Reds May Offer To Free US Airmen As Bandung Gesture By EDWARD R. KENNEDY spokesman who can use his own Philippine homeland as an example **NEA** Special Corerspondent

BANDUNG, Indonesia— (NEA) -The American airmen now being held as prisoners by the Chinese Communists may win their freedom as a byproduct of the Bandung Afro-Asia conference, a neutral source has informed NEA Service exclusively.

The source said there is considerable speculation among neutral and friendly Western nations that some or all of the airmen branded as spies by the Chinese Reds may be released to coincide with the conference as a Communist propaganda demonstration that they are "willing to live and

If this doesn't happen early in the Bandung conference, America's Western friends may take the issue to the

The anti - Communist nations are more prepared than some observers have expected to meet efforts of the Chinese Communists and India to discredit the United States. Peiping faces three nations who joined in the fight for Korea: The Philippines, Thailand and Pakistan.



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We, Too, Must Vote

Often Americans take a rather pitying attitude towards the citizens of other countries. This is particularly true of elections held in such countries as Communist Russia or those which were held in Nazi Germany.

"They must vote 'Ja'!" "No real freedom to choose between candidates!" And other expressions of pity are common American quotes.

But what about us? Must we, ourselves, in many instances vote "Ja!" whether we like it or not? Do we have real freedom of choice? When we pay for something we have actually cast a most compelling ballot for it.

For instance: Who can say "No!" to paying school taxes to whatever district we happen to live in. Yet, isn't the payment of school taxes a vote "Ja" for these schools even if personally we prefer other schools?

Oh sure, we still can support other schools IF we have anything left AFTER we pay our government school taxes. But is this partial freedom a real chance to say NO? Is it real freedom of choice?

It certainly permits NO ONE to wholeheartedly disagree with the dictates of the majority in a school district. The majority says "This is it!" The minority cannot, with its full voice, say "Oh, no it isn't."

The minority is "permitted" to faintheartedly set up other schools (Catholic, Lutheran, Seventh Day Adventist, Episcopalian, etc.) AFTER they first agree, voluntarily or not to pay towards the support of government schools. Government school promoters then point to these schools which now can only be supported timidly and claim they could not do the job of teaching our children were there no tax supported schools. First, they place a tremendous handicap on voluntarily supported schools, then they ridicule them for not being able to overcome this handicap.

The "agreement' 'imposed upon all Americans, who are not in jail, to support government schools is on the basis of EITHER you support such schools OR ELSE you go to jail. And if you resist both supporting these schools and going to jail, you get shot for disagreeing.

Do you think Americans don't have to vote "Ja"? Do you feel we can wholeheartedly disagree? Just try not voting "Ja!" when it comes to paying for government schools whether you agree with them or not.



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

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
