11/2 cups pineapple juice 11/2 tablespoons unflavored gela-

3 tablespoons cold water 3-4 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup crushed pineapple 11/2 tablespoons lemon juice 11/2 cups heavy cream, whipped

1 (12-ounce) bakers' jelly roll Heat pineapple juice. Soften gelatin in cold water, then add to hot juice. Add sugar, salt, pineapple and lemon juice. Refrigerate until mixture begins to thicken, then beat with rotary beater. Whip cream until stiff and fold it into gelatin mixture. Cut jelly roll into 2-inch slices. Arrange 4 slices on the bottom of an ungreased tube pan, place remaining slices around sides of pan. Pour pineapple mixture over slices of jelly roll. Chill until firm. Turn out on serving plate and cut into wedges. Yields 12 servings.

ICE CREAM CAKE 1 (8-ounce) bakers' angel food, sponge or chiffon cake

pint strawberry ice cream 1/2 pint heavy cream, whipped



new in Soviet Russia. It has been serious. rampant since the beginning of the revolution when gangs of children who roamed the country like packs of hungry wolves - became the terror of Russian cities.

The first scene I witnessed during my first visit to the Red "paradise" in 1933 was five husky Russians beating a little pick-pocket who tried to snatch a purse from a woman. He couldn't have been more than eight. He was bleeding badly and seemed like a frightened little beast. I still remember vividly the Soviet waif, dressed in rags, as he was being taken to the police station where another beating awaited him:

Yet so tight was Soviet censor ship that it was only years later, reading Nicholas Voinov's fascinating story, that I learned that the millions of waifs, Russia's orphaned children, were not all the vic tims of war and famine.

Many were kids deliberately deprived of their parents by the Red regime.

Voinov himself was a motherless child of six when his father, a successful engineer, fell victim to one of the many blood purges in Russia, and the boy lost home and family forever to become a "ward of the state."

From a happy home life, little Voinov was thrown into Russia's grim jungle where, in order to survive, the waifs were forced into a career of juvenile delinquency.

Stealing and killing, they defend ed themselves ferociously against a government that robbed them of their parents - their very place in life. They developed their own code of morals and - paradoxically enough - represented the strongest element of freedom and disobedience in the tightly regimented Red "paradise

There are still thousands of homeless children roaming the cities of Russia - though their num ber is now somewhat reduced.

Guaranteed Wage

The date — June 6, 1955 — may be a landmark for scholastic brooding when the researchers of the future ponder the rise and fall of Western Civilization. It unquestionably marks the opening of a new chap-

ter in labor-management relations since the contract reached between the United Auto Workers and the Ford Motor Co. contains the concession by a major employer that it is obligated to pay employes when there is no

Just what immediate value the new contract with its key clause, the so-called Guaranteed Annual Wage. will have to the rank and file of the UAW is open to

The contract is a compromise in that in regard to the "guaranteed wage" it commits the employer to provide 60 per cent of normal take-home pay for a period of 26 weeks to each employe laid off after he has established a "tenure" to his job.

The compromise itself should be satisfactory to the labor bosses who can report to their union memberships that when new contract negotiations come up they can work for increasing the percentage of pay for no work done and the time in which the employer will be obliged for the dole.

But there are gimmicks in the wage "guarantee" provision that are not too well publicized. The "guarantee" does not go into effect until June 1, 1956, a year hence, and there is a proviso that it will not be instituted at all until the laws of home states in which two-thirds of Ford workers are employed are so interpreted that the supplementary compensation does not endanger the state-dispensed unemployment insurance.

State laws in California, Connecticut, Kansas, Minnesota, Mississippi, Illinois and Ohio appear to ban payments of state unemployment insurance except for periods when workers are in a position roughly described as "performing no services and receiving no wages."

You can look for quite an effort on the part of Walter Reuther and his minions in the political arena to "adjust" these conditions.

Management of Ford has acceded to the plan but a great number of economists — possibly all those not in the hire of organized unions — have contended that the scheme of the UAW is not financially practical. This factor cannot be tested in such materially prosperous times as these. The crisis will come in a recession or a depression and if this principle of wage guarantee spreads to the whole auto industry and to other heavy industry the spectre of bankruptcy will be more sharply outlined for not only fringe operators but for the most solid of companies.

If the plan cannot be instituted or if it does not work at all, there will be no benefit for the workers. In this connection the Wall Street Journal makes pointed comment

It stated editorially: "It (the wage guarantee) is clearly dubious for management in an industry which depends on variable demand . . . But even if it does work as it is supposed to, there is plenty of reason to doubt that it is the best deal the workers could have got had the negotiations been open-minded.

Suppose the workers had won the equivalent of GAW's cost in straight wave increases. Would they have been financially worse off? Or suppose the settlement had been on the basis of the company's proposal, which among other benefits would have enabled the workers to buy bonds and Ford stock with the company contributing to the purchases. Is it better for a man to be paid up to 65 per cent of his normal take-home pay for not working or be able to accumulate a reserve of securities? Is a company-paid dole preferable to ownership in the company?"

We agree with the Journal that the answers to the questions are obvious. A worker given a choice between the wherewithal to provide his own security and a guarantee of charity is a devil of a lot more his own man when he takes the road of independence.

But we don't think the rank and file of UAW members were given a real choice. We don't think they were allowed by their union rulers to think at all upon the choices offered. And we believe they were suckered into a deal designed not to benefit the workers but designed rather in the long pull to regiment management and labor into industrial socialism.

If and when Guaranteed Annual Wage is imposed upon the economy of the United States we are going to have less and less of material things because they are going to be more and more expensive.

The equivalent of every penny that Ford and other companies have to contribute to its employes will be added to the price of each and every car that is sold In the United States. Furthermore, the giant corporations are not going to pay out any more doles than they have to and more and more of the labor involved will be concentrated in the giant manufacturers which will reduce nation-wide the opportunities for employment. Mr. Reuther and his union probably never gave a "tinker's dam about Guaranteed Annual Wage. What They sought was the principle of employer-paid compensation for unemployment which forces upon the national

economy the obligation of guaranteed employment. In the long history of man the only way this has ever been achieved for any large number of workers for any substantial period of time has been through an ancient custom which goes by the name of slavery. That is the ultimate result of the Reuther plan.
