

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Long Arm

The Saturday Evening Post, in an editorial entitled "American Industry Takes a Beating From U.N.'s Socialistic Researchers," says: "The eager beavers who talk about revising the United Nations Charter to give more authority, without damaging this country's right to order its own internal affairs, might well take a look at recent reports by two inconspicuous United Nations agencies.

One of the studies makes some vague recommendations regarding practices of foreign operations of the American oil industry as interpreted by the staff of the Secretariat of the Economic Commission for Europe. It intimates that American oil companies overcharge their European customers for Middle Eastern oil, and hints international price control is needed. The other report by the Department of Economics and Social Affairs, besmirches American investors in Latin America.

The oil report, says the Post, "was prepared under the direction of Gunnar Myrdal, a Swedish socialist . . who has described "the adoption of the United States . Constitution as 'nearly a plot against the common people." "The Post then asks: "Is Myrdal the best authority a U.N. agency could rely on for a complicated study of the oil industry?"

According to officials of the American oil componies, oil from the middle East sells at a competitive price and has virtually driven Western Hemisphere oil from Europe's market for that reason. Our oil industry has taken rough newspaper criticism in Europe as a result of the misleading report. Concluding its editorial, the Post says "Curiously enough, neither the American delegation to the United Nations nor even the U.N. Secretariat itself appears to know what these subsidy and socialistically inclined bodies like the Economic Commission for Europe are up to." Apparently the promoters of socialism have long arms which reach into-unexpected places to discredit the free enterprise system of the United States.



One of the most inhuman actions of big strongly centralized governments is the driving of innocent people from their homes to perish from hunger and cold on the highways, to die of disease, to moral and physical disintegration in concentration camps and to wretched exiled existences wherever they may be able to eke out a living; separated from family, friends, home and country. It is estimated that a total of some 70 million persons have so suffered or are so suffering during the past 40 years. We saw the first wave of these unfortunate people, some half a million in number coming from Spain into France in 1939. We saw others pouring Westward from the Hitler regime in Germany. We saw the throngs streaming southward from the Low Countries and Northern France when Hitler struck those areas in 1940. We saw large numbers of refugees from Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia in Sweden, and we saw many of the half-million Finns whom the Russians expelled from the parts of Finland they annexed. Poles, Germans, Sudetenlanders, Arabs. Jews, Moslems in India and Hindus in Pakistan make up other large segments of displaced people. Some have been helped to find means of escape and relocation for a few thousand individuals has been achieved. But in spite of the efforts of people who have tried to help in this tragedy, tens of millions have died or suffered the loss of all that makes life worthwhile. This all stems from the actions of governments denying to people the rights of life, liberty and property. Power-mad dictators pursuing their selfish aims have disregarded the human rights of their victims. Such are the results when governments seize or are given great power over the lives of their fellow men. The only safety for the human race, is strictly limited government, deprived of the right to control the lives and activities of its citizens. Under the freedom which God intended men to enjoy and under government deprived of these extraordinary powers, we would not witness the pitiful spectacles of tens of millions of innocent people suffering and dying. One of man's greatest problems is to learn how to control and limit government.


The principal issues before the conference are the question of reuniting divided Germany, of erecting a general European security system, of progressing toward disarmament, and of easing intercourse between the west and the communist world. The first two of these are to be dealt with together, but Mr. Molotov will not handle them that way, and it is obvious that he will not accept a formula for reunification of Germany acceptable either to the West Garmans or to the western allies.

That being so, there are no trading points to offer and the conference is bound to wind up where it started. But Mr. Dulles persists in cultivating optimism because he wants to keep the appearance of negotiation alive and hopes to pass the buck further down the line by handing the issues over to a new "committee of experts,"' which would prepare the way in turn' for another foreign ministers' conference.



Ramsey, newly appointed natonal Democratic committeeman from Texas, said he was going to Chicago Tuesday for a meeting of the Democratic national commit-




