School Figures

We are indebted to the Los Angeles Times for an excellent job in school statistics which tend to establish the point that while the quality of public school instruction has been on the downward grade, generally speaking, expenditures on public schooling have gone steadily

The point of the entire editorial in the Times was that the government schools should not look to the federal government for special financial aid — a sentiment in which we are happy to concur.

The Times does skirt the real reason for attempting to avoid federal aid to public schools which is that such federal aid automatically means more federal control, but it does take comfort in the report that the California School Boards Association has declared that it "is opposed to the extension, beyond present provisions, of federal aid either for school construction or operation."

As has been pointed out here and elsewhere, there has been no demonstration on the part of the government school educationalists to show how there would be any improvement in education if more money were spent

The Times figures then go on to demonstrate that the national moaning by educationalists of "teacher shortage" and "classroom shortage" will not stand the light of statistical comparisons. The paper goes on to

"And the expenditure has gone up, not simply by a count of inflated dollars spent per pupil but in real purchasing power. Some figures abstracted from the 1948-50 survey of the U. S. Office of Education demonstrate this fact and they also reveal, that there is no teacher shortage, if by 'shortage' is meant a present reduction of the number of teachers in relation to the number of public school pupils compared to other times in the statistical history of the systems.

The survey takes 1870, 1910 and 1950 as years. for comparison. In 1870 public school statistics began to be reliable. That year there were 6,872,000 pupils and 201,000 teachers. In 1910 there were 17,814,000 pupils and 523,000 teachers. In 1950 there were 25,111,000 pupils and 914,000 teachers. The number of pupils per teacher works out: 34.2 in 1870; 34.1 in 1910; 27.5 in

"If there was a teacher shortage 40 years ago, there is a lesser one now if one at all. What is the criterion for this proclaimed shortage?

"More than 16 times as much money in unadjusted dollars was spent per pupil in 1950 as in 1870; nearly eight times as much in 1950 as in 1910. The figures are \$15.55 per pupil in 1870; \$32.23 in 1910; \$258.65 'in 1950. If these figures are adjusted to the purchasing power of the dollar in 1950 they work out: \$28.73 in 1870; \$73.59 in 1910; \$223.32 in 1950.

'So, by comparison with two evenly spaced points in the statistical past, we are far from pinching the pupils. Each one in 1950 had 7.77 times as much actual purchasing power exerted in his behalf as in 1870; 3.03 times as much as in 1910. 'As for the unprecedented building shortage which

was cited as the basis of last year's plea for the great federal grant, here is the value of school property per pupil adjusted in terms of the dollar's 1950 purchasing power: \$35.05 in 1870; \$136.62 in 1910; \$391.36 in 1950 — 11.17 times as much in 1950 as in 1870; 2.89 times as much in 1950 as in 1910."

Labor Pays For Services Rendered

Since all of our business and political activities in the final analysis can be reduced to common honesty, justice and liberty, the part that churches are playing in promoting a better under standing of honesty, justice and liberty is of the utmost impor-

The November issue of The Freeman magazine has a very interesting article under the heading of "Labor Pays for Services Ren dered." by Rev. Edmund A. Opitz staff member of The Foundation for Economic Education. The heading really should have been "Union Labor Pays for Services Ren-

It was a sub-head "Protestant churchmen in the ecclesiastical bureaucracy espouse the currently fashionable labor movement and find it pays off." This is the way Rev. Opitz puts it.

"The recent gift of \$200,000 from the CIO's Philip Murray Foundation to the National Council of Churches (NCC) cannot be described as a bribe. It is more like a part payment for services ren-

"The Federal Council of Churches, a parent organization of the present National Council, was established in 1908 primarily to be an instrument of the Social Gospel. The men of various denominations who brought it into being had discovered a common ground in politics, not religion. They each held to their separate doctrines and denominations. Some were Socialists, others favored what is now called the Welfare State. Christianity in its social application meant, for them, an increasing number of government interventions.

"A cardinal plank in the platform of the Social Gospel was that the labor union offered the best means for realizing religion's apocalyptic dream of an earthly paradise. 'If the banner of the Kingdom of God is to enter through the gates of the future,' wrote Walter Rauschenbush of Rochester Seminary, the leader of the Social Gospel forces, 'it will have to be by the tramping hosts of labor.'

This expectation was widely shared by the churchmen who organized the Federal Council of Churches. "A sympathetic historian of the

Social Gospel, H. F. May, writing a few years ago of its impact on American life, says: "The fullest measure of victory (for the Social Gosepl) was achieved with the organization of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America in 1908. In this federation, representing the liberal elements in all denominations, Social Gospel advocates were able to put American Protestantism officially and repeatedly on record in comparatively concrete terms as a warm supporter of labor's cause."

This support continues. John Bennett, Dean of Union Theological Seminary, declares that 'the largescale economic group to which the churches during the past half century have given most support is the labor movement . . . This interest in the labor movement has been characteristic of the national leaders of the denominations, of the Federal Council of Churches, and of others who have been most articulate in interpreting Christian social ethics. It has not necessarily represented attitudes that have been dominant within the membership of Protestant churches."

"This last sentence suggests the actual situation in the contemporary religion-labor entente. Power-hungry men in the ecclesiastical bureacracy who do not represent the average clergyman, much less the rank and file church member. have reached an accord with the power-hungry men in control of the huge monopoly unions who do not represent the average American working man

"Ever since Constantine the Church has been plagued by power seekers within it. These men adopted whatever political camouflage the occasion warranted, from monarchy to democracy. They heard God's words only when He spoke as they wanted Him to speak. They put up a good case, on religious grounds, for slavery and war. During the Gilded Age of the latter nineteenth century they paid nauseating tribute to the heavy-handed robber barons who loomed large on the American

"And now that the incidence of power has shifted so that the big social fact is 'the accession of the masses to complete social power, as Oriega Gasset puts it, the powseekers within the Church attach themselves to mass movements for social revolution. The Doctor Says By EDWIN J. JORDAN, M. D.

Most difficult to answer is a question often received by this writer on what the chances are of a child with one or more parents with diabetes developing the same disease. As one lady wrote, "My husband has been taking insulin for many years. We have a two year old son who seems perfectly normal. Will he have diabetes

The question is whether diabetes should be considered an inherited disease.

Perhaps the best way to reply to this is to say that it is considered an hereditary disease but certainly not all children of parents with diabetes develop it. Furthermore, only about one quarter of those who develop diabetes can dig up a family history of the disease.

OUR PRESENT KNOWLEDGE of the way in which diabetes is carried suggests that on the average only about one child in four would have diabetes if one parent has the disease and the other is not carrying any tendency in that direction.

If both parents have diabetes, one might expect all the children to have it also, though it does not always turn out this way.

There are other things besides heredity which enter into the development of diabetes. The condition comes from a disorder of certain cells in a small gland lying inside the a comen known as the pancreas. This in turn is affected by other internal glands such as the pituitary, the adrenals, and the thyroid.

PARTICULARLY IMPOR-TANT from the practical standpoint is the knowledge that overweight greatly increases the chances of developing diabetes.

In one series of diabetic patients, more than three quarters were definitely overweight and . only eight in one hundred were below normal weight. Just exactly why this occurs is still obscure, but possibly a person that is already susceptible to diabetes cannot stand the extra strain of fat and the pancreatic cells responsible for the disease break down more easily under such circum-
