





## Middle Of The Road

Ever since his presidential campaign, President Eisenhower has liked to call himself a "middle of the roader." This is understandable.

Ike made an appeal to voters which was voiced in terms of a "crusade," but in action he has resembled the tortoise in the race.

His cries of "skullduggery" in Washington, designed to win him the following of those who are acquainted with that den of corruption, have been drowned in a carefully studied lack of action designed to keep him in the clear with the lefties and other collectivists.

In short, Eisenhower found that he could and did win popular support by deception. He made promises to the vociferous right-wingers and violated those promises for the vociferous left-wingers.

This does not mean that lke was more corrupt than a dozen preceding presidents. It merely means that the business of getting to be president today calls for such wide-spread popularity that to cop the plum, a man must APPEAR to be all things to all people. Such an accomplishment is manifestly impossible. But if a man can get people to BELIEVE that, he is everything that could be desired, that is all that is required in politics.

As Vice President Richard Nixon expressed it when he was running for the Senate in California: "The important thing is TO GET ELECTED. However high your motives may be, they are meaningless unless you WIN. Therefore, you must win at ANY COST.

It is for these reasons that President Eisenhower is happy to be known as a "middle of the roader." It is because he thinks it means that he is popular. He believes it means that in him can be found a common denominator. The elements of both extremes would rather gravitate to a partially acceptable MIDDLE GROUND than repudiate their position entirely and lose to an extremist from the opposite end of the political spectrum. At least, that is what he thinks.

But there are signs which give indication that a change may be in the wind. For while it would be true that a man in the middle might attract elements from both sides, it is equally true that such a position is highly indefensible. It is possible that a man in the middle can repel so many from either side that instead of being the "most popular American" he could, in fact, become the least popular. A veering of the wind which affects that fickle lady of fortune and Mr. Eisenhower may find himself on the slag heap of used and discarded politicos.

There are indications that just such a fate may overtake the man who has continued to support General Marshall and repudiate Senator McCarthy. For we have noticed in a spate of left-wing publications considerable criticism of late aimed at the Gettysburg farmer. He just hasn't gone far enough toward collectivism to please the social compulsionists. From the other side of the pasture there has been a strong and growing movement which is opposed to Eisenhower on the grounds that he has failed to follow out the terms of his own self-imposed "crusade." He is charged with being a Democrat in all but name, and it is not a term of endearment when a man is referred to as an "Eisenhower Republican."

Should it happen that the President be foresaken by both left and right wings, he will be left with nothing but the highly impressionable middle, an area in political life which is unpredictable and dangerous. On occasion the insenate center has slugged it out on principles, although of late it has knuckled under to promises and rewards for good behavior. Political fortune is indeed a strange and unpredictable goddess.

Pundits on the American scene have often noticed how the strange phenomenon of popularity works. A man on the very crest of public acclaim can be plummeted to the depths in the twinkling of an eye. In fact, the higher the rise to general acclaim, the swifter the descent once the bottom drops out.

For our part, we have always viewed the so-called "middle ground" as no man's land. It is either straddled by politicos who fear to let you know the truth of their convictions, or it is occupied by opportunists who await the next chance to compromise.

We Americans traditionally detest the appeaser, the apologist, the straddler. And we we shall not shed a tear if those who insist on compromise find themselves in turn compromised right out of Washington. We need men and women in this country who have strong and virile beliefs and who will fight for them to the last. kindness charity (or love) . . . he-



"The whole problem of our time is not lack of knowledge but lack of love," according to Thomas Merton, Cistercian monk born in France and now a member of the Trappist monastery at Gethsem-

He was showing how the government advocating mass evacuation of the larger cities promoted fear. Then he continues: "There are signs that a great

many ordinary sensible people among civilian defense volunteers regard mass evacuation as disastrous folly. Some of the areas around New York City, like Westchester County, have talked about putting up road-blocks to shut off any unmanageable rabble of refugees. Only recently the Civilian Defense director of Philadelphia complained that neighboring suburban districts are refusing to cooperate in the plan to dump two million city dwellers in their laps, with no feasible way to feed or lodge them. He spoke, naturally, of an urgent need for compulsive legislation to force them to do the impossible and commit the ultimate lunacy.

"At the core of the mass evacuation policy lies a refusal to face ugly facts. The people in charge tell the public that an air raid on any large city with nuclear fission bombs will inevitably cost many thousands of dead and wounded, unless their plan is adopted. As a corollary, they encourage the illusion that everybody can just go out into the country and be safe, although it is more than likely that eventual casualties would be very heavy, not to mention the complete dislocation of our intricate industrial system. "Officials apparently lack the courage to explain, or perhaps do not themselves understand, that civil defense does not mean saving as many lives as possible, at any cost. It means training a

works, its basic system of supply. "The duty of civilians in modern war, as in past wars, is to keep things going somehow, no matter what danger may threaten them. To carry out that mission calls for extraordinary courage: steadiness and devotion. That men can summon those qualities, when they are defending their homes, we know, from the lessons taught us by the people of London and Leningrad, Berlin and Tokyo, who stood up bravely under saturation bombing.

"What they need from official sources is elementary instruction in rescue work, fire control and precautionary measures which may mean the difference between death and survival. Certainly they must be taught to go under cover, inadequate though it may be, while the bombers are overhead. But, when the danger has passed for a little while, they must be preand go back to work. Civilian population in heavily bombed areas will face in any new war a terrible ordeal, as they did in the past war. What is the point of trying to conceal that fact, by pretending that mass evacuation can save their lives without disrupting the whole intricate organization of industrial society?

"The danger of the present policy is even more serious when you consider that it must be founded on a constant overemphasis on the imminence of war. If the people are to be frightened into acceptance of flight as the only solution, it is necessary to heighten every possible danger and paint every

peril in the most lurid colors. 'Nothing else could justify some of the proposals we hear. Under any other circumstances a national leader who suggested laying miles of concrete culvert along our highways, into which people would crawl for shelter, might be certified as a dangerous lunatic.

"Seven or eight years ago, when a new civilian defense was first considered, officials in charge retained some balance. The emphasis was on training people to take shelter in their own cellars or in home-made shelters, provided with a small stock of food and water, a battery radio and elementary fire-fighting equipment. Teams of volunteers were to carry out the same duties as block wardens in England in the last war. Some attempt was made to coordinate the activities of doctors and nurses, hospitals, fire companies and police departments.

"The central idea was sound since it was based on a courageous policy of sticking it out, and seeing it through, just as men in the armed forces are expected to do. Only in the past year or so has this sensible notion been exchanged for the promotion of mass evacuation, based on a public relations campaign of inspired panic.

"The results are already evident in 1) a grossly overcharged picture of what r.ight happen, always assuming that a potential enemy could drop H-bombs with pinpoint accuracy; 2) a consistent effort to present total and disastrous war as just around the corner. In all the propaganda, facts are conspicuously ignored, and and simple measures of protection

### The Doctor Says By EDWIN J. JORDAN, M. D.

There are a lot of things which the medical profession does not know and one of them is touched on in today's first inquiry. Q-My sister has been told she had a virus infection in her system for the past three years, and that this is a three-to five-year illness. She gets frequent weak and nervous spells and I should

like you to discuss this.

B. E. M. A-Of course, I cannot say whether your sister's spells and difficulty are due to a virus but can only discuss virus infections in general terms. It is uncertain in most cases just how long a virus infection lasts, that is how long the virus remains active and disease producing in the human

In all probability, this will vary from one virus to another and from one person to another. For example, in the case of vaccination for smallpox, it is probable that the virus remains active for only a short time. A cold sore or herpes simplex which is considered a virus disease is sometimes believed to harbor an active virus for years at a time.

Under such circumstances, the ovaries continue to manufacture their hormones so that the menopause, in the medical sense, does not occur until the age when the hormone secretion of the ovaries tend to fall

off anyway. If both ovaries are removed at the time of the hysterectomy one has what is known as an artificial or surgically produced menopause. This would carry the same variation in symptoms and differences which would occur at the usual menopause among different wom-



Both McCarthy and Jenner had bitterly attacked Marshall, questioning his competence and loyalty Mr. Truman several times had called Marshall the "greatest living American."

Look, in an article in its current issue, said the former Democratic President has been in Washington four times since he departed in 1953 but never has been invited to the White House,

When Mr. Eisenhower went to Kansas City in October, 1953, Mr. Fruman telephoned the GOP President's suite at the Muehlebach Hotel to say he would like to pay his respects, the magazine said. It said the phone call was never returned.


