The little girl is a Korean, Kira Soon Koom, 11 years old, and she lives in He Yuk Van orphanage in Taegu, Korea. During the war, the child was found in a street in a Korean town in a dazed condition from malnutrition and with no known family.

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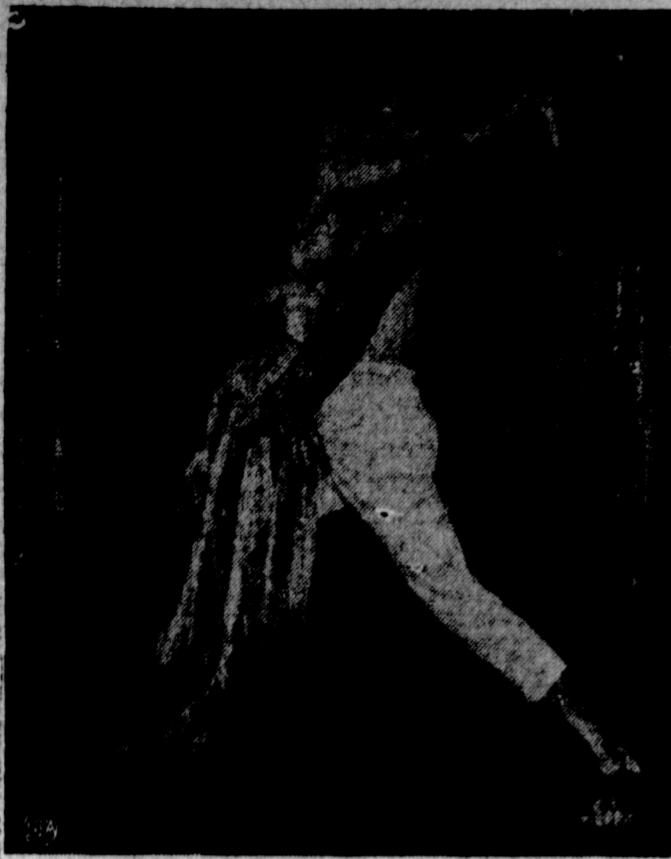

Companies cited in the semi-annual report include: Sunshine Dairy Foods of Pampa Plains Creamery of Amarillo, Borden of Amarillo, Kelly Creamery, Elk City, Okla., and Goldsmith Dairy of Amarillo and Borger for the past two months.

All producers and distributors with a Grade A rating have met government health standards Thorne said.

Petrov Started Something When He Quit Communism

Vladimir Petrov really started something when he decided that he was through with communism. He is the third secretary in the Russian embassy in Australia who turned himself over to the Australian secret service on April 13, 1954.

It happened that Petrov was also the Soviet spy chief in Australia. He turned over to the secret service, along with himself, an amazing assortment of documents on Russian espionage.

Petrov's disclosures led to the unmasking on Sept. 18 of missing British diplomat Donald D. MacLean and Guy F. Burgess as long-time Russian spies.

Now they have led the Australian Prime Minister Robert Gordon Menzies to decide on a national parliamentary election.

Menzies is expected to announce Tuesday that an election will be held on Dec. 10 or 17 for the 123 seats in the house of representatives and half of the 80 seats in the senate.

Heads Coalition Party Menzies is head of the governmental Liberal party — Country party coalition.

His opposition is the Labor party, led by Herbert V. Evatt.

No. 1 issue. He named some men closely connected with Evatt as of assistance to the Soviet spy apparatus.

The campaign is expected to be among Australians who had been of assistance to the Soviet spy apparatus.

Evatt has denounced the Petrov disclosures as "one of the most transparent political frauds in modern history."

But an Australian royal commission, which spent 10 months investigating the documents in question, held that they are authentic.

One of the documents named three aides of Evatt as having given information on politicians and newspaper men to agents of Petrov.

Tries to Cast Doubt Fergan O'Sullivan, Evatt's press chief, confessed on July 14 that he had provided a Petrov agent with a detailed report on Australian newspaper men.

Evatt has made a desperate attempt to cast doubt on the authenticity of the Petrov disclosures.

He finally took the singular course of writing a letter to Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov asking him if the Petrov papers were true.

To nobody's surprise, Molotov replied that of course they were not.

Evatt's disclosure of this correspondence astounded even his fellow Labor party leaders.

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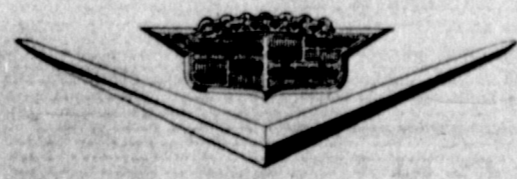

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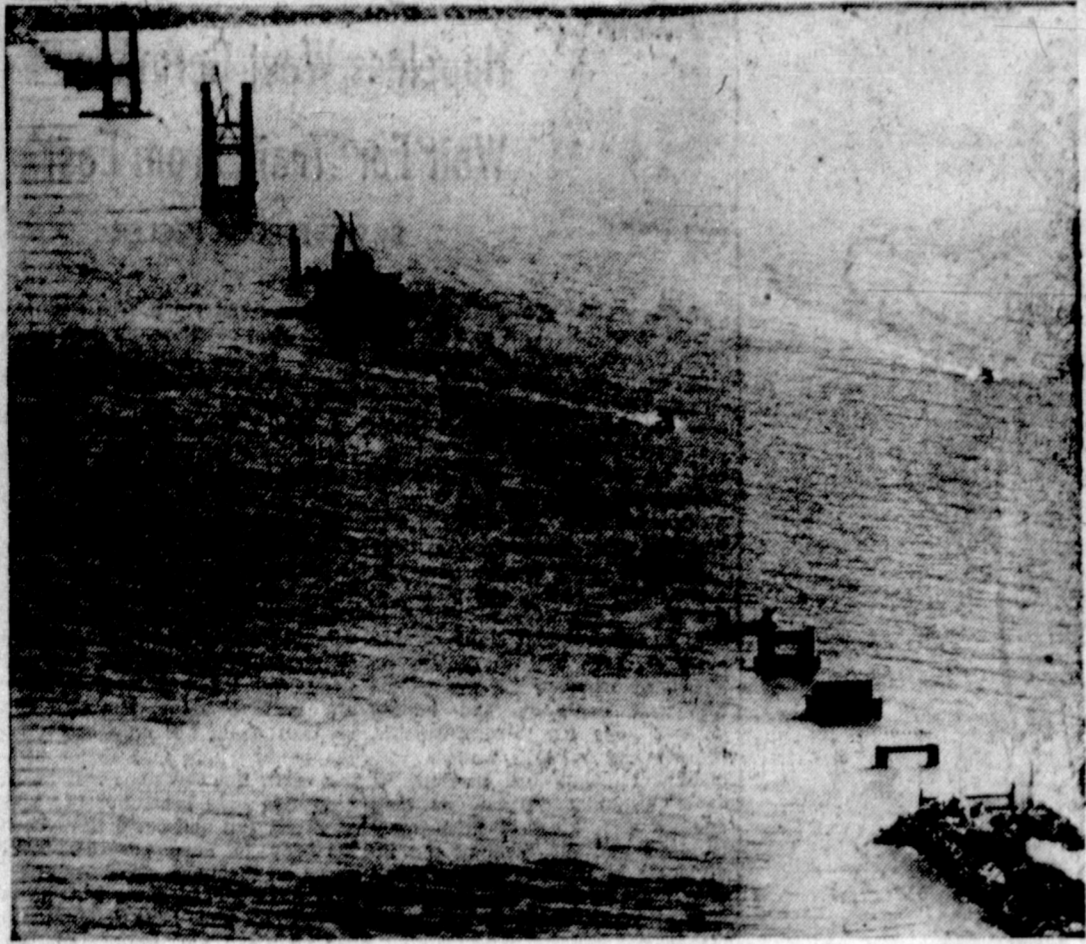

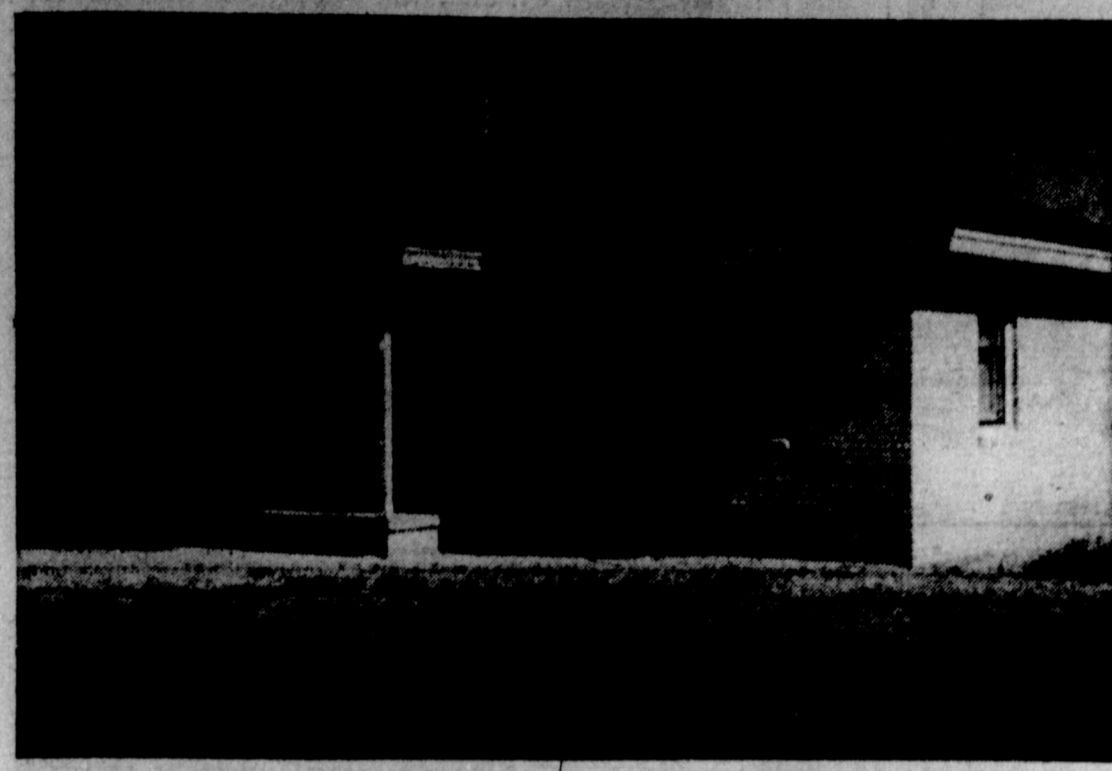

DENVER — UP — Backstairs at the temporary White House: Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall; Send ear muffs and long underwear. It started snowing in Denver Sunday. As the thermometer started down into the 20's, there was a quick and ready market for anti-freeze for the fleet of cars assigned to the White House staff.

Only man who enjoyed the snowfall at the temporary White House Sunday was Sherman Adams, the assistant to the President and former governor of New Hampshire. He said the snow made him feel at home.

Adams occasionally goes ice skating. The ponds hereabouts have not frozen yet, but before the President returns to the east, Adams will have plenty of opportunities to skate locally.

Favorite guessing game at Lowry Air Force Base where the White House offices are located is the exact date of the President's return to the East. The more educated guessers say November 3. Might be November 9 or 10, and then only back to Washington for a day or two to break the trip. Then to Gettysburg.

White House men back to Washington to rest up before the President makes his next move.

George Allen, one of the President's big buddies and farming partner at Gettysburg, is coming to town and probably will see the President in the next few days. Allen is better medicine for Mr. Eisenhower than some of the drugs used by the White House staff of physicians.

Dan Thornton, former governor of Colorado, saw the President briefly Sunday afternoon. It was Thornton, a superb golfer, who tried without success to get Mr. Eisenhower to stop playing 37 holes a day last month. Thornton made his last appeal to the President on the afternoon of September 23, a matter of hours before the President suffered his heart attack.

The President brushed Thornton aside and said since he was feeling better than at any time since he entered the White House, he would go along with his own golf routine.

MAKING A GO OF LIFE

Read Matthew 5:27-28, 33-39

Mistaken concepts of sin persist today. In much modern discussion there is evidence of muddy thinking upon the subject. There are those, for instance, who judge any man's sinfulness by his loyalty to certain historic doctrines of the Christian church. If he is willing to declare publicly that he "believes," he is accounted a Christian regardless of other aspects of his life. He may be an exploiter of children in his mills,

or he may be ruthless in his dealings with his competitors, but if he is correct in his theological position he is called "saved."

There are those, on the other hand, who are quite indifferent to a man's theological opinions, and base their entire judgment on the quality of his social attitudes. If he is a generous man, much given to works of charity and a friend of all philanthropic causes, he is adjudged a Christian regardless of his beliefs. Or, in the case of others, if he holds to certain social ideals and is "opposed to the capitalistic system" and all "profit-making enterprises," he is adjudged a Christian regardless of other interests and positions.

Somewhere between these extremes the truth will be found to lie. Jesus himself put the emphasis on the matter of loyalty to God and devotion to those causes and ideals which are dear to the heart of God. He measured men's loyalties to himself in terms of their moral performances, rather than according to their creedal or ritualistic conformity. "Ye shall know them by their fruits" (Matt. 7:16), he said, by which he seems

Dogs On Navy Expedition Will Have Plenty Of Food

WASHINGTON—UP—A dog's life isn't too tough if the task force ahead of you has seven tons of dog food.

That's what 30 dogs have to look forward to during the Navy's trip to the Antarctic, which gets underway in a few days. The main part of the trip has to do with things like looking over the terrain and plotting air strips and places to hide in case any trouble ever develops in that far-away area.

More man, and there are a lot of them, will have to bundle up like crazy to face the bitter cold around 40 to 60 degrees below zero.

The dogs, wearing their own fur coats, have little to worry about. First off they are on a stand-by, the trained Alaskan huskies and Siberian malamutes. According to the Navy, all are next-to-next to next of kin to the pups Admiral Byrd took to the Antarctic in the way back.

T.Sgt. Thomas McEvoy, who has charge of the kennel, faces a long stretch on the trip, which may run into a couple of years or more. Young Tom is a young bridegroom. But the Navy is the Navy.

Our lad, a tall, muscular youngster is leaving dressed for his job. He also knows that his pups won't have to go to work unless there is trouble, which everybody, including the pups hope won't happen.

Tom's biggest worry, though, in

the long haul is whether there will be enough dog food to go around—even with the exercise of airflits to parachute the dogs down with supplies for the weary.

"Doggone," Tom complained. "You give me eight lady dogs and 22 males. What happens if the population gets out of hand?"

The Navy has no answer to that. That's the sergeant's worry. They told Tom to go about his business. And that's what the sailor is doing, under orders. Leaving his own personal problems behind.

The dogs like as not will fare better than the men when it comes to food. The blubber of the whale and the meat of the seal will be theirs for the barking. This sort of food will be mixed daily with dog meal—just like you stir up dog salad for your cocker or hair-beagle.

Have Special Rations

But in the case of the dogs that are on this mighty mission, the quality will be a little different. The Navy pups will be getting a big double dose of calories—to protect them from the awful cold and to build them up to carry out the assignment of pulling the sleds, if pulling is necessary. There are helicopters—and each dog is checked out for parachutes.

An emergency field ration for a special thing called "pemmican" has been prepared and is ready to take off with dogs and men. The stuff is in deep freeze this very minute at the Navy's base at Davisville, R.I. The "pemmi-

Hearings On Dope Set

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22—UP—Chairman Hale Boggs (D-La.) announced Saturday that his House subcommittee on narcotics will begin a series of country-wide hearings in New York Nov. 7 and 8, Boggs' Ways and Means committee group is considering the need to increase penalties for narcotics peddling. Public sessions have already been held here.

The announcement said hearings will be held Nov. 10-11 in San Francisco; Nov. 16-17 in Chicago.

Tentative plans for sessions in these cities already had been announced.

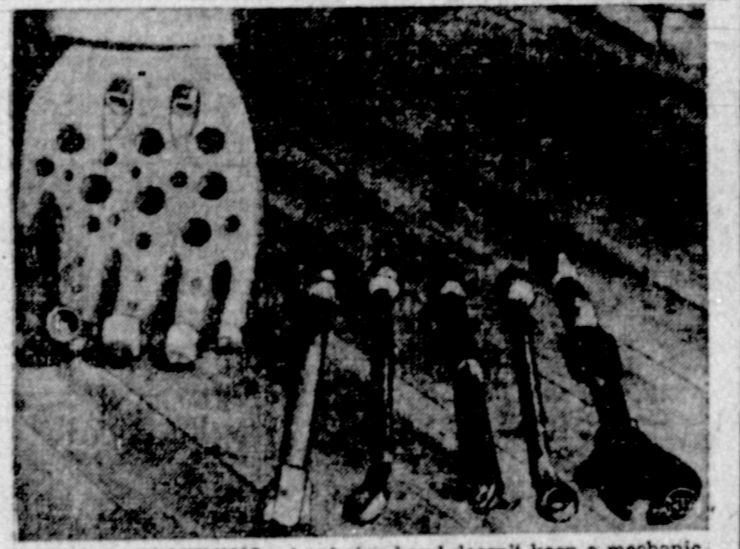
Under the present law, sponsored in 1951 by Boggs, violators of the narcotics laws are liable to a minimum mandatory sentence of two years for the first offense, five years for the second, and 10 years for the third.

The Boggs law permits probation or a suspended sentence only on the first offense.

In announcing the field schedule, Boggs noted that witnesses have testified here that the imposition of prison terms in various cities "have been effective in reducing traffic in narcotics."

"We are particularly interested in the addiction that narcotics and barbiturates on the part of teenagers," he said.
