



Dr. Elmer Hess of Erie, Penn. the AMA president said here Wednesday the "horrible" controversy about the Salk -vaccine "shows politics and science are incompatible."

"The chaos and confusion that have arisen as the result of many politicians in Washington getting into the act has handicapped and hampered the proper distribution of the vaccine," Dr. Hess told phyicians attending the Rocky Mountain cancer conference.


"The polio vaccine problem is a minor one from the standpoint of the health of the country as a whole," he said. "Polio doesn't kill and cripple in a year the number killed and cripped on the highways in a week. Hess said the government

should not pay for vaccine for all children, although federal appropriations for needy cases "might" be all right.

"But I know that doctors would glad to fur in those cases," the AMA president said.

He blamed the controversy sur rounding the Salk vaccine for delays in congressional action on mortages for construction of health facilities and grants in aid for medical research and training. These, Dr. Hess said, are more important medical issues than po-

### Air Tanker Crash Probe Underway

MERCED, Calif. -UP- The Air Force sought Thursday to learn what caused a four - engined tanker to crash in flames shortly after taking off from nearby Castle Air Force Base. All 10 men aboard were killed.

The KC-97, a military version of the Stratocruiser, was carrying more than 6.000 gallons of jet fuel. The crash took place early Wednesday when the plane was at an altitute of 1,500 feet.

Witnesses agreed that one of the engines burst into flames and dropped off. The loss of weight caused the big plane to tilt on its side, with fongues of flame flash-

ing along its length. Then it nosedived into a grain field, six miles north of Castle. The explosion rocked the countryside for miles around and tore out a rrater measuring 50 by 60

feet and 15 deep into the ground. Roaring flames shot high into the air and a pall of smoke was visible 25 miles away. Many persons in the area thought an earthquake had taken place. The fire burned over 20 acres of stubble around the wreckage.

Strawberry shortcake is only as good as the biscuits that are its foundation. Light, fluffy, tender, they absorb the delicious berry juice. When they are made with margarine, they make the berries taste

Biscuits for shortcake are best when they are a little richer than when they are served as hot bread. A hint of sugar gives them just enough sweetness to blend with the sweetness of the sugared berries. Both the margarine and the sugar help the biscuits brown lightly to

give added attractiveness.

For an extra touch of flavor and luxury, split the biscuits as soon as they come from the oven. Spread them generously with soft margarine. Then heap sweetened berries and whipped cream on them and

STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE (6 servings)

2 cups sifted flour 3 teaspoons baking powder 2 tablespoons sugar

6 tablespoons margarine cup milk 1 quart strawberries ½ pint whipping cream

Sift together into bowl the flour, baking powder, sugar and salt. Cut in margarine until mixture is like coarse corn meal. Add milk and stir until flour is just moistened. Turn dough out on lightly floured board or pastry cloth. Knead lightly five or six times. Roll out dough one-half inch thick. Cut into rounds with 4-inch biscuit or cookie cutter. Bake biscuits on ungreased baking sheet in hot oven (450°F.) 12 to 15 minutes. When slightly cooled, spread biscuits with soft margarine. While biscuits bake, wash and hull berries. If berries are large, cut some in halves. Sprinkle a little sugar over berries. About ½ cup sugar to 1 quart of berries is a good proportion. Cover and set into refrigerator until ready to serve. Add Sandwich Loaf To Luncheon Menu

A sandwich loaf at a lunche shower will cause conversation from time it makes its appearance until the last morsel is gone. Home conomist Reba Staggs has several suggestions for preparing sandwich loaves so they will taste as good as they look. If you purchase un-sliced bread, you'll be able to cut it any way you want it, It can be sliced lengthwise into layers. You can alternate layers of light and dark bread, if you desire. Round loaves of bread are attractive when sliced into rounds and spread with various fillings. After the layers are put together the 'cake" is frosted with cream cheese mixed with milk to spreading consistency. The loaf is cut like pie for serving.

Individual sandwich loaves is another idea. Slices of bread are cut with cooky cutters, then 3 or 4 slices are stacked with fillings between. The whole sandwich is then frosted with cream cheese. Here are some suggestions for fillings for sandwich loaves:

Diced crisp bacon, pitted finelychopped prunes, prepared mustard and mayonnaise.

Ground sliced ham, chopped stuffed olives, chopped hard-cooked eggs, pickle relish and mayon-

Mashed liverwurst, butter or margarine, finely-chopped celery, chopped olives and mayonnaise. Gay decorations for sandwich loaves can be made from strips of pimiento and green pepper and placed on top to form umbrella or bell designs.



The law is usually more stric about accidents befalling tradesmen and others who enter your premises in the line of duty so to speak-postmen, laundrymen, met er-readers, delivery boys and the like-than it is in the cases of those who enter your home for purely social reasons.

But this does not mean that a homeowner is absolved of all responsibility for injury to his guests. If he knows a dangerous condition exists, he has a duty to correct it and can be held liable for accidents which might happen if he doesn't For example, in one case a rotter tree branch fell to the sidewalk injuring a passerby. The cour held that the owner was respon sible because he knew of the de fective condition and should have remedied it.

Businesses as well as homes can suffer serious losses from accidents. A case which happened sev eral years ago will illustrate this

Greenthumb entered a hardware store to buy a graden hoe and was struck in the mouth by a golf club being used by Ben Blogun, another customer at the store's in-

The store had to pay Greenthumb a large amount of damages because Greenthumb had been implicitly invited into the store for the business of making a purchase; the store failed to use ordinary reasonable care and to warn Greenthumb of the danger.

Fortunately, not everyone who falls down the front steps gets up and rushes off to sue his host. However, it pays to remember that failure to use resonable care to make your home safe against ac cidents could result in the loss of the savings of a lifetime.
