



WASHINGTON -UP- Rep. Victor Wickersham (D-Okla.) Tuesday explained low he got a share in what he calls a "wildcat" oil deal in Florida without putting up a nickel of his own.

Wickersham said he took an option a couple of months ago on 17,650 acres of land at \$10 an acre in the Everglades. The land was held by the estate of an O'lahoma friend, J. A. McDougal, he said.

Wickersham said he later assigned his option to a Florida-Virginia syndicate in exchange for 5 per cent interest in the ownership of the land. The syndicate bought the land under the option, which at \$10 an acre, would be \$176,000. Wickersham said he is entitled to 5. per cent of whatever the syndicate may get if it sells the land. If it sells at the same price, he would get \$8,824.

The land is under exploration for oil, Wickersham said. His share of any oil is 1-20 of 1-2 of 1-8, he said or one barrel out of 1.280 under terms of the agreemnt.





Average daily production totaled 6,594,475 barrels, the journal said. Texas output dropped 15.875 bar rels daily and Louisiana 9,900. This was partially offset by climb of 8,300 barrels in Oklahoma

and 10,700 in Kansas. Alabama production declined 100 barrels, Arkansas 400, Colorado 3,-300, Florida 25, Nebraska 200, New Mexico 3,500, North Dakota 1,500

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



Good Target

We should like to give a round of applause for some very courageous people. They are the ones responsible for the formation of a new organization which has as its avowed purpose, the repeal of the 16th Amendment. Some of the persons responsible for this new aggregation are: publisher Mary Cain, editor Frank Chodorov, actor Charles Coburn, and Governor J. Braken Lee of Utah. Corinne Griffith is honorary chairman and retired Admiral William H. Standley is one of the directors.

Now, in this day of tensions and tribulations there are always those who cry out in alarm if anyone mentions the thought that taxes can be lowered, or, as in this case, that a specific tax can be repealed.

But it is so patently apparent that our problems stem from excessive government that it is hard to find substance behind the squeals.

The proponents of repeal in this organization point out that the Sixteenth Amendment (the income tax amendment) authorizes the federal government to assess ANY DEGREE of taxation upon you that it may desire. If the amendment were to be repealed they list these benefits: Every payday you could take home all the money you have earned, instead of giving some to Uncle. This would mean an immediate and sizeable increase in pay for nearly every wage-earner in this country. Further, your future earning power will not, be limited by the fear that the more you make, the larger the share Uncle will get his fingers on. It means a reducing the size of the federal government, for if the money isn't there to pay the bureaucrats, they will just have to go some place else.

There is one point we haven't been able to locate in the literature of the "Organization to Repeal Federal Incomes Taxes." That is, that if this amendment were repealed it would mean the end of a great deal of federal snooping and peeking. By rights, what a man earns and has is his own business. Yet, ever since this amendment was passed, the federal government has usurped the right of prying into our private affairs, peeking into our bank accounts, checking up on your debtors and creditors, in an effort to catch you in the embarrassing position of earning a buck you don't reveal.

Can you imagine the freedom you would experience if you actually were able to keep the state of your finances as your own private business? It's a wonderful and a brave idea. Good luck to the patriots who are under-

(Christian Economics)

The Communist strategists will settle for a middle-of-the-road policy because the trend of the middle is constantly leftward. The middle of today is the far left of yesterday, and the far left of today is the middle of tomorrow.

Today federal housing, governent ownership of utilities, social security, federal subsidy for ducation and confiscatory taxaion on larger incomes and estates are considered middle - of-the-road measures. Twenty-five years ago they would have been considered extremely radical. Is there any reason to believe that the middle can ever be anchored? Does it not of necessity continually move loward the left?

Government intervention always essens the amount of goods avail-

ble, creates more problems than solves and sets up a demand for further intervention. It prevents the adjustments that would maintain balance between the goods and services brought to the market by the various groups of producers. It retards the shifting of labor and capital away from the production of things that are not wanted as much as other things and into the production of things that the people want and for which they are ready to pay. It causes overproduction of less wanted things and underproduction of more wanted things. It keeps farmers producing wheat, corn and butter in excess of what the people will buy at the prices asked and retards the shift toward using available facilities for the production of goods the people want and would my. Any degree of government Intervention, that is any interference with the free market, results in less satisfaction of human

The Reach of Government That government must do some

things we are all acced, but unless we succeed in limiting the scope of its power and functions, freedom will eventually disappear as the reach of governnent grows wider and stronger. It is not possible to go on exanding government and surrendering parts of our freedom without eventually losing it all. Communists much prefer this process to that of conquest by war. The latter is destructive and dangerous; the former is headed toward the same goal and requires much

less effort and risk. The use of the terms right and left is confusing. It indicates that we have a choice and that there are different ways of doing things with equal effectiveness. There is right way and a wrong way of handling our economic affairs. Let us substitute the terms right and wrong for right and left. It would

Thus when we have depressions caused by labor unions refusing o cooperate and adjust wages on free market basis, something has to be done to help those whom the labor unions have deprived of their natural rights.
