Senate Dems May Split Up On Tax Issue

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 — UP — The House-approved income tax cut threatens to split Senate Democrats and to upset the party unity so carefully cultivated over the past two years.

The Senate Finance Committee starts to work on the tax bill Monday and almost certainly will knock out the 30-for-everybody income tax cut while approving the tax extension provisions backed by the administration.

When the bill reaches the Senate floor, the odds now indicate that the Senate itself will follow the committee and reject the personal income reduction for which House Democrats fought so hard.

Democrats Unhappy

Some Senate Democrats are unhappy over the prospect of a party split over the politically-potent tax issue.

The strategy favored by Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson calls for developing issues so the Democrats can unite and win. The tax bill threatens to put them in a spot where they will divide and lose.

All available evidence indicates that Speaker Sam Rayburn and his associates in the House consulted no one in the Senate before launching the move a week ago to provide a 30-a-year deduction for all income taxpayers and dependents.

Chairman Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.), who consistently opposes tax relief while the budget is in the red, declared his opposition before the bill reached the Senate. Other Senate Democratic leaders were non-committal.

Urges 'Practical Solution'

Sen. Walter F. George (D-Va.), who is counted as an opponent of the proposed tax cut, suggested that House and Senate Democratic leaders should get together to search for a "practical solution."

Sen. Russell B. Long (D-La.), a finance committee member, promised to fight for the House proposal. He contrasted it to last year's administration tax reform bill, which carried many benefits for corporations, and said:

"The trouble with that rich man's bill last year was that it didn't do anything for the average man. I think this country is failing to produce millions of dollars worth of goods and services that would be produced if there were additional purchasing power, which this tax bill would provide."

CHICAGO Feb. 26 — UP — A young actress was found unconscious Saturday with her three-year old daughter lying dead in her arms. A suicide note was scrawled in lipstick on a dressing table mirror.

Another note said, "bury us in the same box."

The mother, Mrs. Lola De Witt Stewart, 19, was taken to psychopathic hospital, where doctors said she was hysterical and kept crying the name, "Jerry."

Her condition prevented questioning her about the death of her child "Fancy."

An autopsy was ordered to determine what caused the youngster's death. Police said she had been dead about 36 hours.

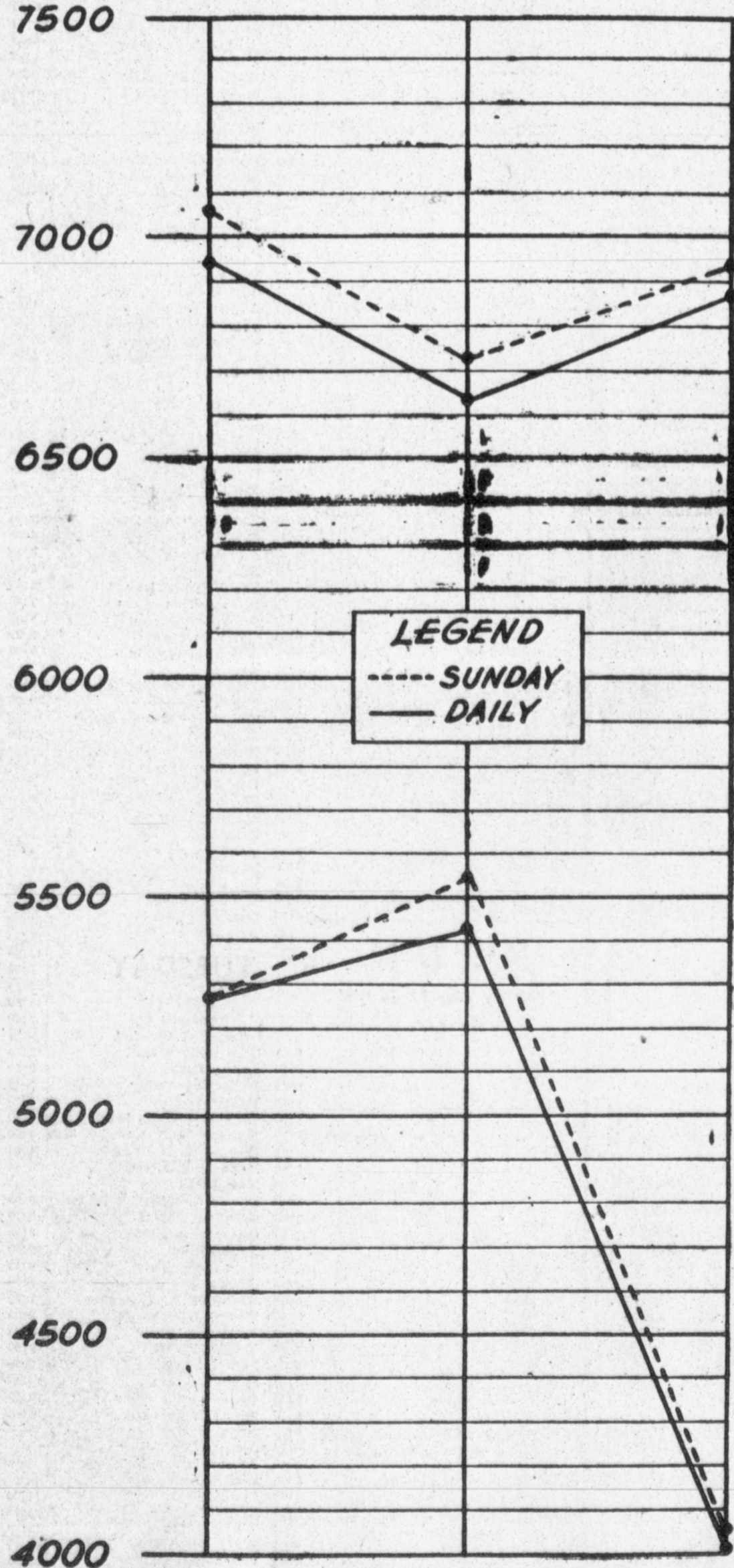

City Slates Vote Canvass

The Pampa City Commission election, City Mgr. Fred Brook Tuesday morning is expected to be pointed out Saturday. A visiting delegation from Newton, Kan., will arrive in Pampa tonight and will return either Monday night or Tuesday morning. Brook said. In the party will be four chamber of commerce men, two city commissioners, the city manager and a private citizen. They will inspect Pampa's street program.

The official name of the smallest state in the Union is "The state of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations," making it the longest appellation of any of the 48 states. For the sake of brevity it has been reduced to plain old Rhode Island, although officially the longer version is still used.

This and many other hundreds of little known facts about American History are brought to light by George Stimpson in his "A Book About American History," recently contributed to the growing library collection by Henry Gordon, Radio Station KPDN newscaster.

What Civil War General Apologized for fighting on Sunday? How Did Valley Forge Get its name? What American Statesman was imprisoned in the Tower of London? Why did Texas Choose the blue-bonnet as the state flower? Was Canada invited to join the American Union? Was George Washington a Marshal of France?

All of these are questions answered by a man known for his lively curiosity for well over half a century. He has assembled facts about the lesser known eras as well as personalities of "American History," in a book which makes for rewarding browsing, because each of the hundreds of entries are complete stories within themselves.

Though not a book for specialists in the field of American history it will whet any one's appetite to continue his investigations, once he has read the poignant "shorts" which Stimpson has put together in one 436-page volume.

Stimpson's quizzical nature has not been limited to the field of American history. His "A Book About A Thousand Things" and "A Book About the Bible" are equally stimulating in their content. Always searching for the hows, whys and wherefors of the world around us, Stimpson has imparted through his books the answers to many things which have puzzled the inquisitive mind.

In his "A Book About A Thousand Things" he draws facts from virtually every field, including, history, science, astronomy, law, literature and geography.

Stimpson says in his introduction to "A Book About American History" that his researches have covered a period of nearly 30 years in the field of American history.

He continues "Even so I feel that a writer is fully prepared and competent to write such a book only after he has finished it. 'Sir,' Johnson said to Boswell, 'a woman preaching is like a dog's walking on its hind legs. It is not done well, but you are surprised to find it done at all.' So it is with me and this book. The wonder is that I ever got it done at all."

Fortunately Stimpson did, and it makes for a delightful addition to the field of Americana.

While browsing in the field of Americana, J. Frank Dobie's "The Mustangs" might be among the other books worth perusing on the shelves of the library.

Dobie "came after the day of the mustang had passed" as he himself remarks, but few living men are more adequately qualified than this son of the Lone Star State, who frequently returns to the ranch life from which he was raised, to write about the wild, free horses of the western American plains whose ancestors were brought here by the Spaniards. A powerful and absorbing book is made from this admixture of history and anecdote, fact and legend.

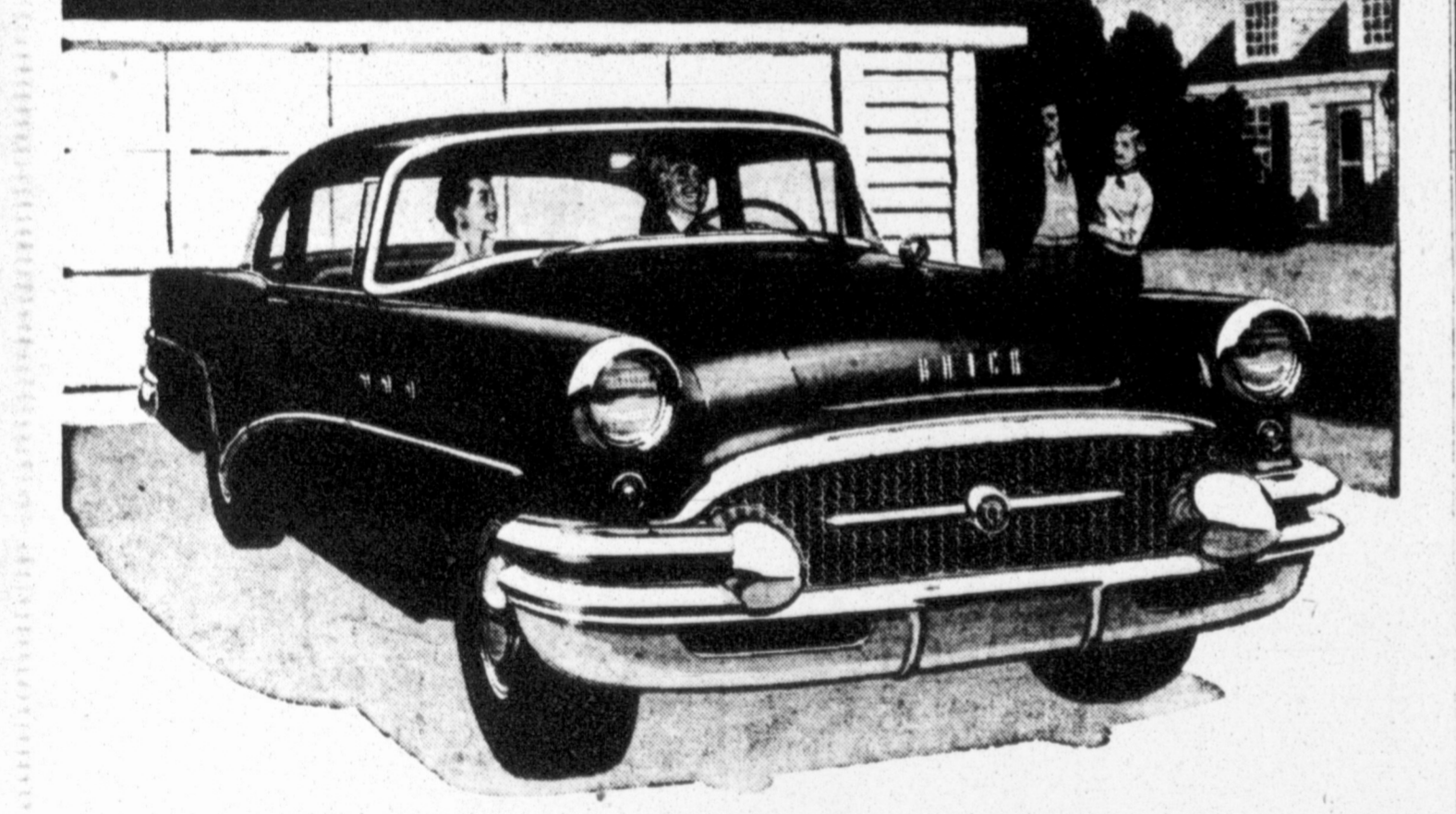
Villon To Be Talked

The fact that the hostess feels you are gracious enough to get along well with a group of her friends whether you know them well or not should please you and you should be quick to accept such an invitation.

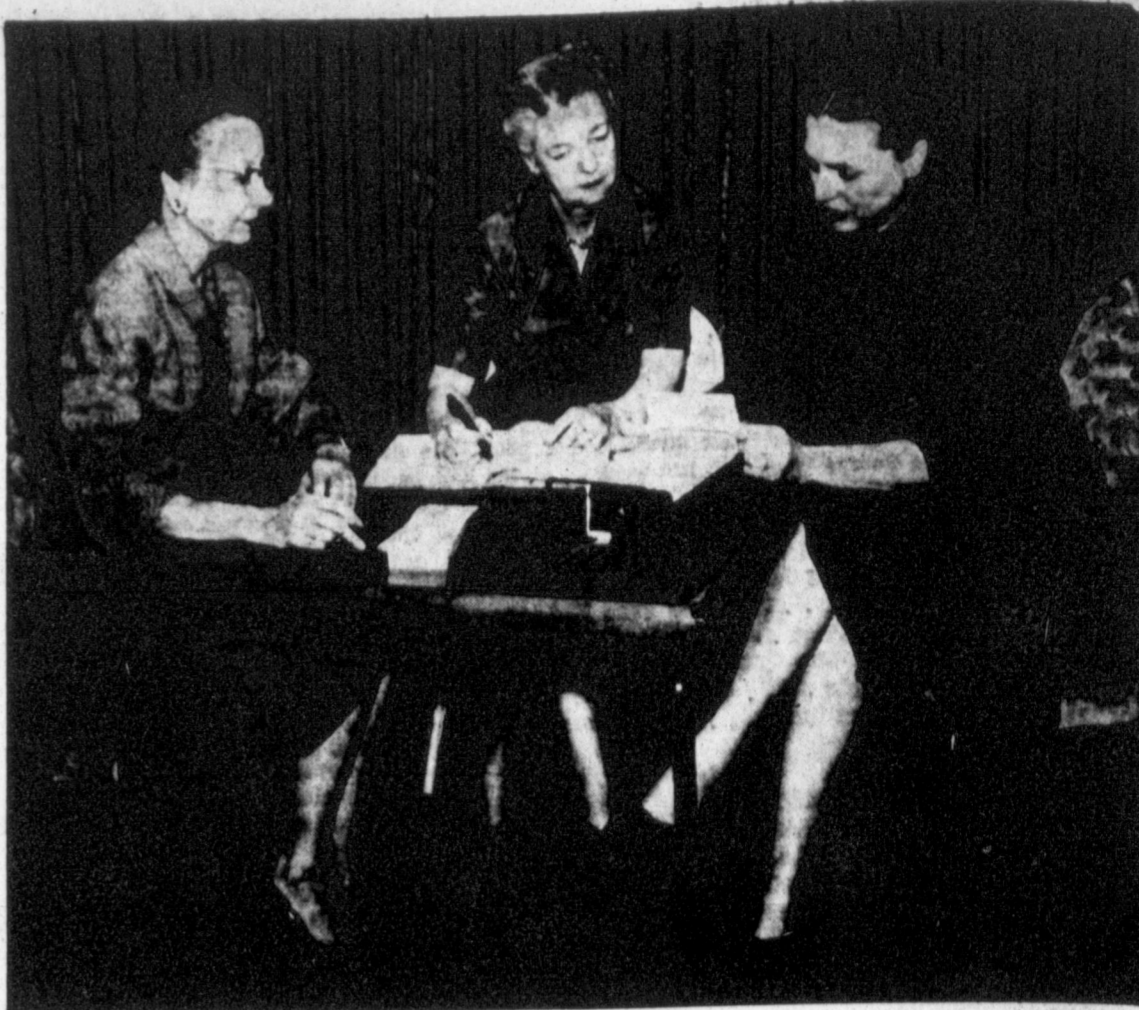

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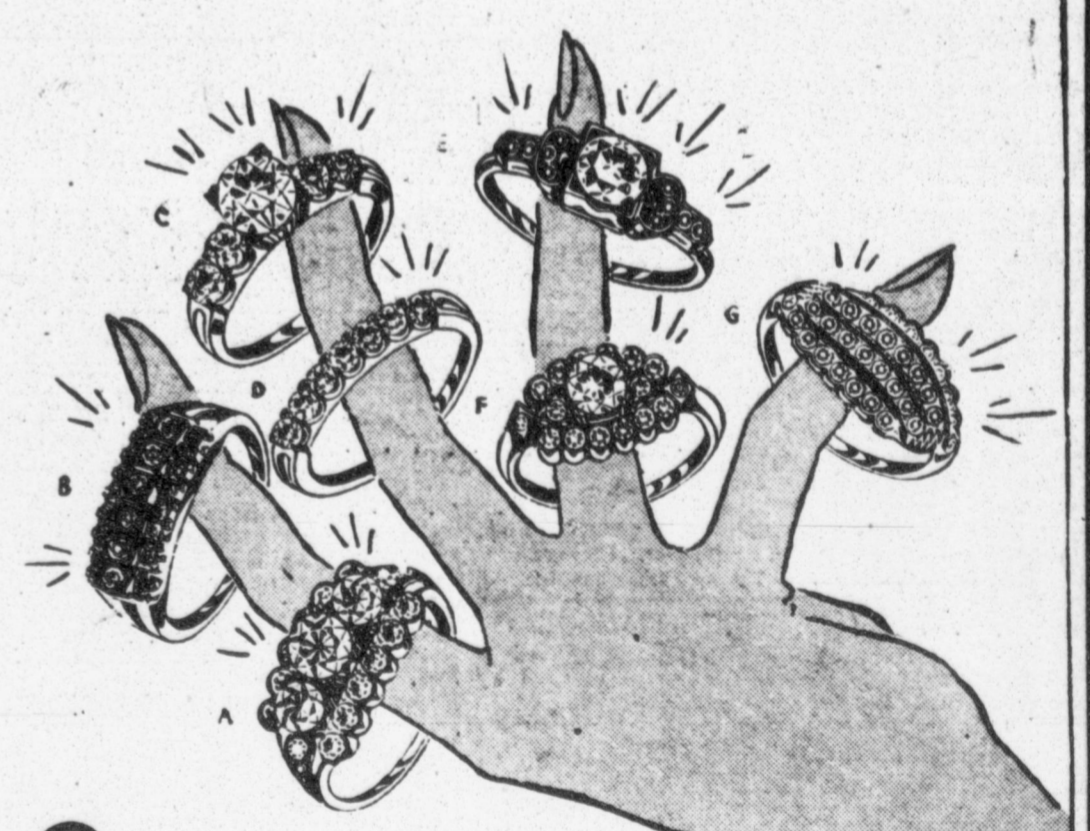
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Irma Jean McWright Becomes Bride Of Jerry Coley In Double-Ring Rite

One of our favorite food experts, Helen Goodrich of Los Angeles, sent us this smooth and substantial soup recipe. It uses crisp celery for a garnish instead of the usual croutons.

Vegetable Cream Soup
(Serves 4)

Two chicken - flavored bouillon cubes, 2 cups boiling water, 1 cup carrot cubes, 1 cup celery cubes, 1/4 cup minced onion, 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/4 cup flour, 2 cups milk, salt and pepper to taste, 2 cups American Cheddar cheese (processed type), thinly cut celery and parsley for garnish.

Dissolve bouillon cubes in boiling water. Add carrot and celery; cover and cook for 10 minutes. Cook onion in butter or margarine in heavy kettle. When onion is tender, but not brown, blend in flour. Gradually add milk, stirring constantly until thickened. Add bouillon-vegetable mixture, stirring constantly.

Heat with salt and pepper. Heat but do not boil. Add cheese, stir to melt. Serve piping hot topped with a spoonful of crunchy, thinly cut celery and sprinkle of parsley.

From New England, home of the cranberry, comes this variation on the baked apple theme:

Cranberry Baked Apples
(Yield: 6 servings)

Six tart fresh baking apples, 1/2 cup raw fresh cranberry relish, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup raw fresh whole cranberries.

Wash and core apples. Starting at the stem end, pare apples 1/2 way down. Place in a 10x7x2-inch baking pan, pared side up. Fill centers with the raw cranberry relish. Boil sugar and water together about 5 minutes. Add cranberries and pour over apples. Cover. Bake 25 minutes in a preheated hot oven (400 degrees F.). Remove cover. Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until tender, basting with the syrup 2 to 3 times. Serve cold, topped with the jellied apple and cranberry syrup which forms as the syrup around the apples cools.

The Fat Get Fatter, Lean Get Leaner Is Report Of Weight Control Experts

AMES, Iowa — (NEA) — Of fates a plight is getting worse and worse.

Now we hear that the fat get fatter. The lean get leaner. And no matter how good your intentions are to reduce, it's probably too late to start. Furthermore even if you do starve yourself and knock off a few ounces of blubber the odds are you'll get it right back.

But don't despair completely, chunky. There are a few rays of hope for you. They're learning new things about dieting all the time.

The gloomy side of the picture for the fat of the land comes from the recent Iowa State College Weight Control Colloquium, which brought together the nation's top experts on overweight problems.

Two theories advanced the claim that the fat get fatter. A study of animals by Dr. Jean Mayer of Harvard says that "they seemed to mobilize spontaneously each day a quantity of fat proportional to their total fat content."

A theory supporting this as applied to humans and postulating that the thin also tend to get thinner is advanced by Dr. Daniel A. Glomset, a Des Moines, Iowa, expert:

"Fat is insulation and a thin person loses more heat by radiation than an obese person. For this reason a thin person may be able to eat more than an obese person and not gain weight."

Several of the experts said that it may be too late for older persons to begin dieting.

"Habit is probably the most important factor in producing the cumulative injury of obesity," says Dr. Edward J. Stieglitz, of Washington, D. C. "And they are concerned not only with food intake, but also with mental attitude, with characteristics of work, sleep and many other factors," he claims.

Thus he concludes gloomily:

"The consequences of obesity cannot be effectively corrected or even notably retarded by dietary control late in life. By then the damage is done. Prevention and control must begin in youth and continue late in life."

Studies reported by several of the experts reveal that about 80 per cent of persons who do manage to lose weight regain it all back in five years.

One of the most far-reaching conclusions was that the problem was so serious in the U. S. it's time the subject of dieting and weight control be taught in elementary schools.

A lone dissenter on the general seriousness of overweight is Dr.



... So Why Not Diet Before Getting Fat?

If the facts about fat in the accompanying dispatch seem grim to you, there's some brighter news on the way.

It's a diet you and your family can follow to stay healthily slim before the pounds start adding up. Screen star Donna Reed, who's just read some good news on the scales at right, has written the story of how she and her husband and children make such a diet part of every-day living. Nutrition Expert G. Dorothy Williams has counted the calories for sensible, fadless diet to go with Donna Reed's story.

It's NEA's seven-part diet series for spring and you'll find it dished up for you exclusively in The Pampa Daily News, Monday.



The diet was liberal, although calorie intake was high. The study suggests that teenage diets in the case of overweight girls are inadequate and ineffective in keeping waistlines slim.

All is not black on the fat front, however. People are losing weight through new ideas in dieting and exercise off willpower, although it still boils down to simply cutting down on intake of food.

Dr. Glomset contends that eating more slowly helps you to eat less. "If you eat slowly your appetite center tells your brain to stop eating before you have consumed more than you need," he says.

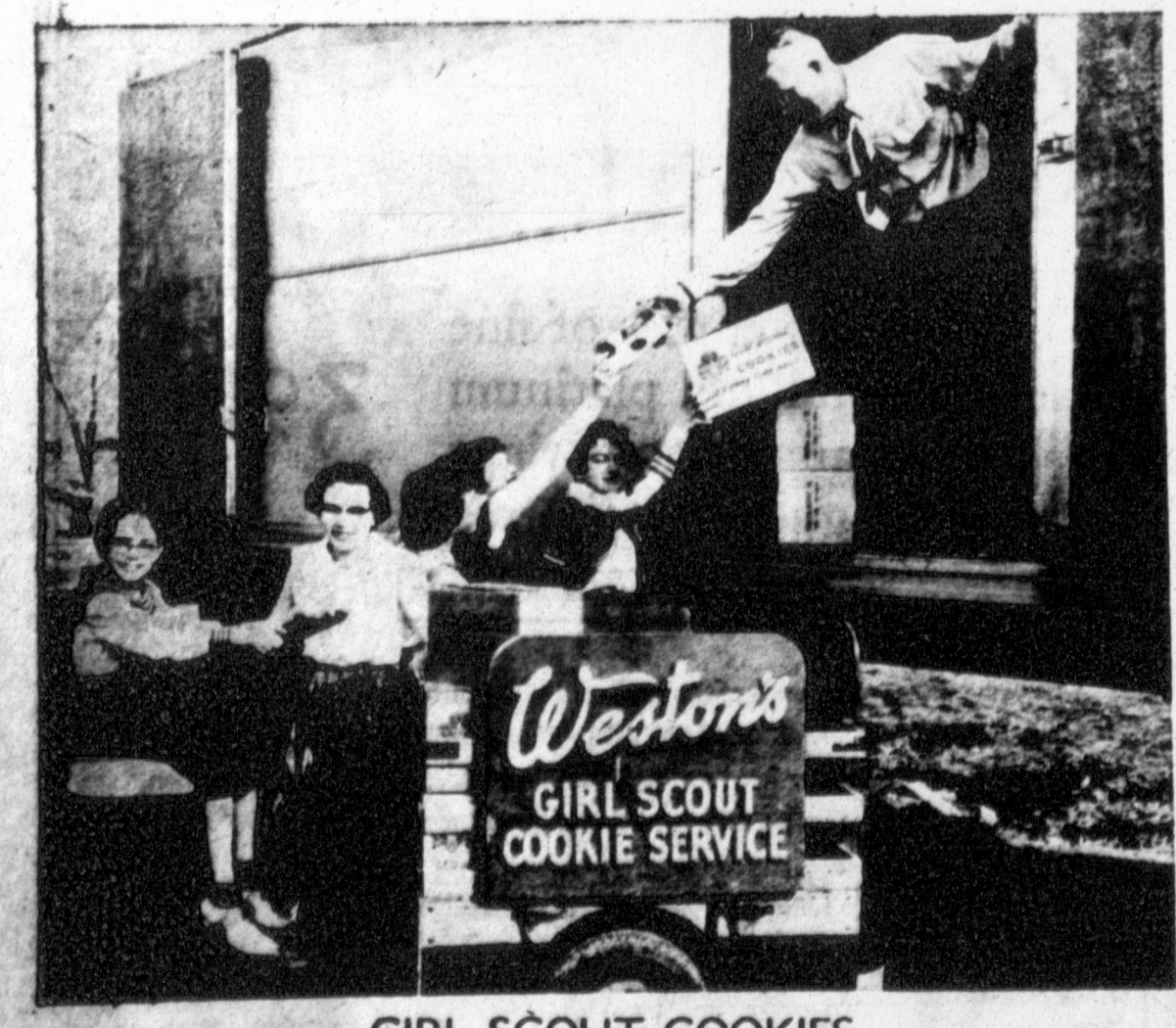

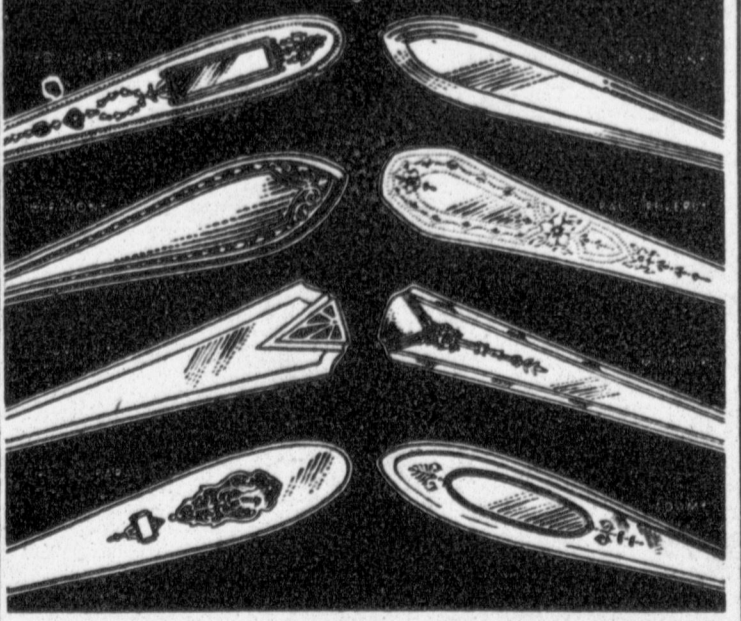

Entire Stage Production Will Be Used In 'Peter Pan' Show

NEW YORK, Feb. 26—UP—An entire stage production will be moved into a television studio for the first time next week when the musical version of Barrie's "Peter Pan" is made ready for the two-hour TV presentation scheduled for the NBC network on March 7. The show closed Saturday night at the Winter Garden after a run that began last Oct. 20. The TV presentation will run almost two hours, and only a few minutes will have been cut from the stage version.

Mary Martin, the star, is not exactly a stranger to television, but her appearances on it have been more spectacular than frequent. People still talk about her TV debut a couple of years ago on the Ford Anniversary show. She also was the main cog in the Rodgers-Hammerstein Cavalcade a year later.

Solution Is Television
"Putting the show on television seems to be the solution to the huge problems that would have made a lengthy tour almost impossible," the star said. "And we love the show so much that millions will be able to watch a performance."

Although the original non-musical version of "Peter Pan" was 69 years old last December, Martin is only the fifth American

actress to play the title role professionally in this country.

The first, of course, was the late Maude Adams, who did it for the first time in this country on Nov. 6, 1905. She was Peter Pan to a whole generation.

Marilyn Miller Tries It
The next to try it, in 1924, was the late Marilyn Miller, the greatest star of the musical stage during the 1920's. Eva La Gallienne did it first in 1928 when she had her civic repertory theater and played it often for several years.

The last to do it before Miss Martin was Jean Arthur, who had a Broadway success with it in 1930. In England, of course, dozens of actresses have played the role during the 50 years because "Peter Pan" is done there regularly every Christmas season.

Walt Disney, who already has given the opposition rating headaches on Wednesday night with his "Disneyland" hour, is all set to do the same for afternoon rivals next fall from 5 to 6 p.m. Monday-through-Friday on the ABC network.

"Mickey Mouse Club" is the title for the new series which is scheduled to bow Oct. 3 in all time zones. The shows will be preliminary, the format will be as flexible as possible within the limits

of presenting material primarily to appeal to juvenile viewers.

"Home" Has Anniversary
March 1 will mark the first anniversary of NBC's "Home" seen daily from 11 a.m. to noon, Monday through Fridays.

Sherwood, NBC End Dramas
Playwright Robert S. Sherwood and NBC have agreed to terminate his agreement which provided for him to give the network nine original one-hour television dramas over a five-year period, beginning Jan. 1, 1953. NBC presented one in 1953 and one in 1954.

Sherwood said he wanted to concentrate on writing the screenplay for Michael Todd's production of Tolstoy's "War and Peace." Besides, he has a new stage play scheduled for fall production, and is revising a second one.

Rudy Valles, who was practically Mr. Radio a long time back, returns to that medium Sunday night for CBS, replacing the departing Edgar Bergen, who incidentally, got his radio start as a guest on one of Rudy's old programs.

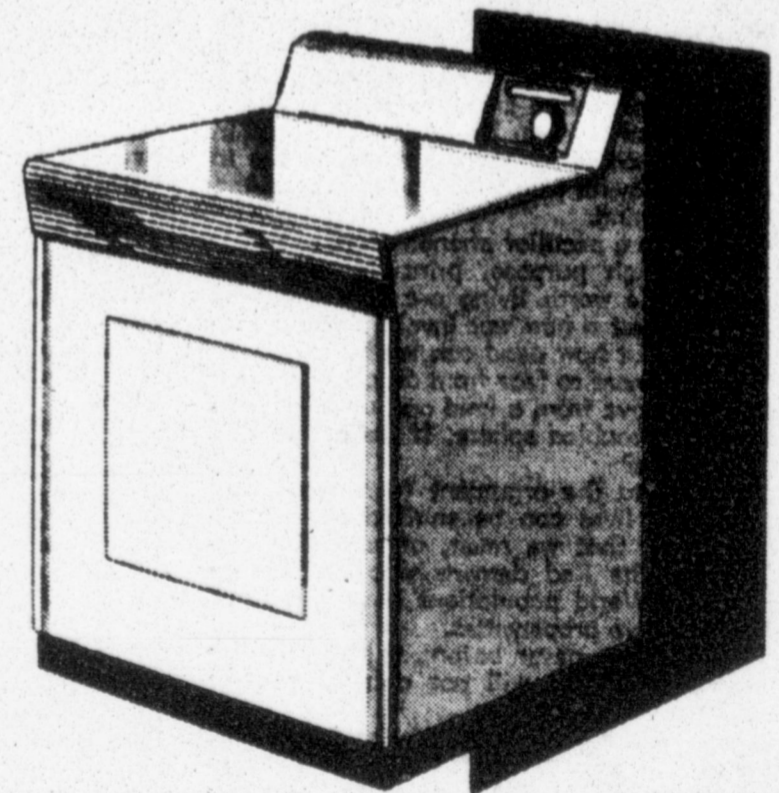

Merger Inside Reuther's CIO Seen Monday

By HARRY WILSON SHARPE WASHINGTON, Feb. 26-UP-Barring unforeseen obstacles, the CIO's Oil Workers International union and the United Gas, Coke and Chemical workers will merge next week into what could become one of the nation's most potent unions.

Their joint dues-paying membership, now about evenly divided, is 181,000. But this may be swelled by another 80,000 AFL workers if the CIO-AFL consolidation goes through.

Projecting further into the future, the new union could become a million-man organization if, as the merger sponsors hope, independent oil and chemical outfits in this country and Canada go for the one-big-union idea.

Cadet Howard's academic standing placed him in the top 10 percent of his class.

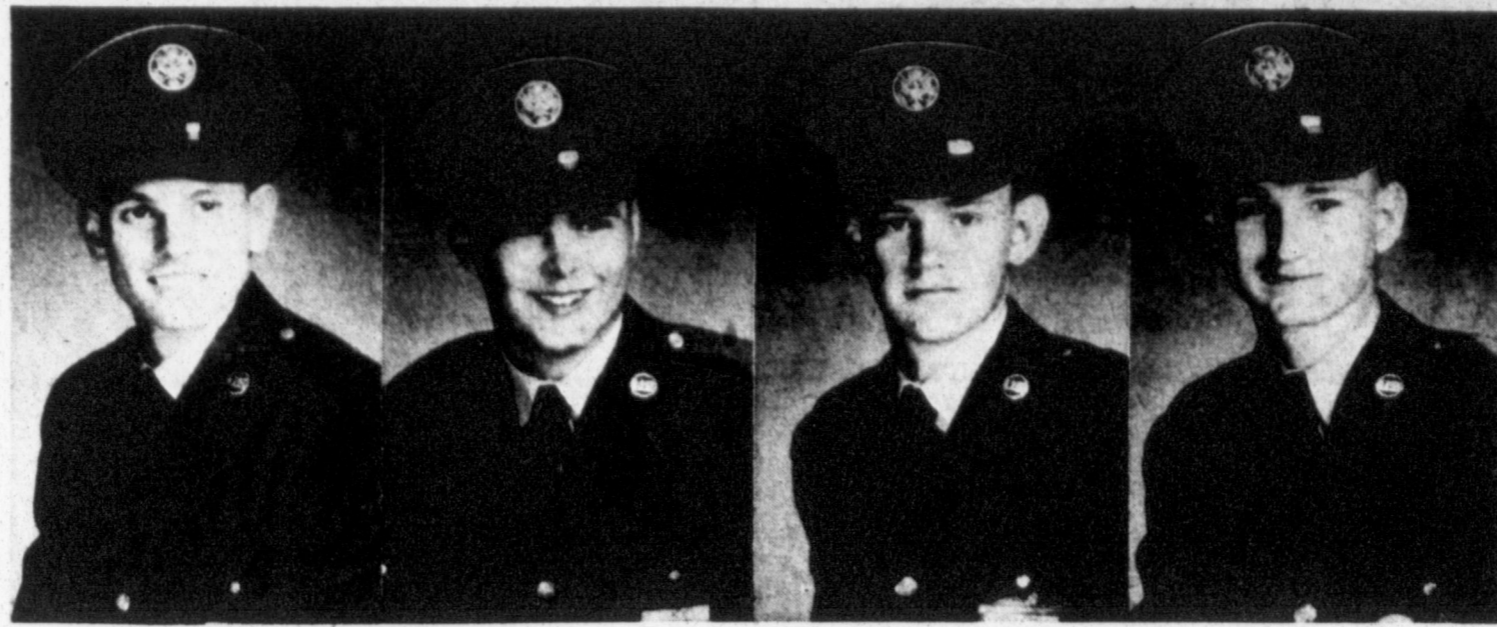
A former student at Tarleton State College, he was appointed to West Point by former Rep. Ben Guill of the 18th Congressional District.

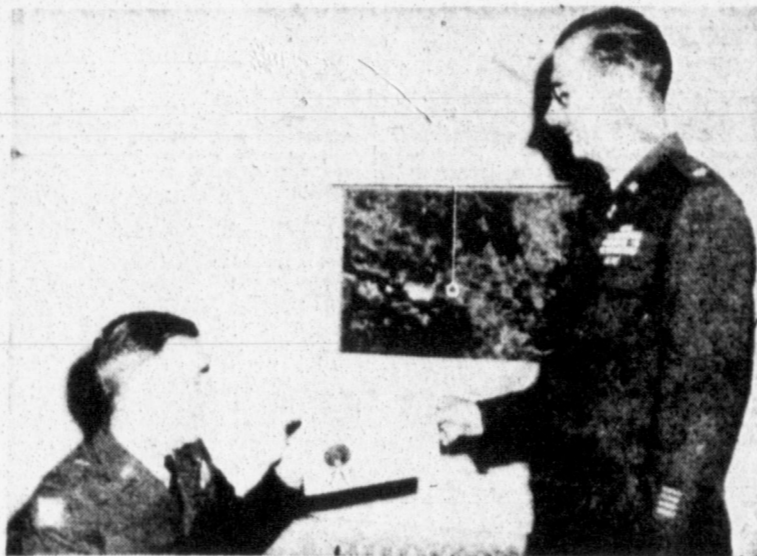
