

# Just Like Gold Rush Days, Fortune Hunters Flood Sierras In Uranium Search

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. — UP — A thousand fortune hunters fanned out over the High Sierras Wednesday in a frenzied search for uranium reminiscent of the gold fever of a century ago.

The map showed three "hot spots" in the mountains about 30 miles east of Bakersfield.

A crowd of 1,000 jammed the streets around the AEC office to see the map, which went on public view at 11 a. m. Tuesday.

An exception was Robert Doherly, 38, of Hanford, Calif. Once he made his map, he strolled out of the room to a telephone booth.

"We're doing this systematically," he said.

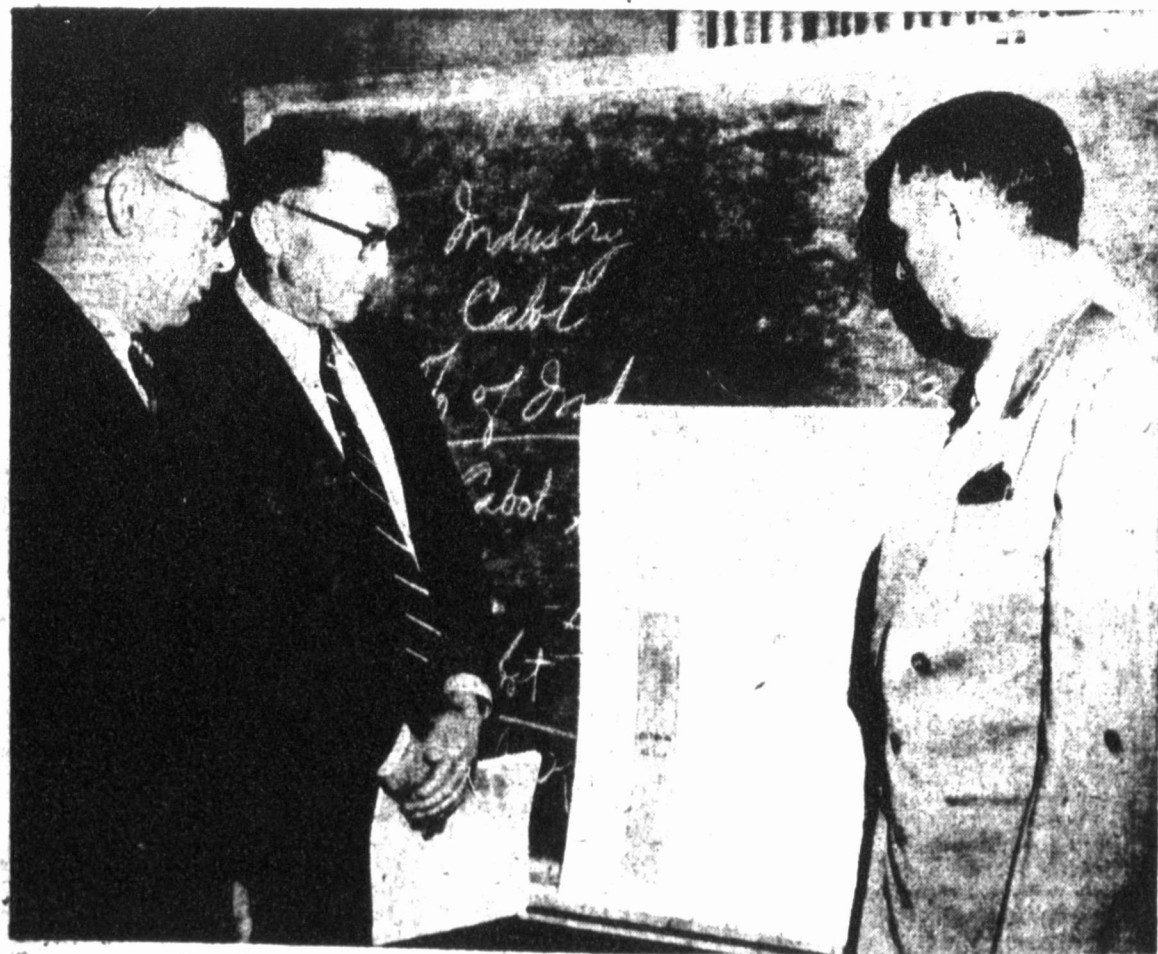

County tax office personnel today said that an estimated 3,500 passenger plates have been sold. And there were 11,600 of them available when they went on sale Feb. 1.

U.S. Dollars Helped Finance German Firm Supplying Reds

BERLIN — UP — American dollars helped finance a West Berlin company charged with selling artillery sights to the Chinese Communists during the Korean war. U.S. authorities disclosed Wednesday. A State Department spokesman identified the firm as the Akania Works, manufacturers of optical instruments, and said it sold the sights that directed Chinese artillery fire on American soldiers. Harald Quilitzsch, former general manager of Akania, and two assistants, were on trial before a West Berlin court Wednesday accused of selling \$457,000 worth of instruments to the Peiping government during the war.

Lefors School To Be Ready In 60 Days

LEFORS — The new Lefors public school building was scheduled to be completed today, but it will be another 60 days before the finishing touches are put on it. Lefors Schools Sup. Archie Roberts reported that inside partition work, half the roof, the laying of the floor, painting and decorating remains to be done. Roberts does not anticipate its being used during this school year — school lets out May 27. But "we'll be ready to use it in September."

Hearing Set On Spending

AUSTIN — UP — A bill providing for expenditure of a record-breaking \$1,553,000,000 in state services during the next biennium will be heard by the Senate Finance committee at 2 p. m. Thursday. The bill was recommended favorably by the Senate Finance subcommittee on Monday. A public hearing on 60 hours notice was required when two members of the Senate, Sens. O. E. Latimer of San Antonio and E. E. Bracwell of Houston, "tagged" the bill.

67 Dog Tags Issued Here

Sixty-seven Pampan's today had jumped the gun and purchased their 1955 Pampa dog licenses. Other masters of Pampa's dog-dogdom still have 1 1/2 months before the deadline for the new dog tags comes up. The deadline is May 1. As a general rule, only an estimated one-third of Pampan's pocket are licensed each year. It has been estimated by city tax office personnel that the Pampa dog population is 2,000.

And April 5 will be the date for the public bidding on the \$200,000 water improvement bond issue passed by Pampa voters. And, finally, the commission will open bids April 13 on a "considerable" amount of water and sewer pipe. To top it off, all four commissioners — though not the mayor — will have another problem on the list of bids dates. For April 5 is city election day and the commission's agenda is all standing for election.

### Probe Group Spends Month On Land Deals

AUSTIN.—UP—A special House committee that has spent more than a month investigating the \$100 million veterans' land program was expected to present its preliminary report to the lower chamber Wednesday.

The House group has worked independently of a Senate investigating committee also studying veterans' land deals. The program, its administration and alleged windfall profits by land dealers have been the subject of numerous grand jury indictments and court suits filed by the attorney general's office.

House Speaker Jim Lindsay said Monday he was certain the findings of the House and Senate investigating committees "will enable this session of the Legislature to enact needed corrective laws which will strengthen the veterans' land program and assure Texas that the program is conducted for the benefit of the veterans of Texas."

Yancy Measure Approved The measure to relocate county funds, by Rep. James W. Yancy of Houston, won easy approval, 117-4. Yancy said his measure permitted counties to move money from one to another of its four constitutional funds—general, road and bridge, permanent improvements and jury funds.

The jury trial waiver in lunacy cases, a measure sponsored by Rep. Ben Atwell of Hutchins, was approved 124-23. Atwell said the plan would "hasten mental cure of patients" in state hospitals.

### Four Suits Seek Funds In Land Deals

AUSTIN.—UP—Four additional suits, seeking recovery of \$224,829 paid by the state under the veterans' land program brought to 17 Wednesday the number placed before the courts thus far by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

The suits against the Guyters involves sale of 11 tracts of Zavala county land to the state and seeks recovery of \$74,000.

The Rays' suit concerns sale of five tracts in Zavala county and seeks recovery of \$31,977.

The trial opened Tuesday after Judge W. Lee Johnson overruled a motion by defense attorney Elmore A. Page that it be halted because "any strain or unusual excitement is liable to cause this defendant to suffer a further heart attack."

AUSTIN.—UP—The Senate, by overwhelming endorsement, Tuesday approved a proposed constitutional amendment aimed at attracting more tourist dollars to Texas.

The measure, sponsored by Sen. Carlos Ashley of Llano, would repeal a constitutional prohibition against the state spending any money for advertising.

The law was written into the books immediately after the civil war when Texans took a dim view of spending money to attract carpetbaggers to the Lone Star State.

**2 Actors Named In Jelke Trial**

NEW YORK —UP—Defense counsel brought the names of actors John Carridine and Mickey Rooney into the Jelke vice trial Tuesday, charging that both had entertained pretty Pat Ward, 21, a cafe-society call girl.  
Chief defense attorney George Washington Herz, in his opening statement to the jury, said Rooney once entertained Miss Ward alone in a Manhattan hotel suite and once promised to take her to California with him.  
Herz said Miss Ward lived the life of a prostitute and consorted with a procurer "long, long before" she met also heir Minot F. (Mickey) Jelke, is on trial on two charges of compulsory prostitution involving Miss Ward and Marguerite Cordova, a former night club hack girl.  
No Desire to Work  
"We will show how Pat Ward worked uptown to the theatrical district because she thought she could pick up an easy buck," Herz said. He said that on Broadway she met and dated sad-faced actor Carridine and Rooney.  
"She had no desire to work and thought she had a sucker in Rooney," Herz said. "Rooney promised to take her to California and so she quit her job. But Rooney went to California alone."  
Herz said Miss Ward was determined to find herself a "soft berth" and "worked her way across town to the east side and the United Nations."  
A Playboy Group  
At a cocktail party given by a UN delegate, to which she "wormed" an invitation, she met Jelke's late brother John, Herz said.  
The defense attorney said John Jelke invited her to a cocktail party at Seabright, N. J., sponsored by the Bachelor's Club of America which Herz described as "a group of wealthy playboys having fun."  
Herz said Miss Ward went there alone and saw Mickey Jelke at the party. Later, Herz said, "when she realized she couldn't move in with Johnny Jelke she deliberately planned to meet Mickey."  
Miss Ward Arrives Early  
Herz spoke shortly after assistant District Attorney Anthony J. Liebler said the state would show that Jelke lived off the earnings of Miss Ward.  
Liebler, in a 20-minute opening statement to the jury, outlined the case which the state expects to prove against Jelke; heir to a \$5 million oil fortune who is on trial on two counts of compulsory prostitution.

**Tighter Oil Import Quotas Urged By Oklahoma Governor**

WASHINGTON —UP— Gov. Raymond Gary of Oklahoma Tuesday urged tighter import quotas on foreign oil because "cheap foreign oil produced by cheap foreign labor threatens the entire domestic industry."  
He told the Senate Finance committee that oil imports are badly hurting small independent producers and adding to unemployment in Oklahoma and other states.  
Gary and Sen. Price Daniel (D-Tex.) headed a parade of witnesses urging the committee to write into the reciprocal trade extension act a provision to limit foreign oil imports to 10 per cent of domestic consumption.  
The committee is considering a three-year extension of the reciprocal trade act.  
Daniel told the committee that "it is the independent oil men who are being hurt" and they are the backbone of the oil industry. The Texas senator said the big oil companies oppose the quota limitation because they own 90 per cent of

**Gene Hersholt Vacates Radio Role For Paramount Film Spot**

**HOLLYWOOD —UP—** Gene Hersholt has celebrated his 50th anniversary as an actor by leaving his famed Dr. Christian role for the first time in 18 years to return to movies.  
The bespectacled veteran recently donned grease paint to portray Viveca Lindfors' father in a Paramount production for Paramount, "Run for Cover."  
From 1938 until this year, Hersholt appeared in no other role but Dr. Christian. He starred in more than 800 radio programs about the character and made six Dr. Christian pictures at RKO until 1942. "In 'It's a Great Country,' and Harding and I co-starred in a sequence but MGM did not use it at all," Hersholt smiled. "I guess there wasn't enough of a message in it."  
"But now that I have time to work in pictures again I've had many offers and I plan to accept more film roles."  
Hersholt has not given up the Dr. Christian character, however. The series retired from radio after 17 years a year ago. But he still owns one-third of the rights to the character and plans to transfer the story to television next fall.  
The fact that nearly every TV program is involved with scandals and white uniforms these days does not ruffle the original doctor of show business.  
"I do not think 'Medie' hurt Dr. Christian on TV," he reflected as he puffed quietly on his pipe in the trophy-filled library of his Beverly Hills home.  
"Dr. Christian stories were built on the humanitarian angle. At times they even bordered on corn, but good corn."

**Fire Razes Beaumont Furniture Co.**

**BEAUMONT —UP—** Fire swept through the five-story Finger Furniture Co. building early Tuesday, gutting several floors and collapsing part of a wall which crashed through the roof of the adjacent Brook Mays Plank Co.  
The fire, of undetermined origin, broke out about 1:30 a.m. and the flames were quickly fanned by high winds which swept the Orange-Beaumont-Port Arthur area during the night. The fire finally was under control at 3 a.m.  
Fire Chief E. D. O'Connor said damage was "considerably more" than the estimated \$500,000 damage caused by a fire at the furniture company on Feb. 9, 1932. Store officials were not immediately available for comment.  
Fire apparatus from Orange, 20 miles away, and Port Arthur, 16 miles to the south of Beaumont, was called to help fight the blaze after all local fire equipment was pressed into service.  
At the height of the fire, part of a sidewalk of the furniture building collapsed and crashed through the roof of the one-story piano firm next door. Firemen said "at least a half-dozen pianos were crushed."

### Court Hears Of Murder Of 4 Persons

DENVER — UP — Mrs. Rose Macri Archina, a 20-year-old American raised in Italy, told a jury Monday that her husband shot her mother in the mouth as the old woman prayed for pity on her knees.  
Mrs. Archina's mother and father and a sister and brother were slain with shotgun blasts in their northwest Denver home on the Sunday afternoon of Jan. 24, 1954. Jan. 24, 1954.  
Frank Archina, 22, an Italian immigrant who married Rose in a civil ceremony before he brought her back to this country in August, 1952, is on trial for the murder of his mother-in-law.  
The state has demanded the death penalty, and has indicated that he could be successively tried for the other three murders.  
Interpreter Necessary  
Mrs. Archina left her native state of California as a baby and speaks little English. She testified in heavy mourning garb, through an interpreter.  
She was led slowly through the story of the horror-filled Sunday afternoon by District Attorney Bert Keating and interpreter Sarsina Nigro, an Italian consulate official.  
She said that her husband became enraged at her father's taunts after dinner, and threw her mother and father to the floor.  
Her father herded Rose, another daughter, his wife and a son into a bedroom and got a gun, she said.  
"Me, my sister and my mother went inside the closet," Mrs. Archina said, and then she heard two shotgun blasts.  
Her husband tore open the door to the closet, she said, and confronted the covering women with a double-barreled shotgun.  
"He loaded it. He fired it against my mother. She was asking for pity and grace for him not to shoot, kneeling," Mrs. Archina said.  
Archina reloaded the shotgun and fired a volley into her sister's stomach, Mrs. Archina said, and then turned the weapon against her own neck.  
He pulled the trigger but it jammed, Mrs. Archina recounted, so he fled through a bedroom window and she ran to a neighbor's home.  
Last week a police officer testified that when he entered the Macri home, he found the elder Macri dead, a son and daughter dying, and Mrs. Macri almost decapitated in the closet.

### Scelba May Be Ousted Before He Returns From Visiting U.S.

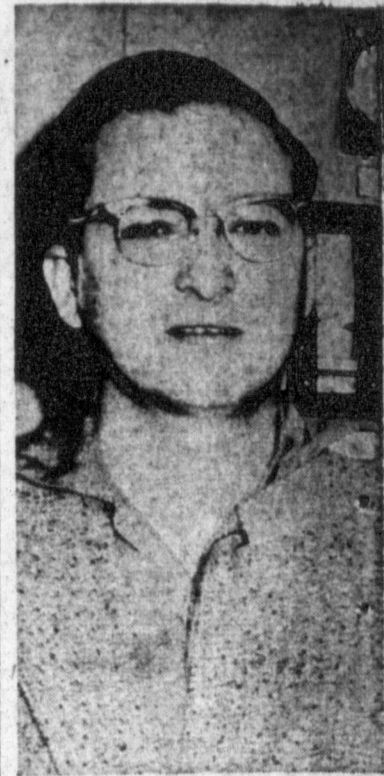

Premier Mario Scelba of Italy, who is coming to the United States next week on an official visit, may become former Premier Scelba soon after his return home.  
Scelba has made an excellent record during his 13 months in office.  
He has reached a settlement with Yugoslavia of the long, bitter Trieste dispute. He has succeeded in getting both houses of the Italian Parliament to approve ratification of the treaties providing for West German armament.  
During Scelba's prime ministry the Communists, who rightly regard him as their enemy No. 1, have lost steadily in party membership and labor influence.  
Coalition Falling Apart  
But the coalition which has enabled Scelba's Christian Democratic party to remain in office shows signs of coming to pieces.  
Further, Scelba has an ambitious rival for leadership in his own party in the person of Amintore Fanfani, who represents the younger element with his "Democratic initiative" faction.  
The two houses of Parliament are to elect a president of Italy in May, to succeed Luigi Einaudi.  
The Scelba government must resign then, as a formality, and it is being predicted that Fanfani may be able to grab the post of premier.  
Fanfani is secretary general of the Christian Democratic Party, and thus in control of the party machinery. He succeeded to that post after the death last August of former Premier Alcide de Gasperi.  
Scelba, 53 years old, is short, plump, bald and deceptively smiling. But he is a tough man. When other anti-Fascist leaders went abroad during the Mussolini era Scelba remained at home.  
His law office became a national anti-Fascist headquarters and a secret liaison center for communication with men in exile.  
Scelba Interior Minister  
Under de Gasperi's prime ministry, Scelba became minister of interior. Communism then was a real threat. Scelba, with control of the national police forces, at once opened a relentless anti-Red campaign. He organized the police flying squads, called "Celere," which charged into Communist demonstrations all over the country in jeeps and broke them up with enthusiastic force.  
But as premier, he has a shaky rule. The Christian Democrats have a majority in the Chamber of Deputies only by reason of the support of the Liberals, Social Democrats and Republicans. The Liberals, who have 14 seats, have been threatening to leave the coalition. If they did, Scelba would lose his majority.  
Fanfani, who is 47 years old, was premier for 11 days in January, 1954 but the Chamber refused to confirm him because he sought support from the Monarchists.

### Ambassador In Laredo On Pan-Am

LAREDO, Tex. — UP — Robert C. Hill, American ambassador to El Salvador, arrived at Laredo after driving 1,889 miles from the Central American republic to the United States and said the "absolutely fantastic, unbelievable scenery compensates for the long, hard trip."  
Hill, his wife and two sons made the automobile trip from El Salvador to the border to encourage use of the Pan American highway.  
Much of the automobile trip was at high altitude, Hill reported here, and "like driving atop the world."  
His convertible automobile's speedometer clocked 1,889 miles. The Hill family loaded the car onto a flat car for the 164-mile trip from Tapachula, Mex., to Arriaga, Mex.  
The Mexican version of the Pan American highway ends at the little border town of El Ocotal, but Guatemala has extended its section through to Tapachula, about 100 trackless miles south.  
Hill arrived at the pontoon bridge connecting Laredo and Nuevo Laredo, Mex., at 8:45 p.m. Monday night. He and his family stayed overnight in Laredo and were to continue Tuesday to first Dallas, then Fort Worth and, eventually, to Washington.  
Hill said he was delayed most along the route from Guatemala City to Tapachula because the highway was only an oxcart trail in some areas of Guatemala.  
The Hill family will return to San Salvador by plane April 8. He will report at Washington on his trip to Vice President Richard Nixon, who has expressed interest in completion of the Pan American highway from the U.S. border through Central America, and to Henry Holland, assistant secretary of state for Latin-American affairs.

### Baptists Sets Expansion Of Radio, TV

NEW YORK — UP — A five-point program of expansion of radio and television activities by the Southern Baptist churches was announced here Tuesday. It included the building of a studio headquarters at Fort Worth, Tex., and the production of a series of colored TV programs.  
The Rev. Paul M. Stevens, director of the Southern Baptist Convention's radio and television commission, announced the program at a press conference at which he dissented in part from recent criticism of religious broadcasts.  
"I don't believe any instrument placed in the hands of the church since the printing of the Bible will be or can be as effective as television," Stevens said. "It is the most powerful form of mass communication that the world has ever known. The churches had better take advantage of it and not throw up their hands in horrified amazement."  
Stevens said he agreed "about 90 per cent" with strong criticism of specific Protestant religious broadcasts and telecasts made two weeks ago by Dean Liston Pope of Yale divinity school. The Southern Baptist leader said he believed Pope was expressing "the frustration of all of us" at the shallow theology expressed by many of the programs. He said, however, that it was a natural outgrowth of the shallowness of the "slap on the back and shot in the arm" theology which has been preached in the last 25 to 30 years.  
He said he "rather resented" Pope's criticism of the Lutheran church television program "This is the Life," which Stevens described as a program praiseworthy especially for its pioneering effort. He said he thought the Lutherans were as aware as anyone of its shortcomings but "they must be given credit for the desire and willingness and getting up the money to do the job."

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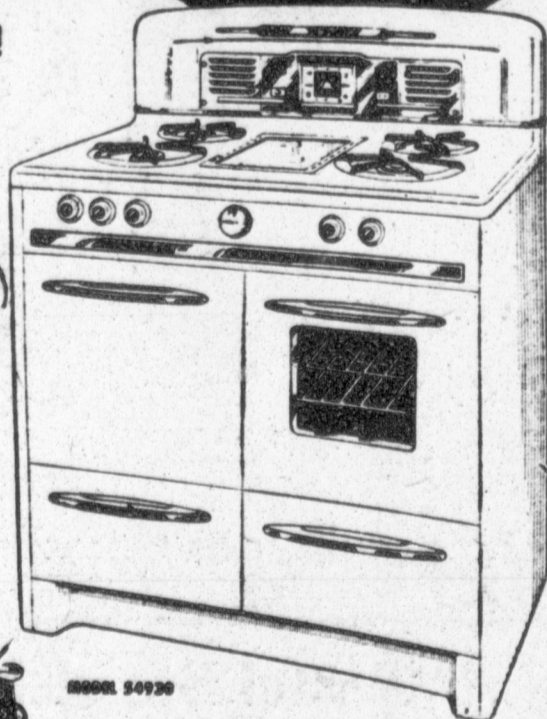
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# Alice At Home And Alice On TV Are Different Girls

HOLLYWOOD—(NEA)—Many, many people, believe these me, should sit right down and read this here story about George Gobel.

Oh, I tell you true, things are in an awful stew.

There's one Alice Gobel on television; another Alice Gobel at home; George in both places and TV fans wondering who's who, what's what, how come, and what's fact and what's fiction.

And that's not even adding to the confusion by mentioning that the TV Alice, Jeff Donnell, and her husband, movie star Aldo Ray have a date with the stork in September.

So there you are — and here I am — and here's the show (case) for unscrambling things about the comedian who just won an Emmy as television personality of the year.

The real George and Alice Gobel met at Roosevelt High School in Chicago, their home town when her name was Alice Humecki. They were married Dec. 13, 1942.

They have three children: Gregg 10; Georgia 5, and Leslie, who will be a year old March 30. They live in a three-bedroom, ranch style home with a swimming pool at Sherman Oaks, a San Fernando Valley suburb separated from Hollywood by a range of mountains. Alice's mother, Lucille, of Polish descent, lives with them and helps Alice with the children and the cooking.

Until 35-year-old George became a TV star, Alice's mother whipped up juicy roasts and thick Polish-style gravy for him back in Chicago. Now, because he's a little fellow — only 5 feet, 5 inches — he has to watch his weight and is confined to steaks and salad, Alice roasts and gravy while George drools.

On television George and Alice argue constantly. A friend who has known the real George and Alice for 10 years says:

"I've never heard them argue about anything."

At home George is the easy-going fellow who leaves the management of everything to Alice, who is a whiz at the job. She shuns the limelight and Hollywood's cocktail parties to concentrate on the role of housewife, mother and headwaiter-valet for George — who loves it.

When he leaves home for his TV show or a night club tour, Alice packs his suitcase. He doesn't even check its contents; everything he needs is there, down to an extra hankie.

Shunning the spotlight goes for George too. He much prefers the private company of old Air Force pals, his getting companions — he shoots in the 90's — and friends from his Chicago radio days.

On these occasions he reverts to the role of a singer and at the drop of a cue he unpacks his guitar. There's always a guitar in the trunk of his car.

One Gobel show on TV was about his son, Gregg. The boy was flunking at school and Alice dragged George in for a heart to heart talk with the principal. In real life, Gregg hags straight A report cards.

Another show was about Bob, George's brother-in-law, stopping by for a cup of coffee and staying six months. In real life, his brother-in-law Bob is a business associate.

But George's dialog on TV is much the same as it is at home. Those expressions sweeping the country — "I became unglued" — "Sure you do" — "So there you are" — "Well, I'll be a dirty bird" — and "You can't hardly get them no more" — are phrases he's been using for years.

Now about the TV Alice Gobel — a Hollywood movie actress with a ski nose and a boy's name, Jeff, Jeff Donnell became Mrs. Aldo

Ray just before she became "Mrs. George Gobel."

She and Aldo live at Sherman Oaks, too.

## Matusow Facing Sentence

EL PASO, Tex. — UP—Harvey Matusow, a self-styled ex-Communist and liar, was scrambling around Tuesday trying to find some way to persuade a federal judge he shouldn't be sent to prison for contempt of court.

In less than 24 hours, the former Communist will be sentenced for criminal contempt by Federal Judge R. E. Thomason, who found Matusow guilty last Saturday.

Thomason's action is the first taken against Matusow since he confessed that most of his testimony in hearings and trials involving communism was a lie. However, the federal judge said he would give Matusow an opportunity to try to convince him that he was not in contempt. The former Communist could draw a five-year prison sentence.

Matusow said it would be his first prison term.

Matusow "schemed maliciously and deliberately to obstruct justice" in the trial of Clinton Jencks, a New Mexico labor leader sentenced to five years in prison for falsely swearing he was not a Red," Thomason said. Jencks was found guilty some 14 months ago and Matusow served as the government's key witness at his trial.

A book entitled "False Witness" and authored by Matusow was scheduled to hit the bookstands for the first time Wednesday simultaneously with his sentencing. In the book, the 28-year-old Matusow admits he lied extensively.

## Meditations for LENT

At a time when men thought that sin had to do with such matters as neglecting to wash after touching a dead body, carrying a burden on the Sabbath or failure to offer the appropriate burnt offering, Jesus warned that real sins had their origin within: "out of the heart come evil thoughts, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. These are what defile a man; but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile a man" (Matthew 15: 19-29, RSV).

Here is a suggestion about the inwardness of true religion.

It is easy for us to suppose that regular attendance at church, stated contributions to good causes, and showing respect to clergymen fulfill our religious obligations. These are desirable, and doing the right things helps to induce the right moods. But participation in

formal acts of worship is unavailing if we have the wrong attitudes within. Giving thanks that God has heard his prayer, the Psalmist exclaims (Psalm 66:18, RSV):

"If I had cherished iniquity in my heart the Lord would not have listened."

Wrong thoughts are not expelled simply by bidding them "Egoe!" We have to crowd them out with good thoughts. The Christian church has always believed that the home in which Jesus grew up was conducive to his spiritual development. Concerning the wonderful events of Jesus' birth and childhood Luke says, "Mary kept all these, pondering them in her heart" (Luke 2:19, RSV). A heart filled with thoughts like that had no room for "theft, false witness, slander." It is the only way ever to get the victory over evil thoughts.

## Murdered Taxi Driver Was Poisoned

FORT WORTH — UP—William Addison Koch, a taxicab driver who was found slashed to death in the yard of his home early Saturday morning, was dying from some kind of poison when his throat was cut, an autopsy disclosed Monday night.

Koch was killed in the yard of his suburban White Settlement home after a series of threatening telephone calls, his wife Anna, told police. She said her husband had told her his life had been threatened by dope peddlers to prevent his telling of their activities.

Fifty-four-year-old Koch had been slashed with a butcher knife. His head was almost severed and his stomach was slashed.

However, Dr. John J. Andujar, the autopsy surgeon reported this was not the cause of death. He said Koch was dying from some kind of poison, probably an overdose of narcotics, when he was slashed. But, he said he could not determine the kind of poison that killed Koch because the body already had been embalmed when he performed the autopsy.

The autopsy was not performed until after police obtained testimony from some of Koch's fellow employees at Checker Cab Co. They reported he was acting "queerly."

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## The Facts

A reader has taken exception to our editorial policy with respect to government schools. We will attempt to provide her with some "straight-forward" answers to her questions, as she requests.

When a bad law appears on the books, the fact that it is only loosely enforced does not remove the evil. Law and justice are very nearly synonymous terms insofar as popular connotation is concerned. If a law is wrong morally, it is bad. If it is not enforced, it helps to breed disrespect for law and consequently justice.

Laws regarding financial support of government schools as well as attendance at government schools are coercive. It is no more right or moral to compel people to pay for a school in which they don't believe, or in which they have no children, than it is right to compel people to pay for a church in which they don't believe, or in which they have no interest.

The reader asks for a straight-forward answer to this question: "What would happen to a country as large and rich as our own without government?"

This much we do know, however. This country would not be as large nor as rich as it presently is, if at the beginning it had a government as large and powerful as it now has. The largeness and richness of this country occurred because we had a small, clearly defined, carefully controlled and limited government.

I want to quote and comment on an article under the heading of "History's Greatest Breach of Promise" by Chesly Manly, as published in the March issue of The Freeman magazine.

"Nothing less than a millennium of universal peace, prosperity and happiness was promised to a war-ravaged, sick and hungry world by the pious founders of the United Nations. Never in history had it been proposed to do so much for so many with so little regard for the possibilities."

Then the article quotes a group of men who were instrumental in bringing about the United Nations. It quotes what Franklin D. Roosevelt promised. What Secretary Hull believed the UN would do. What Churchill believed it would accomplish. What Truman contended about it. What Edward R. Stettin, Jr. predicted it would do.

"No apologist for the UN has uttered more fatuous nonsense about it than Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., chief American UN delegate. Lodge recently told the U.S. News & World Report that World War Three had been prevented by 'United Nations' action in the following incidents: the presence of Russian troops in Iran, the communist encroachment on Greece, the independence of Israel, the independence of Indonesia, the struggle between Pakistan and India over Kashmir, and the aggression in Korea."

"I. Iran. 

Clifton Daniel, NEW YORK TIMES correspondent, reported from Moscow not long ago that Soviet Finance Minister Arseny Y. Zverev stated in a speech that 5,500 sections, divisions, and boards in the central government apparatus, nearly half of the total, and 5,600 trusts, offices, and other organizations had been abolished during the past year, releasing tens of thousands of trained workers for industry and agriculture.

McDonald is a close friend and admirer of John L. Lewis, who originally organized the CIO, and who resents Reuther's succession to the position and prestige he once enjoyed. McDonald has long favored a united labor movement, figuring that Reuther would lose some stature and power in an expanded organization.

George L. Meany, who will head the merged CIO-AFL combination, shares many labor leaders' dislike of the Detroit ideologist and economic planner. But Reuther hopes that Meany will mobilize the full strength of Michigan's organized workers, if the automobile union chieftain can capture the Democratic nomination against Senator Charles E. Potter, the legless World War II veteran, in 1958.

Reuther's political chances would be enhanced, if he could persuade or force General Motors and the Ford Company to grant a guaranteed wage to his union in forthcoming negotiations. Here again Meany is reported to be skeptical toward this revolutionary proposal. Meany leans toward the conservative side.

For one thing, his skilled craft workers do not need so much protection against unemployment and loss of income as do the members of the seasonal mass industries unionized by the CIO. Secondly, it is known that Meany will not welcome a prolonged automobile strike — which would damage the national defense effort and the general economy — in the first year of the new organization's existence.

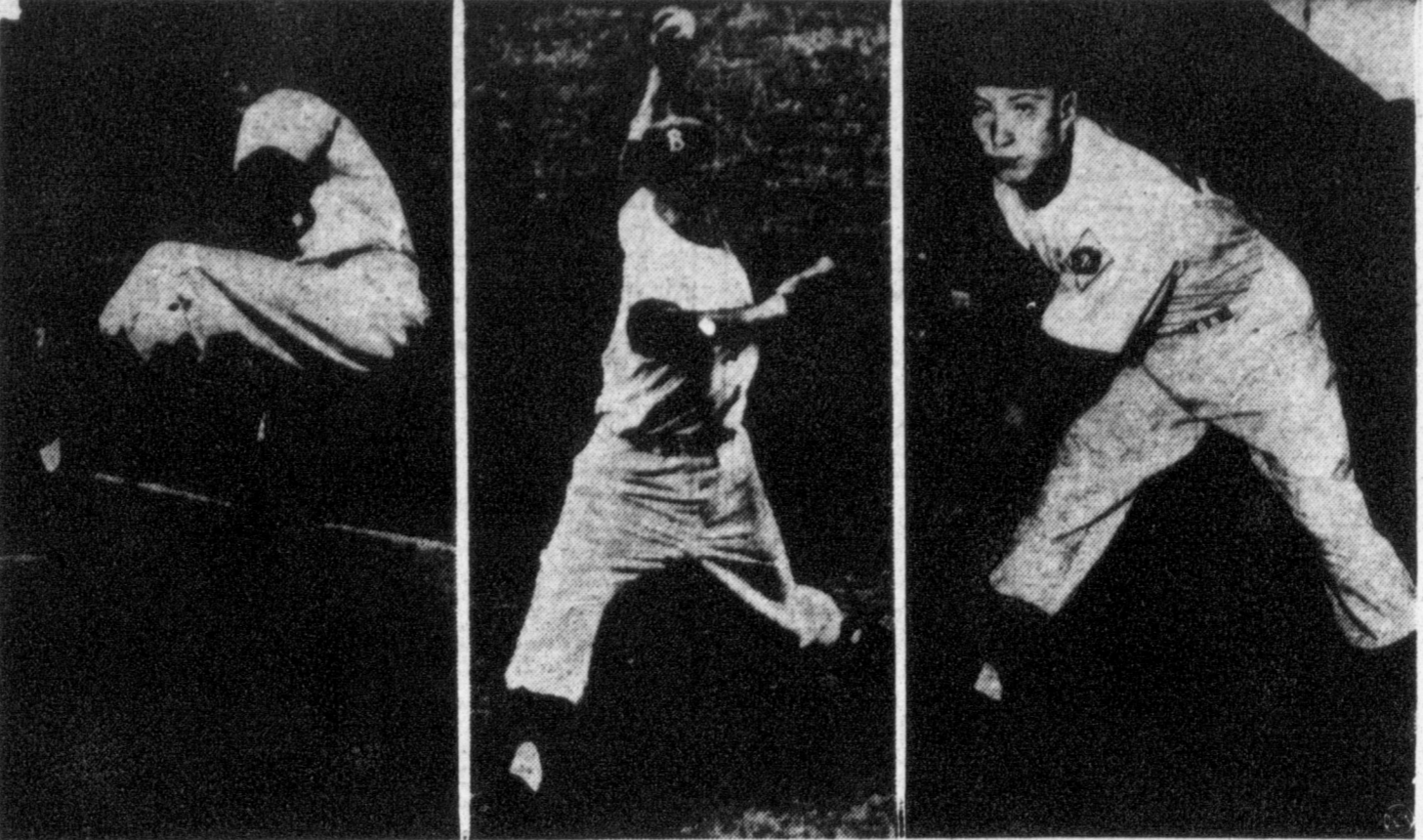

THERE HAVE BEEN SOME fabulous scoring records set by members of the Harvester basketball team the past four years.

All of the scoring marks for a Harvester cager, including single game, full season and career, have been set during the past four seasons.

All single game marks were set by the 1954-55 edition of the Harvesters while the immediate past team set also two of the four season marks.

But all four of the "career" marks remained intact. Fabulous Jimmy Bond holds all four career marks.

Gary Griffin of this year's outfit set two single game records and two season marks.

Griffin scored 37 points against Childress in December for a new "high point" record for a single game and his 17 field goals in the same game set another record.

E. Jay McIlvain of this year's team set the only other single record of 11 free throws in the first game with Amarillo, Jan. 28.

Griffin and Bond share two season records apiece.

Griffin became the only Harvester to ever score more than 600 points in a single season when he dumped in 620 points in the past season. And in going over the 600 mark, Griffin poured 248 field goals through the hoops, another season record.

Bond holds the other two season marks and all four of the career records.

Bond hit 140 from the free throw line in the 1953-54 season for a record and his 22.3 average per game in the 1952-53 campaign. Bond scored 579 points in 26 games during the '52-53 season, the first of two Harvester state champion teams.

Griffin is the only other Harvester to ever average as much as 20 points per game during a single season and Big "Zeke" hit 20 on the nose the past season when he scored 620 points in 31 games.

Well, you can see, these fellows have represented Pampa High School well the past three years on the basketball court and it's only fitting that the local cage fans turn out en masse for the banquet honoring the 1954-55 Harvester cagers.

The banquet will be unrecited next Tuesday night, March 22, 7:30 p.m., in the high school cafeteria. As usual there'll be a lot of entertainment at the cage feed. And we're fortunate to obtain Rev. 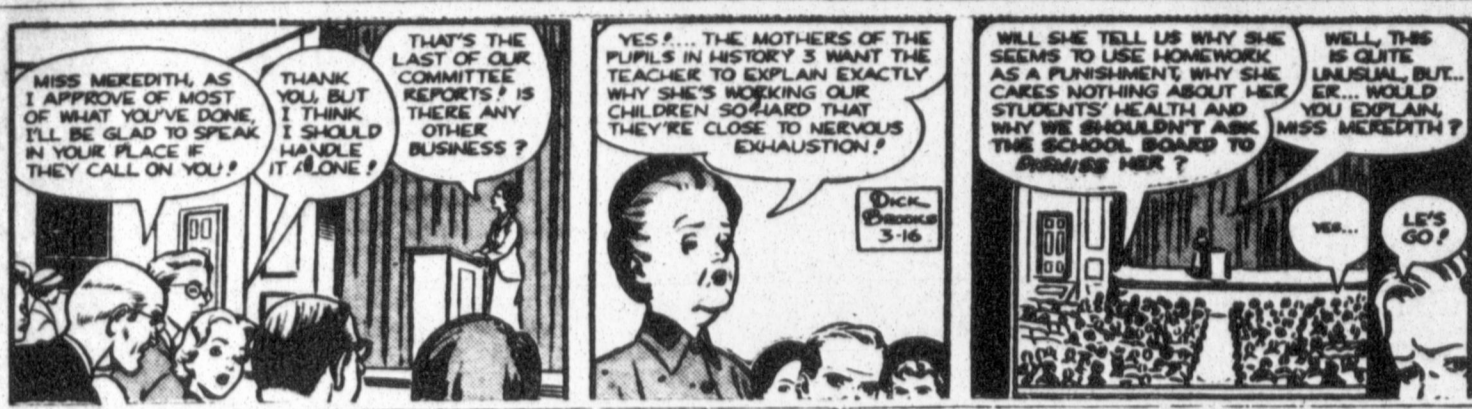

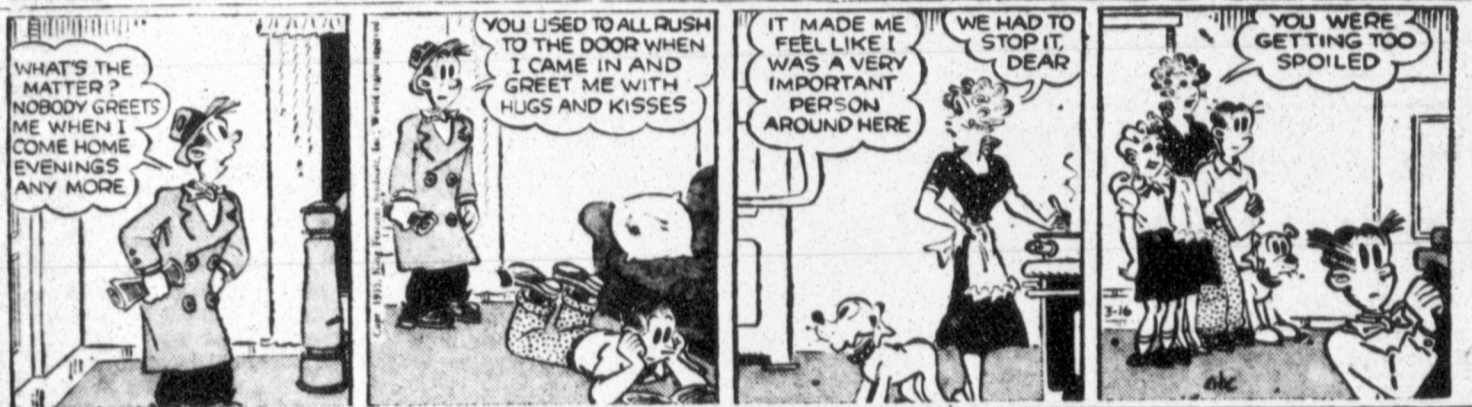
