

Shut Up Members

Defenders of the Parent Teacher Association certainly will have a difficult time explaining to most members the position taken as reported by the New York Times News Service in connection with federal aid to

In reporting on the opening of the PTA national convention in Chicago, the service said:

'Dissenion has flared up within the Illinois PTA over legislative platform action. A letter signed by 142 members from the Chicago area was sent to national and state officers, It demands that the PTA refrain from adopting platforms and programs dealing with national and international political issues and refrain from becoming a 'political pressure group.

"It was reported that the rebels, whose principal objection seems to be federal aid to education, would be ruled out of order if they sought to bring their complaint before the national convention. The national organization is on record as favoring federal aid to school

In other words, the national PTA organization, which is supported by the dues from individual members throughout the United States, is taking a stand as favoring at least a form of federal aid to educationa viewpoint that certainly is not shared by all PTA mem-

Thus, the national PTA organization says, in effect, you little people in your PTA units pay your dues and shut up - we'll do the politics for all of us."

Apparently there is no objection from national about national becoming a pressure group but should a local PTA attempt to discuss an important school issue like federal aid to education with all of its ramifications and implications, the local PTA is to keep it quiet.

In the issue of federal aid to education the local PTAs have good grounds for making an issue of the question, bringing it to the floor of PTA membership meetings for discussion and attempting to determine if the national PTA speaks for PTA or not. The national organization is powerless to stop such action on the part of the local unit which needs only to withhold national dues from the national group to not only save the money but rid itself of the blame for national policies that are not in line with those of the local unit.

The difficulty, of course, that all PTA members find they face when they consider such actions as federal aid to education is some basis from which to argue against such federal aid and subsequent federal control. That there will be control where there is aid, regardless of the protestations made by the proponents of such measures, can scarcely be doubted. Who controls the purse controls the thinking and the spending.

But PTA members who feel that "we don't want federal control of education" ought to keep in mind that the educational system of the country today is in the hands of government almost exclusively. (And would be exclusive if some of the "leaders" like Dr. James Connant had their way.) And anything in the hands of government is certain to expound and teach in one way or another control by government. If PTA approves of government control in the field of education it is in a mighty poor position to argue against any type of control whether it be at the federal, state or local level.

Admittedly, there is more opportunity to exercise some local judgment if government control is only at the local level and, to a lesser degree if it is at the state level. It is easier to repair glaring errors in a local or state set-up than it is in a federal system. But the net result will be pretty much the same for government control of the field of education and ideas is counter to the American system which carries a conviction that the free enterprise system is superior to a government control system such as is now practiced in Russia.

If it is true that the private enterprise system is best and most valuable in the field of, say, medicine, then it ought to be true in the field of education. If there is objection to the kind of thinking that holds that "the government owes everyone a living" then there ought to be objection to the same kind of thinking that "the government owes everyone an education." To establish this we need only to look at the field of religion wherein, under private enterprise and with a minimum of government aid and control (tax exemptions for church groups and religious bodies) there is no lack of opportunity for anyone to obtain all of the religious instruction he can and will take on a voluntary

Certainly the people are no less concernd with the ability of children to read and write than they are with presenting the children with means of obtaining religious training and instruction. But should there be offered a bill in Congress to establish a state religion and force through the use of the tax pistol the people of this country to support such a state religion there would be such a hue and cry as to completely destroy any such attempt.

Any other approach to the two questions can only establish that the public or government school supporter finds it impossible to be consistent in his thinking unless he also supports government religion. And when public or government school supporters are questioned along these lines they have no logical and reasonable answers and either resort to silence or avoid the topic. They quickly realize that they are in an untenable position and are advocating a philosophy that might makes right and that there are no inalienable rights for Amer-

Bricker Amendment In the last chapter of his book "The United Nations, Road to War" Dr. Watts points out how mportant it is that the American people adopt some sort of safeguard to the Constitution. After urging the passage of the Bricker Amendment he writes:

"Americans must rededicate themselves to their own Revolution and resume the struggle for freedom. They must prepare to spend their entire lives in it.

Then Dr. Watts finishes his book under the heading of "Continue

the Revolution" as follows: "For two generations the Eevolution has lost headway. As the a confidence born of freedom itself - puts them at the mercy of ambitious and shallow men who are greedy for power or who do not understand the meaning of

"While America was clearly a land of limited government and individual freedom, it acted as a revolutionary force throughout all the world. It did not exert this influence mainly by force of arms although American adventurers did volunteer for fighting in revolutionary forces everywhere. Primarily America promoted revolution by its example of freedom at home and voluntary cooperation

"More than this, America was itself a real-union of nations. People of all races and creeds came here, and they learned to work together in peace.

"At the same time it was a federation of states, and it grew as new states formed, adopted limited, republican constitutions and applied for admission to the

"Americans used to dream that in this way many nations might gather into this and similar peaceful federations, spreading the rule of law throughout the world. For they had (and still have) a political system of government that could become a United Nations of the world, not through conquest

but through voluntary association. "But for the other nations to want to join such a federation, they must have more incentive than these United States now give them. Why should the thinking people of any country want to join us today to share the costs and dangers of subsidizing and defending 40 other nations and a billion

America was never entirely free from coercive collectivism,

just as it was not entirely free from private violence, or crime. But after 1913, it suffered a serious reaction toward collectivism, both economic and military. The Federal Reserve Act made the banks of this country serve political policy as banks have been forced to do in other lands throughout most of recorded history. The incometax amendment gave the federal citizen's income. Military conscription was adopted in 1917.

"These measures - control over the currency, incomes and manpower - enabled the U.S. Government to wage three 'preventive' wars. In each of these wars colectivism gained new ground in its reaction against the American Rev-

"What is the 'Voice of Ameri-

ca' today? It is a government broadcasting system which by its very name and existence belies the individualism and free enterprise America once stood for. This 'Voice' and the United States Information Service may arouse the envy and covetousness of people in other lands by boasting of our automobiles and bathtubs but such socialist agencies can hardly teach faith in free enterprise which they themselves infringe. Instead, by advertising TVA, FHA, 'foreign aid social security and other collectivistic policies, the foreign propaganda of our federal government supports the communist line concerning American prosperity. That line is that our prosperity is due to an abundance of natural resources, and that government had to adopt the socialist program in order to distribute the wealth

and prevent overproduction. "Similarly, government agencies spend countless millions of dollars each year to preach to our own citizens the pagan gospel of coercive collectivism as practiced by CCC, USES, REA, PHA, FCA, IVA, FHA, and a host of other legal violations of peace, freedom

and moral law. "Is it any wonder that so many modern 'progressives' and 'liberals' look to the communists for leadership when America itself adopts so many of the communist proposals? Even the government's foreign aid' program to fight communism consists of forced levies on Americans to subsidize creeping socialism abroad.

While this trend towards statism continues in America, no military effort will stop communism or establish lasting peace. Atom bombs are useless against the infiltration of communist ideas when used as an excuse to extend collectivist policies in this country.

The work and propaganda of socialist agencies in our own government make communists faster than the FBI can possible identify

"Peace comes when people want freedom for others as well as for themselves, and when they use force, legal or illegal, only in defense against aggression. Therefore Americans will be able to promote peace in the world only as they know enough about the meaning of peace to stop the legal aggressions within their own land.
