Sampler lo Test For Radioactivity

AUSTIN, May 10 - A high volume air sampler installed on the roof of the State Department of Health here will show any increases in radioactive "fallout" resulting from nuclear bomb tests now being conducted in the Pacific.

The air sampler, capable of sampling more than 1500 cubic feet of air every day is designed to trap air-borne radioactive particles on a think pink filter pad. When read daily, increase in radioactivity occurring on any given day are apparent.

The instrument was installed two w aks ago as part of a sprawling count to coast network of 39 monitoring stations. It was provided by t's U.S. Public Health Service and the Atomic Energy Commission to got quick, first hand records of rad'cactive fallout reaching the United States from the Eniwetok Provir; Grounds where test firings began last Friday.

"Fallout" is the term applied to particles of matter atomized and made radioactive by expanding super weapons and drawn into the atmosphere by updrafts. The particles eventually settle back to

The distance they travel, wafted by ar currents at tremendous by ar currents at tremendous heights, is one of the questions the detection network is expected to

State Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle said first readings from the 24-hour operation were made April 19, well in advance of the actual beginning dates of the nuclear weapons tests.

State Health Department radia-tion engineers in charge of the air sampler say radioactive particles are constantly present in the at-mosphere in small but measurable quantities, coming chiefly from materials contained in soils blown from other areas. The filter readings obtained prior to the Pacific tests helped establish existing levels of natural radiation.

Readings taken to date have VALUATION shown variations in normal background raiation up to five times greater than minimum values. These values are all within safe

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Alliance In Congress

Leaders of a new North-South coalition are mustering forces for their first test of strength in Congress.

Clarence E. Manion, co-chairman of For America, which represents the northern partner in the new alliance, indicates the importance of the issue:

"Any Congressman or Senator who does not go all out for the speedy passage of this bill is either dumb to the constitutional wickednes of judicial legislation or in league with those who are determined to destroy states rights. In either case such Congressman or Senator is disqualified for service in this emergency and should be retired by the voters."

The bill is a little-noted states rights measure penaing before the Judiciary Committees of the House and Senate. Hearings have been held on the House bill, spansored by Rep. Howard W. Smith (D Va.), and are promised for the companion Senate measures introduced by Sens. William E. Jenner (R Ind.), John L. McClellan D Ark.) and 11 other southerners.

Manion's sentiments are fully shared by members of the Federation for Constitutional Government, the coordinating agency for white citizens councils in 11 southern states. The southern federation and For America have come together on both political principles and a strategy for 1956, aimed at throwing the Presidential election into the House of Representatives.

The southern federation was born to fight the Supreme Court's segregation decision. Smith says his bill has nothing to de with segregation." Nevertheless, it is the focus of the new coalition's first legislative effort.

Smith's bill was prompted by a 1954 Pennsylvania supreme court decision invalidating that state's anti-subversives law. The decision, involving a Communist leader named Steve Nelson, was affirmed April 2 by a 6-3 majority of the United Sates Supreme Court,

The majority opinion held that the anti-Communist laws passed by Congress in recent years imply "the inescapable conclusion" that "Congress has intended to occupy the field of sedition" legislation and leave "no room . . , for the states to supplement it." The court's minority said it "should not void state legislation without a clear mandate from Congress."

Since the early 1800's the Supreme Court has assumed the power to decide in cases like Congress does or does not intend to exclude parallel state legislation. Critics of this practice call it "preemption by implication" and "judicial legislaton."

Smith intends to stop this. He was the author of the 1940 Smith Act, one of the bills cited by the Supreme Court as indicating an intention by Congress to occupy the entire field of anti-sedition legislation. But Smith says, "I never dreamed . . . the states (would be) precluded form enacting a law to protect themselves."

The Nelson case, he says, "is merely a symptom of the dangerous disease that threatens to destroy completely the sovereignty of the states." His remedy therefore, is stated in general terms. It says:

Courts shall not assume that an act of Congress is intended to bar state legislation on the subject "unless such act contains an express provision to that effect" or there is a "direct and positive conflict" between the federal and state law "so that the cannot be reconciled or consistently stand together."

Smith's bill would protect states rights not only in the field of anti-sedition laws but also in the broad areas of public welfare, commerce, public power and natural gas, aviation and labor legislation.

Support has come for the bill from many persons and groups who do not share the specific political goals of For America or the Federation for Constitutional Gov-

Lined up in favor of it are the American Farm Bureau Federation, the National Association of Manufactufers, the Chamber of Commerce and committees of the American Bar Association and the National Association of Attorneys General.

The only opponents on the record are the Justice Department, the AFL-CIO and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The new-found allies of the southern segregationist and northern nationalist movements welcome outside support for the measure. But they have their own reasons for backing it: To slap at the Supreme Court, strike a blow for states rights, demonstrate the success of their collaboration and, most of all, encourage their backers to further political ventures inside and outside Congress.

Thanks For Reader's Comments

I want to reproduce a letter from reader Clyde Dawson in regard to my article under the heading "Was There Ever a Need for Labor Unions?" It is readers like Mr. Dawson who help a writer be more careful in saying what he

means. I was careless in saying that increased production was beneficial because whatever is produced willy-nilly has to be distributed in order to benefit the owner of this production. I should have qualified this by saying, "Under a free and unhampered economy where the government did not interfere by subsidies every one was benefited. I also should have qualified my

statment that any arrangement that increases total production is beneficial to mankind. I should have limited this by saying that anything that increased production that people wanted and were willing to pay for benefited mankind. I thank Mr. Dawson for pointing out my errors in my statements. Here's the way he put it: "Mr. R. C. Hoiles, Santa Ana, California, Dear Sir: Under the heading, 'Was There Ever A Need for Labor Unions?' you write, 'And any arrangement that increases total production is beneficial to mankind.' I presume this means durable goods as well as agricultural products. You continue, 'It is beneficial because whatever is produced willy-nilly has to be distributed in order to benefit the owner of this production.' Later you ask if there are

any questions. "Recently the President of the United States told us that we are paying \$1,000,000 per day for storage for crops for which there is no demand in the marts of trade. Government agencies have for years tried to cut total production of livestock and grains. Just today I heard of a plant near here which supplies parts for automobiles, being closed because of an over supply of cars. The rulers of many labor unions have tried to curtail production. One example is prohibiting the use of spray guns in painting and limiting the size of paint brushes.

"You say increasing total production is beneficial because whatever is produced has to be distributed in order to benefit the owner of this production. At present only a protion of his production is distributed - the balance is bought with tax money and either destroyed or stored or sold at a fraction of its market value.

"I don't see how an increase in total production is beneficial to mankind until a better method of distribution is devised. When this country is unable to distribute what it produces today, would not an increase in production merely add to the problem? We know that rancher near Anaheim Calif., plowed under ten acres of cabbage because he could not sell it for enough money to pay for har-

"For about twenty-five years the government has been buying and withholding from distribution a portion of our production in order that the balance could be sold at a profit. And during this same period, many of our citizens have had to do without the things they needed. Since we the people have subscribed to bureaucratic rule of our lives and property. why wouldn't it be a good idea to just have the government tax us enough to buy up all that we produce and distribute it evenly? At least we wouldn't be paying twice for the same goods. Clyde

If free market prices were the guide, the price would tell people what to produce. Of course, producing a perishable commodity, one runs the risk of erring in what people want produced. When too many people produce cabbage or tomatoes or any other perishable crop and they run the risk of a loss. That is the risk all must take under freedom. If prices, however, in surplus crops were permitted to drop to merely pay for the marketing and there were no artificial costs in marketing due to labor monopolies or any other monopolies, the amount of surpluses consumed would be a great deal larger than it is where prices are maintained artificially.

While the producer often takes a loss in producing perishable products he often also makes a large profit. This averages out over the years to the profits from producing products that will keep. The customer is the boss of what he wants produced when the government does not inter-



that forcing # left - handed child to use the right hand causes stuttering. It is not wise to make a left-handed child use the right hand. But a broad view expressed by Dr. Barbara in a book on stuttering (Julian Press, \$5) says, "Stuttering is not to be considered as an isolated disorder of the speech mechanism but as an outward expression of a more basic character disorganization."

THE ATTACK on speech defects

(including stuttering) should come as soon as possible after such difficulty is first noticed.

It is important to get good advice since the management of speech defects depends, to a considerable degree, on the understanding by the parents and their handling of the situation. Furthermore there may be things in the home environment about which the parents are thoroughly unaware which are affecting the child's speech.

Much has been learned about stuttering and other speech defects and their treatment during recent years.

The results of proper treatment are often exceedingly good. In most cases a stutterer, or a child with some other speech defect, should have expert guidance from one of the speech clinics spotted around the country. Information on them can be obtained from the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, 11 South La Salle St.,

THE BOOKIET on stuttering prepared with the advice and guidance of the American Speech and Hearing Association and Society for Crippled Children and Adults is a good source of information as is the book on stuttering by Dr. Dominic Barbara previously mentioned.

It is important to remember that a youngster with stuttering or other speech defect will not simply outgrow the difficulty.

NAVY PAGE MR. MEANY AND THE TEAMSTERS

Chicago Daily Tribune President George Meany of the nerged AFL-CIO has called his executive council to a special meeting May 1 to consider the suspension of the teamsters unon, whose 1,300,000 members make it the biggest unit in organized labor.

It appears that Mr. Meany has the teamsters dead to rights if he wants to proceed against them. The AFL expelled the International Longshoremen's union in 1953 because it failed to get rid of the gangsters who ran it. Recently James Hoffa, who is the No. 2 if not the No. 1 man in the teamsters union, arranged to lend the ILA \$400,000.

Meany's protest stopped the Ioan, but the teamsters went ahead with a working agreement with the longshore bosses for joint organization drives. The AFL-CIO constitution forbids any affiliate to extend "recognition" to an expelled union, and that is the clause on which Meany is proceeding. Dave Beck, president of the teamsters, is prepared to argue that what his union has done doesn't constitute recognition. The executive council will hear

deal of argument that isn't going to affect its decision. What the international union bosses who constitute the council do will be governed by two considerations; how much they fear the teamsters, and what they might hope to accomplish by kicking them out of the club.

Many of them have good reason to be afraid. Presdient Beck has announced his intention of boosting his membership to three million. A worker doesn't have to drive a truck to be eligible. Filling station owners in Chicago suburbs were recenfly forced to pay dues on behalf of their attendants, who were not consulted in the matter, just because the teamsters could shut off gasoline deliveries to stations that weren't signed up.

In theory, at least, Messrs. Beck and Hoffa feel free to sign up anyone handling a product that is hauled at any time in a truck, and that includes just about all of the workers in the country, including those already affiliated with other craft or industrial unions. A current complaint against the teamsters union is that it has been rading the brewery workers union, using its power to shut off deliveries from breweries where it meets opposition. When it is remembered that

his dues collections are the bread and butter of any union boss, it is plain that leaders of other unions would be happy to retaliate against the teamsters, But they also have to consider what they would gain by suspending them. The AFL and CIO have never

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been much more than trade assocations. Occasionally they have come to the rescue of weater members, but usually the affiliated unions have run the national body, and not the national body the members.

Lawyers Guild May Come To Judgement

WASHINGTON - UP- The Na onal Lawvers Guild, which seemed always to be too hot for the toosevelt or Truman administraions to handle, is about to come

o judgment. The guild has not been judged et or, of course, convicted. But here is solid evidence that the or ganization was whomped up neary 20 years ago to serve the purposes of the Communist party, It may have changed stripes since If so, the guild has nothing to fear from the inquiry to which i now is subject by the subversive activities control board.

Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. ordered the guild in 1953 to register as a Communistdominated organization. The guild's appeal against that order was in the courts until this week when the Supreme Court threw it out. Attorneys general under former Presidents Roosevelt and Tru man did cite a large number of organizations as Communis fronts. But the guild consistently was overlooked although its record of Communist-front activities was notorious

A. A. Berle Jr., Justice Ferdinand Pecora, both of New York, were among the organizers of the guild. Another was the late associate Justice Robert H. Jackson. Berle, Pecora, Jackson and many others got out quickly when they liscovered the Communist taint,

"The National Lawyers Guild was formed," said Berle in his letter of resignation, "in the hopthat expression might be given t the liberal sentiment in the Amer ican bar.

"It is now obvious that the pres ent management of the guild is not prepared to take any stand which conflicts with the Communist party line. I have no further interest in it."

Pecora had been elected guild president before he got the word and quit. The guild was a slickly disguised outfit with enough muscle to prevent a citation during the Roosevelt and Truman administrations despite its public record.



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
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
