### School Board Member Urges Bond Approval

Rex Rose, school board member, yesterday urged Pampa Rotarians, at their weekly meeting, to support the \$2,250,000 bond issue to be voted on next Saturday.

Rose pointed out that the election will consist of voting on three separate ballots. One ballot will be for Senate Bill 116, which alters the method of financing the school district. Another ballot, bearing the same wording, will authorize a \$1.50 per \$100 valuation tax rate and the third ballot will be for the three bond issues which total \$2,250,000. The speaker stressed that it was vital that Senate Bill 116 carry inasmuch as the other two ballots would have no force should it fail.

The present tax rate is \$1.25. Rose pointed out, with \$1.05 dedicated to maintenance and 20 cents to bond retirement. It was Rose's opinion that an additional 10 cents or 12 cents would handle the proposed expenditures.

The major issues covered in the bond election are a new junior high school building to be situated on 16 acres by the Perryton parkway at a cost of \$1,348,000; a new 16-room elementary school north of Fairview Cemetery on Duncan at cost \$414,000; new shop buildings and equipment at the high school, \$87,000; an acoustic treatment of the high school field house at \$5,000; remodeling the present junior high school (cafeteria, band room, business office, etc. for \$188,000); new stage curtains for the school system, \$18,000; paving of Decatur St. through the high school property, \$17,000; addition of six classrooms to Lamar School at \$96,000; and replenish funds for purchasing land to be used under the bond issue, \$50,000. All figures used, the speaker stated, were approximate.

In pointing up the need for expanding the school system, Rose emphasized that there are now 200 elementary school students occupying the old Cabot offices and too, it is estimated that there will be 2,000 more students of junior high age by 1960 than are presently enrolled.

At the conclusion of Rose's talk, the club had a program of Christmas musical selections presented by the high school a capella choir. Junior Rotarian for the month of December, Jimmie Partrish, was introduced by David Gantz.

WASHINGTON — UP — Protestant, Catholic and Jewish religious leaders, who had long been urging Benson to take the step, were jubilant at what one of them called "a magnificent victory for human brotherhood."

### Judges For Bond Vote Are Named

The election judges and clerks for the \$2,250,000 school bond election next Saturday were named this morning by Roy McMillen, business manager of the school district.

Presiding judge will be De Lea Vicars, who will be assisted by Arthur Rankin and Frank Stallings. The judges will supervise each election, and will assist voters with the election ballots. They will classify the voters, according to the ballot used in the three separate elections. The largest class of voters will be property owners who have paid their poll tax and have property listed in the school district and county; they will vote in all three elections using three ballots. The second main group of voters will be the qualified poll-tax voters who have no property listed on either role. They will vote on the pink ballot. Those who have property rendered in the school district but not on the county roles will vote on two ballots, the white and pink. And those who are listed on the county role but not the school district role will vote on the pink and blue ballots.

# Dulles Says Reds Reopen Cold War

## 17-Year-Old Killer Of Three Is Sought

VANDERGRIFT, Pa. — UP — State police conducted a house-by-house search of a snow-blanketed rural area north of here Thursday for a 17-year-old boy who killed three members of a family and seriously wounded a fourth, a girl who spurned his attentions.

Police said they believed the slayer, John Fallone, of Near Ford City, Pa., either had found shelter from the subfreezing weather or killed himself in a secluded spot in the coal mining-farming area near Mateer, Pa., after his shooting spree. Officers said he evidently was a "mental case."

One of the victims, William Smail, 47, received only a leg wound in the first outburst of shooting. He crawled for help and returned only to be killed in another fusillade.

After the three killings, Fallone returned to his suburban home about a mile from Mateer, ate and calmly watched television accounts of the murders, police said. Then he went to sleep.

When officers arrived at the Fallone home, they were told he was in bed. But the boy apparently had heard police approach and escaped through a window.

The other dead were identified as Jay Warren Smail, 44, brother of William Smail, and Jay Smail's wife Irene, 36. A daughter of the Jay Smails, Gladys Alene, 15, was reported in poor condition in Armstrong Memorial hospital at near-by Kittanning, Pa., with a chest wound.

WASHINGTON — UP — A 52-day-old strike by flight engineers against United Airlines is over. The strike was settled late Wednesday in time to assure that United Christmas.

The dispute ended with an agreement between company and union on a new contract. United had continued operations despite the strike.

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## American Minister Talks At Opening NATO Session

PARIS — UP — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles warned the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) Thursday that the Soviet Union has launched a new cold war offensive in the Middle East and Asia.

In an address to the opening session of the North Atlantic Council, Dulles said the new Soviet strategy is a serious threat. Speaking for nearly an hour to the assembly foreign, defense and treasury ministers of the 15 NATO nations gathered to review the West's military, political and economic policies in the cold war, Dulles noted that the Soviets have the potential to act decisively.

He said the Soviets were offering both aid and technicians in the Middle East and Asia. He pointed out that Russia has huge stocks of obsolete arms to offer, even though it lacks many consumer goods.

The Dulles speech reviewed in their entirety the Soviet's zig zags of policy for the past year. He said the year started and ended with the cold war. He recalled that last year's annual NATO council meeting met under growing Soviet threats of what would happen if the West approved the Western European Union (WEU).

That crisis came and went, he noted. But the past 12 months, he added, had made up a "kaleidoscopic year" which posed a "lot of puzzles."

He recalled that his prophecies have come true that Russia would not carry out its threats against bringing Germany into NATO.

## Solomon's Wisdom Costs Him A Job

NEW YORK — UP — The "wisdom" of a judge named Solomon seemed likely Thursday to lead to his banishment from vehicle accident court.

Magistrate Charles Solomon came up with his words of wisdom on Tuesday — eight parking cases were dismissed in quick succession.

Wednesday, just as quickly, the word leaked out that Solomon would probably never again be assigned to traffic court after his regular weekly stint there ends Friday.

"I can't help that, can I?" Solomon asked when reporters went to him with the news that he was having his last assignment in traffic court and asked for more words of wisdom.

No kin to Wise King Solomon, who claims no relationship to the original wise king, endeared himself to harried New York motorists with the decision: "You can't prosecute a car."

He made the ruling after a motorist pleaded innocent to overtime parking. The patrolman who issued the ticket admitted he could not prove the motorist owned the ticketed automobile or even that he was responsible for it being illegally parked.

## Town To Sing For President

GETTYSBURG, Pa. — UP — The town of Gettysburg will sing a Merry Christmas salute to President Eisenhower in the town square Thursday night, but the President will miss his neighbors' yuletide greetings.

Because of his doctor's orders to slow down for a while, Mr. Eisenhower is accepting no outside social invitations for the rest of this week.

The people of Gettysburg were disappointed that the President cannot attend their Christmas pageant. But, according to Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty, Mr. Eisenhower's inability to be present reflects no lack of neighborliness. It simply means the President is following his doctors' advice.

Mr. Eisenhower also is keeping his work to a minimum. He planned brief conferences with his staff Thursday but otherwise will spend his time resting and walking around his farm.

Gettysburg has decorated Lincoln Square in the center of town with a colorful Christmas scene that includes a "Santa shanty" where St. Nicholas arrives during the evening. Signs around the yuletide setting proclaim, "Santa comes to Story Town."

## 2-Front War Threatened

CAIRO — UP — Prime Minister Gamal Abdel Nasser announced Egypt was informing the United Nations Thursday that Egypt and Syria will attack Israel on two fronts if there is "any further Israeli aggression."

The virtual ultimatum brought the Middle East crisis to one of its most critical points since the Palestine fighting stopped six years ago.

Egypt and Syria recently allied themselves militarily and formed a joint high command. Communist arms deliveries are filling out Egyptian gaps in equipment. Syria fronts on Israel's northeast border and Egypt abuts the southern frontier.

Nasser issued his warning four days after an Israeli night assault beside the Sea of Galilee killed some 50 Syrians.

Kent said the agreement provides that all flight engineer work will be performed by members of the flight engineers union.

The agreement also calls for wage increases raising flight engineers' monthly pay on DC6 planes from \$775.58 to \$815.53 and on DC7s from \$856 to \$962. The raises are retroactive to Feb. 1, 1955.

A side issue in the strike involved the AFL Airline Pilots' Association, whose members have been substituting for strike flight

engineers on United Airline flights. Kent said this matter will be settled through the efforts of AFL-CIO officials who sat in on part of the negotiations.

### Schools Don't Look Like Schools; That's New Idea

NEW YORK — UP — Contour chairs and pink chalk boards and geometric patterns in the sound-proofed ceiling—that's what the little red school house is made of nowadays.

Educators and architects are selling book learning to beginners in a new way. A school is not supposed to look so much like a school, and according to one leading school architect, communities of all sizes are aware of the change.

"People used to have the idea that when you left home you went to school in a place that was completely different from your home," Ben John Small said. "We build prisons now that are far more handsome than some of the elementary schools used to be."

Now communities are trying to give their children "a gentle transition" from home to school, Small said.

**No Long Corridors**  
"We no longer like for a child to have to go in a main entrance and down a long corridor to his classroom," the architect continued. "They don't do that at home, so why can't they walk right in off the street to their own school room area?"

There is no such thing as fixed seating in a classroom any more. The chairs can be grouped informally at the teacher's discretion. And when we pick out seats we consider things like the impact of spinal curvature on a child's well-being. The seat must promote good posture.

"And if an architect forgets to specify a colored chalk board instead of a black board, well, he's just not hep."

We won't know how successful this new school environment is, Small admitted, for 20 years or so. The ideal result would be a

generation of young adults who liked to learn, and whose education had only whetted their curiosity to continue studying.

"The institutionalized school is too abrupt a change for a child," Small said. "It is a cold environment and an obstacle to learning."

**A Rambling Building**  
The low, rambling buildings widely used for elementary schools now are one way to give a home atmosphere. The most popular color for chalk boards is green, but there also is a choice of beige, charcoal grey, pink and off-white.

Small admitted there were complications to this change. "Communities now go shopping for curriculums," he said. "They are eager to teach the latest subjects when they start to build a new school. The result is that a school building has to contain some astonishing possibilities for study."

Once a child moves into secondary schools he now has a choice of such subjects as tea room management, cosmetology, television theory and earth science as well as more orthodox courses.

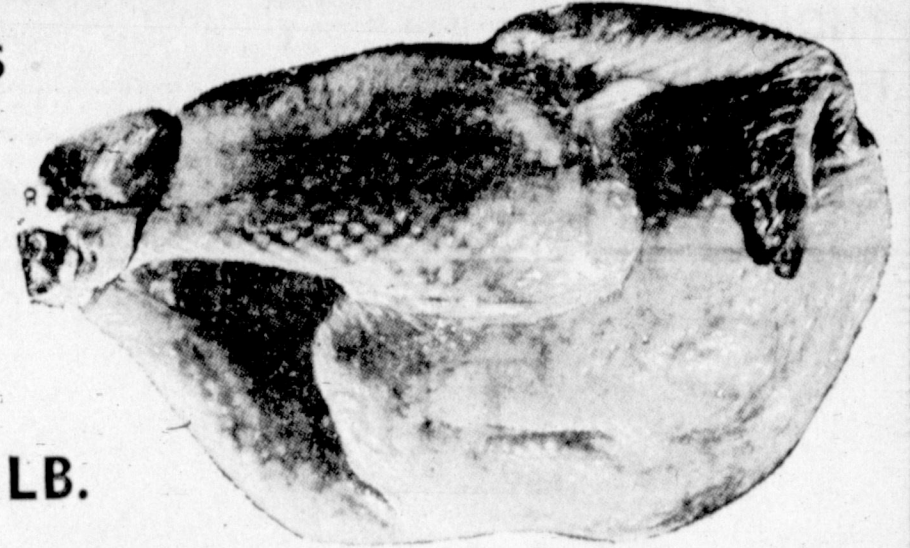

Producer Of TV Dramas Hears From Rough Critics

By WILLIAM EWALD NEW YORK — UP — Herbert Brodtkin holds the kind of TV job which requires him to cope with cheery little letters like this:

"Dear sir... your show of Nov. 27 was the most hypocritical and cowardly display that we have ever seen on TV. We intend to retaliate by boycotting your product and poisoning your name wherever possible..."

By now, Brodtkin, producer of the Alcoa and Goodyear dramas, has learned to take this kind of (animal in stride. "Less than one per cent of our mail is critical," says Brodtkin, "and sometimes even some of that is constructive."

However, Brodtkin confessed that some of the one per cent were 100 per cent ear-blasters. "We did one show on Nov. 27 with Melvyn Douglas," said Brodtkin, "called 'Thunder in Washington' that stirred up more controversy than any other show in our series."

The program dealt with a businessman who volunteers for government service and winds up as

the center of a congressional investigation. Its ending was inconclusive and the show evoked such bon-bons as:

"...A deliberate plan to subvert our government institutions..." "What is the idea of making Congress an out-and-out villain?" "Rest assured I shall avoid as far as possible buying anything marked Alcoa."

"The play was wonderful, but the ending stank!" Brodtkin answers all of these literary delights as a matter of course. He even answers when the writers seem to be courting no reply.

Brodtkin, former producer of such shows as "The Elgin Hour," "Motorola TV" and "ABC Album," has learned, he said, to stick to his guns.

"I long ago made up my mind," he said, "to do the kind of thing I want to do. If you try to please everyone, you wind up pleasing no one."

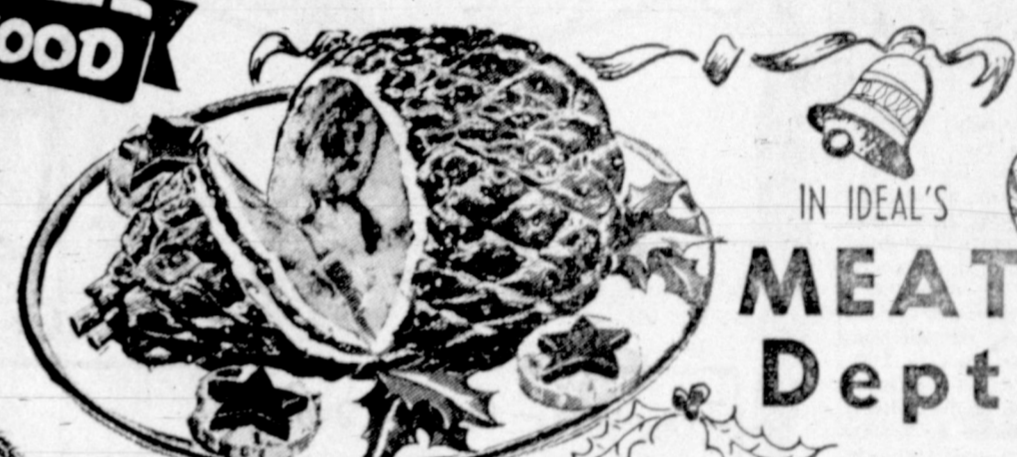

## IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

With December 15 being observed as "Bill of Rights Day" throughout the land, many persons are (or should be) thinking about what this important "document" means to them. This column will attempt a brief explanation of its meaning.

The American "Bill of Rights," consisting of the first ten amendments to our federal constitution, all adopted at one time in 1791, specifies in some detail a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Unaltered by subsequent amendments and jealously guarded by our courts, these privileges must still be respected by our governing bodies today.

Among the most familiar of our constitutional guarantees are those relating to freedom of religion, speech, and of the press. The same article protects the rights of peaceful assembly and the privilege of petitioning the government for redress of grievances.

Another amendment secures our persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, and specifies that no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, and unless supported by oath or affirmation.

The due process of law amendment encompasses not one but several guarantees. Every American is secured against being placed twice in legal jeopardy for the same offense; against being compelled to be a witness against himself in a criminal case; and against having his private property taken for public use without just compensation.

He is also secured against being held for trial for a capital (death penalty) or other infamous crime, unless upon a presentment or indictment of a grand jury. And, of course, no person may be deprived of life, liberty or property without orderly court procedures, on due process of law.

The right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury, in the locality where the crime was committed, the right to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, and the rights to compel attendance of defense witnesses and to have the assistance of defense counsel in all criminal prosecutions are secured by another section of the "Bill of Rights."

Excessive bail and fines, and cruel and unusual punishments, are prohibited in Amendment VIII. Other articles insure the right to bear arms and ban quartering of soldiers in private homes during peace time.

Then, to make quite clear to our governing bodies the underlying intent of the preceding provisions, the Ninth Amendment states: "The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

The Tenth Amendment further emphasizes this basic theory by providing: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

Thus, that fundamental philosophy expressed in the Declaration of Independence, that men are endowed with certain unalienable rights, and that "to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed," has been carried forward into the highest law of our land.

**HOLIDAY DINNERS** seem wonderful to you, the hostess, too, if you have learned the secret of serving your guests, on such occasions, a tray of attractive but simply-prepared appetizers with beverages in the living room before dinner.

**THE INFORMALITY** of moving about to help themselves to the cheese and other appetizers on tray will put your guests at ease and spark good conversation. And what a wonderful opportunity it provides for you to put the main course on the dining table.

For this holiday appetizer tray, feature a Baby Gouda cheese which has been cut into wedges, though not completely through the cheese. You may wish to cut the cheese early in the day and store it in a plastic bag in your refrigerator.

Just at serving time curl over your fingers and outward, the red wax pellets which you have created in the cutting of the wax-coated cheese into wedges. If you have a Christmas poinsettia plant in your home be sure to place it near your appetizer tray so that your guests may notice the resemblance between your cut and red-petaled Gouda cheese and the poinsettia.

Your canapes and other appetizers may also be made earlier in the day and stored in plastic bags in your refrigerator.

For some easily-prepared canapes use a doughnut cutter, cookie cutters and a sharp knife to cut circles, squares, wreaths and stars from light brown toasted slices of bread. Spread on each of the toast shapes one of these savory butters, anchovy, lemon, olive, shrimp or sardine. Top them with any one or two of the following: grated egg-yolk, chopped parsley, thin slices of stuffed olive, or thin wedges of ripe olive. Another fancy touch may be given to a few of the canapes by using some lemon butter in your cake decorating cone to decorate them lightly.

**TO PREPARE** the tall, speared appetizer tidbits, red and green plastic or wooden party picks can appear a flavorful and colorful combination of the following: fancy cuts of Gouda cheese, tiny cubes of lean ham, button mushrooms, which have been marinated in tart French dressing, halves of stuffed green olives.

The bases for the speared appetizer tidbits are triangle cuts of Edam cheese. Fancy oval slices of Gouda cheese complete your tray.

**D-Y Sues For Funds Return**

WASHINGTON—UP—The Dixie Yates interests filed suit against the Atomic Energy Commission Tuesday to recover \$3,534,788 spent by the private utility ombudsman on the canceled Dixon-Yates power contract.

The suit was filed in the U.S. Court of Claims here by Attorney Daniel James, representing the Mississippi Valley Generating Co. That was the firm formed by the Dixon-Yates interests to carry out the controversial power contract.

The AEC, which once approved the contract, declared it invalid on Nov. 23 because of a possible violation of the conflict of interest law. It said it would make no cancellation payments.

North Carolina State, ranked No. 3 nationally, for the Atlantic Coast Conference title. State has won a league crown seven times in the last eight years, but McGuire's young team may be ready to take over.

North Carolina State easily turned back League for South Carolina Wednesday night, 90-66. Held to a 35-30 margin at halftime, the Wolfpack ran away in the second half as All-America candidate Ronnie Shavlik set the scoring pace with 28 points.

Dayton, the nation's No. 5 team, played host to Idaho of the Pacific Coast Conference and easily extended its record to 5-0 with a 93-56 triumph. Flyer first-stringers played only half the game but seven-foot Bill Uhl took scoring honors with 18 points.

Kentucky, which narrowly defeated DePaul after losing to Temple, will try to regain its touch Thursday night against Maryland.

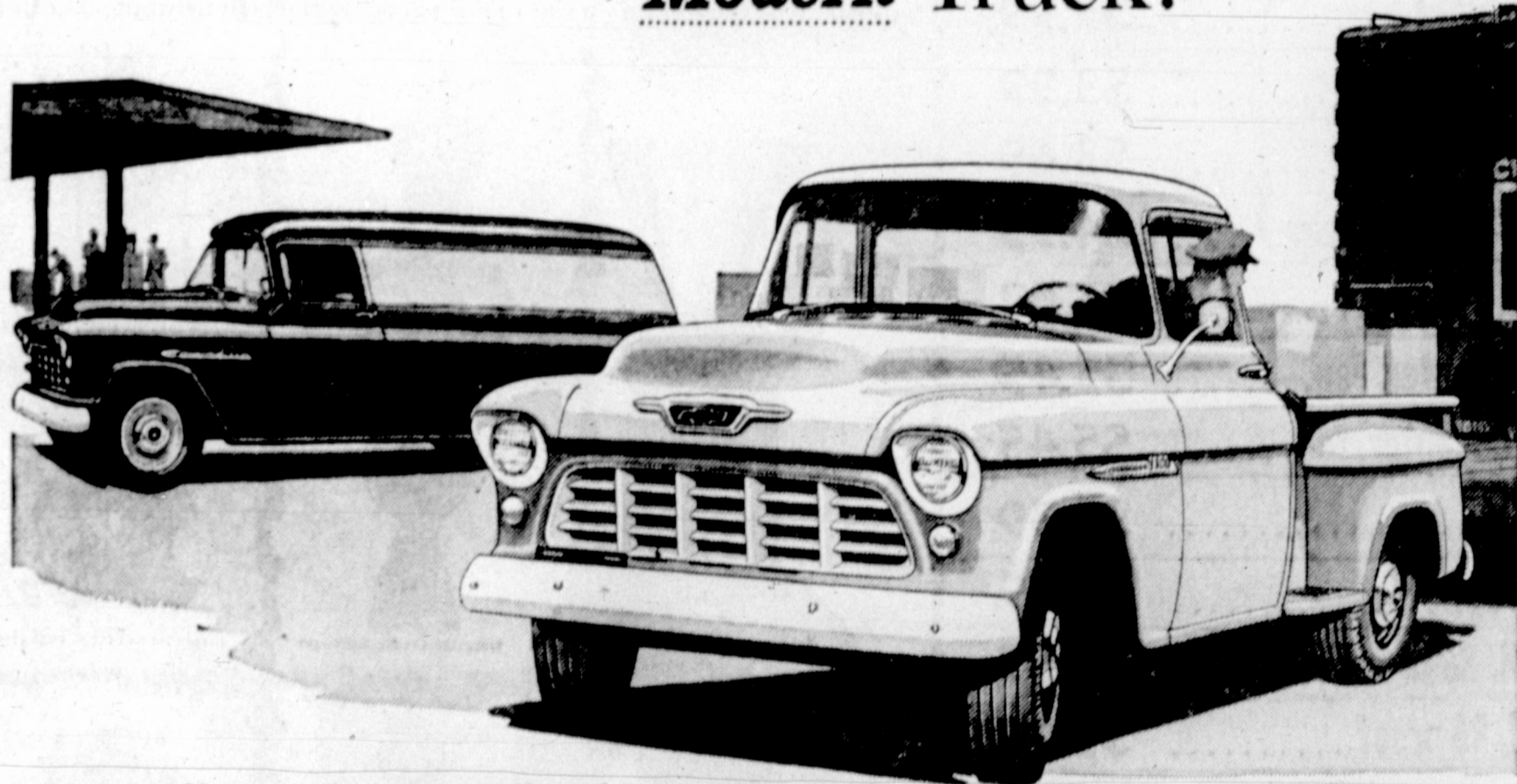
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# Unbeaten Reapers To Meet Phillips Today

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# Maryland, Oklahoma Get Ready For Orange Bowl Game Jan. 2

Editors Note: This is the first of a series on the teams in the bowl football games.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. — UP — That old baseball phrase — "good field, no hit" — best describes the Maryland team that faces mighty Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl Jan. 2.

The 1955 Terrapins went undefeated in a 10-game season largely because of their mammoth and mobile line. It is big, savage, hungry and proud — taking more delight in throwing somebody for a 20 yard loss than the average team takes in scoring touchdowns.

This was the line that held high-scoring UCLA to 21 yards minus rushing; that permitted no opponent more than two touchdowns; that led the nation in defense against rushing with a pre-game average of only 76.1 yards; that hung up a "Dream Game" in its Maryland's superb defense that makes the Orange Bowl clash a literal "dream game," because Oklahoma will be throwing the nation's top rushing attack against that brawny Terrapin line. When Maryland Coach Jim Tatum was asked what would happen when the "irresistible force" met the "immovable object," he replied frankly: "I don't know. Oklahoma never ran against a line as good as ours but we never saw an offense as good as theirs."

Tatum's concrete defense includes All-America linebacker Bob Pettigrew, tackle Mike Sandusky and two crack guards — Jack Davis and Gene Dyson, Maryland's second string line is as big and almost as good as the first. The Terrapins' four ends — Bill Walker, Russ Dennis, Tom Flynn and Jim Parsons — are seniors with experience and savvy.

Spotty on Offense

Offensively, Maryland has been erratic and spotty all year. Quarterback Frank Tamburello is smart, takes well and is rated a

fair passer. Halfback Ed Vereb, the Washington Redskins' No. 1 draft pick, is a fast slyer and the Terrapins' only consistent ground-gainer. The other Maryland backs are either too light or too slow to be mentioned in the same breath as Oklahoma's fleet Gryhounds, and the Terrapins are particularly weak at the fullback slot where two converted sophomore halfbacks, Phil Perlo and Fred Hamilton, share the duties.

Maryland's aerial game is used mainly as an auxiliary weapon, seldom employed in the Terrapins' own territory but an occasional surprise threat.

Defense-minded Tatum naturally won't reveal what plans he has for slowing down Oklahoma's swift backs and it may be he won't change the defense patterns that worked so well all year. Maryland's basic defense is a 5-4-2, occasionally shifting to a seven-man line.

## New Coach Hires Baylor Assistants

WACO — UP — Three members of the 1955 Baylor football coaching staff were rehired Thursday by new Bear Coach Sam Boyd.

Boyd said James (Buddy) Parker would remain as a varsity assistant while Bob Barfield and Charlie Driver, freshmen coaches last season, will move up as varsity assistants.

Boyd said he would name two additional coaches in the near future.

**ALICE COACH DENIES HE INTENDS TO PROTEST PLAYOFF**

ALICE, Tex. — UP — Coach Cleo Rigby denied Thursday reports he intends to protest his team's loss last Saturday to Port Neches in the Class AAA schoolboy football semifinals.

"We lost the game 14-7 and that's the way it stands," Rigby said.

Rigby admitted there was some question over a guard-eligible play which Port Neches used to beat Alice with less than two minutes to play. But he denied a report he would file a protest of the play with the Texas Interscholastic League.

If Port Neches hadn't scored their final touchdown the game would have ended in a 7-7 tie and Alice would have advanced to the state finals against Garland on penetrations.

Port Neches' winning touchdown came when guard Norvel Dorsey took a snap from center and raced 54 yards. The question on the play is whether a rule requiring in certain instances a potential ball-carrier to turn facing his own goal applies in this case.

## H'School Playoffs Near End

HILLSBORO, Tex. — UP — The switch of a speedy guard to fullback has brought Hillsboro down a predicted "also-ran" finish to the Class AA schoolboy football semifinals this year.

Hillsboro will meet Westlaco in the semifinals at Waco Saturday and the Eagles success is no secret. It's an awesome split-T ground attack led by fullback Merlin Priddy who has averaged close to 200 yards per game in Hillsboro's three playoff contests.

Priddy's chief running mate is halfback David Hernandez and both have gained more than 1,000 yards on the ground this season.

Priddy was a three-time all-district guard, but made the shift to fullback when Coach P. T. Galiga felt he needed the 190-pound lad's 10.2 speed in the backfield.

But Hillsboro needs its feared running attack to make up for a passing weakness. In three playoff games, the Eagles have thrown only 12 passes, completing four for only 30 yards.

Paired with the ground attack is a tremendous defense sparked by Priddy at linebacker, 190-pound center Mickey Jackson, 185-pound end Robert Himmel and 210-pound tackle Marvin Daley.

Coach Galiga pursues a defensive strategy and spends the bulk of his practice time on it, explaining simply: "If they can't score, they can't beat us."

So far it has worked. Wauhatchie was averaging four touchdowns a game until Hillsboro came along and held them to one. Killeen averaged six touchdowns a game but had to settle for two against the Eagles and they were not enough.

If the Eagles have a weakness, it is depth and lack of passing. Thus far, however, neither has hurt.

It is a team of iron men and four of the players — Priddy, Hernandez, Himmel and Jackson — have played every minute of nine of the Eagles' twelve games this year.

NORMAN, Okla. — UP — Oklahoma is the nation's No. 1 team in ranking, scoring, rushing and total offense, but perennial pessimist Bud Wilkinson fears Maryland's defense will take the bloom off the Sooners' Orange Bowl football hopes.

Wilkinson, in contrast to Maryland Coach Jim Tatum, believes in conditioning his team for victory and his fans for defeat, he exhorts he thinks his national champions can win. His Orange Bowl prediction fits that pattern.

"I think all of the advantages are with Maryland," he said. "The best defensive team will win in any case, and I have a feeling Maryland is a far superior defensive team than ours — and they share the feeling."

Oklahoma's swift backs and line-men almost as fast are riding the crest of a 29-game winning streak, 53 Big Seven Conference games without defeat, and have scored in 165 straight games.

Would Near Own Record

The Sooners beat Maryland 7-0 in the 1954 Orange Bowl and an 10-2 speed in the backfield.

Other victory this time would all but clear the way for Oklahoma to break its own national record of 31 straight triumphs. The Sooners' first two opponents next season are North Carolina and Kansas State.

Wilkinson tries to prepare the Sooners for one game at a time, emphasizing each victory as equally important. But it's no secret the hopped-up Sooners want to win this one more than any other.

Tatum's predictions of victory and praise of his No. 3 ranked team has irritated many of Oklahoma's high-spirited players. An added factor is Tatum's unpopularity in Oklahoma while Sooner coach in 1946 — with Wilkinson as his assistant — and team leaders see the game as a contest between Wilkinson and Tatum. They don't want Wilkinson to come in second-best.

"We won't have any trouble getting up for this one," said tackle Ed Gray. Also Oklahoma dropped the 1951 Sugar Bowl game to Kentucky 13-7, at the end of the only other season the Sooners were ranked No. 1.

Many Favorites Lose

Wilkinson pointed out that in past bowl games the favorite lost about 75 per cent of the time, but said he did not think the psychological effect of a team's national ranking had any effect.

The 1955 Oklahoma squad averaged 36.5 points per game — well below the 1952 squad's 49.7 average — but many observers think this Sooner edition is Wilkinson's finest overall unit.

The key this season has been speed. In halfback Tommy McDonaid Oklahoma has one of the fastest backs in the game, "equally dangerous running or passing. If the defense spreads to stop McDonaid — as did Colorado — right halfback Robert Burris and fullback Billy Piker churn through the middle. Guard Bo Bolinger, an All-America, leads a Sooner line strongest from tackle to tackle.

But Maryland game movies show the Terrapins are "by far the best team we've played," Wilkinson said gloomily. "I think we'll play as hard as we can play," he added in his closest move toward a prediction. "If they beat us it will be because they played better."

Should we, at any time, be inconsistent with these truths, we would appreciate anyone pointing out to us how we are inconsistent with these moral guides.

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Which Way

Were we to attempt to sum up our problems of this 20th century into a single phrase, we would be inclined to say that more than any other thing we are endangered because of our old world dependence on and worship of Authority.

And the tyrants were not slow to exploit this feeling of awe on the part of the populace. Many of them would superstitiously ignore the ignorance of their subjects by insisting that they were divinely born, or even that they achieved godhood by virtue of their military prowess.

And the people believed this hooey to such a degree that dependence upon Authority has become almost a part of the mores of the human race itself. To augment the problem, persons who rebel against Authority, frequently are misfits, criminally inclined, who have not learned to govern themselves and who merely flout their own petty and malicious desires in the face of truth and justice.

It is small wonder that true progress on the part of humanity is slow. Not that we have failed to progress totally. Our ability to pierce the mysterious veil of science and penetrate to the innermost secrets of the physical world in which we live is unsurpassed. And by means of this intellectual achievement, we are now able to survive better and more surely than ever before.

Yet, in this regard, since we have carried over the barbaric dependence upon pomp and circumstance, we lack self-discipline. Our leisure time becomes the devil's workshop. We expect the government to solve our problems and we resist the inclination to stand erect upon our own dependable extremities.

It is plain that the human race stands at the crossroads between heaven and hell. We will throw off our dependence upon authority, assume our own individual responsibility and reject the superstitions of our barbaric forebears. Or, we will not. If we do not, then our dependency will continue. We will refuse to bestir ourselves as individuals. We will be content to move en masse. The government will be the be-all and the end-all of our existence. But since government is, by nature a consuming, not a producing entity, we will eat up our substance and devour our future through a lethargic willingness to barter our freedom and self-reliance for the crust of bread that poses as security.

This does not mean the end of the human race. For from it, it merely means the continuance of superstition, barbarism, violence, coercion, deceit, dependency and ignominy instead of the broader, brighter way that might be ours.

It is time we learned that authority can do nothing for us that we cannot do for ourselves. And the willingness of our governmental officials to "help" us is the apple of discord which baits us to forego the victory that might be ours as individuals.

Man does not live well when he seeks to live alone. His chances of survival and comfort are reduced when he moves outside the realm of the free market. But there is a world of difference between voluntary cooperation, as exemplified in the market place where both persons to every transaction expect to profit, and compulsory obedience, in which the will of the Authority is substituted for the individual desires of every person.

Where compulsory obedience rules, cooperation vanishes. True, men work together. But only to the extent of the rewards or punishments that will be theirs at the hands of the Authority.

Where voluntary cooperation occurs, men work together willingly. Their rewards or punishment are of their own making. And each man learns to live according to the best within him, since he is a self-responsible individual and the results of evil rebound swiftly upon the perpetrator.

Compulsive societies are the hallmarks of savagery. Voluntary cooperation comes only with civilization. Dependence upon Authority breeds the compulsive society. Dependence upon one's self brings freedom and individual responsibility. Which way, America? Which way, world?

Why Not Federal School Aid?

There's much discussion as to whether the Federal Government should help pay for government schools. The National Educational Association is strongly in favor of this belief. The conference recently held in Washington seemed to support this idea.

I have never heard but two reasons why the government should be engaged in "educational" work. One is that if it were not for government schools the children of the poor would be unable to get an education.

The other reason is that we have to have an educated citizenry in order to have a good government. And this belief is based on the theory that if the government does not educate, the parents will not educate their children, and therefore we will have a dumb, illiterate citizenry.

Now, if either of these "reasons" be true, then it seems logical that we should have Federal aid to education. If government "education" is necessary so that the poor will be educated, then there is no rational reason why the poor in every state should not be taken care of by the richer citizens in the United States. It would seem selfish and harsh and unsympathetic for the rich states to be able to furnish schooling for the rich states while the poorer states would be less able to take care of their poor than the wealthier states would be.

Thus, following this so-called humanitarian line, we should not only "educate" all the children in the United States but we should try to educate all the children throughout the world. There's lots and lots of poverty in the rest of the world and if government schools are based on humanitarian ideas, then why limit government schools to the United States? Why not have the richer nations like the United States furnish teachers and books for the very, very poor throughout the world?

Or, if the purpose of government schools is to train persons so that they will be intelligent citizens, then if we are interested in the welfare of the United States, the richer states should be just as much interested in educating the children in the poorer states as they are in educating the children in the richer states. The voters for Senators and Congressmen in the poorer states need understanding in order to have good government just as much as they need it in the richer states.

And we can carry the same line of reasoning that if we do not want to be invaded, we should educate the youth of the land in every land, then we would not need to have such big standing armies.

It is hard to see how anybody that really believes in the majority having the right to force the minority to pay for what the majority thinks is education, should be opposed to Federal aid to education. They are certainly inconsistent to believe in local government schools and not to believe in national or international schools.

Of course, the real reason against Federal aid to education is exactly the same as the reason against state or county or local government schools. They are all based on injustice. They are all based on the theory that the might of the majority has the right to coerce the minority to pay for something they do not want. They are all based on state socialism.

Instead of government schools, whether they be local, state or Federal, being able to educate the youth of the land, they make it infinitely more difficult for those attending government schools to get an understanding of what is right and what is wrong, what is justice and what is injustice. In other words, they handicap those attending government schools in getting an education. They make it more difficult for them to understand that to the degree a government is limited to only doing what each and every individual has a natural right to do, to that degree will we have a good government. Government schools, by their very nature, advocate bigger government, more power, more authority—that the government is the giver of liberty rather than God or nature.

Those people who believe in any form of state education have been handicapped by state education. They have not been taught to recognize a contradiction. They have not been taught to overcome this handicap that comes from government education—local, state or Federal. Contradictions and inconsistencies mean nothing to them. They are taught to believe in the divine right of the majority.

There's not much question but what eventually the Federal government will take complete control of "education." And it should if the theory of local government education is right that government can educate, then why not have the biggest taxing and more powerful taxing unit seizing the wealth of the wealthy to indoctrinate all the people to believe in bigger and bigger and ever bigger government.

And it seems, of course, absurd to rational people to believe that the Federal government that is now in debt head over heels and has no money that it does not take from private citizens, should be undertaking to educate the youth of the land.

If we are not intelligent enough to pay our own government costs and are saddling onto the youth of the land some debts of about \$4,000 per child, why believe that the government was wise enough to educate the youth of the land and then try to make the youth of the land pay for their own education? How foolish can we be?

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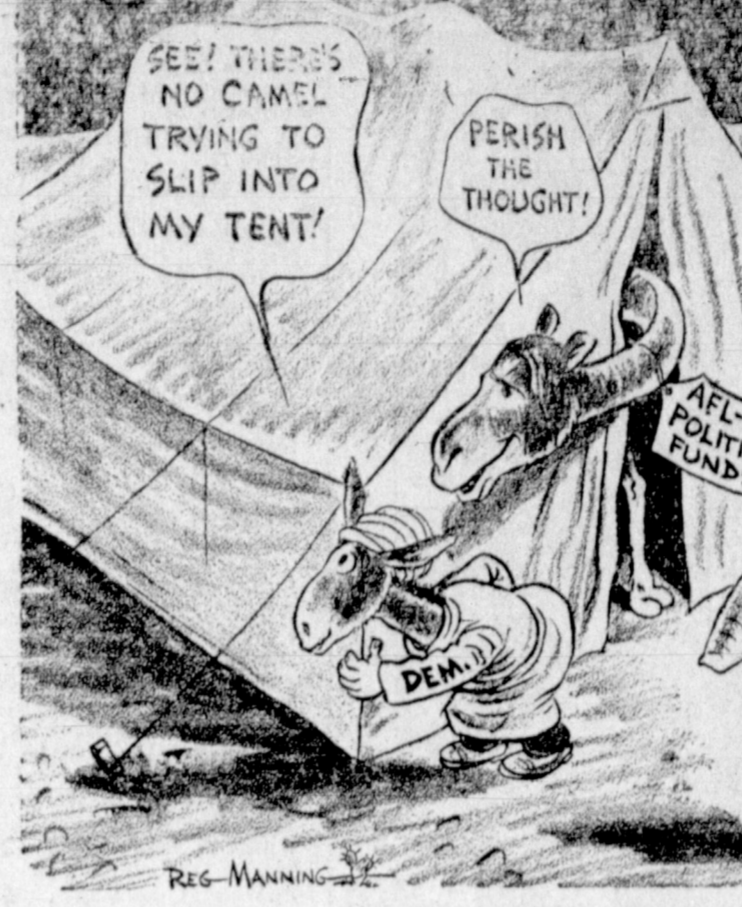
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Fair Enough Labor Union Merger Proves Cynicism Of Both Parties By WESTBROOK PEGLER

The merger of the AF of L and the CIO is a menace, the more ominous because it proves in final terms, the brutal cynicism of politicians of both national parties. At this sad hour the tragic condition of Joe Ryan, the old president of the International Longshoremen's Association, reveals the cruel character of the world trade called politics. Last winter George Meany, the president of the AF of L and now president of the grand cabal, received from Notre Dame University a medal intended to confer honor on all who receive it. He will be collecting many trash baubles from others equally eager to capitalize his spurious distinction but well knowing that he has never been anything but a political boss of chartered job-trusts.

Joe Ryan is the one man who kept off the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts Harry Bridges and the Communist goons and saboteurs behind him and his CIO union of longshoremen, Joe Ryan is the one man who planted George Meany in the presidency of the New York State Federation of Labor, who promoted him into national rank in the American Federation of Labor—in short who put George Meany where he is today. Yet Ryan drags himself wearily on his dull little personal errands down around Chelsea Village, New York, his heart dead within him, deserted by men who owe everything to him, hounded by the state and federal governments, broke, sick and dependent.

Meany and every veteran of the old, crude, roughneck union rackets and fights not only on the waterfront but in the building trades and teaming, knew the coarse brutal facts of life in Joe Ryan's ball-walk many years ago. They didn't protest then. Most of them were his political accomplices and that certainly includes George Meany whose countenance now beams from the papers with all the fine character and expression of a portrait of a hoop.

The New York county grand jury indicted Ryan after the Mr. Big investigation but it did not indict Mr. Big, himself. The United States grand jury indicted Joe for something concerning his income tax but it did not indict Mr. Big. The Department of Justice hounded Joe with a nasty persecution under the Taft-Hartley Act when thousands of other flagrant, open-and-shut cases were howling for action all over the United States.

Tom Dewey made a deal with Ryan's old colleague and benefactor, George Meany, to chase a busted, broken crippled old fighter off the docks which he had defended against the Communists throughout the war when the CIO was hogging scarce and precious air transportation from San Francisco and Seattle to the east coast ports to conspire with treacherous New Deal unionizers of the CIO. They were preparing to seize the ports as soon as Russia was saved from the Nazis.

At Dewey's behest, and Meany's, though it was strictly none of Dewey's business, being a federal matter, the labor relations board held an election under legal supervision. Dewey is not a good judge of elections as we observed in 1944 and 1948. In this case he and Meany were knocked off the deep end by an inspiring demonstration
