



## The Truth And Lie

Those who are familiar with the "Communist Line" have often remarked its twistings and turnings. Karl Marx, in setting down the doctrine of class warfare, stated in simple terms that the Communists disdained to hide their objectives.

Yet at the same time Marx made it clear that they would stop at nothing - murder, theft, dishonesty of every character - in order to accomplish their aims. The validity of both of these statements became quickly apparent.

The aim, according to Marx, was the "abolition of all private property." To accomplish this objective did not mean that property itself was to be destroyed. Rather, private ownership was to be destroyed and public ownership substituted. In short, the government was to possess and own all property . . . and then would dole it out to the people on the basis of need, according to government standards. The people would never own it. They would merely use it. This, then, is the ESSENCE of COMMUNISM.

But in this very same document which contained the far-flung Manifesto of Revolution, Marx went even further. He stated that the "revolution" would be conducted until ALL existing governments fell. That the pieces of these governments would be picked up and welded together in a great super-world government, the "dictatorship of the proletariat."

Then, said Marx, this government, too, would vanish. It would disappear and all that would be left would be a delightfully anarchistic society in which compulsion was no more!

Here, then was the first big truth and the first big lie of the communist program. The truth of the aim of communism is the abolitin of private property. The lie is that huge world dictatorship would ultimately fade away.

Why did Marx put in the lie about the "dictatorship" fading away? Those who have written biographies of the great phony have pried into the political situation as it existed in the time of Marx. They have shown that prior to Marxian dialectics, one of the most powerful political pressure groups was the anarchists.

It is clearly apparent that Marx desired to win as adherents to his new materialistic religion these same people who were disenchanted with the efficacy of government. Without their help, he felt that he could not succeed in his purpose. Therefore, since his gims were directly opposite to those of the anarchists he resorted to the "big lie" technique in order to win them to his

cause well knew that the anarchists were discouraged For long generations they had propounded the theory "the least government the better." Therefore, since he was desirous of lining them up with his revolution, he had to resort to falsehood.

He pointed out to them that the business of eliminating government had never been successful through all the ages of man. The reason for this, he said, was that government resorted to force, and that a lack of force was just not capable of resisting force. Therefore, he advocated a great new force, a new, all powerful government which could successfully take on all other governments and eliminate them. Internal class revolu-

tion was his proposal. Then, said he, the big dictatorship thus formed would just disappear. This had an immediate appeal to his listeners and readers of a hundred years ago. They were led to believe that his aim actually was anarchy. But that his methods of achieving it were dramatic and new and worthy of effort. Consequently, Marx was able at that time to suck into his ideology, persons whose desires were the opposite of his, but who were fooled into believing that Marx had a new METHOD for achieving what they wanted. The rise of socialism and ever more powerful and tyrannous states throughout the world has

It is time now to isolate the communist germ. It is imperative that those who would oppose it, understand it. It cannot be combatted which is not understood.

By definition, communism is the opposite of anarchy. The one does NOT lead into the other. They are at opposite ends of the political spectrum. Communism moves toward the left, the red, the infra red, the compulsion and power of governments. Communism is wholly dependent upon compulsion. To do away with private property permanently requires that constant force be administered AGAINST persons so that they may never own anything but only use those things which the government in its wisdom deems that they need at a given

If the force of government is removed, people will quickly revert to a natural state in which they will look after themselves, purchase and own property and mind their own business. Communism is complete artificiality, controlled by the force of government.

By definition, the old-style anarchist was the man who didn't believe in government. But he allowed himself to be drawn into the Marxian tangle of compulsion so that he could help to bring about the downfall of governments through force and violence. The anarchist, as well as the Marxist became known as the man with the smoking bomb who was seeking to destroy the existing social order. But such individuals are no better than Communists, for they have succumbed to the red argument that violence can beget non-violence. And this

Today there is a new breed of men who view ancient anarchy and Marxism with the same abhorrence. They cannot be called "anarchists" since they are not against

government in a violent sense. Through reason, logic and love, they advocate independence of thinking, honesty and purity. They give their allegiance to freedom and to the right of the individual to live his own life in peace and harmony, without government interference or compulsion. They move toward the right of the political spectrum, away from the red and toward the ultra-violet. They believe in spiritual reality. They support and espouse moral integrity. They seek to practice intellectual honesty through

kindness and logic.

They believe in private property, private rights,

and minding one's own business. We are in sympathy and harmony with their point

Road To Liberty And

Hans F. Sennholz in his book "How Can Europe Survive?" under the chapter "Liberation of Man" explains the road to liberty and international peace in this

"If international cooperation is to be restored and peace is to return to mankind, the ideologies and policies of government interventionism and socialism must be abandoned. The individual must be freed from the multiplicity of infringements upon his liberty oy the public, i. e., the majority of his fellow men, and the individual must regain the right to the product of his own labor. Special privileges to any person or group of persons must be denied because they are identical with infringements on the rights of others. The granting of benefits by government violates the principle of liberty in that it limits the liberty of others. Special privileges in the form of income or of position in the market for goods and services and special protection of certain producers and professions should be abolished. Special protection in the form of sanctioned monopolies, prohibition of competition, fixed prices by governmental decree, and prohibition of the free movement of goods across political borders, all are measures of government privilege and protection that must be abolished. The principle of 'no special privilege' must be acknowledge as the fundamental principle of the liberal so-

"All regional and national divisions should only be regarded as convenient divisions in the administration of safety and security of individuals by governments. If the attitude were held, it would be easily recognized that all limitations on trade are disadvantageous to all concerned. The functions of the state must be limited to securing the protection of life and property, a limitation which would eliminate the problem of boundaries. If the functions of the state are thus limited and no privileges can be attained through control over the apparatus of the state, it becomes a matter of utter indifference whether the state extends over a large or small territory and which state affords the individual's security of life and property. In a liberal society individuals all over the world could cooperate, and economic causes for conflict would no longer exist. "If the individual were freed

from constant government interference and tutelage, he would go where the conditions of life would be most favorable for him. He would work and produce at a place offering the most suitable conditions for production. Thus individuals would migrate continually from places where the natural conditions of production are less favorable to places where they are more favorable. It is true, migration of individuals of various nationalities would create national minority problems. But these problems would be limited to cases of individual discrimination. The state whose function would be restricted to safeguarding life and property could not conceivably grant privileges and favors like the state founded on interventionism and socialism and in which political decisions have an enormous significance in the life of the indi-

"The nations of Europe have the following alternative: either to continue their policies of government interventionism and socialism with their inherent seeds of conflct and disunity, or to abolish all infringements upon the liberty of individuals and establish a liberal society. Whether or not the European nations will cooperate and live in peace depends on this very choice.

Under the heading of " A Free-Trade Area" Mr. Sennholz reinforces his position with this state-

"There is but one way to unify Europe. Nations eager to unify must abandon their government welfare and socialist ideologies and return to policies of individual liberty and free trade. All restrictive and protective measures within the union, as well as toward the outside world, must be abandoned. Where only free trade and individual liberty exist, there are cooperation and union.

"The theory of international trade forms one of the most complicated subject matters of economic theory. In this age of utter disregard for economics the theory of international trade is rejected because it conflicts with the basic tenets of the ideology of government welfare and socialism.'

Moral Principles Necessary The author explains the importance of moral principles in this

"But there is still another aspect of American and European security that is far more important than the preparedness expressed in the number of men and horsepowers. This is the strength of spirit and ideas which cause us to act. Armed might cannot ultimately be depended upon if our minds disdain the spirit and ideas of selfdefense. Rulers and nations who have rejected this fundamental principle of human action have fallen before the assault of their enemies. And we, as well as they, must finally fall if our minds embrace the spirit and ideas of weakness and self-destruction.





Shepperd disclosed at Longview Sunday night that his offices have been checking for more than a week reports of Klan activity in Baby Celita Smyth, Miami, Tex. East Texas, where the majority of the state's Negro population is cen-

He said he had met with inves Mrs. Laraine Walker, 1008 Var- tigators in "various trouble spots" and it was apparent that Klan or Homer Hollars, 1001 Mary Ellen ganizers have been active in "a

"As far as we can determine. the attorney general said, "Klan promoters have been rebuffed by responsible local citizens and we Mrs. Beulah Phillips, Lexington, hope no active functioning group has yet been organized.'

Shepperd said he was convinced that the Klan is making a concerted drive to recruit Texans and appealed to East Texans to steer clear of the organization.

"There is no reason or purpose for the Ku Klux Klan in Texas in 1955," Shepperd said. "We must throw out these hoodlums and hate mongers.

Shepperd said all state agencies were pledged to fight against the Klan and local prosecutors have been alerted to watch for signs of it. He said the laws of Texas provide stiff penalties for operation of any masked or hooded organiza-

The Klan obviously hopes to States against the U.S. Supreme Court decision on integration in the public schools," Shepperd said, This decision may be opposed in an orderly peaceful and legal man

The attorney general revealed ast week that a stream of anti-Negro, anti-Jew and anti-Catholic literature was being mailed around the state from Waco
