It may be a long time in the making, but it sounds like a fine idea. There are probably plenty of musicians in Pampa who would like an opportunity to belong to such a group. There are probably plenty of other folks who would be happy to make cash contributions to help see that such a band is formed.

The best thing about the plan is that it would provide an addition to Pampa's cultural life at no burden to the tax payer.

Here's wishing luck to the idea, but I hope they don't fail to play a little "Oom Pah" once in a while.

The winner of that game plays Baytown, undefeated in 10 games and rated third in Texas football. That is, assuming Baytown will beat Houston Reagan in its quarterfinal match.

And provided they don't knock themselves out in that semi-final round, the victor will wear the state crown.

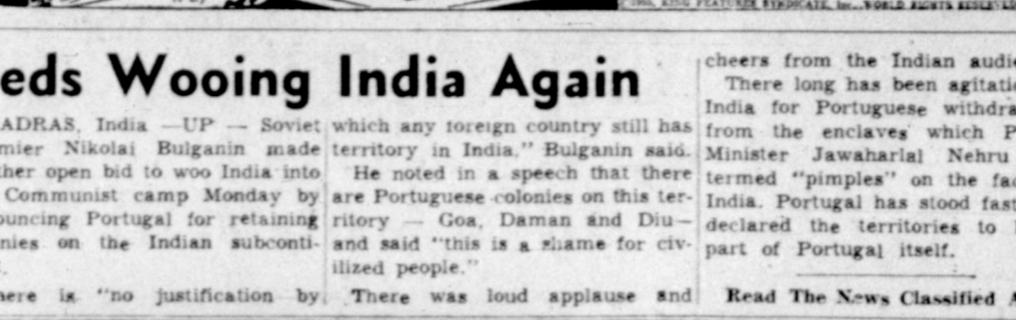
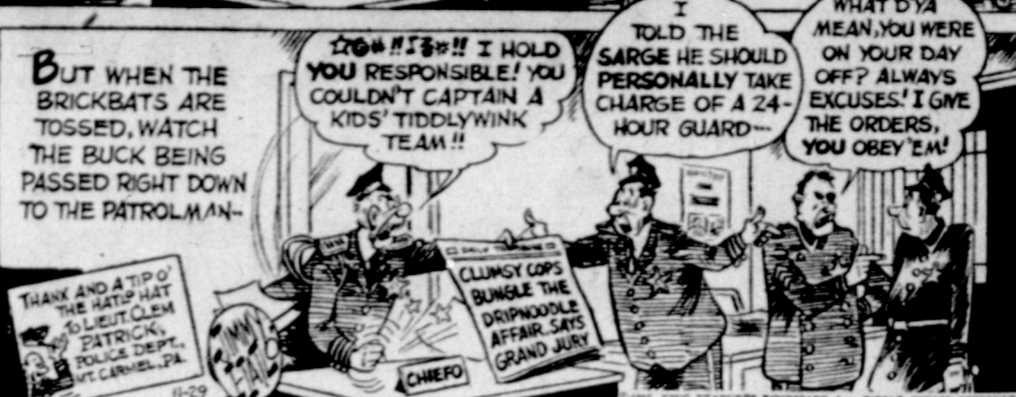

Reds Wooing India Again

MADRAS, India —UP— Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin made another open bid to woo India into the Communist camp Monday by denouncing Portugal for retaining colonies on the Indian subcontinent.

There is "no justification by which any foreign country still has territory in India," Bulganin said. He noted in a speech that there are Portuguese colonies on this territory — Goa, Daman and Diu — and said "this is a shame for civilized people."

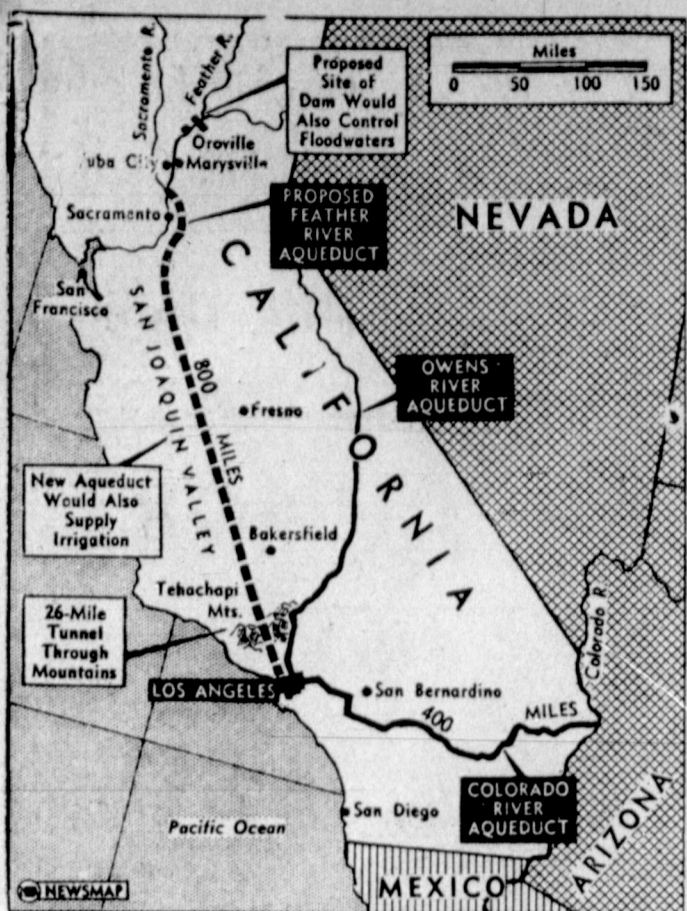

A. PLOTS LONG HAUL FOR WATER—Los Angeles is planning a water delivery system that may become the top engineering marvel of the nation. It is the Feather River project, which would include the nation's largest dam, near Oroville and an 800-mile aqueduct, as seen on map above. The dam would be 9 feet higher than Hoover Dam and require 14,000,000 cubic yards of cement to build. One monumental task of the aqueduct would be to lift the water 3400 feet over the Tehachapi Mountains or build a 26-mile tunnel. Estimated cost would be more than a billion and a half dollars. Los Angeles is no novice in the long-haul water business. In the years 1907 to 1913, it built the Owens River aqueduct and extended it in the 1930's. Later it was prime mover in the 400-mile Colorado River Aqueduct.

The assailant ran screaming from the cafe and the others followed.

One of them looked at Como and remarked that he looked silly enough to be a cook. Then the others took up the chant. The battle began when Como pulled a gun and ordered them out.

Wilson Says East, West Want Peace

MIAMI, Fla. —UP— Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson said Monday the "lack of concrete results" at the Geneva foreign ministers' meeting does not mean necessary that the cold war will be stepped up.

Wilson expressed hope that progress ultimately will result from the meeting. He said "the peoples of all nations, including those back of the Iron Curtain Want Peace and not war."

But, Wilson cautioned in a speech before some 1,000 mayors and city officials at the 82nd annual Congress of the American Municipal Association, the nation should not let its guard down and

must "maintain military strength into the indefinite future."

Wilson, who attended the Geneva meetings for eight days, observed that "some people perhaps expected too much from that conference."

"I, for one, do not believe that the lack of concrete results means an intensification of what is called the 'cold war.' Neither do I draw the conclusion that no progress will be made as a result of these meetings," he said.

Wilson warned, however, that "it is going to take years for men of good will throughout the world to establish a sound condition for a just and durable peace. In the meantime, we don't dare let down our guard."

Judge Denies Bid To Quash Theft Charge

HOUSTON —UP— Former City Treasurer Roy Floyd asked District Judge Langston C. King Monday to quash a felony theft indictment against him, but the judge denied the motion.

Floyd's plea came as his trial on felony theft charges growing out of the recent house and land scandals began before Judge King. Floyd's trial is the first to result from last summer's scandals.

Floyd, who was fired from his city post by Mayor Roy Hofheinz after indictment by a grand jury, announced he was ready for trial. He was accompanied by his wife and the wife of W. C. Fortenberry, a house-mover also under indictment.

Fortenberry, also scheduled for trial before Judge King Monday, probably will be tried later. District Attorney Dan Walton said. Both cases were originally set for Oct. 17, but were postponed.

Floyd said Monday he was "tired of waiting and more than ready" to go to trial. Walton said the state was ready, too.

Floyd was charged specifically in Monday's trial, with theft of a city-owned duplex house that disappeared from its lot and turned up on Floyd's property.

Man Is Fined On Pistol Charge

Cecil Ray Chisum, 21, Pampa, pleaded guilty to unlawfully carrying a pistol in County Court this morning and was fined \$100 and costs. He also pleaded guilty to swindling with a worthless check and was fined \$5 and costs. He was fined on a check dated August 16 for \$5. HERE'S ANOTHER ARTICLE by F. Philip Slater, fashion director of the Young Set magazine, on the latest trends in party clothes for the sub-teen youngster. "Party clothes go from formal in the East, to casual in the far West. But wherever a girl lives, she will want something representing all sections of the country. And no matter what section of the country or degree of formality, I find one dominant theme throughout — this is the year of the East Indian influence. In New York in formal dresses, in Texas in chic Indian lounging sets, and California in smart date dresses.

"REMARKABLE RESTRAINT and good taste are repeated with amazing frequency. The holiday fashions for the subteen girl are so clean, so wonderfully simple that it would be bad manners to overdress them with too much makeup or too much costume jewelry.

"The bouffant skirt remains an whatever the detail in the subteen dresses, yards and yards of nylon

party dress — in the more formal tulle, with wide scoop necks and just a suggestion of sleeves. In less formal party dresses I found huge skirts with boat necklines and push-up, three-quarter sleeves. Whatever they entail in the subteen party dresses, you will note they are exclusively created for the Subteen Young Set Girl!"

Rubinoff Will Present Varied Program On Famed Violin During Pampa Concert

Rubinoff and his violin will be presented at 8:15 p.m. Dec. 8, in the Junior High School auditorium, with a special matinee concert for students and faculty slated for 4 p.m.

The concert is being sponsored by the Pampa Altrusa Club, with proceeds to go into the club's scholarship fund. Tickets are available at the Citizens' Bank and Trust Company, Heath's Men's Wear, Clyde's Pharmacy, and Coston's Bakery. Altrusa Club members are also selling tickets. This program is not connected with the Community Concert Association.

At this concert, Rubinoff will use his famed Stradivarius violin, which is insured for \$100,000. Satisfying a life-long ambition, Rubinoff acquired the "Strad" after searching for several years. He had tested many old and valuable violins, placed at his disposal by music dealers and collectors, but none was just right. The Romanoff-Stradivarius, as it is known, sent him into raptures.

Made in 1731 by Antonio Stradivari, in Cremona, Italy, the instrument in time passed into the hands of the Romanoffs, the reigning family of Russia until the revolution. It disappeared during that time, but turned up later in Paris in the possession of a former Russian prince who had taken the valuable instrument with him when he fled the country.

The violin bears the elaborately engraved and jeweled coat of arms of the Romanoff family, as well as the identification mark of Stradivari and the date.

Rubinoff's concert will include such well-known selections as "Tea For Two" by Vincent Youmans, "Clair De Lune" by Debussy, "Warsaw Concerto" by Addinsell, as well as such popular numbers as "The Ballad of Davy Crockett" played in 15 characteristic styles. "Three Coins in the Fountain" and "Cherry Pink and Apple Blossom White."

He will also present "Rhapsody In Blue" by Gershwin, "When Day Is Done" by Katscher and Chopin's "Polonaise, Opus 53." He will also play two of his own compositions, "Dance of the Peasant" and "Fiddlin' The Fiddle."

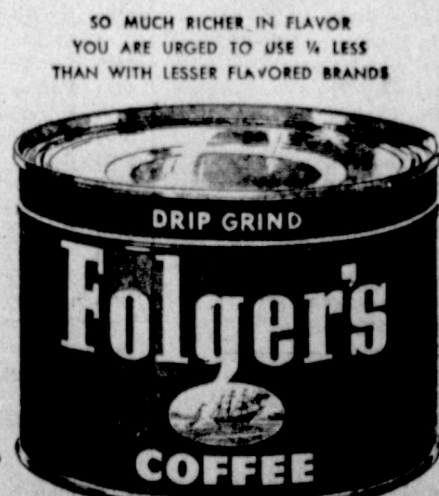

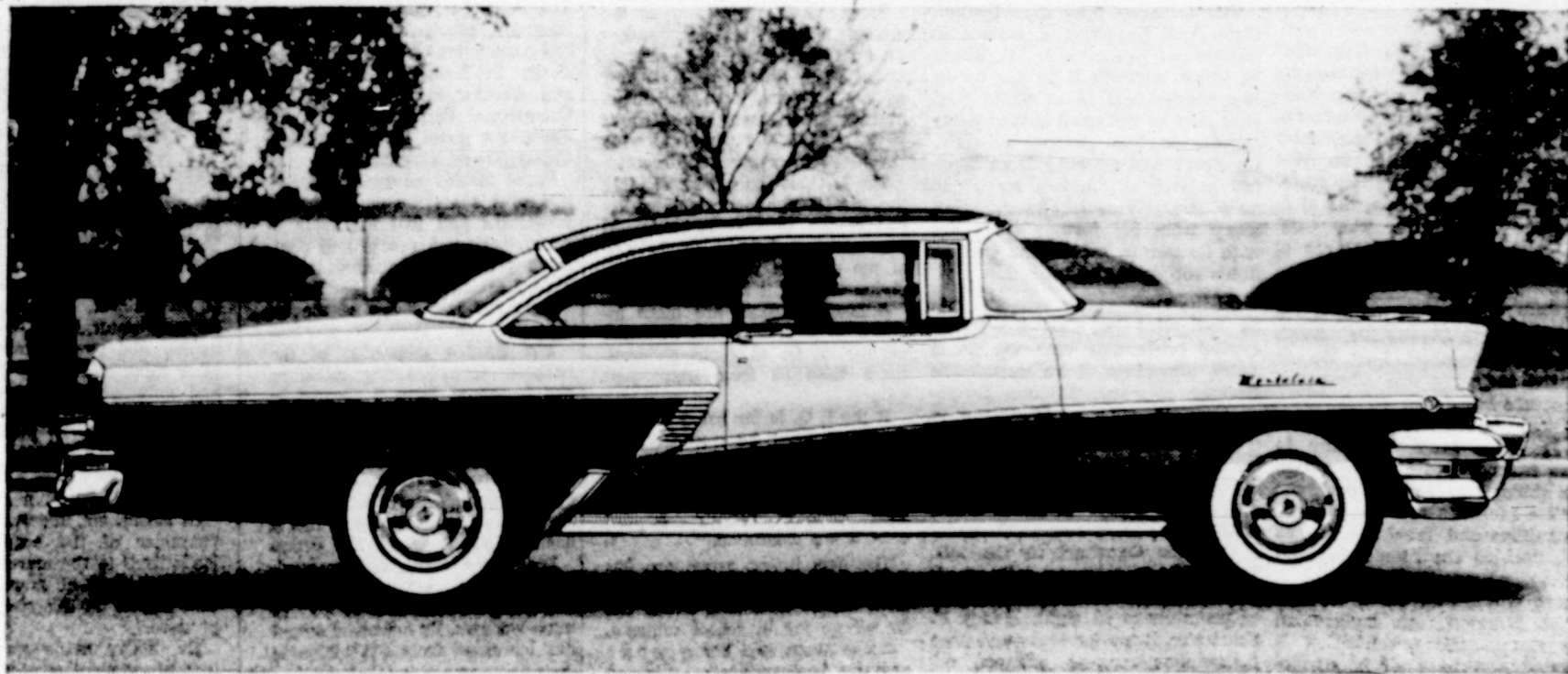

NEW YORK — UP — Oklahoma's slick Sooners, who exploited speed, savvy and spirit for a perfect record and a berth in the Orange Bowl, were chosen the 1955 national college football champion Tuesday by the United Press board of coaches.

In the final balloting of the season, 24 of the 35 leading coaches who make up the United Press rating board picked Oklahoma best in the land. On a point basis, the Sooners received 323 out of a possible 350 for a 14-point margin over Rose Bowl-bound Michigan State.

Coach Bud Wilkinson's split-T powerhouse, which averaged 36.5 points in 10 games for the highest scoring record among major college teams, was voted the nation's No. 1 team for the second time in the past six seasons.

Michigan State Second
The coaches—the men who know the game the best—ranked Michigan State, Maryland, UCLA and Texas Christian in order behind Oklahoma. Ohio State, Georgia Tech, Notre Dame, Mississippi and Auburn rounded out the top 10 teams.

Michigan State was the No. 1 choice of seven coaches, while Maryland and UCLA each was picked by two. Of the 11 coaches who did not vote Oklahoma tops, six picked the Sooners second, one third, two fourth, one seventh and one eighth.

The Orange and the Rose Bowls thus correlated the nation's top four teams, Oklahoma and Maryland, the only undefeated and untied teams in the major college ranks, collide in the Orange Bowl, while Michigan State and UCLA meet in the Rose Bowl.

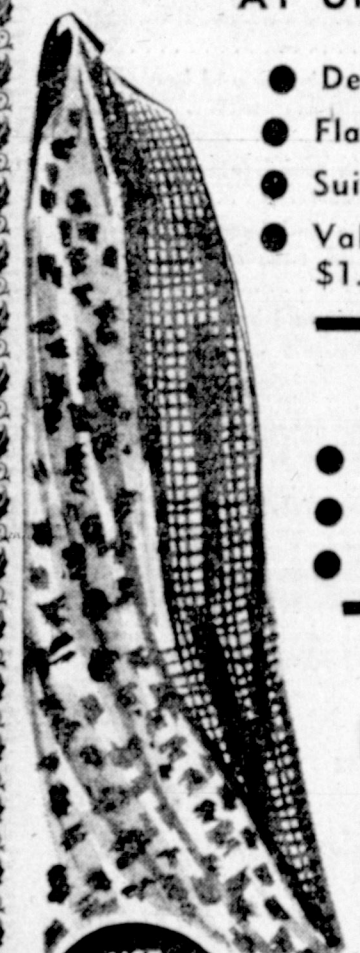
