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





### Teacher Shortage

The Indianapolis Star has shed a little light on the subject of what has been termed the "nation's teacher shortage." Every year, the Stor points out, the hue and cry is raised by the proponents of government education. There is a dearth of teachers everywhere! Split sessions are occurring with great regularity! So on and so on with repetitious monotony.

Now the NEA is quite convinced that a teacher should be able to handle something between 25 and 35 students in a class. So far so good. According to the U. S. Office of Education, in 1930 there were about 900,000 teachers to over 21 million students. That was about one teacher to every 24.2 students. No problem in 1930. What about 1955? According to the same source, there are just about one million teachers to about 23 million children. Yet the national average of pupils per teacher comes to only 23 as apposed to 24.2 twentyfive years ago. In other words, the situation has improved rather than worsened.

Yet, the bald statistics don't tell the whole story. For it is true that there are some teachers in some schools who do have to handle classes of from 40 to 50 or even 60 pupils. Why is this?

The Star, the National Republic, and Human Events all combine to point out the answer. A great many of our teachers have been moved out of the classroom, into supervisory jobs. In other words, some teachers teach others bass teachers, who teach. The expanding arm of bureaucracy, under which our entire governmental educational picture takes form, is now apparent. The great bureaucracy, empire is being built by getting fewer and fewer people to do the work, while a parasitic army of basses is trained to emulate the commissors and regulate the workers.

The Star concludes: "It would appear then that the solution to the 'teacher shortage' is to put more teachers back in the classroom . . . It should be worth a try. It could save us millions of dollars and at the same time give our teachers smaller classes for better teach-

Offhand we might be inclined to agree with the Star, were it not that the evil cannot be cured by even this drastic step. The disease with which our entire governmental educational system is suffering is endemic. The evil is at the root and cannot be cured by trimming the branches. However the growth is pruned, the same malady will reappear.

The malady is found in the combination of education and politics. Government has no business in educational activities IN ANY FORM. Government, an instrument of socializing and compulsion, is just not the proper instrument for disseminating knowledge that wisdom

To bring a permanent cure to our educational problems, a separation must come bytween school and state.

BETTER EQUIPMENT -RETTER WAGES

By George Peck

Justification for the existence of Apprecian industry lies in the fact that it makes coping and management available to the American worker, thereby coabling him to enlarge his contribution to our national income and also at the same time, to make comings for himself.

Let's use a very sample example by way of illustration. A mon without tools is given an excuration job. Without equipment he is almost belpless, and his accomplishment is small over the course of a day, the week or the year his performance would be greatly enlarged if a hand-showel were made available to him. If also he were furnished with a wheelbarrow with which to carry dirt from one point to another, his achievement would be further increased. If someone were to loan him a steam-shovel and truch him to epecate it, obviously his prochartire labor would be multiplied

me welle d. Working without tools, this mun's went would have a very low murket value. Equipped with a serson shacel, on the other hand, his income would be increased many times. It is true in the latter case, that the man would ingur certain expenses. He would have to pay for instruction on bow to run the machine, rental in the use of it and for the fuel to operate it. But he would have an entermously increased gross income out of which to meet these expenses, leaving him a much larger net income

This man would have very litthe expense for the rental of a hand-shovel, slightly increased exproper if he remind a wheel-harrow. and much greater expense if he rented a stram-shevel. Is it not reasonable that the income to the roun who replied him the steron shovel should be much greater then to the man who rented him a hand-shovel? Is it not also true that the worker would be able to make a greater comiribution to the national income if he wers a erem-showed instead of a handmoved? This simple illustration of the man with the shovel exemplifies what takes place in organized industry. Stockholdres make capital available to industry; industry makes plant and machinery available to the worker, plus instruction on utilization of the emploment. The better the machinery an industry makes available to its employees, the greater are that industry's grass earnings resulting in greater facilities to infact of the workers, increased wages for the workers, and quite reasonably a larger profit per emplayee for the company. The three partners of industry, therefore, all gain-bicker profits for capital, higher wages for workers and reduced prices for the consuming

Conversely, the poorer and less ellicient the plant facilities made available to the workers, the lower are the gross earnings, resulting in fewer safeguards for the safety, health and comfort of the

playere for the company and higher prices for the consuming public. All three partners are the losees thereby.

These basic, economic facts are the answers to certain individuals who condemn certain industrial companies, by relating their supposedly large earnings per em-They fail to take us through the indestrial "curtain" by not tolling the whole story, This is unfortunate because it is not in the interest of the American people as a whole and parselves to engender class hatred

American workers are indeed fortunate that tools are made available to threa, far superior to those furnished to xorkers elsewhere in the world. There nasibly is a case here or there where capital takes more than a reasonably just share, but ever the broad field of industry as a whole, companies that are earning high not profits per employee, are paying higher wages to their employees than is the case with companies that are not earning high not

profits per employee. Which in the final analysis seems to indicate that better equipment makes better wages.

Hutt entitled The Theory of Collective Bargaining (Free Press, 1954). Even without intricate analysis, a moment's thought should convince anyone that if capital is used to pay wages capital would have been used up long ago.

"These and other union fallacies have been linked to the violence which is incipient in all union activity. The major union weapon is the strike. Everyone has a right to quit work; but in a strike, the workers do no simply walk off their jobs, they try to prevent anyone else from accepting the jobs they have vacated. If a striking union did not have a license to use violence on would-be strikebreakers it would lack the necessary and minimum condition for being a union. Violence is not incidental to trade unionism, it is an essential part of it.

Theological Rationalization "Once the nature of unionism is seen, one is led to inquire into the climate of theological opinion in which the necessary violence of union activity is rationalized. The customary rationalization is w terms of the class struggle ideology. A sample of this thinking is taken from the writings of John C. Bennett. He says, '... violence is itself one of the things in this world which is in the long run diately qualifies this sweeping observation. He goes on to say that while such is clearly the case in war, it does not hold in 'direct action which may be accompanied by violence against a class so small in number (the capitalist class) that when once its power of ownership is taken away it ceases to be a dangerous opposition and can be treated with moderation.

"Is Violence Immoral? "Writing on the same topic, the resefulness of violence in the class struggle, Reinhold Niebuhr, also of Urion Seminary, says, 'The Middle classes and the rational moralists ... are wrong in their assumption that violence is intrinsically immoral.' In deciding whether or not to implement a policy with violence, he says, the considerations are pragmatic, resting on the answer to such questions as 'How great is the immediate and less inclusive value which is sacrificed for a more ultimate and more inclusive one?' Apparently, for this theologian, there are other than pragmatic guides, for he says, 'It is well to note that even in the comparatively simple problems of individual relationships there is no moral value which may be regarded as absolute.' This from a religionist is startling
