a report on the scandal-ridden \$100 million veterans land program. He said he was firmly opposed to abolition of the veterans land program, which he declared was "not all bad despite reports of fraud and excess profits from some fast-dealing land promoters."

Lava Flow Threatens In Hawaii

PAHOA, Hawaii - U.P. - A flow of molten lava from a violent new eruption in the Kilauea volcano Friday pushed its way toward the sea Tuesday, devouring canefields and forests lying in its fiery path. The new eruption broke out suddenly Monday night, sending a huge fountain of lava spurting 800 feet into the air. Then a massive lava flow bubbled from the ground and fanned out into the lush tropical forest.

Relief Hay Deadline Set

AUSTIN - U.P. - Drouth-area farmers were reminded Tuesday by Agriculture Commissioner John White they have only until March 31 to accept delivery of hay under the emergency relief program. After the deadline, under federal regulations, farmers will not be eligible for reimbursement of transportation costs, White said.

Missing Man Reported OK

CANADIAN - Fred Taylor, Canadian cafe operator, who disappeared Monday morning, has called a daughter to report that he is all right. According to Hemphill County Sheriff Harry Rathjen, Taylor telephoned his daughter that he was all right though he didn't reveal his whereabouts. Taylor stirred up an investigation when his wife reported him missing Monday morning. She found his empty wallet, hat and boots in the apartment behind the cafe where they live. "We don't know where he is but his family is satisfied that he is well," said Sheriff Rathjen.

The judge acquitted Provoo on the ground that he was denied his constitutional right to a speedy trial.

SAN ANTONIO - U.P. - Former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, who was indicted by a Bexar county grand jury last week on a charge of bribery in connection with the veterans land program scandal, faces trial on April 1. Announcement of the trial date was made Monday. It will be before Criminal District Judge M. D. Jones, who earlier had set the same date for trials of C. V. Wynn, Harry Sheppard Jr., on 10 counts of veterans land program deals.

Quail Hatchery Bids Requested

AUSTIN - U.P. - Bids on construction of a \$200,000 experimental quail hatchery at Tyler, the key stone project of a statewide bob white restoration program, will be opened March 24 by the Texas Game and Fish Commission. It was announced Tuesday.

### Big Storm System Batters Midwest

In the southland, meanwhile, forestry experts hoped a cold front would swing down far enough to dampen raging fires which have burned out about 175,000 acres of timberland in Alabama, Georgia and Florida.

In Dixie, light rain and drizzle sprinkled parts of Virginia and North Carolina and fog spread over parts of northwest South Carolina, central Georgia, southeast Alabama and northwest Florida. Colorado Town Has Jitters A threat of a different sort was causing jitters in the northwest Colorado town of Rangely. Five miles above the community a fast thaw had piled up thick ice jams in the White River. Water poured over farmlands and residents feared that a sudden break in the jam would throw masses of ice against a bridge just west of town, probably backing up waters in flood proportions at Rangely.

### Group Calls For Record Spending

AUSTIN —UP— A Senate Finance subcommittee Monday recommended \$1,558,382,508 in state expenditures over next biennium, a record high spending program exceeding anticipated tax revenue by more than \$51 million.

The multi-million dollar appropriation measure tops the previous figure for the last two years by more than \$18 million.

Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, chairman of the Senate Finance committee, said the proposal was subject to amendment by the full committee. However, there appeared little likelihood of major change, at least prior to reaching the Senate floor. Even there, approval was probable since the powerful finance committee includes 21 members of the 31-man Senate.

**Earmarked for Schools**  
Most of the increase is for public schools, colleges and universities, highways and public welfare, expenditures taking about 85-cents out of each dollar of income from state and federal sources.

The apparent additional tax needed of more than \$51 million includes \$14 million in increased public welfare benefits, approved last November as a constitutional amendment, but not yet acted on by the Legislature. However, approval by the lawmakers appeared assured.

The report recommended a \$2.5 million increase over the next two fiscal years for public health.

Elective officials such as the members of the Railroad Commission were increased from \$10,800 to \$17,500 a year, and the salary of the agriculture commissioner was hiked from \$8,700 to \$15,000 annually. However, few other wage boosts were recommended.

An increase of \$10 million in appropriations from general revenue for the state's 18 colleges and universities was proposed. The bill earmarks \$1,450,799 for major repairs of college buildings, most of them neglected since World War II.

**Increase for Junior Colleges**  
An increase of \$2.1 million was recommended for junior colleges. Proposed spending of about \$60 million on state hospitals and special schools tops the present level

**Columnist's Libel Suits Are Settled**  
NEW YORK —UP— The New York Daily Mirror published a statement Monday announcing settlement of \$1,525,000 in libel suits filed by the New York Post and its editor, James A. Wechsler.

The statement, authorized by Walter Winchell, said the columnist never said nor meant to say that the New York Post, its publisher or editor are Communists, or are sympathetic to communism.

The statement was broadcast also Sunday night over the American Broadcasting Company network at the start of Winchell's television program.

The suits were discontinued with the publication of the statement and payment of \$30,000 in counsel fees and costs to the Post and Wechsler.

The agreement provided that the statement should be published in other Hearst newspapers also and that either Hearst or King Features which distributes the Winchell column, request other newspapers publishing the column to carry the statement.

Winchell also disclosed Monday night that he is leaving the ABC network because of a dispute over an insurance policy covering him for libel.

The columnist, who will leave the network Dec. 28 after 25 years, said he was paid \$10,000 weekly \$2 weeks a year under the contract signed with ABC seven years ago.

### Ike Reports Aid Shifted To Asia

WASHINGTON —UP— President Eisenhower sent his semi-annual report on the mutual security program to congress Monday and reported that the United States has shifted the bulk of its economic aid to Asia.

He pointed out that the underdeveloped countries of Asia hold the bulk of the world's population, occupy the largest land area, contain major sources of key raw materials and minerals and many of the most valuable military bases.

Because of this the United States must be "deeply concerned with the stability of these countries," and help them achieve the economic growth necessary to facilitate the raising of their living standards and their movement toward Democratic government, Mr. Eisenhower said.

The President will submit a special message to congress next month. Foreign aid chief Harold Stassen, just back from a 30,000-mile trip to seven Asian countries, said Monday that this will recommend a "significant" increase in U.S. economic aid to Far Eastern nations.

It will be fitted, Stassen said, into the \$3.5 billion for worldwide economic and military aid earmarked by the President in his budget for the fiscal year starting July 1.

WASHINGTON —UP— The Baptist General Convention of Texas withdrew its application for a permit to build a new television station at Corpus Christi to expedite, it said, bringing television service to the city on Channel 6. World Rule

The United Nations is an organization which is pre-occupied with lines. This modern aggregation of Babylonians is convinced that the way to peace is a matter of removing the lines of demarcation which separate us into nations, religions, races, and economic groups.

According to the one-world theory, it is these barriers which cause us all our difficulties. If we can have one world, one government, one church, one race and all wealth redistributed equally about the face of the globe, then we would have peace. This is the theory. The theory begs the belief that each line of demarcation is a potential battleground.

It is an interesting concept. For it is on this theory that the entire U. N. functions. Yet, this same predilection with lines manifests itself in another way, also. The World Association of Parliamentarians for World Government, an organization which is part and parcel of the one-world movement, and totally devoted to the United Nations ideal of world government, met in London in September of 1952 to map out the ways and means to lasting peace.

This time the line erasers drew a great many more lines than they erased. Here we see that they have divided up the world like any ten-year-old divides an orange. And they have submitted this proposal to the U. N. with the hopes that 1955 will be the year which will bring it to fruition.

In order to maintain peace in a world under a single government, a single police force will have to be relied upon. It is self-evident that it would be unwise (keeping the removal of barriers in mind) to let any subject nation police its own domain.

An Easy Way To Get Political And Economic Understanding

We all like to get material and spiritual and intellectual things with the least possible effort. We absorb most of our beliefs from our environment, thus our environment is very important.

Most of the current magazines with large circulations are magazines that are to a large degree escapist literature. They seldom publish anything that is not popular or entertaining. They are interested in circulation in dollars and seem not to see that unless we more nearly approach a moral basis, their dollars and circulation will do them little good.

I know of no easier way to get a better understanding of political and economic matters than to read regularly The Freeman magazine. It is devoted to the narrow aim of promoting liberty and freedom and peace.

The March issue of The Freeman is devoted entirely to the United Nations. Every person who believes in the United Nations should read articles by writers who do not believe that the United Nations is good for the United States. The March issue has articles by 16 prominent students of government and history — such men as John T. Flynn, Frank E. Holman, Edmund A. Optis, Dean Russell, John Chamberlain, W. H. Chamberlin, F. A. Harper and Frank Chodorov.

Here is the way Chodorov starts out the editorial under the heading of "One Worldism": "Ten years ago the United Nations was ushered into the world as the guarantor of peace. It has failed. Despite that obvious fact, there are many whose faith in some sort of superstate as an instrument of peace is unshaken, and who lay the failure of the UN to the limitations put upon it by the autonomy of its members.

That is to say, they believe in peace through coercion; the more coercion, the more peace. "History cannot give this faith the slightest support. The grandeur that was Rome did not prevent the parts of that empire from coming into conflict with one another nor from rising up against the central authority.

"The best way can be said of any coalition of nations is that it can keep smoldering fires from breaking out only so long as one of its members can dominate the others. It can maintain an armed truce. The UN has not done even that, simply because no one State has shown sufficient strength to take control. The two most powerful members have been in contention since its beginning and are now flexing their muscles for a test of strength.

Official Review Of Matusow Turnabout Reveals Red Plot

WASHINGTON — High government officials' review of Harvey Matusow's accusations against Communists in the courts and before Congressional committees has convinced them that his recantations are part of a red plot hatched in the Kremlin to discredit the American counterintelligence against the Soviet conspirators at home and abroad.

Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr., has ordered every Federal agency to check on each case against a government employee in which Matusow testified. It is understood that they constitute only a handful, and that the on-again-off-again witness was only a minor figure in these trials. He is described as a "bit player" in the drama which he seeks to rewrite and to stage.

The questions which the courts, Congressional Committees and Federal agencies must resolve are: (1) Did Matusow lie in his original testimony? (2) Did his lies affect basic decisions with regard to convictions or suspensions? (3) Did his data seriously damage the status of government officials against whom he bore witness?

In the first place, the smelters' union which advanced \$1,500 in royalties for Matusow's book, "False Witness," is notoriously radical, and was therefore expelled by the parent organization. Both of Matusow's publishers have taken refuge behind the Fifth Amendment in answer to senatorial questions as to whether they were communists.

My bargaining agents, representing "management," dealt themselves a very swell proposition a few years ago. They call it an executive incentive and retirement plan.

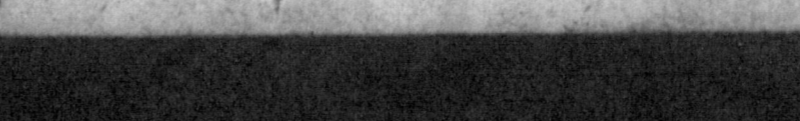
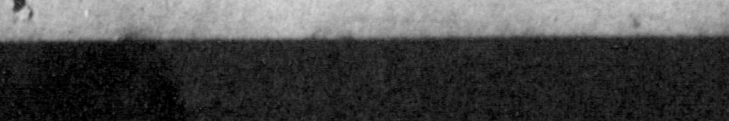
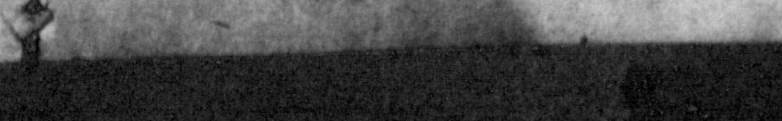

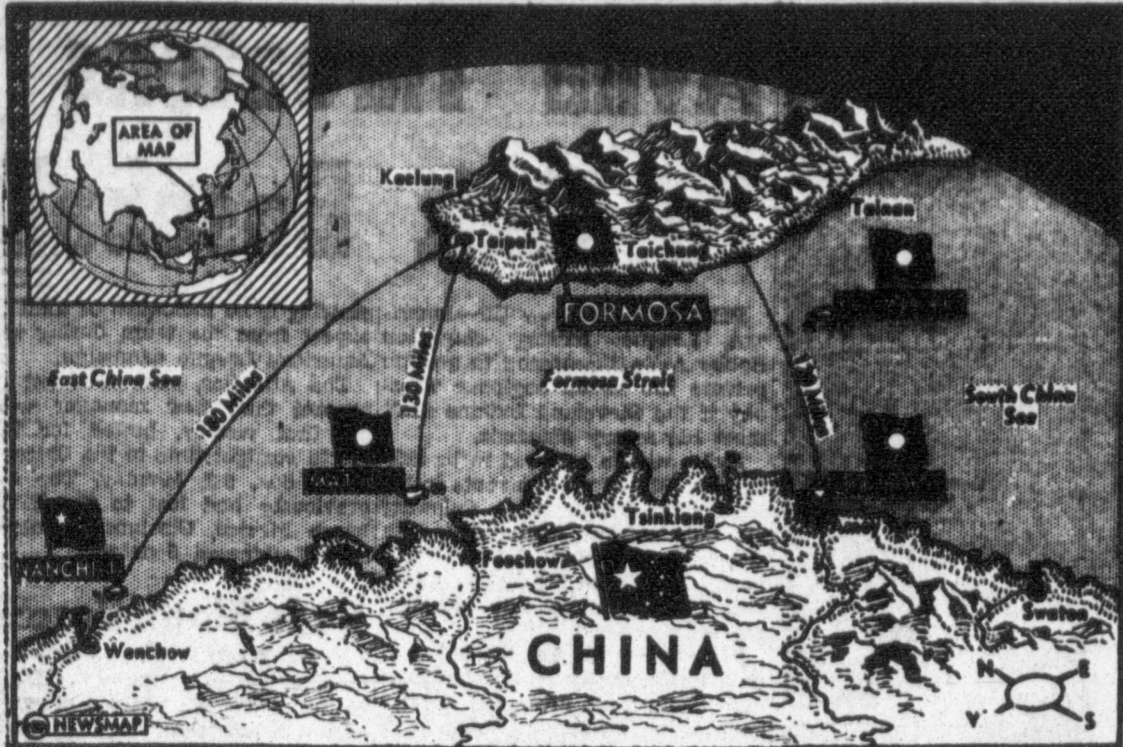

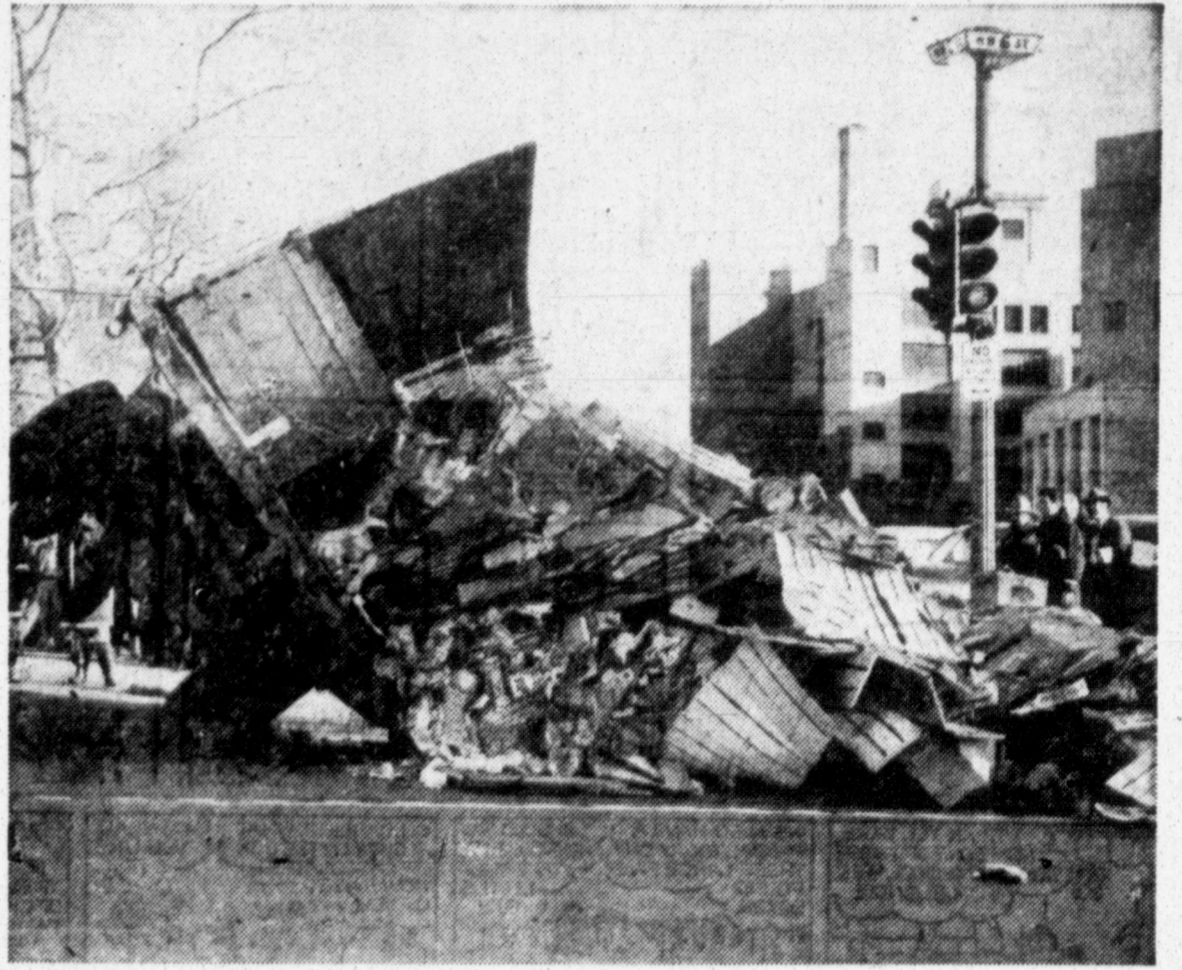

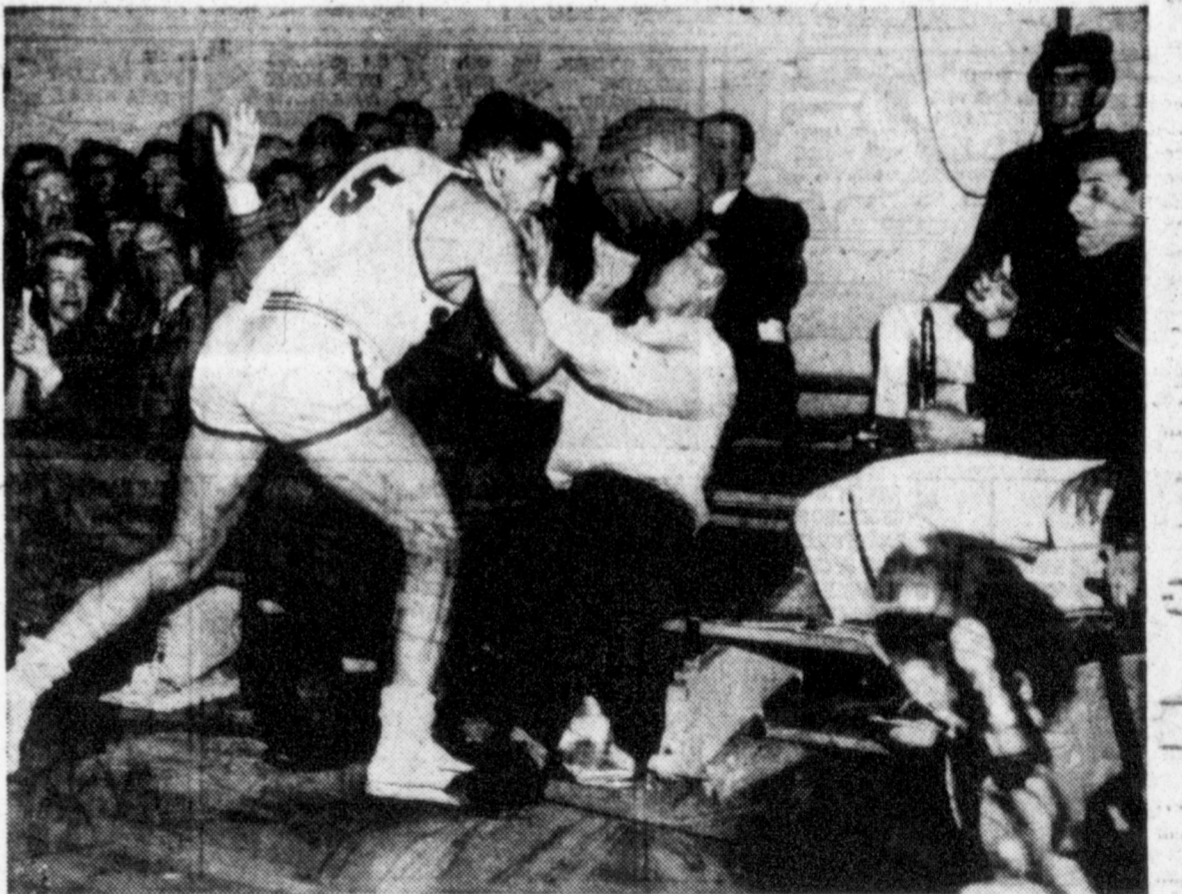

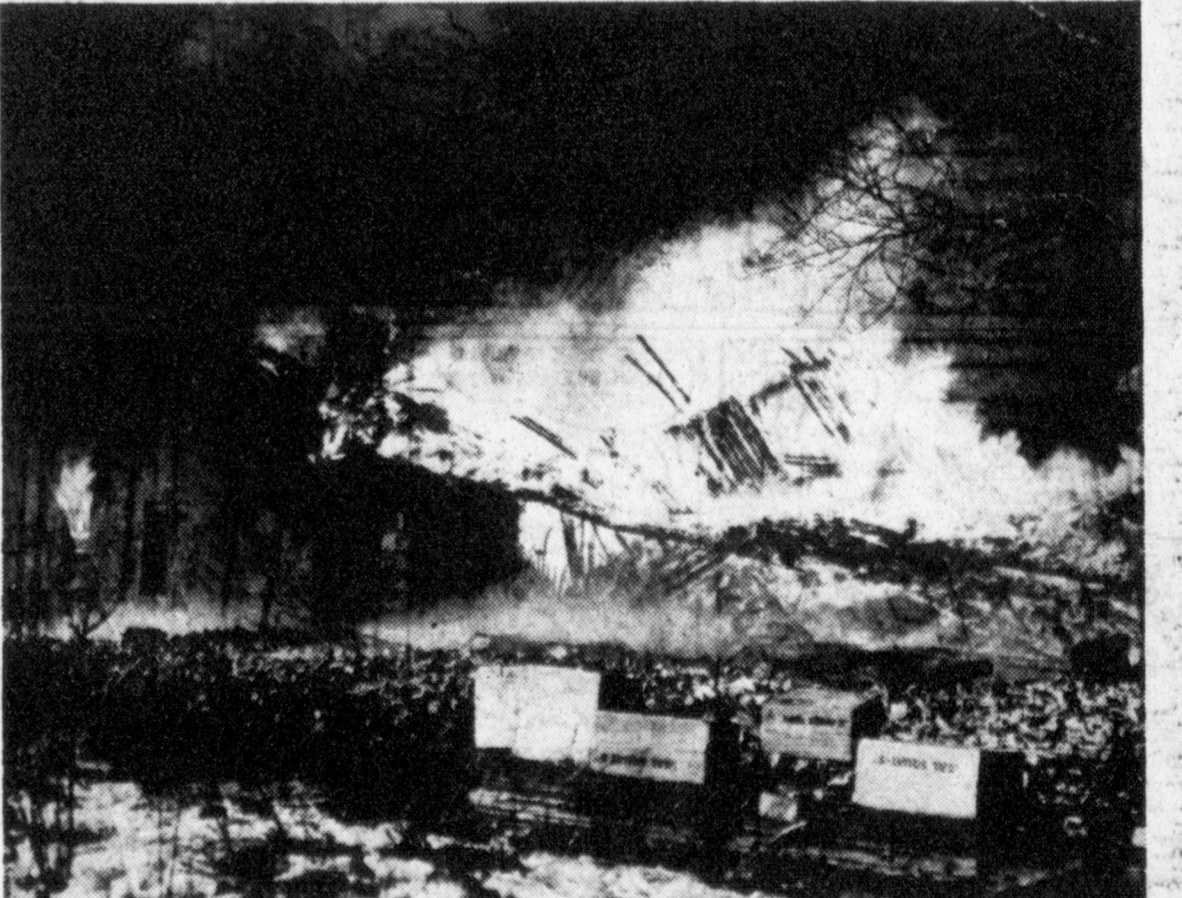

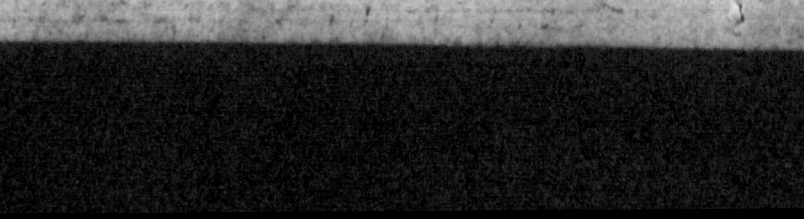
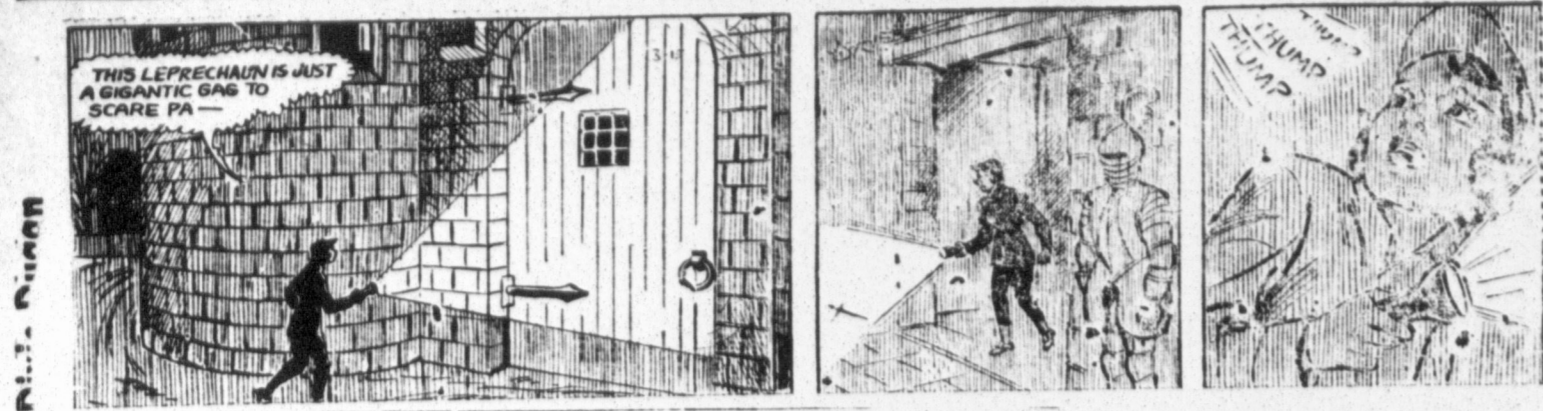
