President Assigns Self A Vigorous 1955 Schedule

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Nov. 23 — UP — President Eisenhower, fresh from an encouraging new physical checkup, took over active command of the Republican party Wednesday and assigned himself a vigorous presidential schedule for the rest of the year.

Benson Reveals Soil Bank

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 23 — UP — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson revealed Wednesday that the government has started work on a \$400 million "soil bank" program to bolster farm income.

At the same time, he appealed to "everyone" for suggestions to the problems we face.

Benson disclosed preliminary details of the land bank program in a press conference following his speech to the 89th annual convention of the National Grange. He said that although the plan now under consideration would prohibit harvesting of crops from land set aside by farmers to receive government payments, it would exempt grazing.

Rejects Rigid Supports

The feature was apparently aimed at some land bank critics who contend that farmers with small acreage would not benefit.

In his speech to the Grange, Benson rejected any suggestions that would return to a system of rigid, high price supports.

"I ask everyone of you to send me your ideas about solutions to the problems we face," he said. "Every suggestion will be considered and every letter will receive a personal answer."

"We will listen to any suggestions — from any source — except the suggestion that would turn back to the programs that helped create our present difficulties," he said.

Moving Surplus Faster

He said that rigid price supports were useful in wartime, but have failed in peacetime. "Flexible supports wisely used can be helpful in peacetime and should be used," he said. "But in view of present surpluses, they are not and never will be enough."

At the press conference following the speech, Benson was asked about remarks made before the Grange Tuesday by Rep. Jamie L. Whitten (D-Miss.), chairman of the Agricultural Appropriations subcommittee. He charged that the administration was not disposing of surplus commodities, and advocated sales in world markets.

"Since July 1, 1953," Benson answered, "we have moved out of government storage and into consumption commodities with a cost value of \$4 billion. That is nearly twice as much as our predecessors moved in the two years before the Korean war."

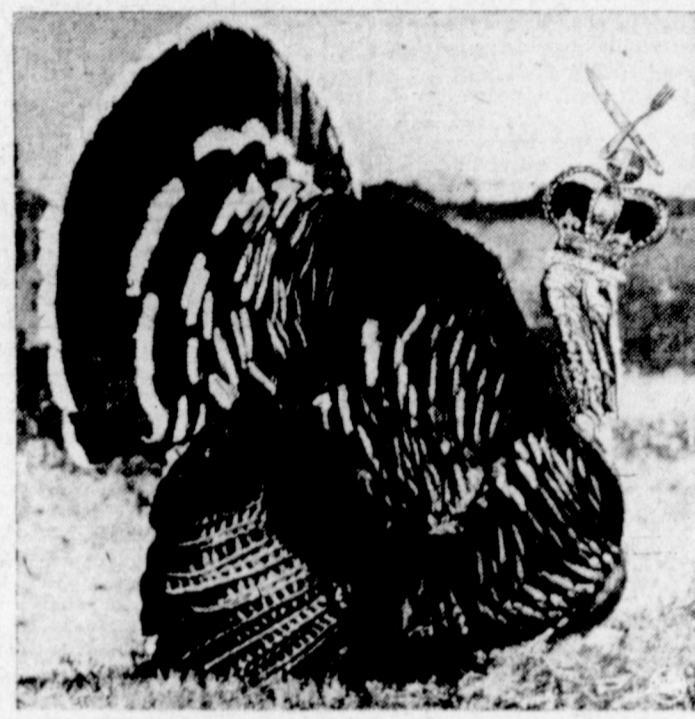

Reds Seize Climbers

LONDON, Nov. 23 — UP — Chinese Communists have seized two British climbers and a Sherpa guide exploring the towering Himalayan mountains, it was disclosed Wednesday.

The two Britons — Sidney Wignall, the expedition leader, and John Harrop — and the guide were taken by the Reds in the area of 23,072-foot Mt. Solopal along the border of the independence kingdom of Nepal and Tibet, which is now under Chinese Communist rule.

News of the capture reached the newspaper, Liverpool Post, which is a sponsor of the exploring expedition.

The foreign office announced that it has ordered urgent inquiries into the fate of the two Britons and their guide.

The governments of Nepal and neighboring India have been asked for any available information. Pending the receipt of further reports, the foreign office decided to make no representations direct to the Chinese Red government with which Britain maintains diplomatic relations.

However, it was reported that the situation had been made known to the Chinese Communist diplomatic mission in London and that it promised to make inquiries immediately to Peiping.

The Liverpool Post received its information in a letter from John Henson, now acting leader of the expedition.

The area in question is ill-defined, and is claimed by both Tibet and Nepal.

School Head Makes S-D Day Statement

Appealing for unanimous support for "S-D Day" — safe Driving Day, Thursday, December 1, Superintendent of Schools Knox Kinard declared today:

"If S-D Day can impress upon every citizen of Pampa the necessity for driving and walking safely 365 days every year, it will be one of the finest things that ever happened to this community."

Superintendent Kinard reminded that children and young people are among the most frequent victims in traffic. He noted:

"Last year in the United States, these accidents killed 1,760 children under 5 years of age, 2,350 between 5 and 14 years, and 7,800 between 15 and 24. School years are dangerous years.

"Here in Pampa, there were no deaths last year, and none so far this year. So, our own record, in protecting our children is good, but we must maintain constant vigilance to make certain that it stays good.

"We in the schools have the duty to instill the essentials of safety in the minds of our elementary school children, and within the limitations of funds and facilities available to us to make it possible for our high school students to have driving lessons, so they'll know how to protect their own lives, and the lives of others. We intend to carry out this duty.

"Like all of us in the schools, parents have a double duty: to teach young people to drive and walk safely; and to drive and walk safely ourselves.

"By all means, let's make S-D Day completely accident free in Pampa. But, let's not stop with S-D Day. In fact, let's not wait for S-D Day. Let's make a pledge right now that we'll fulfill our personal responsibility for safe driving and safe walking every day and night as long as we live. As long as we live we'll be longer if we do."

Holiday Traffic Record Is Seen

CHICAGO, Nov. 23 — UP — Weathermen Wednesday predicted a cold, but snowless, Thanksgiving Day for most of the nation, spurring holiday travel to expected record highs.

Weather bureau officials said the nation as a whole would be "rather on the cool side" Thursday. They predicted snow only for parts of New England, the central and northern Rockies and extreme northern Michigan.

Rail, airline and bus officials

added extra equipment to handle the increased traffic.

Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council, urged caution on the highway as a special preview of safe driving day, one week from Thursday.

Don't Spoil It
"There is no surer way to change and spoil the whole tone of Thanksgiving," he said, "than by bringing heartbreak and suffering to anyone on the very day itself."

Not everyone was to travel on the holiday.

President Eisenhower planned to spend a quiet day at his Gettysburg farm with Mrs. Eisenhower; their son Maj. John S. Eisenhower; his wife, Barbara, and the three grandchildren.

Adlai E. Stevenson, the man whom Mr. Eisenhower defeated for the presidency in 1952, also will be at his farm home near Libertyville, Ill. Stevenson planned to host staff members at dinner.

Troops To Eat Well
Army troops scattered all over the world won't be forgotten when it comes to the traditional turkey.

Fifth Army headquarters here said the standard menu would include turkey with sage dressing and giblet gravy, three kinds of potatoes, buttered peas, creamed onions, hot rolls and butter, fruit cake and either pumpkin or mince meat pie.

At Pittsburgh, parks director George B. McDonough was taking no chances with the plump turkeys which roam Allegheny county parks. He ordered them confined to their pens for the duration of the holiday.

Solon Says Firms Won't Testify

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 — UP — Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney said Wednesday that some auto dealers who are critical of General Motors Corp. have declined to testify at a Senate hearing in fear of "reprisals."

The Wyoming Democrat, head of a monopoly subcommittee investigating the giant auto firm, said he has received a "flood of letters" from dealers and parts manufacturers objecting to certain GM practices.

But some of them contend it would be "economic suicide" for them to testify publicly. O'Mahoney said. He added that "we will do our best to see that there are no reprisals" for those who do testify.

"The picture here shows a steady trend toward absolute control of the auto industry in the offices of General Motors," the senator said. Individual enterprise, he said, no longer exists in the auto industry. Recent mergers of smaller auto manufacturers, he added, prove they no longer could compete on their own against GM and the Ford Motor Co.

O'Mahoney said some GM dealers complain they have been pushed to "the brink of disaster" by being forced to sell more cars than they can on a sound financial basis. He quoted them as citing too lenient credit terms and "exaggerated" trade-ins as results of GM demands for sales.

Brazilians Consider Martial Law Bill

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 23 — UP — The Chamber of Deputies debated Wednesday a government bill which would declare modified martial law throughout Brazil.

Acting President Nereu Ramos asked for passage of the state of siege bill, which would suspend certain constitutional guarantees and vest special powers in him, in order to prevent further political crises over Brazil's presidential succession.

The chamber's final vote was being delayed by a series of 39 amendments introduced by the measure's opponents. Each amendment was being voted separately.

Could Search Homes
Under the state of siege, the government would have special powers to impose censorship, restrict the movement of civilians, suspend the right of assembly and make house searches and arrests without warrants.

The Brazilian supreme court meanwhile took under consideration a petition for a writ of habeas corpus on behalf of President Joao Cafe Filho and an injunction petition against the Congress Tuesday barring Cafe from office.

Both houses of Congress voted overwhelmingly Tuesday to declare Cafe unfit to resume the presidency after his recent heart attack although his physicians declared him fit.

Cafe Kept at Home
Cafe was the latest political case.

Crowds Cheer Pope

CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy, Nov. 23 — UP — Thousands of visitors from all over the world cheered Pope Pius XII Wednesday on his first public appearance since the official statement that he had seen a vision of Christ.

Shouts of "Viva il papa" (live the pope) echoed in the rectangular courtyard of the Pope's 17th-century summer villa in this village six miles south of Rome.

The pope spoke to the crowd for 15 minutes, addressing individual groups in six languages — English, Italian, French, Spanish, German and Portuguese.

He made no mention of the vision of Christ which the official statement said he saw last December at his bedside in the gravest age of his long illness.

But Vatican sources said the pope may speak of the vision when he broadcasts his Christmas message to the world from his study in the Vatican on Dec. 24.

Long Thanksgiving Day Set In Korea

WESTERN TRUCE FRONT, Korea, Nov. 24 (UP)—It will be a long, muddy Thanksgiving Day for thousands of American troops in Korea.

There is little holiday spirit, and several days of rain hasn't helped. But morale generally is high and almost to a man GI's of the front-line 34th U. S. infantry regiment shruggled off this holiday away from home with a "things could be worse" attitude.

Early Thursday morning, like American troops elsewhere in Korea, the front-line soldiers will give thanks at special masses and chapel services.

About noon, they will pour into quonset hut mess halls for the traditional turkey dinner with all the trimmings.

May Toss Turkey Bones

A handful of soldiers plan to go back to their front-line observation bunkers after dinner and toss turkey bones at the Communists only a few hundred yards away across the demilitarized zone border in North Korea.

American soldiers agreed that Thanksgiving is more than a meal. They miss home and their families a little more than usual on this day, and that's what they talk about.

For some, like Pfc. Kerwin Hamme of Manchester, Pennsylvania, it is their first Thanksgiving away from home.

"I don't mind it too much," said the 20-year-old Hamme, who has been in Korea two months. "It'll be okay if I can stay here without any bullets flying."

Pfc. Joseph E. Burrell, 20, of Newark, Ohio, said, "I'd sure like to be home."

The lanky, brown-eyed soldier hesitated and then added, "I guess I miss mom and dad most."

Burrell is growing a mustache because "it gives me something to do to trim it."

"Like to be home today, wouldn't I?" was the typical GI-style reply of Pfc. John M. Lira Jr. of Rio Vista, Calif., who also is growing a mustache and long sideburns because "it gives me something to do to trim it."

Man Kills Hostess, Self In Plane

SEATTLE, Wash.—UP—An unshed love letter found in the pages of a book "How to Sell Yourself" Tuesday told why a spurned suitor shot and killed a United Air Lines hostess and then took his own life.

Sally — you're probably right. I'm not the man for you," the letter read in part.

It was found in the luggage of Pfc. D. Glendenn, 26, a New York brokerage worker, who killed stewardess Sally Shedd, 25, Seattle, before 40 horrified passengers aboard the plane.

Glendenn later took his own life.

Miss Miriam K. Garland, another stewardess on the plane, told the details of the shooting which began at a tempestuous romance that began at a wedding in New York a year ago.

According to Miss Garland, Miss Shedd and Glendenn met at the wedding of another stewardess. In September she joined him in New York where they took in the World Series.

She said Miss Shedd later tried to get off the romance by letter, but the pair met in Seattle, where they had a date for a wedding. Miss Garland said she was grieved but thought that she and Glendenn had nothing to do with it. Miss Garland said "He kept saying that he wanted to marry me."

Doctor Says Current News Must Embarrass U.S. May Have Flu Epidemic

WASHINGTON—UP—A leading medical authority said Tuesday there is a pretty fair chance the nation will have an influenza epidemic this winter.

No way to tell for sure. But Dr. Dorland J. Davis said flu epidemics strike in cycles and this country is about due for another.

If an outbreak occurs, Davis said it probably will be the relatively mild form of influenza which figured in the epidemics of 1951 and 1953. Even so, it could bring a lot of misery to thousands of Americans.

Davis heads the laboratory of infectious diseases at the government's National Institutes of Health. He also is in charge of the World Health Organization's influenza center in the United States.

Influenza is a big trouble-maker. In its milder forms, it produces a general feeling of discomfort — headache, cough, four-to-five-day fever, general aching and a feeling of being "all washed out." In its more serious forms, flu can lead to pneumonia and death—especially among older people.

The symptoms are similar to those found in severe colds, grippe and half a dozen other common respiratory infections. But true influenza is caused by its own family of viruses. It usually is spotted when there has been a fairly large outbreak and experts move in to make a laboratory identification.

The influenza family of viruses falls into two main divisions—type A and type B. The B virus usually causes relatively small, sporadic outbreaks. Type A is the one that produces major outbreaks, occasionally on a world-wide scale, and strikes in two and three-year cycles.

Recall Happy Days

Many soldiers recalled big, two-hour long family Thanksgiving feasts and usually successful efforts in escaping the dishes at home.

"You know, we used to have 20 people to dinner," smiled specialist 3-C John R. Smith of Royal Oak, Mich.

"The turkey dinner isn't so much. We have turkey once a month here," continued Smith, the 25-year-old father of a daughter he has never seen. "I miss the family and the talk around the table most."

Other soldiers recalled worse Thanksgivings in Korea.

"We ate turkey in 1952, but it was a little different then," said M-Sgt. Robert J. Gibbs of Wichita, Kan., a veteran of the fighting on "Pork Chop" and "Old Baldy" hills.

"I guess the Army gives us a big turkey dinner to make us feel at home as much as possible," Gibbs reflected adding, "but not being with your family is just as bad today as it was then."

Houston Sets Awards For Show

HOUSTON—UP—Cash prizes and special awards totalling \$189,744 were announced Tuesday for the 1956 Houston Fat Stock Show to be held Feb. 22 through March 4.

Among the special awards will be three scholarships, 210 certificates for beef and dairy calves for junior exhibitors, and \$500 in good housekeeping awards.

New to the Houston show ring will be the Brangus breed of cattle, and breeding swine will make an appearance after several years absence, show officials said.

Deadline date for entry of cattle, sheep and swine is Dec. 15, for market poultry Dec. 31, and horses, rabbits and breeding poultry Jan. 15.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru and his two eminent visitors from Moscow must be embarrassed by current news developments.

Nehru, Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin and Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev are praising their own and each others' countries as lovers of peace and good will.

Nehru has emphasized that the "great cause of human progress" can not be served by violence and hatred.

Denial of freedom and racial discrimination are not only improper, but are the seeds from which grow the evils of war," Nehru said in one speech.

Picture Russia as Model

Bulganin and Khrushchev are building up their country as a model for all to admire. At the same time, they are neglecting no opportunity to complain of the defects and misdoings of the Western democracies.

And while this is going on, the Indian newspapers report that 10 persons were killed in wild riots in Bombay, India's largest city—caused by what the rioters call racial discrimination.

The same newspapers report that in freedom-loving Russia six men were executed, after secret trials, for alleged complicity in the villanies of Lavrenti P. Beria, the secret police chief who was shot two years ago.

At least, the Russians can say to themselves that the Bombay riots could not have happened in their country. Russians take what they get, and praise the Kremlin. At least, when they think out loud.

Nehru can console himself with the thought that in India there are no mass executions for offenders against his regime.

No doubt Nehru, Bulganin and Khrushchev will continue to express their admiration for each other.

The Bombay outbreak, however, may well be followed by others even more violent.

The reason is that one of Nehru's vast projects is to consolidate India into 16 states, and a lot of Indian do not like the idea.

India's 369 million people consist of innumerable racial and religious groupings. Fourteen different languages, out of the many, are recognized by the government as official.

The trouble in Bombay was caused by Nehru's decision to cut up the Bombay area into three states.

The idea is to divide the state according to the languages of its peoples.

Bombay City is to be one state, a second one is to be the state of Maharashtra. But more than 40 per cent of the three million people of Bombay city speak the Maharashtra language. They want to be incorporated in Maharashtra state.

The same problem exists in other areas, and in some of them the complaints of discrimination also may take violent form.

Houston Port Head Resigns

HOUSTON—UP—Attorney J. S. Bracewell, chairman of the Houston Port Commission, resigned Tuesday, blaming press of personal affairs and professional commitments.

Bracewell, a former judge, said in a letter to County Judge Bob Casey, ex-officio chairman of the port board, that his resignation was effective "as soon as my successor is elected and qualified."

"My personal affairs are such that I could not possibly accept re-appointment," Bracewell said in his letter of resignation.

Bracewell said that since there were "many important decisions" affecting the welfare of the port to be made before the first of the year, he thought it would be to the advantage of the port to have his successor participate in the decisions, rather than himself.

Bracewell was appointed port commissioner Oct. 1, 1954.

T.E.C. Lists Openings

Michigan State's Daugherty Selected Coach Of The Week

EAST LANSING, Mich. —UP— He took his lumps with a grin last year when the Rose Bowl champions he inherited lost game after game.

He beat his critics to the punch by saying, "We proved we could lose gracefully, but I guess we overdid it."

It was his first season as head coach. He had taken over a crumbling dynasty, only to see it crumble in his hands.

When the dust settled, he picked up the usable pieces, added some new, promising but untested material and built his own football powerhouse, almost overnight.

A Good Season

He's the United Press coach of the week, Hugh (Duffy) Daugherty of Michigan State, whose team ended its 1955 season last Saturday with an 8-1 record and a summons to the Rose Bowl, beating Marquette 33-0.

It was one of the finest comebacks ever staged in college football.

Daugherty gives the credit to his coaching staff and his players.

"The coaches were a year older and a year wiser," he said. "As for the players, the seniors worked like eager sponges, and the sophomores came through like veterans."

Daugherty declined to predict the outcome of Michigan State's Rose Bowl clash with UCLA.

"But we'll do our best to carry on the great record of Big Ten teams in past years," he said. The record includes a Michigan State Rose Bowl victory over UCLA in 1953 when Biggie Munn was head coach.

What's the outlook for Michigan State next year? Will it suffer another relapse similar to the 1954

Longhorn, Aggie Game To Be Nationally Televised Today

Fumblin' Army Should Be The Defense King

NEW YORK, Nov. 23—UP— Army's unpredictable Cadets, who have been generous in fumbling but stingy in giving up opposing yardage, should wind up as the major college 1955 defensive champion, no matter what happens in the Navy clash on Saturday.

The West Pointers, losers in two of their first four games largely because of their fumbles, have yielded an average of only 139.5 rushing-passing yards to eight opponents, according to statistics released Wednesday by the NCAA.

That put Army more than 30 yards per game ahead of its closest 1955 rival, Holy Cross. Since the Cadets led the nation in offense last year, they can become the first team ever to top the major colleges in both extremes in consecutive seasons.

Back of Holy Cross in Total defense was Army's arch-rival, Navy, followed by Maryland, Auburn, Oklahoma, Detroit, Vanderbilt, George Washington and West Virginia in that order.

Although Army's lead in total defense is secure, Maryland still can win the rushing defense title if the Cadets give up more than 105 ground yards to Navy. If Maryland winds up with the nation's top rushing defense mark, it will mark the second time it has won the honor in three years. The Terrapins have completed their regular schedule with a 75.9-yard average.

Behind Maryland, in order, in rushing defense are Holy Cross, Auburn, Oklahoma, Wichita, Denver, Navy, Boston College and Colgate. Behind Nebraska in pass defense are Florida, Michigan, George Washington, Kentucky, Navy, Oklahoma A&M, Detroit, Harvard and Vanderbilt.

Texas and Texas A&M, the two teams destined to provide the nation with its Thanksgiving Day football thrills today, took it easy Wednesday and avoided any chance of damaging injuries.

The game will be televised nationally (over NBC-TV) starting at 1:15 p.m. The game already is a sellout and 42,000 persons will jam into Aggie Stadium at College Station to see it firsthand.

Neither team has been put through a really rough workout this week. Most of the drill-time has been devoted to polishing plays and improving kickoff returns.

The Aggies wound up all contact work before the game with a light, short workout. Coach Paul Bryant stressed the kicking game. At Austin, Texas Coach Ed Price also handled his team with a view to relieving pressure brought on by a traditional rivalry.

A victory would give Texas an even season record of five wins and five losses. It also would leave open the door for Texas Christian to win the conference championship if TCU beats Southern Methodist Saturday.

For the Aggies, victory will mean Texas A&M's first conference title since 1941 and its second win over Texas since 1939.

At Fort Worth, TCU held a non-contact drill Tuesday. Coach Abe Martin attributed a lack of pep to 89-degree weather. The team will be near full strength for SMU.

But SMU will start without guard Tommy Beall and halfback John Marshall. Tackle Eric Knebel, end Willard Deweall and guard Tiny Goss probably won't start but will get into the game.

Saturday, Rice worked to perfect a pass defense against Doyle Traynor, while Baylor worked late polishing up its own defensive game.

Ray Robinson Gives Up As Entertainer

GREENWOOD LAKE, N.Y., Nov. 23—UP— Sugar Ray Robinson, former middleweight and welterweight champion, announced Wednesday, "I've given up all thought of being an entertainer and I'll devote the rest of my life to crusading for my people."

It is because of this crusading ambition that 35-year-old Robinson is determined to recapture the middleweight crown from Carl (Bobo) Olson at Chicago on Dec. 9, he said.

"As champion, my co-operation with the National Association for Advancement of Colored People will be much more valuable than now," he explained here at the Lakeside camp where he is training.

Sugar Ray's announcement was unexpected. Friends thought he was fighting to get quick money and to boost his future prospects as a song-and-dance man.

Champion Olson is no stranger to Robinson. Slender Ray beat him twice before Bobo won the vacant crown. Robinson knocked Bobo out in October, 1950, and outpointed him in March, 1952.

"I know I'll be meeting a better Olson now than I fought before," the ex-champ said Wednesday. "His June knockout by light heavy weight champion Archie Moore won't have any effect on his fighting as a middleweight."

Olson is favored at 14-5, but Robinson said he hoped to win on a knockout.

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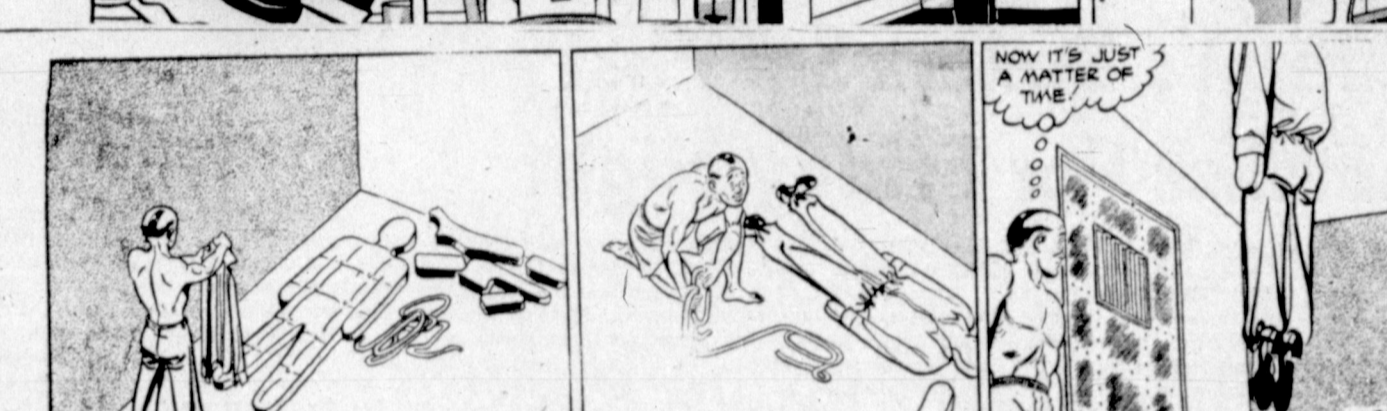
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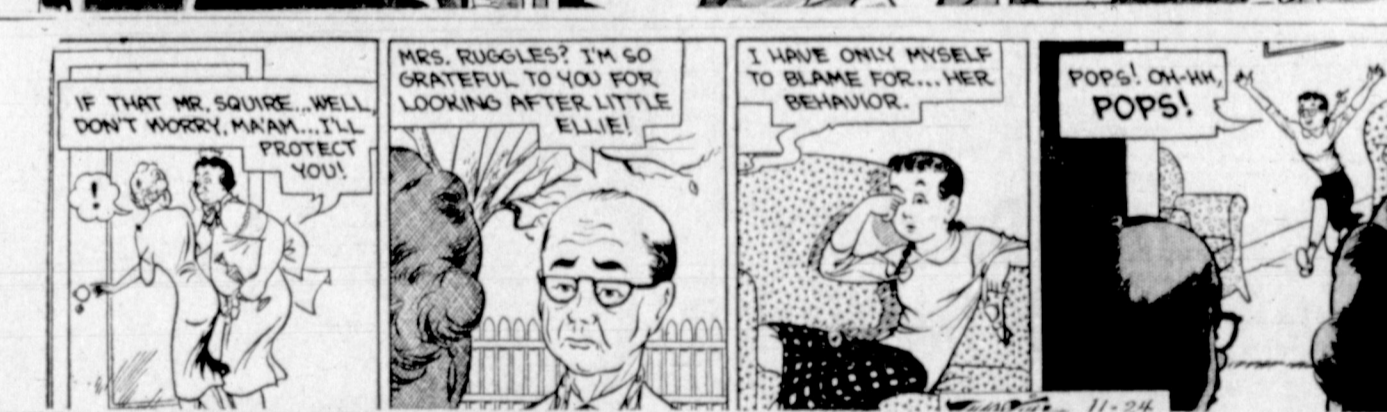

Johnson Blasts G. O. P. WHITNEY, Tex. - UP - The tideland issue generally—and specifically Adlai Stevenson's belief that the federal government should control the rich off-shore lands—is the issue that triggered the second Republican vote in history in Texas in 1952.

President Eisenhower won and Texas got its tidelands, but Senate majority leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas says the tidelands represented "the last kind smile the Republicans have given us."

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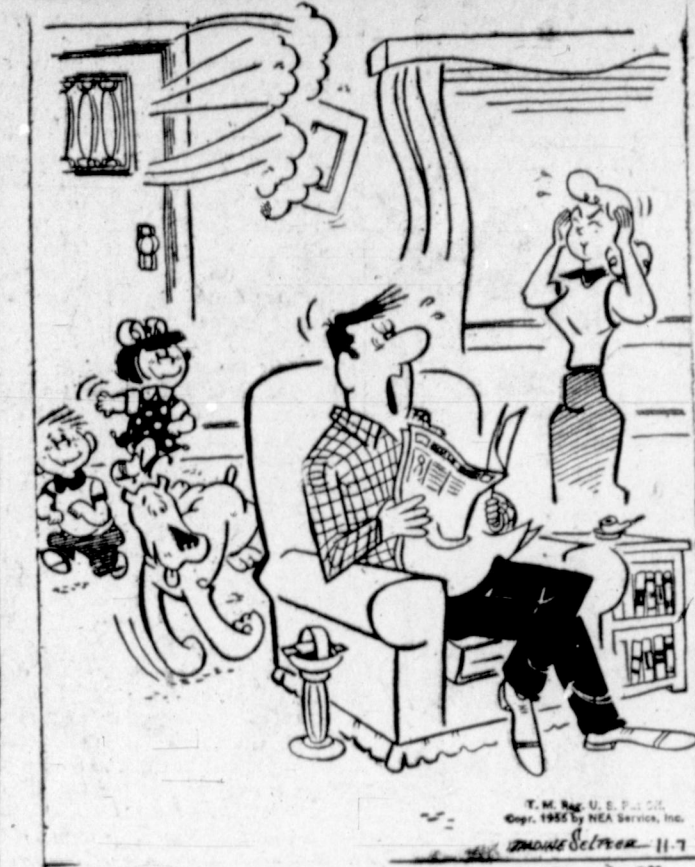

Swanson Says Dutch Football Has More Right To The Name

AMSTERDAM — Dutch football is about as much like our American football as ping-pong is like tennis. Personally, I think the Dutch football has more "essence" and right to be called by this name than our game has.

Their game is played almost entirely with their feet, a player being disqualified if he uses his hands or pushes with his body. The use of the head, however, is allowed in the game. Bouncing the ball from one head to another makes them look like sea lions.

Why they don't all have a perpetual headache I couldn't understand until I was informed that the upper part of the forehead has a very hard bone.

With No Padding
But even so the head has to recoil against the top vertebra as it makes a solid contact with the ball. If they would only wear headgear. They not only go bareheaded but have no padding whatsoever anywhere. Shorts, bare knees and generally short sleeved sweaters are the costumes.

Some 40,000 persons witnessed the game between Norway and Holland. Holland won 3 to 0. There are no secret muddles. Everything is out in the open. One never loses sight of the ball. It is extremely fast, players constantly running from one end of the field to the other—no inch-by-inch play. The game takes no brute strength, just a pair of very lively feet and a hard head.

Since I had missed lunch (heaven forbid that one should miss a meal in any of these countries), I had planned that I would have a very famous dish. I most certainly did not want to leave without testing hutsput, in other countries called hedge podge or hotch potch. It is a mixture of meat, a variety of vegetables held together with mashed potatoes.

To Indonesian Place Instead
But since the weather was not

quite cold enough to have it on the menu yet and I was leaving in a few hours, I was taken to an Indonesian restaurant. (I'll try anything once).

There are literally hundreds of these restaurants in Holland. I must admit that I do not like gobs of food on my plate at one time but somehow this was different because it was only a spoonful of each thing and the flavors are delicate.

Some I could detect were rice, raisins, veal, lamb, chicken, gratin, beef, tony peanuts, cucumbers, cooked mushrooms, mushrooms, mushrooms sweet and sour sauce and a sort of soup added to this if you wish. This is no place to diet.

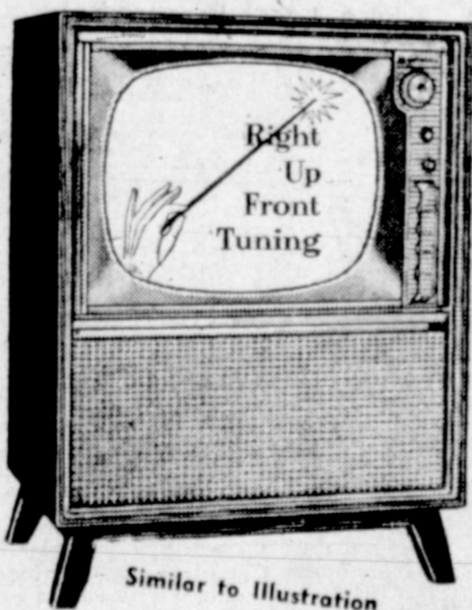

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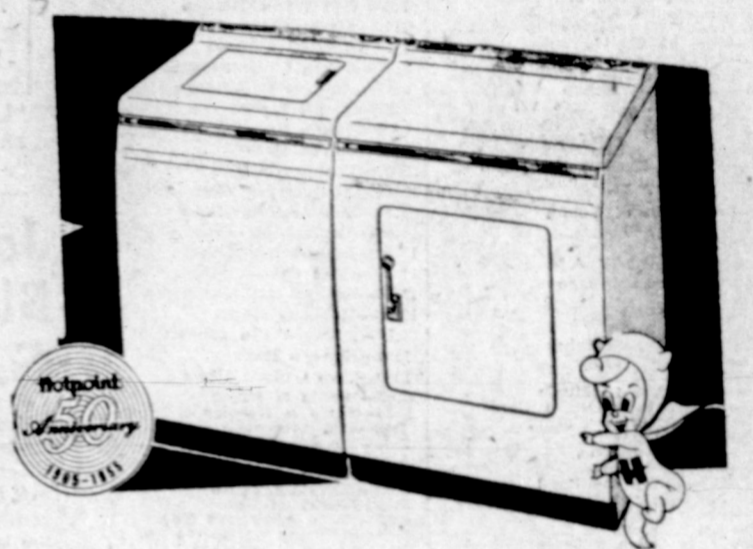

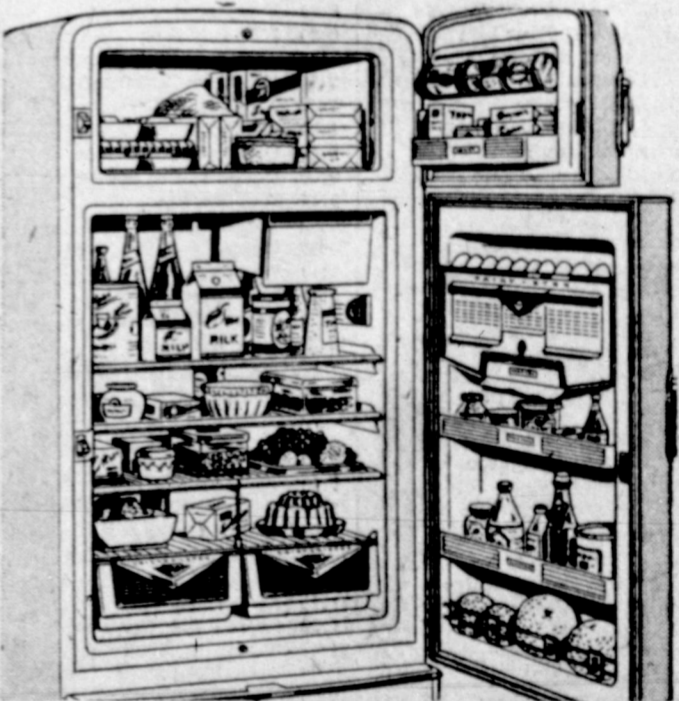

Frankincense, Myrrh Have Old History

The gifts of frankincense and myrrh presented to the infant Jesus carried both temporal and religious significance.

Frankincense was used by both the Egyptians and the Jews in their religious rites. Curative powers were attributed to it for the treatment of an amazing variety of ailments.

Myrrh was said to be an antidote for hemlock poisoning and a remedy for leprosy. Kings and queens used it to beautify and perfume themselves.

Mixed with water or wine and taken internally it was supposed to be at once a stimulant and sedative, a tonic and astringent.

Historians tell us that frankincense was also burned to purify the air, and that to breathe the fragrance would "comfort and refresh the spirit" much as smelling salts are used today.

Myrrh held a similar role of importance with the ancients. It was highly esteemed as an ornament and perfume, an incense for religious rites and an ingredient of embalming oils.

Today many resins are referred to as myrrh but "true" myrrh is a gum resin produced by Commiphora Myrrha, a small tree that grows in eastern Africa and Arabia. Long months were spent in gathering the myrrh and it had to be brought to Palestine by caravan over long and hazardous journeys.

No wonder then that frankincense and myrrh, significant of good health and religious favor were chosen as fitting gifts for a king.

1/2 lb butter
1 cup sugar
2 egg yolks

Postmaster Gives Tips On How To Mail Christmas Gifts

Postmaster O. K. Gaylor today gave some tips on how to mail for Christmas. At the same time, he urged mail patrons to start planning now to shop early and mail early for Christmas.

A new illustrated pamphlet, "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels For Mailing," describes the type and sizes of cartons best suited for shipping, and lists hints that will help with special Christmas mailing problems, such as shipping chinaware. Copies are available free—at the Pampa post office.

Right packing, right wrapping, and right addressing are the three keys to easy and trouble-free Christmas mailing, Mr. Gaylor noted.

Detailed packaging instructions may be obtained easily from the packaging and wrapping pamphlet. But, the Postmaster did have a few do's and don'ts to offer, as follows:

Don't go for flimsy light cardboard and paper boxes in packaging your Christmas presents for the mail.

Do pick strong containers in good condition. An empty corrugated fiberboard box of the type that may be found in your neighborhood grocery is good for mailing gifts, for example, if it is rigid and undamaged. Be sure the container is the right size: if it is too large, the contents are apt to shift in transit; if too small, an overstuffed carton may burst in shipping.

If necessary, cut your container down to fit the contents. Cushioning material, such as excelsior, shredded newspapers or tissue paper, should be evenly and firmly placed on all sides of the gift item. Two or more inches of such covering is the minimum.

The carton should be wrapped in heavy brown paper and tied with strong twine.

Articles of a delicate nature, such as glass, china, electrical appliances, musical instruments and radios, must be marked "Fragile" by the mailer. Foodstuffs should be marked "Perishable," if subject to spoilage. But don't mark the wrapping with unnecessary wording. For example, "Do not Delay," is superfluous. "Rush" does not properly belong on a parcel. If it is desired to expedite delivery of a parcel, use special handling or special delivery service.

Do address plainly and properly, using postal zone numbers where available. Addresses should be

printed in ink or typed, and a return address should appear on every parcel, no matter how near or far it may be going.

The proper place for the return address, incidentally, is the upper left hand corner of the parcel—no, on the back, side or one of the other corners.

The overwhelming bulk of Christmas mail will be by parcel post, of course, and it should be remembered that size and weight limits vary depending upon the post office of mailing and the post office of address.

Mailers may check with their post office and ask for the free pamphlet "Post Office Department Publication 3," which contains the rates of postage and limits of size and weight for domestic mail.

Books may be sent at a special low rate of postage, but mailers must not enclose other articles with books at this rate.

Christmas Loot Boots

Make your own "Loot Boots" for a cowboy boot from denim or bur-Christmas gifts or for your own lap. Using gold paint, decorate it home decoration. Use them as with Texas longhorns and a spur.

Design a huge "Santa Boot" of red terrycloth or outing flannel. Make a Santa's head of unseal, and fasten it near the Christmas tree to fill with gifts that would normally be placed on the floor. Or make a boot for each member of the family, to hold and display gifts.

See what materials you have around the house: firm fabrics, fringe, braid and buttons, glitter, sequins and gold paint.

Make little ones and big ones, to hang from the mantle or dangle from the Christmas tree. Make them bright and gay and glittering to friends.

If you live Western style, make them from year to year.

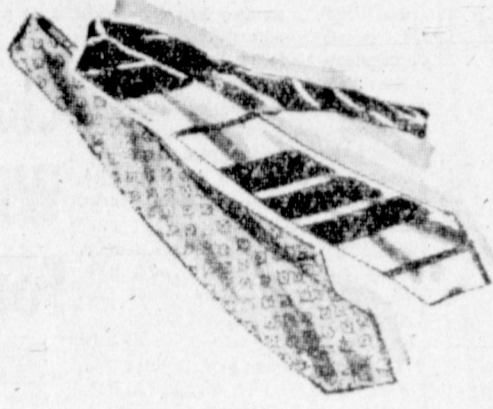

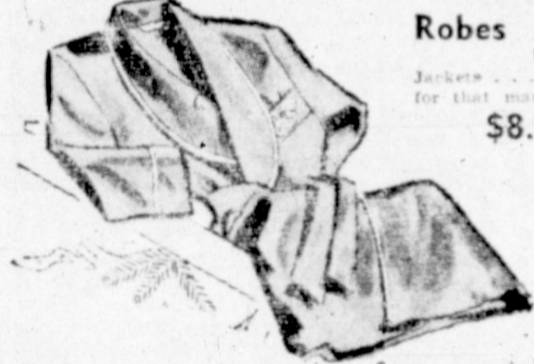

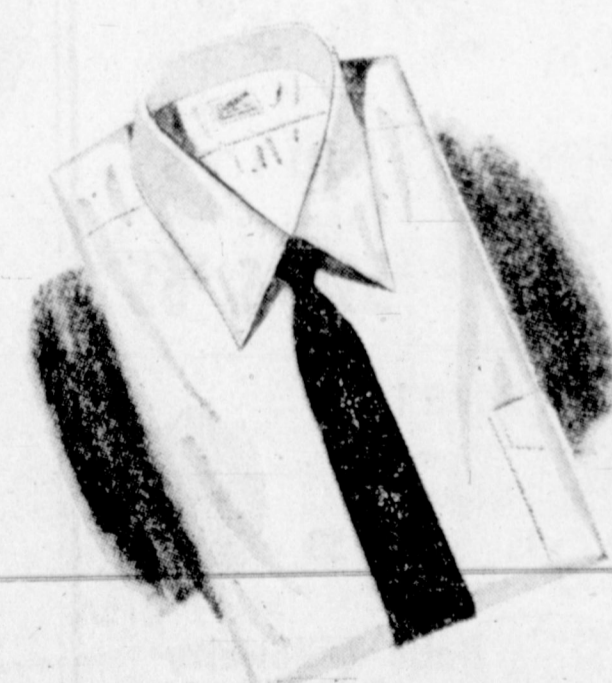

Tips For Wrapping Packages

Each year thousands of dollars worth of Christmas gifts arrive at post offices damaged or spoiled because they were not properly packed and wrapped for mailing.

To be sure that carelessness doesn't spoil a Christmas surprise for someone on your list, follow these basic rules when wrapping packages to be sent through the mail:

Use double-faced corrugated cardboard as an extra wrap around all gift-wrapped boxes. Do not attempt to mail in thin cardboard boxes.

Pack fragile gifts in cotton or excelsior before boxing.

Insert a small card bearing the recipient's name and address and your return address in case the package should get damaged.

Leave at least two inches between the merchandise and the container and pack it with crumpled paper or excelsior to guard against shock in handling.

Use heavy wrapping paper and strong cord for outside wrapping. Insure every gift package so that if it is lost or damaged the merchandise can be replaced.

Other timely tips on Christmas mailing include: Check with your local post office about weight and girth limitations on parcel post packages.

"Away in a Manager," Luther's hymn for children, came to us from Germany. England gave us the spirited "God Rest You, Merry Gentlemen" and from France we inherited the beautiful "O Holy Night." From Austria came "Silent Night, Holy Night."

Three Americans enriched our heritage of lovely Christmas carols by giving us three which are among the world's favorites today.

In 1849, a Massachusetts Unitarian minister, Edmund H. Sears, composed "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear." Ten years later, Dr. John Henry Hopkins, Jr., an Episcopalian rector from Williamsport, Pa., composed both the words and music for "We Three Kings of Bethlehem Are."

"O Little Town of Bethlehem," perhaps the best known and most beloved of all American carols, was written in 1868 by Phillips Brooks, a young Episcopalian minister of Philadelphia. A trip to the Holy Land was his inspiration for the carol.

A churchman, Job Pierpont, composed "The Gay Christmas" song, "Jingle Bells" which has been popular for almost a century. A new Christmas song that is non-religious in theme, "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas" by Irving Berlin is fast becoming a classic favorite

Here Are Holiday Favorites To Serve At Your Feast

Add variety to your holiday feasts with these candies, popcorn, trees and a delicious date pudding.

- DATE PUDDING**
 2 cups dates
 2 cups nuts
 4 eggs
 2 cups sugar
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
 1 cup milk
 Chop up dates and nuts; grass 1 1/2" x 9" x 2" pan and start your oven at 325 F. or slow.
 Beat eggs in a bowl until frothy, then add sugar gradually, beating half at the time. Sift baking powder with flour and add flour mixture and milk, a little at a time, alternately to egg-sugar combination. Stir in chopped dates and nuts, pour into pan and bake 1 hour. Cut in squares and serve hot or cold with vanilla cream. Makes about 15 squares.
- FIG CANDY**
 2 cups sugar
 1 lb. figs
 2 1/2 cup water
 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
 Chop figs up finely.
 Cook sugar and water without stirring, until syrup reaches 238 F. on candy thermometer or until a drop tested in cold water forms a soft ball.
 Remove from heat stir in cream of tartar and figs. Pour into a buttered 8" square pan and cut into 35 small squares when cool.
- POPCORN CHRISTMAS TREES**
 8 ice-cream cones from your corner candy store and pop up a heaping bowlful of popcorn.
 Now mix 1 1/2 cups of confectioners' sugar with 1 unbeaten egg white and 1/2 teaspoon vinegar until smooth. Cover cones 1/4" thick with icing (use a small spatula or knife) and stick popcorn all over the surface of cones while icing is still your tree with red cinnamon drops, silver dragees (attached with a dab moist). When icing is dry, decorate with a little of a sprinkling of colored sugar.
- Stuff your Christmas dates with DATE DELIGHTS
 Grind together 2 cups of raw peanut butter, walnuts, creamed cheese or candied orange peel. Roll in powdered sugar. Delightful tid-bits!
- CRANBERRY RELISH**
 cranberries, 1/2 cup of drained pineapple, and 1/2 cup of a lemon. Combine with 1 cup of sugar. Chill before serving. Wonderful with your holiday turkey!

For years we have been putting Christmas Seals on our holiday cards and packages. The design changes every year, but the purpose is the same—to fight TB! Have you ever wondered about the origin of these seals? The first Christmas Seal was the inspiration of Einar Holboell, a postal clerk in Copenhagen. The first seals appeared in 1904. The seals found their way to

America and attracted the attention of Jacob Riis who wrote an article about them. Few people, however, were interested in them. In 1907, Emily Bissell, a public health worker, concerned about the fate of a small sanatorium, recalled the article and sat down to sketch America's first Christmas Seal. She was aided by a columnist on a Philadelphia newspaper in promoting them and the idea became successful. Today, sponsored by the National Tuberculosis Association, the seals are sold to promote education, research and case-finding in the fight against tuberculosis. Remember to buy and use your seals this year!

Official Tree Is In California
The nation's official Christmas tree is not located in Washington, D. C., but in General Grant national park, 64 miles due east of Fresno. Some 267 feet high, the tree was designated as the nation's Christmas tree at high noon on Christmas day, 1925, and is one of the most celebrated in the United States. Patriotic and devotional services are held beneath it each year. Heavy snowfalls sometimes cut down on the attendance, but usually at large number of visitors attend the ceremonies.

Legend Of The Poinsettia

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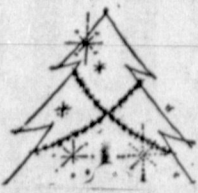

Revising an old tradition, the Kissing Ball returns to popularity, bringing with it a delightful bit of Christmas whimsy. Many years ago every home featured at least one of these beautiful decorations, hung from an archway or chandelier.

A pomander, sometimes a blown egg, sometimes a ball of cotton. Styrofoam is the favorite material today. For a variation of the holiday wreath, an evergreen star can also be made by fastening wire coat hangers together and firmly wiring sprays of greenery to it. Modern mood stars can be created from painted chicken wire squeezed together in the center. Then form a star of sprigs . . . or use this background. Complete the doorpiece by fastening Christmas tree balls on the outer edge of the chicken wire.

Giant make-believe candy canes, red felt Christmas stockings, Santa Claus figures, or white angel and snowflake cut-outs mounted on dark blue paper to cover the door are but a few of the attractive door decorations you can select.

A stand-by favorite that's always beautiful is the door spray of evergreens with a cluster of ornaments, pine cones, or paper bells fastened to it. Always finish with a spray with a perky bow of red ribbon. Your favorite store carries a weather-proofed ribbon for outdoor use.

Let bright strings of outdoor Christmas lights twinkle a greeting from your house. Twine them in the evergreens framing your doorway . . . trim your outdoor evergreen tree with them . . . festoon them around a porch or entry . . . or outline windows for a cheery effect.

Decorating the outside of the house can be the most fun-filled family project of the thrilling holiday season and is a wonderful way to share your Merry Christmas with all who pass by — truly the real spirit of the season!

Practice Safety For The Holidays

You feel that Christmas is really here when you start unpacking decorations and putting up the tree. For decorating the home with traditional or original fancies makes the season as full of Christmas as a holy berry.

Safety considerations should rate when picking your tree for, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters, the tree is Christmas' greatest hazard.

They suggest: Choose a small tree and keep it outdoors until a few days before setting it up. If you have land, pick a live tree, cover the dirt with foil and plant it afterwards. Saw the butt of a cut tree slantwise and stand it in a tub of water; locate it away from a fireplace, exit or radiator; avoid untreated paper or cotton or ornaments. Use electric lights with the UL (Underwriters Laboratory) mark. Never use candles! Don't run electric trains around the base and don't use outlets or plugs under the tree.

When your tree is set up wire the top to the molding or window frame, using something like light aluminum wire which is inconspicuous. Don't leave tree lights on when

Pageant Of Christmas In Other Lands

The giving of gifts has been an important part of the holiday season ever since the Wise Men and shepherds brought gifts to the Christ Child in Bethlehem. Gifts expressing love and goodwill are given all over the world at this time, but the bearer of gifts differs from country to country.

In America children look forward to Santa Claus who carries his gifts in a pack on his back and is drawn in a sleigh by eight prancing reindeer. He fills the stockings, hung by the fireplace, and heaps presents under the Christmas tree.

After the Christmas Eve feast in Poland, Mother Star... who is dressed like an angel in a white robe and veil, distributes the gifts after Father Star, who is a bit to be feared, listens to the children's prayers and catechism.

In Norway, they remember the birds and animals with stuet and choice sheaves of grain tied to trees

and rooftops; extra fodder is provided for the cattle.

Candles shine from every window in Bavaria, to light the Kristkind on her way from home to home. She is messenger of Infant Jesus, and Bavarian children believe that she brings them their gifts. She wears a white robe and has golden wings.

In Holland, Dutch children wait anxiously for the arrival of St. Nicholas. Dressed in traditional bishop's robes of black, he carries a crozier and wears a mitre. He brings gifts for the children which he places in their wooden shoes standing in the chimney corner.

Gifts are given to the Swiss children by a radiant angel who rides in a sleigh drawn by six reindeer. English children wait for a Santa Claus who looks very much like our own jolly elf. They also find gifts tied to a Christmas tree.

In Spain, the Three Wise Men deliver gifts as they continue their way to Bethlehem. In old Russia, "Baboushka," carrying a staff and many toys, goes from house to house in her search for the Christ Child.

"La Befana," mystic wanderer in search of the Christ Child, delivers gifts, like the good fairy she is, to Italian children. She is represented carrying a broom and goes from house to house.

Christmas, Universal Holiday, Sport Coat Stems From Many Countries Is Ideal Gift For Man

As a new Christmas season comes 'round again, it is interesting to look back on the very tradition of the holiday itself. No other observance is so rich with myth, legend, fact and fancy culled from the world over.

In the earliest days of Christianity, Christmas was not a festival at all. And, before the fifth century there was no established opinion as to when Christmas was observed on the calendar. Dates in months as various as January, March, April and May — a well as in December were discussed as the day of Nativity in the earliest days of Christianity.

In the first two centuries after Christ's birth, it was recorded by early historians that His birth occurred on Wednesday, December 25th, also on Friday, December 25th and also attributed to various other days in the week.

In the Calendar of Philocalus (354 A.D.) it is stated that in "Year I after Christ the Lord, Jesus Christ was born on December 25, a Friday, and 15th day of the new moon" — though in fact — December 1, A.D. I, was a Sunday.

Early chronologists have variously associated the birth of Christ with symbolism attendant to the many anniversaries devoted to the creation of the sun.

Certain Latins as early as the year 345, transferred the birthday from January 6th to December 25th, which was then a Mithraic feast or birthday of the unconquered sun of Philocalus.

The Syrians and Armenians of that period clung to the January 6th observance and accused the Romans of sun-worship and idolatry.

In the late third and early fourth centuries, the feast of December 25th was observed in the West from Thrace to Cadiz, while in the East — in the Byzantium empire, the January 6th date was celebrated. In the Christian church the festival of the Nativity of Jesus Christ is so closely associated with the Epiphany (the commemoration of the Baptism) that no history of Christmas is complete unless both are looked at together.

Epiphany has been celebrated in the Teutonic west as the Festival of the Magi. It has been called the Feast of the "Declaration," of the "Manifestation," of the "Apparition," or simply, Twelfth Night.

Until the fourth century, the Christians observed only Epiphany and Easter with festivals and religious rites, and the physical birth of Christ was not widely recognized.

In fourth century Spain and Armenia, the month prior to Epiphany was a time of fasting and repentance.

It is said that the feast of Baptism, or the day of the Savior's

birth observed on January 6th, was used to separate the natural birthday from the thought that in His Baptism, the Savior was reborn through the Holy Spirit.

Synonymous with the Epiphany observance is the blessing of the springs and rivers from which the water is stored for baptism and lustrations.

Even this rite has its origin in the ancient Festival of the Nile where it is related that the Nile's waters were at its purest...also, in the neopagan festival of the Birth of Aeon where after an all night ritual of flute-playing, dancing and singing, "Kore, the Virgin gave birth to Aeon, (a sun deity).

Long before the birth of Christianity, December 25th was celebrated by the Anglos with all-night festivities and vigils as the start of the new year. It was called "modranecht" or "mother's night."
