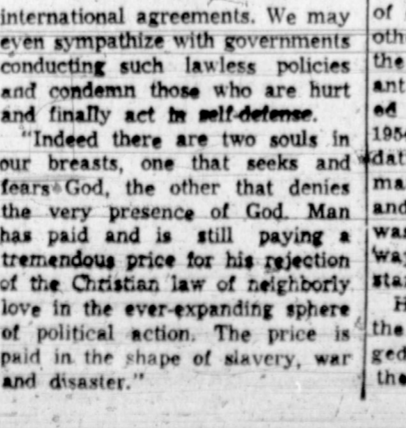

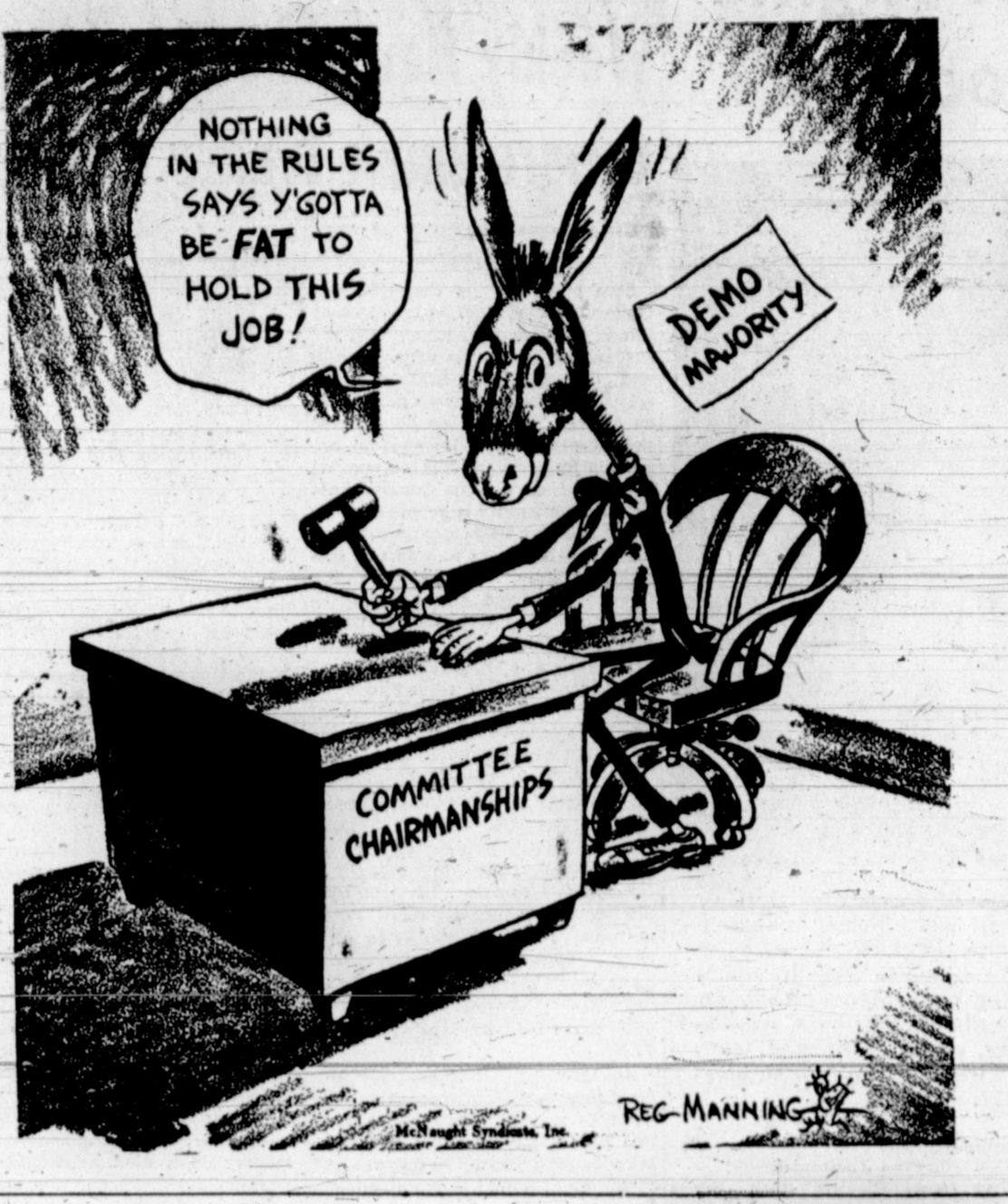

The Thin Man

WASHINGTON — The Eisenhower program to defend the Middle East against Russian militarism faces heavy opposition from Capitol Hill to Cairo because of the general belief that any war in that region would be fought with atomic weapons rather than conventional weapons. It is this factor which makes the white House plan, as unfolded to members of Congress by Eisenhower and Secretary Dulles, entirely different from the precedents cited by its distinguished proponents. In explaining it to Congressional conferees, its sole author, Secretary Dulles, described it as a mere geographical extension of the Monroe Doctrine, which covered the Western Hemisphere, and the Truman Doctrine, which shielded Greece and Turkey against possible Communist invasion or economic infiltration.

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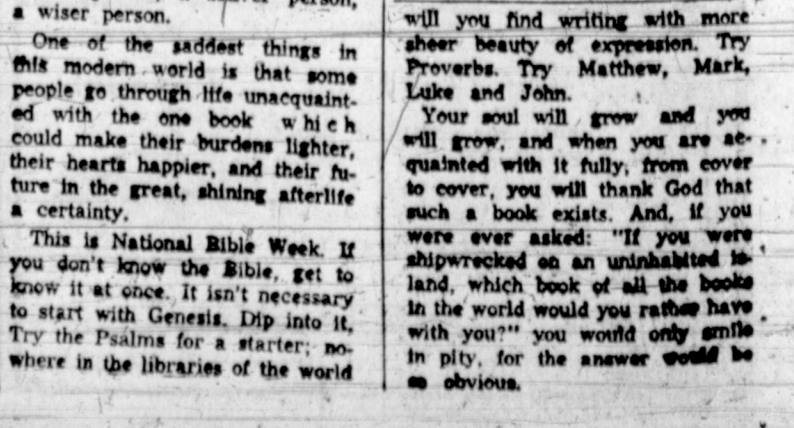

Marie Thinks Kidnaping Planned Well In Advance

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Marie McDonald said today that she thinks "the case of the kidnaped 'body'" was planned well in advance because her two alleged abductors "walked into my house as if they had lived there all their lives."
In an exclusive interview with United Press, the 32-year-old blonde gave her version of a 24-hour ordeal which she claimed began last Thursday night when two zoot-suit-type youths kidnaped her from her \$45,000 home.
"Miss McDonald said an 'enemy' may have arranged the kidnaping because 'any one else would have taken my baby.'"
Los Angeles detectives said they have revealed and "in a few more days we should have it all out in the open. We have to lay all the facts before our superiors first."
Marie's theory as to who may have master-minded the bizarre story that she revealed for the first time since returning to her Encino home late Saturday by private ambulance from India where she was found wandering along a desert road.
Pushed Open Gate
"They must have pushed open the electric gate," she said as she rested in the bedroom of her early American-style house.
"Anybody can—I do sometimes when I forget my key. The boxes didn't bark. He's like that. He even walked with us all the way to the gate when they took me away."
"Those two men came in, calm as anything, and knew every inch of the house. They made me get out the notepaper and newspapers for the kidnap note."
"I think they were high on something. One of them had a gun. We got in a car and they blindfolded me and we just kept going round and round. Once we stopped for gas and they made me lie on the floor of the car."
Forced To Telephone
She said she telephoned friends while being held prisoner because her abductors forced her to.
"They told me to call a columnist," she went on. "They wanted to alarm the people they planned to ask for ransom money. The only number I could remember was Harrison Carroll's (columnist for the Los Angeles Herald-Express)."
"They would ask me a number, dial it for me and then hand me the phone. The only call I made without their knowledge was to my business manager and when they caught me with the phone they smacked me."
She said the young men planned to ask \$20,000 each from her wealthy ex-husband, shoe magnate Harry Karl; her current boyfriend, actor Michael Wilding; her mother, Mrs. Marie Tuboni; and her business manager, Harold Plant.
Gave Her Pills
"They gave me pills to take, big white pills with a blue cross. They made me wash them down with strong whiskey," the blonde

actress said, her voice shaking with fatigue and emotion.
"I held some of the pills in my cheek and didn't swallow them."
She said one of the youths called the other, "gasser."
After Marie was found wandering on the desert near India early Saturday, police quoted her as saying she had been raped. A doctor later said she had not been. Today when I asked her about the reports she cried, "Oh, please, I can't talk a ny more."

or rejected all demands they have made.
The resolution pushed back the clock even beyond the somewhat edged political situation just before the revolution began. While it ruined Hungarian hopes for limited political freedom, it shattered Kadar's last shred of popularity.
It left Kadar dependent only on Soviet arms to remain in power in his heavily-guarded parliament building.
Accused Nagy of Treason
The Kadar government for the first time openly accused former Premier Imre Nagy and his regime of "treason." Previously Nagy had been described as a "weak" man who made the "mistake" of permitting revolutionary elements to seize control.
The declaration attacked "Western imperialism" but it held out hopes for Western aid to help restore the \$1 billion losses it said "the nation had suffered through the revolution." It also promised major financial help from the Soviet Union and the Communist nations.

North Demos Will Issue Own Program

WASHINGTON (UP)—A group of Northern House members plans to issue its own "Democratic legislative program" before President Eisenhower presents his program to Congress next Thursday.
Their strategy is to go on record first with a program more liberal than the one they expect the President to propose.
Leaders of the group are secretly circulating a statement which, for one thing, calls for a strong civil rights program. The Northerners are bypassing Southern Democrats in their attempt to get enough endorsements to make issuing the document worthwhile. And so far, they have not cleared the proposed program with Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.).
Informants said the program also proposes a big school construction program, revision of the Taft-Hartley Act, extending coverage to additional workers under the minimum wage law and permanent liberalization of immigration laws.
It also calls for a U.S. plan to try to end colonialism by extending foreign aid to countries which give up their overseas possessions.
