Just Like Gold Rush Days, Fortune Hunters Flood Sierras In Uranium Search

BAKERSFIELD Calif. UP-A thousand fortune hunters fanned out over the High Sierras Wednesday in a frenzied search for uranium reminiscent of the gold fever of a century ago.

The rush was touched off Tuesday when the Atomic Energy Commission released its first uranium map of a Far West area.

in the mountains about 30 miles east of Bakersfield.

Late Tuesday, the Kern county recorder's office reported that 130 uranium claims already had been filed - Hundreds more were expected to be filed Wednesday.

The uranium searchers ranged from grizzled miners who have

spent a lifetime prospecting for metals to greenhorns who asked "how do you tell a rattlesnake?"

A crowd of 1,000 jammed the streets around the AEC office to see the map, which went on public view at 11 a.m., Tuesday, Hundreds of men had spent the night before the office in the hope of

being the first in the tiny room where the map was on display. As soon as the map was avail-

able for inspection, the prospectors copied the symbols on maps of their own. Some took flash pictures of it. As soon as each man was finished, he pushed his way out of the room

Once in the street outside, those who had seen the map rushed for mountains.

An exception was Robert Doherty, 38, of Hanford, Calif. Once he made his map, he strolled out of the room to a telephone booth. There he called his partners 11 men waiting at scattered points in the Sierras, each with a Jeep and

The uranium hunters complained the AEC map was "very small." A Bakersfield blueprint firm took advantage of the fact that there was only one copy available and sold 400 reproductions at \$1 each within three hours after the unveiling.

The Facts

A reader has taken exception to our editorial policy with respect to government schools.

We will attempt to provide her with some "straightforward" answers to her questions, as she requests. First, we would like to say again how much we ap-

preciate hearing from persons who are honest and sincere in their own point of view even if it doesn't coincide

When a bad law appears on the books, the fact that it is only loxly enforced does not remove the evil. Law and justice are very nearly synonymous terms insofar as popular connotation is concerned. If a law is wrong morally, it is bad. If it is not enforced, it helps to breed disrespect for law and consequently justice. If it cannot be enforced, then it is that much worse. But the evil begins when a bad law is put on the books.

Laws regarding financial support of government schools as well as attendance at government schools

It is no more right or moral to compel people to pay for a school in which they don't believe, or in which they have no children, than it is right to compel people to pay for a church in which they don't believe, or in which they have no interest. Education is just as much a personal matter of choice as religion. If you think that compulsory taxation for government schools is moral, then why would not compulsory taxation for a government supported Council of Churches be just as moral?

We do not berate government in any form. We berate artificial and coercive government in any form.

The history of the world has established that some governments become tyrannies. The history of the world has established that all governments have a tendency to grow in size and power. Tyranny occurs when a government becomes large and powerful. We oppose excessive government whether at home or abroad because in it are the coercive and oppressive characteristics which create tyranny.

The reader asks for a straight-forward answer to this question: "What would happen to a country as large and rich as our own without government?"

We don't know. Further, we do not think she knows. She could guess and so could we, but neither of us

This much we do know, however. This country would not be as large nor as rich as it presently is, if at the beginning it had a government as large and powerful as it now has. The largeness and richness of this country occurred because we had a small, clearly defined, carefully controlled and limited government. Thus the American people (NOT their government) established the greatest nation on earth.

The reader's final question gives us opportunities for rhapsody. She wants to know if there is anything in the country or the form of government that we like and enjoy. There are hundreds of things! In fact there are very few things in the country we don't like and enjoy. As for our government, we have few illusions regarding it. The things we like about it are these: The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution with its Bill of Rights. Although we, the people, have lost much in the way of freedom, we still do retain, despite the government, a land rich in opportunity and human freedom.

Our country is rich in its heritage. It was the first land dedicated to the concept that government is inherently evil, and that people are inherently good. We believe in that heritage. We believe in preserving the American Revolution which endeavored, not to overthrow a tyrant, but rather to prove that men are free.

SUDGE HARLAN BEFORE THE SENATE (Chicago Daily Tribune)

Judge John Marshall Harian has been testifying before the scnate judiciary committee which is considering his qualifications for membership in the Supreme court.

Judge Harlan in substance, asked the senate to take him on trust. The nominee did not deny that he had been a member since 1952 of the advisory council of the Atlantic Union committee. Yet when the objectives of this organiza-. tion were read to him, he professed astonishment that he had been supporting a movement to drive the United States into a political union with a number of European and other foreign countries, with a common citizenship, common foreign policy and defense establishment, unified currency, economic integration, and unrestricted im-

Judge Harlan said if that was a correct statement of the objectives of Atlantic Union, "I disassociate myself." We should say that this awakening comes rather late in the day.

We find it difficult to believe that an experienced lawyer, a sitting judge of the United States Court of Appeals in New York, and a worldly man could be as naive as Juige Harlan seeks to make himself out. He could not have been around for four years, with the newspapers available, let alone being a member of Atlantic Unfon's advisory council, without knowing at least generally that it is committed to the liquidation of American sovereignty.

A lot of Communists and members of communist fronts have testified that they were so simple minded that they never knew that they were being used for a revolonary purpose. It is difficult to eredit their testimony as to commupist fromte: It is difficult to credit Judge Harian's as to One World

in the Citizens' Association for the United Nations, but again said he had no idea of its program or aims and would drop his membership. "I am not," he said despite these connections, "an internationalist,

a One Worlder, nor a Union Now-

Again, Judge Harlan said he felt that a Supreme court judge, when he takes the oath, must resign from all such organizations as those he was questioned about. But the fact is that the candidate already is a judge of a very important federal court, and not until now has he felt it incumbent on himself to put aside connections with internationalist organizations. If a Supreme court justice should not be encumbered with such prejudicial baggage, why doesn't the rule hold equally for a judge of the Court of Appeals?

Judge Harlan was noncommittal when the claims of treaty law as against the supremacy under the Constitution of internal law were brought up in questioning. He would not declare himself, altho the seat for which he has been nominated may prove decisive in tilting the court toward the extinction of American sovereignty and constitutional liberty.

It is no pleasure to take note of these matters, Judge Harlan is a distinguished lawyer and in his brief career on the Court of Appeals, has shown judicial capacity of a high order, Nevertheless, the testimony before the committee raises the gravest question of his fitness for the Supreme court. It would be a great mistake to forget that, in the steel seizure case three Supreme court judges took the position that obligations as mimed under the U.N. treaty authorized the federal government to seize property in violation of the Constitution. The margin of safety on the court is already narrow. Surely among thousands of learned and judicially minded lawyers in this country, at least one can be found who can pass the most rigorous of senate examinations without saleing any doubts of his fitness.

"No apologist for the UN has uttered more fatuous nonsense about it than Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., chief American UN delegate. Lodge recently told the U.S. News & World Report that World War Three had been prevented by 'United Nations action in the following incidents: the presence of Russian troops in Iran, the communist encroachment on Greece. the independence of Israel, the independence of Indonesia, the struggle between Pakistan and India over Kashmir, and the aggression in Korea.'

"According to Lodge's argument, the absence of world war for nine years after the UN was established must be attributed to the UN. Students of elementary logic know this as the post hoc, ergo propter hoc fallacy. It would be just as logical to argue that the League of Nations prevented a world war because none occurred for twenty years after it was founded. World wars don't come every nine years. The nations need a little more time to recover from the last one and get ready for the next.



"4. Korea, Tise United States was involved in the Korean war and prevented from winning it by the UN. In 1947. General Albert C. Reuther's political chances would be enhanced, if he could persuade or force General Motors and the Ford Company to grant a guaranteed wage to his union in forthcoming negotiations. Here again Meany is reported to be skeptical toward this revolutionary proposal. Meany leans toward the conservative side.

For one thing, his skilled craft workers do not need so much protection against unemployment and loss of income as do the members of the seasonal mass industries unionized by the CIO. Second ly, it is known that Meany will not welcome a prolonged automobile strike - which would damage the national defense effort and the general economy - in the first year of the new organization's existence.

Reuther, however, entered the merger movement with full recognition of Meany's distaste for the guaranteed annual wage. Indeed the suspicion exists, in labor circles that the Detroit unionist will cite Meany's attitude as an alibi for possible failure to obtain an assured yearly income for his



It's Your Country By John Beck

At long last one of the glants on the American publishing scene has taken cognizance of the fact that plans are under way to amend the United Nations Charter. The Saturday Evening Post of Feb. 26. 1955, contains an article enfilled "Judgment Day for the U.N." by Demaree Bess, "an expert's appraisal of what may really hap-

The author's appraisal may prove to be correct; only time can tell. But what seems obvious at present is an attempt to allay current and wiedespread fears that we may become enmeshed in world government through UN Charter amendment. The careful reader of "Judgment Day for the U. N." may also discover more real signifcance in its omissions than in its The article begins with an ac-

count of a small group in Red Wing, Minnesota, who began 'more than two years ago" to study the UN with an eye to correcting some of its defects, later learning that a great' many other people were doing the same thing. From this the uninformed reader may gain the impression that not much thought had been given the matter prior to a couple of years ago. Ford Grant Actually, according to a 'vice

president of the United World Federalists, Grenville Clark - and he should know!-plans for remedying the "weaknesses" of the UN began with a conference in October. 1945, the very month and year when the charter came into effect. A little later this Conference Committee commissioned Clark to prepare a set of proposed amendments to the UN Charter. In this he was aided by Louis B. 




