Police Chief Urges Care On S-D Day Here

Stick around for S-D Day, 1956. Chief of Police Conner today urged all motorists and pedestrians to participate in S-D Day activities and to help keep traffic accidents at a minimum.

Tomorrow has been proclaimed by President Eisenhower as Safe-Driving Day, a vast national effort to reduce traffic fatalities. Local police, civic groups, churches, lodges, unions and others are expected to observe the day.

Meanwhile, Chief Conner urged drivers and pedestrians to remember that S-D Day comes at a time when traffic fatalities reach an all time high.

He quoted figures from the National Safety Council indicating that December usually results in the highest number of traffic deaths than any other month of the year. "These are six safe-driving tips that motorists should remember at this time of the year, Chief Conner said.

He listed the following:

1. Get the feet of the road. Be alert but relaxed, try to sense road and weather conditions before you start out.
2. Adjust speed to road and weather conditions. If the roads are slick and the weather is against you, take it easy.
3. Keep windows and windshields clear at all times. You have to see danger to avoid it. Carry an ice scraper to use when snow and ice get to heavy to be taken care of by the windshield wiper.
4. Use tire chains on ice and snow. They can greatly reduce stopping time.
5. When using the brake, step on it promptly, release it completely and repeat the process intermittently for a safe pumping action.
6. Drive a safe distance behind other vehicles.

HOUSTON —UP— The Houston Post, a morning daily Wednesday announced a 20-cent month increase in its subscription price, effective Dec. 1.

The new subscription price will be \$1.95 a month, daily and Sunday. Street and newsstand prices remain at 3 cents daily, with an increase from 15 cents to 20 cents for the Sunday edition.

The Post Publishing Co. said increase was necessary to meet higher costs of newsprint and production. It is the first circulation price boost for the Post since June 1, 1951.

Faure was not out of the woods. If he dissolves parliament he would remain as premier. But parliament could first pass a vote of censure against him and he, too, would be out. In that case Pierre Schmitter, the president of the assembly, would become acting premier.

The repercussions of Faure's move were almost limitless in French politics. It was certain the right-wing and left-wing parties would begin the most explosive struggle for power in France in many years.

One of the principal specters arising was the possibility of a popular front with the Communists.

THE PAMPA YOUTH AND COMMUNITY CENTER was discussed Monday at the dinner meeting of the Pampa Alumna Club. It was extremely interesting and informative. At least it was to me, as I have never discussed the subject with someone actively working on the project. Frank Fata was there to tell us all about it.

IT WILL BE A WONDERFUL thing for our Pampa young people when the dream is realized, but as Mr. Fata pointed out, there are many practical problems involved. However, I won't go into that part of it. What I wanted to pass on was a story Mrs. Frank Lard told — a true, and true-to-life, story.

Mrs. Lard told of a man who was head of a big trucking company who was looking for a place to establish an office in this area. He looked over Pampa and said it would be a good place, except he would never put in his office here because there was no recreation facilities for his six children. It's something to think about.

All the discussion took me way-y back to my teens. I was lucky enough to grow up in an area where nature provided a wonderful playground. The whole east side of the town was the bay — Green Bay — so we had swimming and boating, hiking through the woods — we went on picnics, Weiner roasts and steak fry. But, in the town itself, in the evenings there was not much we could do except bowl or go to the movies.

So, a group of citizens got together and leased, cheaply, an old building, and "gave" it to us as it was. I spent a glorious summer, along with the other young people in town, fixing up the old building. Someone donated a juke box, and we had a small snack bar where we could get simple snacks, such as pop, ice cream bars, etc. We organized it like a town, with a mayor, aldermen, etc., and of course, this was all under adult supervision. We all loved our "town," as we had a part in fixing it up — we had made it ours by the hours of labor we had put in. We helped with the finances by charging a 25 cent or 30 cent membership fee.

When winter came, however, no one could be found to donate a roofing job for the building. As the winters are severe in Michigan, it was a necessity. So they took our teen-town away, and never had one as successful again.

DURING MONDAY'S discussion, it came to my mind that it might be a nice thing for some club or group in town to provide the teenagers with a temporary and simple place to meet until the youth center is a reality. It needn't be plush, but it would give them a place to go for good, clean super-

Senior Girls Of Pampa High School To Take Homemaking Tests Tuesday
"Homemaker of Tomorrow Day" will be observed here Tuesday.

A total of 256,534 career-minded graduating girls in 10,222 of the nation's high schools simultaneously that day will test their aptitude for the career that awaits eight of 10 of them — homemaking.

Included will be senior girls of Pampa High School who have been enrolled in the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Pampa's winner last year was Joy Shumate.

General Mills, sponsor of this \$100,000 scholarship program designed to assist the schools in homemaking education, announced the participation of nearly half of the nation's high schools today. Last year, 187,463 girls in 8,040 schools were enrolled.

General Mills credits part of this year's increase to the impact the program as made in the entire school curriculum. School administrators registering entries include homemaking teachers, guidance counselors, deans and teachers in physical education and social studies.

A total of 582 schools and 12,436 girls in Texas will take the 50-minute written homemaking examination which will be the basis for selecting the school and state homemakers of Tomorrow. The examination paper of the girl receiving the highest test score in each school will be entered in state competition with each state Homemaker of Tomorrow receiving a \$1,500 scholarship and each state runner-up a \$500 scholarship.

Light Angel Christmas Pie Is Easy To Make, Freeze

As light as a snowflake, yet as festive as a Christmas tree — that's this Frozen Angel Pie.

The era of the traditional heavier mince pie or flaming plum pudding seems to be giving way to lighter desserts for Christmas dinner. Maybe you are of the new way of dessert thinking. If so — here's the sweetest answer.

Frozen Angel Christmas Pie (With Chocolate-Coconut Crust)

Three-quarters cup sugar, 3-4 cup water, 1-16 teaspoon salt, 3 egg whites, 1½ cups heavy cream, 1½ teaspoons pure vanilla extract, 10-inch Chocolate-Coconut crust, maraschino cherries for garnish, angelica for garnish.

Boil sugar and water together until it spins a thread. Add salt to egg whites and beat stiff. Gradually beat sugar syrup into beaten egg whites. Whip cream until almost stiff. Add vanilla extract and beat until stiff. Fold into egg white mixture. Turn a 10-inch Chocolate-Coconut crust. Freeze until ready to serve. Decorate the top with red cherries and angelica, cut to resemble poinsettias.

Chocolate-Coconut Pie Crust (Yield: 8 servings)

Three squares unsweetened chocolate, 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, 3-4 cup sifted confectioners' sugar, 3 tablespoons milk, 1½ teaspoons pure vanilla extract, 2½ cups shredded coconut.

Melt chocolate and butter or margarine over hot water. Mix confectioners' sugar with milk and stir into the chocolate mixture. Add vanilla extract and coconut. Mix well. Turn into a 10-inch 2½ pan. Spread and press uniformly over the bottom, sides and edge of pan. Chill until firm. Fill with Angel Pie filling.

Harvester Banquet Set, Aggie Coach Is Speaker

Paul Bear Bryant is to be the guest speaker at the annual Harvester Football Banquet held in the high school cafeteria December 16.

Paul Bryant is head football coach and athletic director of Texas A&M College. He came to the Aggies from Kentucky in 1954 and became the 19th coach at Aggie.

He coached the "Prohibition Kids" into second spot in the South-west Conference this year.

One of the most successful coaches in the business, Bryant served eight years as Kentucky's head coach and left with an impressive record of 60 wins and 23 losses and five ties.

He built the Wildcats into a major football power after the war, coaching there from 1946 through 1953. His coaching career began at Maryland where he won six and lost two and tied one.

He has built the Aggies from their 1954 football poverty to the second spot in the southwest conference in only one year with only the TCU Frogs over him.

The Aggies in 1954 won only one game of 10 but each game they played they gave it everything they had. He was given a great deal of credit for winning one game his first season at A&M.

Bryant was an all-southeastern conference end at Alabama in the mid-thirties and played with such great stars as Don Hutson and Dixie Howell on the Rose Bowl team and had the advantage of the late Frank Thomas' teaching.

Bryant is a native of Fordyce, Arkansas. He remained at Alabama as Thomas' assistant from 1936-39. He then took the job as an assistant at Vanderbilt in 1940 and 41 before entering the navy in World War II. After naval duty and reaching the rank of lieutenant commander, he launched his career at Maryland.

The Aggie coach, 41 years old, is married and has two children, Mae Martin, 19 and Paul, Jr., 10. The final plans for the banquet were made last night at Quarterback meeting when the directors of the club met and discussed the program.

Tickets to the affair are still on sale at Richard's Drug and at Malone's and B&B Pharmacies.

"Each plate will be worth that price," quarterback club president Ralph McKinney stated.

The annual banquet is being held on December 16 due to the fact that Paul Bryant would not be available until late in January otherwise. Most of the members feel that the date is better than waiting until after Christmas.

Basketballers Open Season, Drop Tulia Hornets 47-41

Cassady Gets Top Honors

COLUMBUS, Ohio—UP—The sports world will pay tribute Dec. 8 to modest, red-haired Howard (Hopalong) Cassady, Ohio State's two-time All-America halfback who Tuesday was the overwhelming choice for college football's top individual award, the Heisman Trophy.

The 21-year-old Columbus native, who led the Buckeyes to their second straight Big Ten championship this season, won the award with 2,219 points, the greatest margin in the 21-year history of the trophy.

He polled 594 first place votes in the balloting of 1,324 sports-writers and sportscasters from all over the nation. Selection of the fleet-footed 175-pound halfback was announced in the office of Ohio State University President Howard Bevis.

Cassady will be presented the 21st Heisman Trophy on Dec. 8 at the annual dinner of the Downtown Athletic Club of New York which conducts the poll.

All-America back Jim Swink of Texas Christian was second in the balloting but far behind in points with only 742. Quarterback George Welsh of Navy was third with 383 points.

Cassady, whose game-breaking tactics earned him the nickname of "Mr. Spectacular," scored 37 touchdowns during his four-year collegiate career for 222 points. His total topped that of any player in Ohio State history including that of the immortal Chic Harley.

The Buckeye speedster gained 2,466 yards on 435 rushing plays, returned 41 kickoffs for 943 yards and 35 punts for 341 yards. He caught 43 passes for 619 yards, intercepted 10 passes which he returned 229 yards and completed three of 14 passes for 64 yards.

In his four years, he handled the ball 578 times for a total of 4,662 yards or an average of eight yards each time. In addition to his offensive brilliance he was an outstanding defensive player and never had a pass completed on him in Big Ten competition.

Lead Changed Hands 9 Times, Game Tied 8

The Pampa Harvesters came from behind and their season opener with a 47-41 thriller over the Tulia Hornets. The Pampa B squad trounced the Hornet B team 62-29 last night.

The two teams played it nip and tuck with the Hornets scoring first and last but not enough in between. The Harvesters were cold from the ball handling standpoint and in the shooting department as they lost the ball several times with no help from the Hornets.

The Hornets on the other hand were unexcelled in their ball handling and were hitting good from

goals and four free throws for a total of 18 points. Jerry Gee was the second high scorer for the Green and Golders with a total of 15 points on seven field goals and one free throw.

The Harvesters trailed at the end of the first quarter by a 12-10 margin and trailed two points at the half with the score 23-25. In the third frame the Green and Golders had gained three points on the Hornets and led by a 33-32 score. They were not to be denied in the last quarter when they added 14 more points and stretched that one-point lead to six at the final gun.

The Green and Golders will be in Vernon Friday night and will go to Quannah for a Saturday night game.

Pre-Season Ratings Put Defending Champs On Top

NEW YORK—UP—The University of San Francisco's defending NCAA basketball champions, led by All-America Bill Russell, were picked Wednesday by an overwhelming vote of the United Press board of coaches to win the national title once again.

In a near-unanimous display of sentiment, 33 of the 35 outstanding coaches who will rate the college basketball teams weekly for the United Press during the coming season voted Phil Woolpert's Dons as the best bet for 1955-56.

North Carolina State was the top pre-season choice of one coach and St. Louis University was selected by another.

San Francisco was picked as the nation's No. 1 team last season after winning 23 out of 24 games during the regular campaign. Then the Dons won the NCAA championship at Kansas City, beating LaSalle in the final 77-63.

Kentucky Chosen No. 2
Kentucky, which has a perennial basketball powerhouse under Coach Adolph Rupp, was picked as the No. 2 team in the coaches' pre-season sizeup, followed by Utah, North Carolina State and Iowa. Dayton was picked No. 6; Illinois and UCLA were tied for seventh, with Duquesne's 1955 National Invitation Tournament champions ninth and George Washington 10th.

Points, distributed on a 10 down to 1 basis for votes from first to 10th places, showed San Francisco,

342; Kentucky, 259; Utah, 210; North Carolina State, 208; Iowa, 195; Dayton, 94; Illinois and UCLA, 89 each; Duquesne, 63; and George Washington, 54.

Holy Cross, New England's leading hope for national prominence, was picked No. 11, followed in order by Marquette, Fordham, Washington and Alabama. St. Louis and Indiana were tied for 16th; Oregon State and Southern Methodist tied for 18th and Kansas was 20th.

Odds Are Jess Hill, Trojan Mentor, Will Get The Last Laugh

LOS ANGELES — UP — He was laughed at when he quit coaching track to take over his first head coaching job in college football four years ago.

He was laughed at again only two weeks ago when he was hanged in effigy on his own campus.

But Jess Hill, the United Press coach of the week, got the last laugh when his Southern California Trojans sprung one of the season's biggest upsets last Saturday by mauling Notre Dame 42-20.

Southern Cal never had beaten the Irish in their annual windup game since Hill took over the coaching reins from Jeff Cravath in 1951. This season, the Trojans reached the Notre Dame battle with an undistinguished 5-4 won and lost record, while the Irish had an 8-1 mark.

It looked like another beating was in store for the Trojans.

But Hill, ignoring the 10-point odds against his team, flatly predicted a victory over the Irish in a pre-game meeting with his players.

"I told them they were going out to win, not for me, but for themselves," he disclosed later. "I wanted them to have something to remember this season."

A crowd of 84,592 at the Memorial Coliseum cheered Southern Cal wildly at the finish, but the

real hero was Jess Hill, who believes "the psychological approach in athletics is the most important part of the game."

A former major league outfielder with the New York Yankees, Hill was coaching the Southern California track team when he switched his talents to the football squad. He probably realized he was moving into one of the toughest jobs in college sports, so he didn't take long to expound on his favorite theory.

"There can be no negative approach as far as our team is concerned," he pointed out. "And we certainly will have no defeatist attitude if I have anything to do about it."

That's a rather unusual approach in college football, which is noted for its legion of pessimistic coaches.

But, indirectly, it enabled Jess Hill to get the last laugh on the last Saturday of the 1955 season.
