The first directors' meeting of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development for the fiscal year was held yesterday noon in the Palm room of the City Hall with President Ed Myatt presiding.

New committee chairmen for the fourteen working committees were approved by the board of directors as follows: Agriculture & Livestock, Paul Payne; Aviation, Leon Fain; Fire Prevention & Safety, Ott Shewmaker; Highways & Transportation, Fred Thompson; Highway Signs & Tourist Development, Frank Lard; Industrial, Roy Smith; Legislation & National Affairs, Arthur Teed; Merchants Activities, Hugh Peoples; New Business Greeters, A. A. Schuneman; Bob Sidwell; Public Improvements, Lynn Boyd; Publicity & General Information, Jim Dean; Public Relations, George Newberry; Sports & Recreation, Warren Hasse.

Several progress reports were given on committee activities including a detailed report on Christmas activities by Joe Tooley, chairman of the Merchants Activities Committee.

A major portion of the meeting was devoted to a discussion of projects to be included in the Program of Work for the year ahead. The Phillips 66 Discussion Plan, originated by Dr. Don Phillips, president of Hillsdale College in the state of Michigan, was used, whereby groups of five sitting at separate tables elected a chairman and secretary, and all participated in making suggestions to be included.

The procedure proved very popular, since it gave everyone present an opportunity to get into the act in contributing suggestions for our Program of Work. The following are just a few of the many suggestions made at the meeting: (1) A new civic auditorium; (2) Beautification program on highways coming into the city; (3) A youth building; (4) A new hotel; (5) A colored swimming pool; (6) Widening and improvement of State Highway 152 within the city limits and on to Borger; (7) Establishment of additional highway markers on Highway 60 at Texas...

China Clipper Took Off 20 Years Ago

By WILEY S. MALONEY SAN FRANCISCO—UP—Twenty years ago Tuesday the "China Clipper" lifted itself from San Francisco Bay and nosed through the Golden Gate bound for Honolulu and Manila on the first scheduled flight across the world's largest ocean.

"Men, machines and nerve made that flight possible," said Capt. John H. (Captain Jack) Tilton, 62, retired Pan American Airways pilot. "It was real pioneering."

Up to that time the longest over-water hop—attempted only by mail planes—was between Dakar, Africa, and Natal, Brazil, a distance of 1,564 miles. PAA had projected a passenger airline covering more than 4,000 miles of ocean flying, including one non-stop leg of 2,400 miles between here and Honolulu.

"The problems were terrific," Captain Jack said. "Most people don't realize how much time on the ground had to be spent before even the preliminary flights could be made. Bases had to be built out on the stepping stones. Weather forecasting and navigational hazards had to be met. As each wrinkle was ironed, a new wrinkle appeared."

Captain Jack was not aboard the China Clipper. He went on the next flight aboard the Philippine Clipper, a sister plane.

"An odd thing that," he said. "The China Clipper was the first scheduled flight to land in the Philippines and the Philippine Clipper was the first to land in China."

Gasoline reserves were one of the big problems, he said, but this problem was tied in with navigation.

"Our chief navigational aide," he said, "was the 'bubble octant' with which we could establish a horizon and get an angle off the stars to know where we were in time and space. But when weather forecasts were spotty—and they were—it was not possible to sight a star in an overcast. Radio communication with ships would help, but that was by chance. Problems had to be faced and solved immediately."

Hagler To Return To Oklahoma OKLAHOMA CITY—UP—Oklahoma Crime Bureau Chief O. K. Bivins was en route to a spot just north of the Red River Tuesday to take custody of David F. Hagler, wanted in Oklahoma for a torch murder.

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol said Hagler had agreed to surrender to Bivins and be brought to Sulphur, Okla., where he is charged with murdering an unidentified man Oct. 7, 1954.

A patrol spokesman said Bivins accompanied Dave Tate, Oklahoma City attorney, to Gainesville, Tex., late Tuesday to confer with Byron Matthews, Fort Worth lawyer representing Hagler.

The spokesman said Hagler had agreed to give himself up to Bivins at Thackerville, Okla., on the Oklahoma side of the Red River. Hagler, free on \$15,000 bond granted by Texas courts, has been fighting an extradition order of May 5, but his attorneys said recently they would surrender him to Oklahoma authorities if they would promise to free him on bond.

Murray county authorities rejected the proposal.

A brief was filed last Wednesday with the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals in answer to Hagler's appeal from the extradition order.

The 37-year-old former Fort Worth asphalt company executive escaped extradition last April by a ruse of the court.

YESTERDAY BEGAN one of our country's noblest recent-day projects, a safe driving campaign.

NATIONALLY PROCLAIMED Safe Driving Day is Dec. 1 and the scorekeeping of traffic fatalities began yesterday—8-D Day minus 10, and will continue through 8-D Day plus 10.

ON DEC. 1, every person in the United States is urged to be especially careful while driving or walking. For one, an going to be particularly attentive to see if I have developed any hazardous habits, if I take unnecessary chances, walk or drive absentmindedly. I hope others do the same.

HERE ARE some tips which the President's committee for traffic safety have distributed which should be observed if one would fulfill his personal responsibility for safety: For driving, (1) be sportsmanlike on every drive, (2) obey all traffic regulations, (3) keep speed reasonable and start earlier, drive slower, (4) don't drive when you drink, (5) remember, danger increases with darkness; at sundown, reduce speed so you're within range of your headlights, (6) stay in line—don't weave, (7) don't pass unless there's plenty of room—and never on hills or curves, (8) allow sufficient stopping distance between you and the car ahead, (9) be extra alert at intersections, (10) always signal your intention to turn or stop, (11) if the weather is bad, don't drive unless you must and if you drive, double your care, (12) check your brakes, lights, windshield wipers, tires and steering. For walking, (1) cross streets only at crosswalk, (2) cross only an proper signal, (4) watch for turning cars, (5) never go into the

roadway between parked cars, (6) if there is no sidewalk and you must walk in the roadway, walk on the left, facing the traffic, (7) when walking at night, wear or carry something white to help drivers see you.

WOULDN'T IT be wonderful if we could go for a day AND night with no traffic fatalities in our nation?

Peter Lind Hayes Is One Of Arthur Godfrey's Best Fans

NEW YORK—UP—Peter Lind Hayes, the heir-apparent to Arthur Godfrey's throne at CBS-TV, makes no bones about the fact that he is "one of Godfrey's biggest fans."

"I think he's a genius," said Hayes Tuesday. "Godfrey's the first one who got the drop of TV. He shows up—and that's all he has to do. He isn't anybody but himself. And his honesty is what makes him great."

"Another thing—I think he's the greatest salesman that ever lived. There isn't anyone who can sell a product the way he does."

Hayes is in a peculiarly qualified position to assess the talents of his boss. It has become increas-

ingly obvious to students of the TV menu that Godfrey has tabbed the likeable night club entertainer as his number one fill-in.

As such, Hayes has found himself carrying an increasing load in his role as pinch-hitter since Godfrey launched his plan to take periodic breathers from his TV chores.

"When he first asked me to take over his show," said Hayes, "he picked me, he said, because 'I think you can talk to people.' In my first year, I worked about 20 of his shows. In my second about 30, and this year, my gosh, I've been on more than the other years put together."

Hayes, born 40 years ago under the handle Joseph Lind, grew up in Las Vegas, Nev.

in show biz. At one time, he and his mother, Grace Hayes, were partners in an impersonation act that played the vaudeville circuit. His mother now runs a lodge in Las Vegas, Nev.

Hayes, who has worked a successful nightclub act for many years in tandem with his wife, Mary Healy, said he had only three major commitments lined up for 1956—six weeks in Las Vegas and Miami Beach early in the year and a four weeker in August in Vegas.

"I'm on call for Godfrey's morning show at any time," he pointed out.

Godfrey, Hayes said, had given him the most useful advice for working the morning show. "He told me," said Hayes, "to sit back, relax and enjoy it. And above all, don't try to be clever."

WASHINGTON—UP—If you see a man wearing a smock and beret, splashing at a canvas, hold your punches.

It could be Joe Louis, Ezzard Charles or the old-timer Mickey Walker. Odds are, if you throw the "sissy" tuft at these guys you'll wind up with a bent beak and purple under each eye.

All three of these ex-boxing champs have taken up painting and they are in no mood to be kidded about it. Mickey Walker, for example, held the welterweight and middleweight crowns at different times. He stacked up over \$3 million while putting guys to sleep on canvas. Now he's putting paint on a canvas, strictly for fun.

"Used to be," Mickey says, "that I could get in a left hook, put a guy under and run along home and get a good night's sleep. But when the foliage on a mountain daisy won't straighten out on the canvas, I'm helpless."

Paint to Relax
Mickey and a lot of other athletes are going in for painting to relax, says Albert Dorne, head of an artists' school in Westport, Conn.

Not all of the above mentioned box fighters are clients of his. But he has quite a class of athletes. Such as Bill Wight, the left-handed pitcher for the Baltimore Orioles; Ezzard Charles, former heavy-weight champion; Tex Coulter, the hulking football player; Margaret

Smith, 19-year-old West Coast golfing sensation, and George Araujo, the Providence, R.I., lightweight contender.

"Take that guy Tex, for instance," Al said. "He is more interested in painting than in playing football. He knows he can't football forever. But you never get too old to paint. Look at Grandma Moses!"

Did Some Boxing
Al Dorne, who wears John L. Lewis eyebrows and a nose that has a tendency to list from one side to the other, depending on how he blows it, did a little boxing-fighting on his own at one time. 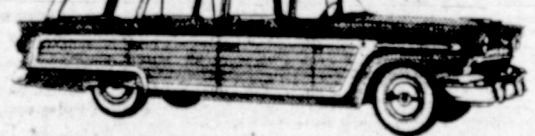
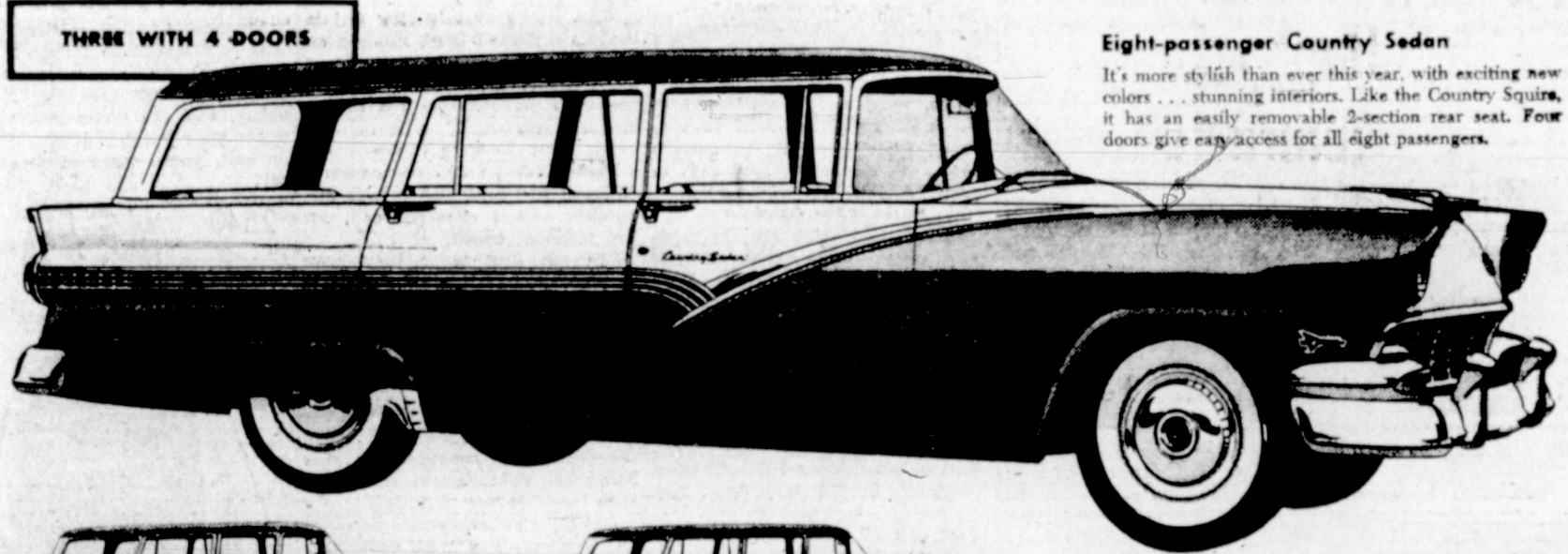

HALLMARKS OF THE SEASON in shoe styles, without which no shoe can be considered good fashion, are lightness, softness, flexibility. These are achieved in a variety of ways: elimination or softening of toe boxes; shortening, paring and softening of counters; use of unlined or lighter-weight tanned leathers; specifications for slimmer heels and lighter soles. All bring startling new comfort and grace to the more discernable fashion trends, according to the Shoe Fashion Board of St. Louis.

SLIMNES is the keynote to the shoe silhouette — be the style a closed up pump, or a sandal bared for after-five elegance. With slenderness to lines the accepted trend, the silhouette interest focuses on pumps a truly custom look. St. Louis manufacturers have dropped or folded their toplines leaving no seams to mar the beauty of the shoe's simple lines. Straighter side-lines, ending in a squared throat-line, also indicate uninvolved simplicity for the season ahead.

Throattines are extremely active in the changing silhouette of the shoe. They're creeping higher — generously rounded or quietly peaked. Leather strappings, ties and bows accentuate these tabs. Stretchable toplines are both fashionable and comfortable — their seam found in pleated inserts of elastic caught in a buckle or a voffly detailed bow.

Fall fashions are predominantly closed silhouettes. But significantly, though both toes and heels are covered, the shank area often is open or the sides are cut low. Barer silhouettes — halters, slings, and barebacks — are, by nature of the materials and trimmings used, designated for afternoon and evening occasions.

Heels, of course underscore every silhouette offered and from these, it is obvious that every height can be a fashionable level today. Flats have come out of the teenage category and are perfect for suburban life. Medium heels, slimmer and more shapely, no longer are confined to very conservative styles — they grace the dimmest of afternoon and evening footwear. Bobbed heels, as they're frequently called, are definitely as fashionable as the summer-straighter and higher heels with which they share the spotlight. Both are frequently decorated, the pattern of the vamp delightfully provoking the use of a striped or patterned leather cover, a puffed or jeweled motif.

Uninvolved simplicity also is the trend in detailing — derived in great measure from the new fashion impact of textured leathers. Decorations thus take the form of those the manufacturer can accomplish right in his factory — slashes and perforations that take on underlays, stitchings that are either light in pattern to give texture interest, or bold in outlining feature detailing. There's little need for excessive trim with such refreshing combinations as mat finished black calfskin paired with creped, even grained kidskin; luminous calfskin, pearlized lizard or satin elegantly accenting suede.

Chestnut-sausage stuffing for the traditional Thanksgiving turkey — that's a savory blessing. We tested it at the recent southern colonial dinner given by the American Spice Trade Association to celebrate its 80th anniversary.

Rost Turkey With Chestnut-Sausage Stuffing

Fifteen to 18-pound ready-to-cook turkey, salt, chestnut-sausage stuffing, 2 sticks butter or margarine, melted, 3 cups hot water.

Wash turkey and sprinkle inside lightly with salt. Fill body and neck cavities loosely with chestnut-sausage stuffing. Fasten neck skin to the back with a skewer. Fold wings flat against the body. Lace abdominal cavity with string and skewers to hold in stuffing. Tie legs together and fasten to tail.

Place on a rack in an open shallow pan. Brush skin of bird with melted butter or margarine. Mix with hot water to the remaining body cavity and crop of a 15 to 18-pound turkey with this mixture,

Three Give Opinions

Three people who are, in separate ways, close observers of women gave their opinions after hearing the above questions. All three agreed on one thing: Women acquire "an air," they're not born with it. Into it goes a combination of self confidence, good grooming, proper clothes and good posture. Neither the year of a woman's birth or the price of her dress is of great importance.

"I cannot give you an exact definition of what it means when a girl walks into our offices with that 'air' that makes you look twice," said Jerry Ford, the husband half of the Ford model agency proprietors.

"But if the best looking girl in the world doesn't think she is good looking, she won't have it. So in our business 'an air' is a reference really to personality — to a feeling of self importance."

New Yorkers Claim

More New York city women claim a share of this special air, another expert observer said, for two obvious reasons.

"In the first place they have everything here to choose from in the way of clothes and grooming aids," Mrs. Fredricka Fels, a buyer of moderate-priced clothes in the Bonwit Teller store, said. "And secondly, this is the most competitive city in the world. Career girls have to look well because of their jobs and women who stay home are conscious of competing with these career girls."

The third authority said no woman, wherever she lived, could give the impression of having "an air" unless she felt comfortable in the clothes she wore.

"If you are comfortable, you feel better, you walk better and you look better," said Mollie Parola, a dress designer who's most famous customer is Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower. "That's what I call having 'an air.'"

A panel discussion, "Behaviorisms Of The Teen-Age Child," was held at the recent meeting of the Junior High Parent-Teacher Association in the school auditorium.

In conclusion, the panel agreed that the best way to insure a normal teen-ager of a well-adjusted adult life is to answer his questions correctly, build up confidence between the parent and child, help him to feel secure in his home, school and church, so he will have the security he needs to face the world and the problems that exist today.

The business session was led by Mrs. Gene Fatheree, in the absence of the president, Mrs. Jack Foster. Mrs. Fatheree read a telegram from Mrs. Foster and Mrs. Bob Andis, delegates to the PTA convention in Fort Worth.

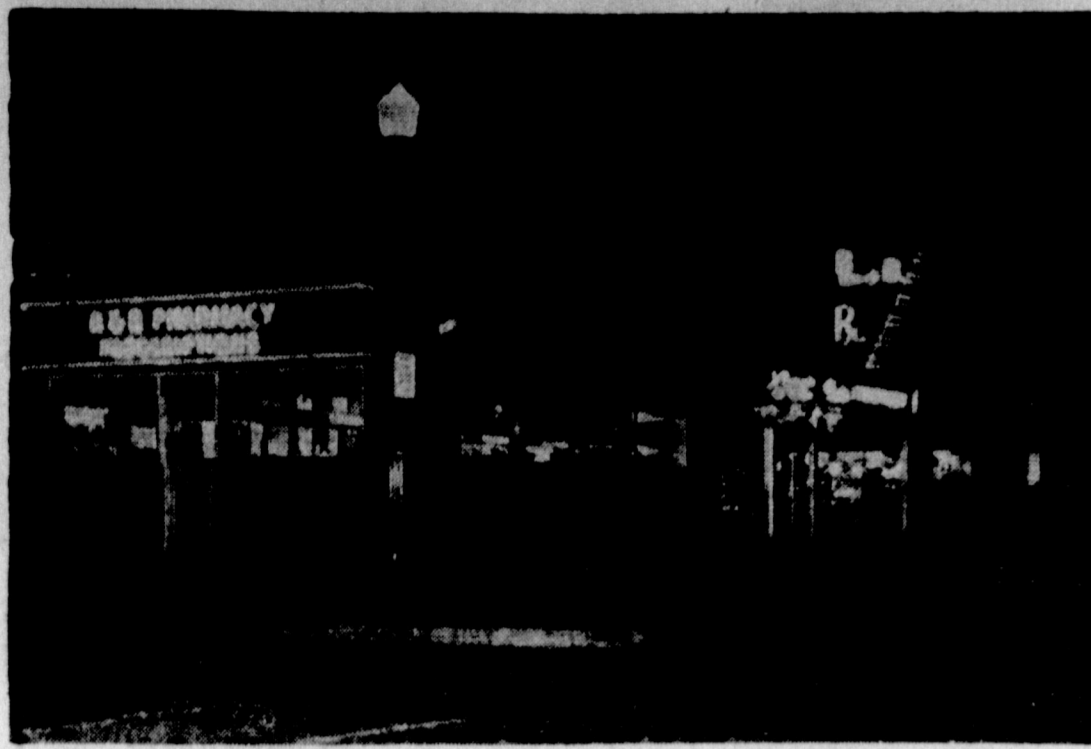

The Pampa Harvesters, with one win behind them, will be out to notch up their second and last win of the season when they meet the winless Borger Bulldogs on Thanksgiving day in Borger.

The Harvesters know that even though the comparison of scores between the two teams gives Pampa the advantage, the Bulldogs consider they have had a successful season if they defeat the Harvesters on Thanksgiving day.

Previous records show that Borger strength and past performance don't mean a thing when the teams get together. The game is usually an upset. Pampa has won 12 of the 21 games with Borger and have held the Bulldogs scoreless in four starts while the Harvesters racked up 91 points. The Green and Golders lost the last two games and the game of '46 and tied the game of '40 by a score of 17-17.

The two teams have played each year since 1932 with the exception of two years. The Harvesters squads of '37 and '43 didn't meet the Bulldogs.

MAKING A GO OF LIFE

Read James 1:16-27

Sin and doctrine cannot be separated. Generally speaking, according to popular Christian thought of today, sin consists of (1) erroneous beliefs, and (2) immoral conduct.

There is good reason for drawing the line rather sharply on the subject of correct beliefs. If there is no place for loose thinking in the field of medicine, where the body is concerned, there is also good reason for insisting upon clear thinking in the realm of the spirit, where the destinies of the spiritual life are at stake.

Protestant emphasis upon correctness of belief, however, has resulted in no little confusion and much pettiness. Having assigned supreme authority to the Scriptures, and having given each individual the right to interpret them according to his best understanding, we are confronted with a tendency to insist upon intellectual conformity at the expense of moral integrity.

If a man is willing to declare his belief in the "fundamentals,"

some people accord him all the rights of the fellowship regardless of the spirit in which he lives. He may be contentious, spiteful, ungracious, devious in his business dealings, and intolerant of spirit, but if he is "sound in his theology," he is rated as a first-rate Christian. It often happens that those who are loudest in their defense of the "faith once delivered to the saints" are also unscrupulous in promoting that defense. I sometimes wish Will were not quite so religious," said a long-suffering and patient woman. "I think he might be a lot easier to live with." She was suffering from a malady which afflicts the entire Christian movement. We need to emphasize orthodoxy of conduct as well as orthodoxy of belief.

Lord God, forgive me for exalting my own opinions above the conscience of which I am a part. Have mercy upon me for having set myself up as a judge over other men, denying them the rights of fellowship because they disagree with me. Amen.

Safe Driving Campaign Underway

WASHINGTON—UP—The 48 state began a special daily tally of traffic fatalities Monday in a campaign to prevent death on the nation's highways.

The campaign will last three weeks and will be highlighted by "Safe Driving Day" on Dec. 1. At that time an all-out effort will be made to go through a 24-hour period without a single traffic fatality. This is the second year for the campaign.

President Eisenhower's committee for traffic safety, and more than 200 national organizations have endorsed "S-D Day."

Last year's S-D Day, Dec. 1, fell far short of the no-death goal. A total of 81 persons were fatally injured on Dec. 1, 1954. During the three-week period encompassed by the 1954 campaign the traffic toll was 2,144.

Army, Air Force Feud Over Missile

WASHINGTON—UP—The Army and Air Force are feuding over the results of secret guided missile tests in which the Army's Nike duelled the Air Force's Matador bomber.

The tests were held to determine the effectiveness of the 1,600 mile-an-hour Nike against modern jet bombers. That much publicized missile was pitted against an Air Force Matador jet bomber with a speed of 600 miles an hour.

The Nike knocked down at least one Matador—two by Army claims—but missed on several other shots in aerial duels last month at White Sands, N. M., Proving Grounds.

The Matador was chosen as the target because it is, in effect, a pilotless fighter-bomber with the speed but not the size of present jet bombers.

But the inconclusiveness of the tests only added new fire to a long-standing controversy between the two services.

Bannister Steps Out For Christ

OXFORD, England—UP—British track star Roger Bannister came forward and made a "decision for Christ" Sunday night after hearing American evangelist Billy Graham speak in a crowded Oxford church.

The tall Briton who ran history's first four-minute mile last year and now is a practicing physician was one of 1,500 that jammed into Aldgate church which has seats for less than 1,000.

After his sermon Graham invited all who felt deeply moved to stay and hear another quiet 10-minute talk on what the Christian way of life means. Bannister stayed and then went forward to shake Graham's hand.

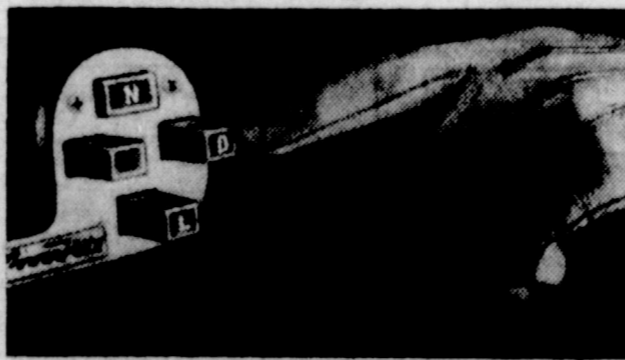

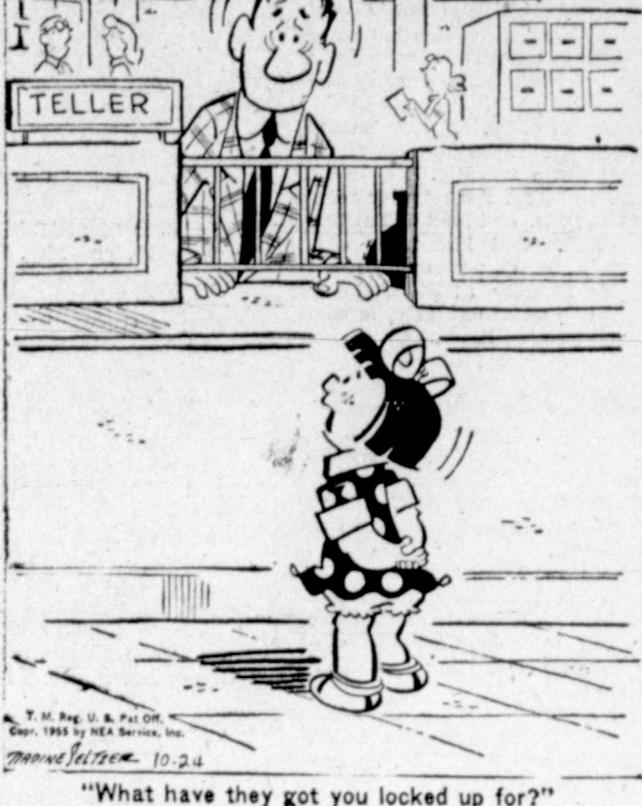

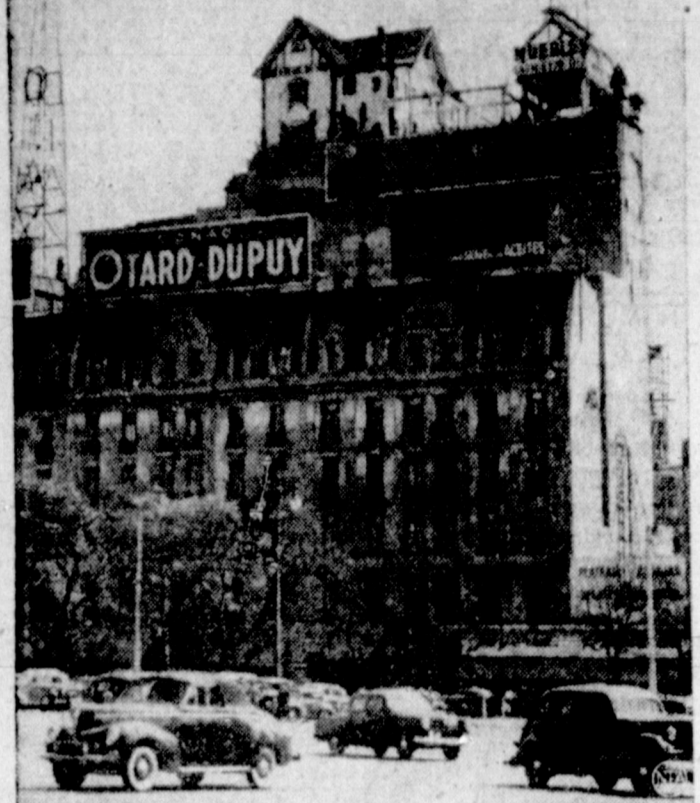

Actress Gives Credit For Her Success To Work And Mother

HOLLYWOOD — UP — Dorothy Gish, one of the few silent screen stars who still is a working actress, pegged her long success Tuesday on two reasons — hard work and a sensible mother.

To veteran movie-goers the Gish sisters bring back memories of heroines with clouds of hair in "Orphans of the Storm," "Birth of a Nation" and other early-day flickers.

Of all those first idols of the celluloid, Dorothy and Lillian Gish lead a bare handful whose names never left the marquee. Mabel Normand and Wallace Reid came to early tragic deaths; others were involved in scandal, some faded, many retired.

But Lillian still is active in films ("Cobweb," "Night of the Hunter"). Dorothy has kept busy on the stage, and both are in demand for live TV dramas that tire many a complaining newcomer. Dorothy, now 37, is currently in the plaster city for her first live TV drama

originating here.

What, has kept their amazing careers alive?

"We were born in show business and we worked hard," Dorothy said firmly as she sat, a slender figure at 57 still with long hair and beautiful eyes, in her hotel room.

"And when we first won notice mother explained that agents wrote all that publicity and we must not take it seriously. She explained youth was a commodity and when that went we would need the basic ability. When crowds followed us she said they'd also follow somebody with a ring in her nose."
