



Walter Reuther, in his unscrupulous and vicious rise to power, has stomped on the heads of consumers and wage earners alike. His particular footstool has been the automobile manufacturer from whom he has now managed to evoke a half-hearted promise to pay men for not working.

The whole GAW plan is tied up with federal control and with state unemployment insurance funds. But the purpose of the GAW is to see to it that a man who produces nothing shall be paid on the same basis as the man who produces in full measure.

Nothing more unfair nor prejudicial to the status of the working man could well be imagined. The result, as many thoughtful economists have indicated, would penalize the productive worker, freeze the man with longevity into full labor, and place the novice and neophyte on a velvet cushion of ease . . , full pay for no

What the guaranteed annual wage is to the factory worker, the "soil bank" idea is to the farmer. In this case, however, the villain in the piece is not Walter Reuther. It is the federal government directly. In this ever growing monstrosity the idea has hatched that farmers, instead of being subsidized on the basis of excess crops grown, should be subsidized for land that is taken out of production and placed, figuratively, in a

Plagued by produce which never reaches the market but which the federal government is buying up, the solution is thought to be to pay the farmers for growing fewer acres of crops. The old corn burning, pig killing days of FDR flush to mind. Back during those first socialistic totterings all a farmer had to do was pledge himself NOT to grow wheat, corn, pigs, or what have you. Promptly a federal check was sent to him.

The fallacy of this idea was brought home abruptly when in 1934 and 1935 the country reeled from even worse spasms of depression than it had had in 1929 and 1930. Ultimately, payment for non-production was abandoned by the socialists as just one more idea that didn't

Now, in 1955, faced with mounting surpluses on every hand, and ballooning costs to the taxpayer, the social schemers have dug this old chestnut out of the long cold fire. Perhaps, they figure that by means of the tricky new title, "soil bank," they can dress the old girl in skirts, apply a little lipstick and cause her to pass as a debutante. But she's a haggard old crone, this socialist belle-dame something for nothing.

She was bedraggled and frowsy by the time FDR finished with her. In squiring her about town, Reuther has to maintain a stern visage so he doesn't laugh in

her ugly old face. But despite her appearance as a harpy, there are many farmers that are welcoming the old hag, forgetting that "something for nothing" ultimately costs everybody

The surplus farm crop problem will only be made more complicated by this idea of "banking" certain acres which, according to plan, are then to lie fallow until

they regain their fertility. It is true that land can frequently be reclaimed by

letting it remain idle. It is not true that the American taxpayers should be compelled to support the farmer's acres which are not producing. This is one of the occupational expenses of farming, comparable to equipment obsolescence, factory expansion or office equipment replacement. Taxpayers cannot be compelled morally to underwrite the manufacturer in these problems.

There is no equity in paying for farm acres that do nothing. If this were fair, then why not pay the manufacturer when he permits some of his machines to stand idle? Why not give top grades to school students who diligently refuse to study?

This is the reverse english on society which causes it to twist out of its orbit into far left field. Something for nothing has never been and never will be possible.

The solution to the problem of course can only be found in getting the government out of both the labor management problem and out of the farm problem. Only then will the normal actions of supply and demand tend to bring all things into balance for the blessing and pros-

worth"? Does he consider the unemployment we had in 1929 and the '30s as a steading influence? Is the artificial boom that is now plaguing our Country a steading influence. The government's interference with credit and banking is one of the primary, if not the primary, causes of booms and busts, in spite of what we are teaching the youth of the land in non-free schools to believe.

This is what Isabel Paterson wrote in 1913:

ical power extending over money, with the Federal Reserve system, was forecast with detailed accuracy by Elihu Root. He wrote: 'This is in no sense a provision for an elastic currency. It does not provide an elastic currency. It provides an expansive currency, but not an elastic one. It provides a currency for which the bill contains any provision compelling reduction...With the exhaustless reservoir of the Govern ment of the United States furnishing easy money, the sales increase, the business enlarge, more new enterprises are started, the spirit of optimism pervades the community. Bankers are not free from it. They are human. The members of the Federal Reserve Board will not be free from it. They are human. All the world moves along on a growing tide of optimism. Everyone is making money. Everyone is growing rich. It goes up and up ... until finally someone breaks ... and down comes the whole structure. I can see in this bill ... no influence interposed by us against the occurence of one of those periods of false and delusive prosperity which inevitably end in ruin and suffering. For the most direful results of the awakening of the people from such a dream are not to be found in the banking houses -no: not even in the business houses. They are to be found among the millions who have lost the means of earning their daily

prophets.

And yet we're still teaching innocent children that the Federal Reserve System was a reform was a benefit to mankind. No wonder the youth of the land is confused when they are obliged to study such confused authors as David Saville Muzzev.

Gone are the days, thank goodness, when every child with a heart murmur was put to bed for months or years and made into a chronic invalia. Nevertheless, the discovery of a heart murmur in a youngster frequently causes the parents to become considerably alarmed. One mother, for example, recently wrote, "My daughter, age 6, has a heart murmur and I have been told she will outgrow this by the age of 15, and not to worry about it. Can you give me

further information?" Apparently, in this case the litgirl's physician feels that the child has what is known as a "functional" heart murmur. This kind of thing is quite common in children and it does not mean that disease is present. Functional murmurs are outgrown and need not interfere in any way with the life has one.






