

Controversy Over MacArthur's Views On Russian Aid Flares

WASHINGTON -UP-The controversy over what Gen. Douglas MacArthur thought about Russian help against Japan during World War II widened Tuesday.

It probably won't be settled by the now-planned publication of official documents bearing on Mac-Arthur's views about Russian intervention in the war 10 years ago. Defense Department security officers are reviewing the stack of papers now and may have them. ready for publication in the next few days.

The controversy was fanned Monday when an Army historian asserted flatly that MacArthur at the time of the February, 1945, Yalta conference was "thoroughly in favor" of Soviet entry into the war against Japan.

"Willing to Make Concessions" Louis Morton chief of the Pacific section of the Army's Office of Military History, wrote in The Reporter magazine that MacArthur was "perfectly willing" to make concessions to gain Russian par-

ticipation. The historian's claims were at odds with MacArthur's assertions that if anyone had asked the time of Kalta he wood

MacArthur said Sunday night that President Roosevelt and other heads of state got their military information at Walta from their chiefs of staff who "acted solely upon their own responsibility." He said his views were never asked and he learned of concessions to

Russia months later. Supported by Commanders Morton contended the desire of the American chiefs of staff for Russian help was "supported by theater commanders." He said MacAribur "stated complationly at

the time of Yalta to more than one visitor that American forces should not invade Japan until three months after the Red army had attacked in Manchuria" where Japan had a huge army. Otherwise, Morton wrote the

The view that Soviet forces should pin down Japan's Kwanturg army on the Asiatic mainland has bean attributed to MacArthur in

several books. Robert E. Sherwood said in "Roosevelt and Hopkins," pub-

lished by Harper & Brothers in 1948 that at Yalta Mr. Roosevelt's prime concern in all Far Eastern discussions was American war plans against Japan. He said, "MacArthur's calculations were based on the assumption that the Russians would contain the great bulk of Japanese forces on the Asiatic mainland" during the invasion of Japan.

Who's Crazy?

Clarence E. Harbison, a dog psychologist who, is going around the country giving lectures, is not one who wants to live by the side of the road and be a friend to man. From the tone of his remarks, it's obvious that he prefers canines to Homo sapiens.

Listen to the man. "There-are no crazy dogs," he says "it's the people who are crazy."

And again: "There's no such thing as a bad dog. They may become emotionally upset, perhaps, but not bad. Take the trouble I had with Rudy Vallee's dog . . . there was nothing wrong with that Doberman that Rudy couldn't have corrected if he'd have straightened out his own habits first.

Here is another Harbison pronouncement: "When a person gets a puppy they should prepare for its arrival just as they would prepare for a new baby, and for the first few years should train it just as carefully as they train Junior. Chances are the dog will respond better

And here is a piece of the dog psychologist's advice to dog owners: "Dogs aren't much different from humans; they have the same brain, the same nervous system and they respond to the same stimuli. The only trouble is they're dumb. So it's up to people who own dogs to figure out what the dog is thinking.

All dog owners, except maiden ladies who keep Chihuahuas and Pekinese — and they are really cat lovers without the courage of their convictions - know in their secret hearts that underneath all the surface slobber of affection, life is a continuing battle between man and dog. In that war, obviously, Dr. Harbison has sold outto the enemy.

It's not easy to fathom the devious thinking that goes on inside a dog's head, but the following seems reasonably typical of the conversation that goes on each night between a certain Shepherd and an Irish Setter of our neighborhood:

SETTER: Did you see your psychologist today?

SHEPHERD (digging up bulb garden in search for bones): Yes. He says there's no such thing as a bad dog. He says my troubles all stem from the fact that the boss brought me home from the kennel at the same time the missus brought the baby home from the hospital. Sibling rivalry, you know.

EIGHT-YEAR SENTENCE (The Wall Street Journal)

It is disquieting enough that the Administration's latst Asian aid plan calls for spending more than \$2.3 billion in the fiscal year beginning July 1. Even more disturbing is the bland assertion that this is to be the first instalment in an eight-year hand-out.

This \$2.3 billion is some \$650 mil-Bion more than is being spent in Asia this fiscal year. That is hardly a modest boost, though the increase is apparently to come not from further levies but from less spending elsewhere in the world. But it is only when \$2.3 billion is multiplied by eight years that the scope of the scheme emerges.

Assuming the yearly instalments do not go up - a doubtful assumption in dealing with foreign aid-the eight-year total comes to \$18.4 billion. That's fust for Asia: there is nothing to surggest other aid is going to stop. And this \$18.4 billion would come on top of some 350 billion of U. S. Governmental global spending since the war.

That a good deal of this \$18.4 billion or more would be wasted may be taken for granted. The area covered boasts for the most part meither the economic nor the political sagacity to handle any such sum sensibly. But there is still time for Congress to quash this eight-year stretch. If Congress doesn't, the taxpayer might some day rebel at his cruel and unusual punishment.

is the monopoly of coercion." Then I told him that if he wanted to continue to use the above statement I wished he would answer the following questions:

"Does the government's monopoly of coercion take away from me my moral right to kill in self defense?

"Or would I have a moral right to use defensive force if the government was not available if I saw a man raping a child?

"Do not the courts free a man from the charge of murder if he can prove that he killed in self-

"Does the county, state or federal government have the monopoly of coercion? "Do not the states retain the right to defend their citizens' lives and property as well as the fed-

eral government? "Does not each county have the duty of defending the lives and property of its citizens before the state has a monopoly of coercion?" Chodorov's Answer

Here is the way Chodorov answered the above questions:

"When I wrote 'Government, is the monopoly of coercion,' I was merely describing government. I didn't say that government has a right to this monopoly. Government has no rights because government is not a person. Whether it gets its monopoly by force or by the vote of 51 per cent of the people, it still exercises its monopoly.

"True, there are no absolute nonopolies. I can use force either o rob you or in self defense. In either case, the government interaccept your statement. Even in the case of suicide the government atives to you. If you should fail in your attempt at suicide, you can be punished. The point is, there is nothing to government except coercion. It has no competence in any economic conditions are fallacious. Only individuals produce goods and services and they do it by finding out what other individuals want. and services. It cannot function in tion in the market place except to destroy or impede.

"When I use the word 'government' in this connection, I am not talking of the federal government only. I am talking of any political

"I hope this answers your query." Yes, he answered my questions and I will admit that government is a monopoly of coercion, just as he had said, which before his an-

swer I did not understand. I am always under great obligation to anyone who points out the errors of my beliefs. There is no greater enjoyment for one who has a desire to develop than to get a new truth in his head.


