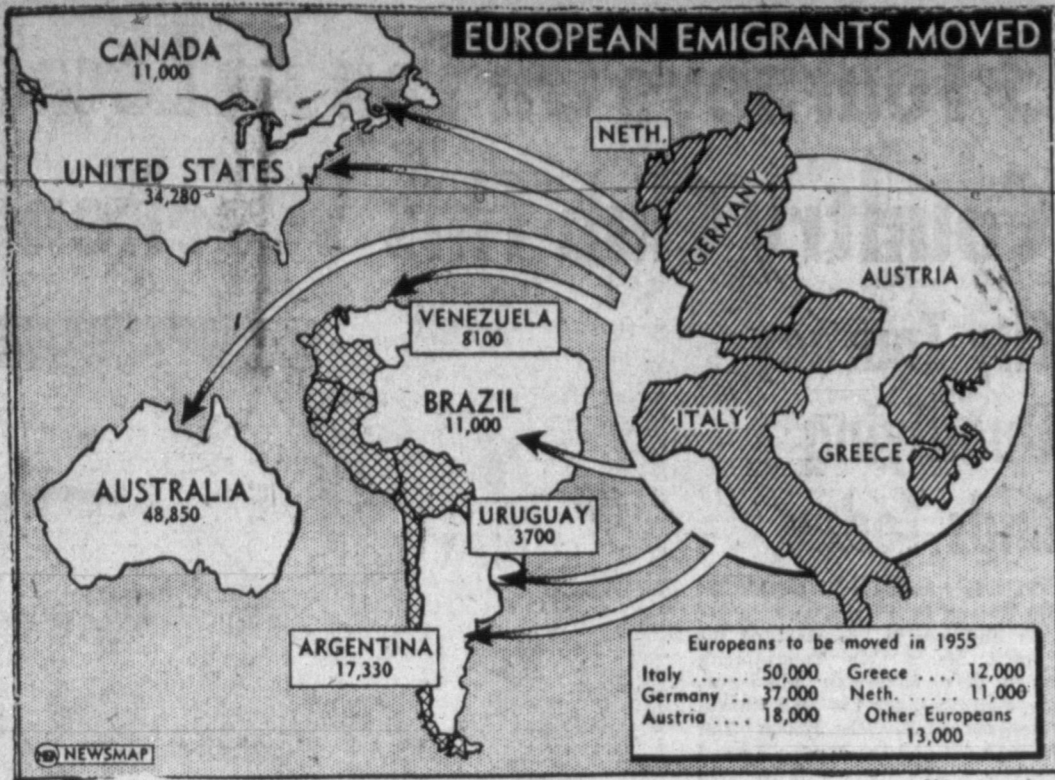

### EXODUS FROM EUROPE

While Washington boils in controversy over proposed liberalization of the McCarran-Walter immigration act, to ease relief or refugees, Europeans by the thousands are departing their native shores for greener pastures throughout the world—including the U. ## Senterfitt Announces For Governor

AUSTIN — UP — Reuben Senterfitt, former speaker of the House of Representatives, announced Tuesday he will be a candidate for governor in 1956.

Senterfitt, politically conservative, served seven terms as a member of the House, and held the speakership in 1951 and 1953 to become the second man in Texas history to hold the House presiding officer's post two consecutive terms. The other was former Gov. Coke R. Stevenson.

No other aspirants have formally announced for the governor's race. However, there was a full field of potentials, including: Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey; Agriculture Commissioner John C. White; Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton; Attorney General John Ben Shepard; Texas Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson; U. S. Sen. Price Daniel, and Deputy Secretary of Defense Robert Anderson of Vernon.

In addition, Austin attorney Ralph Yarborough, twice defeated in races against Gov. Allan Shivers, has continued active in Democratic politics, holding out the possibility he may seek a third race.

The governor himself has offered no hint as to his personal intentions.

## Sicilian Election May Have Saved Scelbo's Job

Italian Premier Mario Scelbo may have saved his job by his victory in the Sicilian regional election.

If so, it is good news for the United States and its allies. Scelbo is a firm friend of this country. He hates the Communists, and the Communists hate him.

Scelbo has been in trouble for several months. The coalition which he leads is shaky. Rebels in his own Christian Democratic party have been gunning for him. He suffered a loss of prestige when Giovanni Gronchi, one of his party enemies, was elected president of Italy April 29.

Gronchi is a member of the left wing of the Christian Democratic party. Scelbo's leadership is opposed also by a strong group of

right wing members of the party. Everybody agreed to let things rest until after last Sunday's election in Scelbo's native Sicily for a regional assembly of 90 members.

Had the Christian Democrats suffered a defeat, Scelbo's enemies planned to introduce a motion of no confidence against him at the opening of the Italian parliament next Monday.

In the old Sicilian assembly, the Christian Democrats held 30 seats and the Communists and left wing Socialists held 30. The Christian Democrats ruled with the support of small groups.

The Communists, who are losing strength steadily on the Italian mainland, threw everything they had into the Sicilian campaign.

The election, however, proved a clear victory for Scelbo. The Reds kept their 30 seats. But the Christian Democrats gained seven — at the expense of splinter parties — to make their total in the assembly 37.

Also the Communist popular vote declined for the first time since World War II.

Scelbo's pro-American, anti-Red policy has been strengthened, and he has been strengthened personally.

**Party Caucus Friday**  
There is to be a Christian Democratic party caucus Friday. What will happen there remains to be seen. But the stocky, smiling, 53-year-old premier may be expected to face his critics boldly and to ask no favors. At the moment, his chance of riding out a threatened crisis looks good.

Scelbo has had a long, spectacular career in politics. He attended his first political rally when he was 13. He was a protégé of Don Luigi Sturzo, founder of the popular party which has now become the Christian Democratic party. Little Mario went to an opposition political meeting. He reported so efficiently on the meeting that Don Sturzo said:

"Young man, if you keep on listening so intently to what people say you will become police chief."

Scelbo later became premier.

Scelbo did just that — he became police chief of all Italy, as interior minister, in the critical year of 1946. Communism was at its peak. Revolution was a clear threat. Scelbo reorganized the entire national police and formed the famous anti-riot squads.

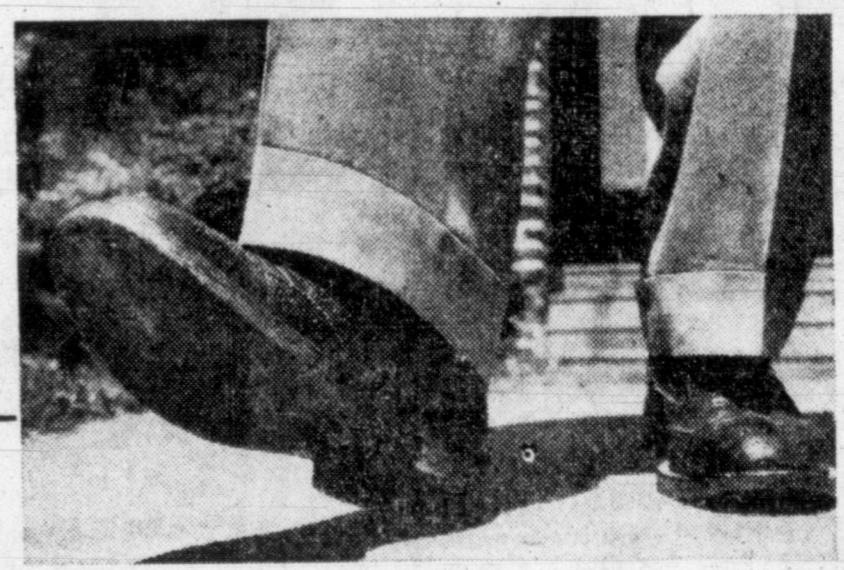

## Crude Oil Output Down

TULSA — UP — Decreased allowances in Texas and Louisiana were major factors in a drop of 85,100 barrels per day in U.S. crude oil production last week, the Oil and Gas Journal said Tuesday.

Daily average production for the week was 6,601,252 barrels.

Louisiana production dropped 31,100 barrels, and Texas decreased 14,900 barrels per day. Other drops were Alabama 100, Arkansas 250, California 600, Colorado 2,800, Florida 25, Indiana 200, Kansas 11,300, Kentucky 100, Nebraska 700, New Mexico 3,000, North Dakota 2,400, Oklahoma 8,800, Utah 200 and Wyoming 600.

## Mob Of 5,000 Greets Film Star Of 'Davy Crockett'

AUSTIN — UP — Fess Parker, a lanky Texan regarded by multi-million Americans as the small fry as Davy Crockett in the flesh, was credited Tuesday with standing firm against an onslaught that would have sent the old frontiersman scurrying for the hills.

Parker, arriving in Austin for the premiere showing of "Davy Crockett: King of the Wild Frontier," stepped from a plane Monday night to face an estimated 5,000 kiddies—and parents, too—bearing down on him in relentless attack.

In the best tradition of the Alamo, Parker stood his ground. He beamed on the crowd, patted heads and waved. "Betsy," his trusted rifle, in the air as a multitude of moppets swarmed about him.

Many of the youngsters sported coonskin caps, fringed shirts and make-believe rifles. Police said the crowd was probably the largest ever to welcome a person to Austin, at municipal airport.

Parker wore his traditional buckskin garb, and with the aid of an escort finally pushed his un-

ruffled way through the wildly enthusiastic mob.

Later, safely ensconced in a hotel room, Parker related that he likes kids "and I like to talk to 'em. But man," he added, "that sort of thing can be dangerous."

## Real Bull Fighter Tells Why He Risks Life In Ring

EDITOR'S NOTE: — Aline Mosby is on vacation. Today's guest columnist is director Budd Boetticher, Hollywood's only real bull-fighter. He tells why he risks death in the ring.

**HOLLYWOOD** — UP — Several weeks ago I was celebrating the fact my picture "The Magnificent Matador" was ready to be shown, so it seemed logical to accept an invitation to go to the border city of Tijuana to fight the brave bulls.

A handful of years have passed since I was in a bull ring, an arena that has fascinated me from the moment I first stepped into one as a torero at the tender age of 19. That was more than 15 years ago. Since then whenever opportunity has arisen between pictures I've tried to block out time for bull fighting.

Many people have attempted to explain that fascination of the bulls for the audience as well as the fighter. When it was announced I would actually be going into the ring again, I knew many of my Hollywood friends would be in the audience looking for the answer.

Now it's true a man can get killed fighting bulls. And many of them do.

Why do I do it, then?

Making pictures in Hollywood can be exciting, highly profitable and quite frequently, an ulcer-producing business. I don't have ulcers. Nor do I visit a psychiatrist. I fight the bulls instead.

I trimmed down to 176 pounds for the fight. I never felt better in my life. I became a different man with a purpose. And though this was, I believe, the 28th time I'd been in the ring, it was the first time I felt no fear at all.

I was going to do something I was not at all sure I could do and if I failed the penalty would be tougher than one connected with making a flop picture. In the ring there would be no agents, producers, cutters, sound men — none to rely on but myself.

This is "tournament week" at the Pampa Country Club.

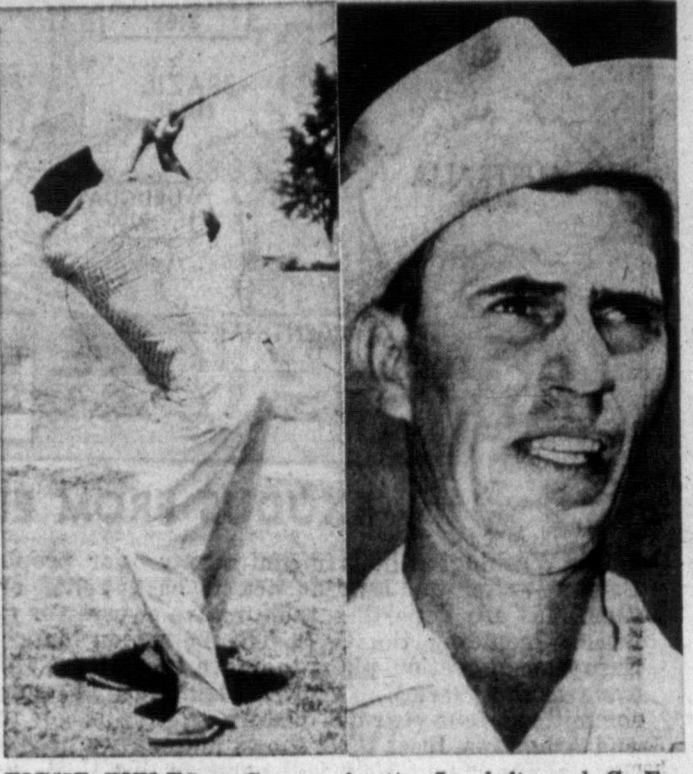

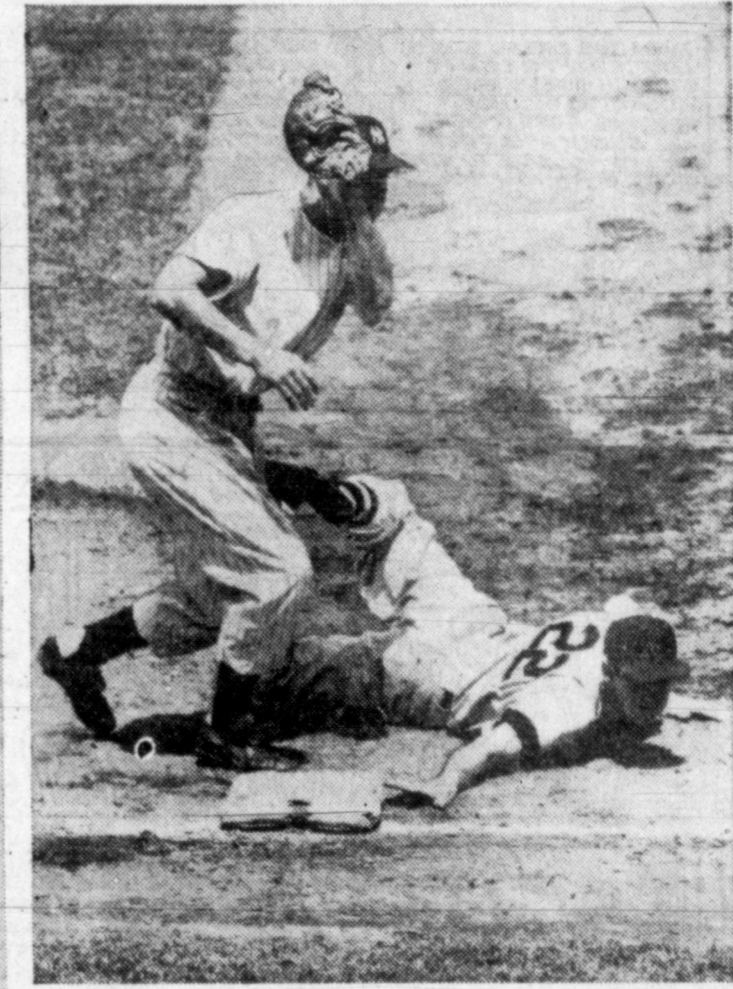

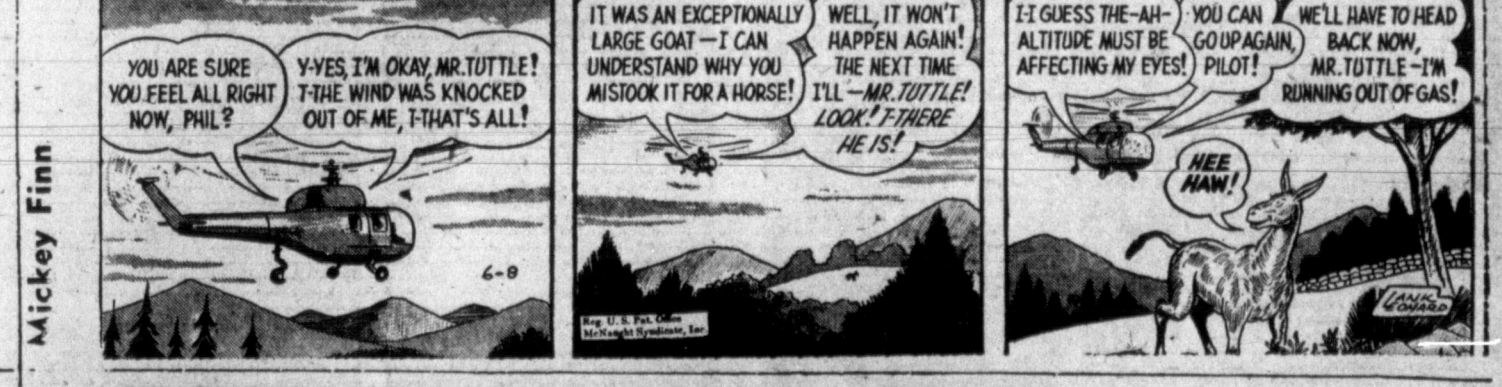
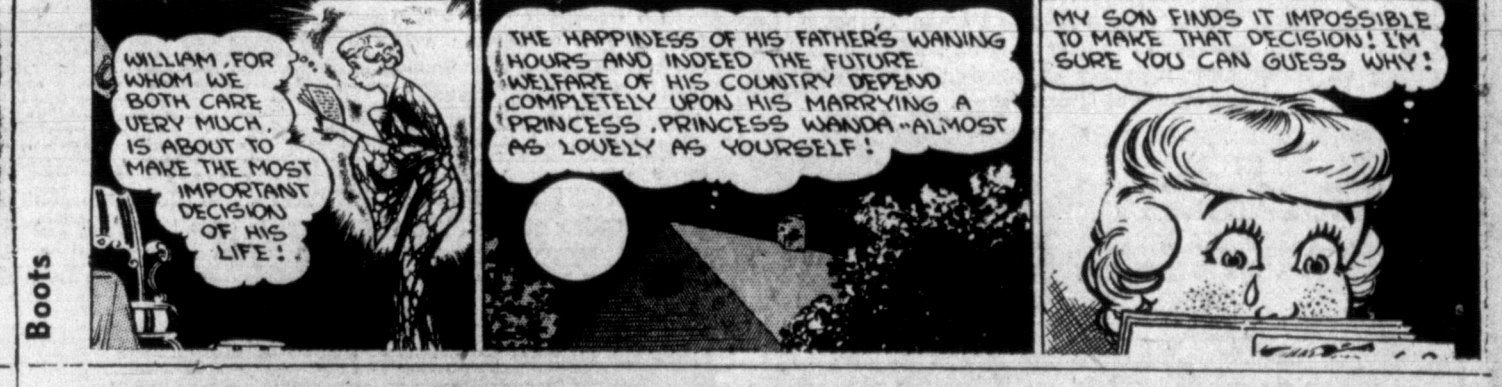
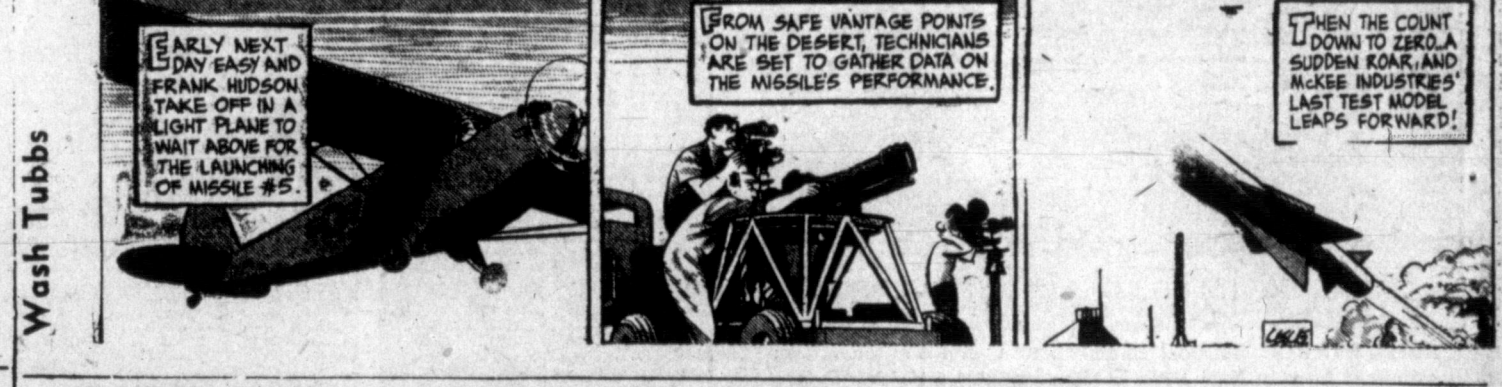
