Industrial Investment

Texas Industrial Week is being recognized in to-day's paper with a special section devoted largely to drawing attention to the part industry plays in the material well-being of the Top O' Texas region.

A very salient part of our industrial development which is usually overlooked is the place of invested capital; for without the savings which make this capital possible, there would be virtually no tools (industry) to raise the standard of living much above the subsistance level. When it is realized that there is about \$13,000 invested in tools for every industrial worker, one gains an insight into the part profits and savings play in our industrial development for they are the springs from which this capital flows:

It is one of the disasters of our day that the professional humanitarians, almost to a man, do not understand the importance of relieving human suffering and vital needs through the only method which can permanently allay these problems; namely, invested capital derived from profits and savings. They think, rather, like the savage, that the easiest way to get fruit is to chop down the tree, not considering that the source of future crops is being destroyed in the process. So, season in and season out, the humanitarian clamors for more taxes on the "rich", to help the "distressed," either through outright handouts or subsidies and, in the pro-cess, dry up potential capital for investments which mean more production.

Ignorance is not a self-curing disease, particularly in the realm of economics, and the sooner the almost universal ignorance of the importance of invested capital is dispelled, the greater will be the strides toward eliminating material distress.

Wage Law Dangerous

A statesman would vote against a minimum wage of any sort. A politician would vote for any sort of mini-

Many people, of course, would not agree with those two statements—and that is their privilege. But let's consider some aspects of the minimum wage law.

First and foremost, it must be remembered that the minimum wage under the so-called Fair Labor Standards Act is decided by law; it is not decided by the value of the laborer's services.

That is the way wages are decided under totalitarian government-whether dictatorship, communist or socialist. When government assumes the power to decide how little a man shall be paid, it is then a very short step to assume the power to tell him how much he shall be paid. It is next a short step to tell him how much he shall produce and how much he shall pay for what he

This is totalitarianism, and there is no room in a free nation for such governmental assumption of power. Under such a system, the worker has lost his individuality and becomes simply a cog in a machine.

That is why a statesman would vote against a minimum wage law of any sort. He knows that it is wrong in principle, and is therefore bound to be wrong in practice. He knows that it leads to evils much worse than those it proposes to cure.

The whole trouble is that it is so easy to confuse the end with the means. The main objective of the minimum wage, its proponents say, is to give everyone a living wage. Well, everyone wants at least a living wageand should have it, if he earns it. Most everyone wants a great deal more than a living wage—and should have that, too, if he earns it.

But no one who believes in freedom will argue that a person should have a certain wage whether he earns. it or not. That is contrary to common sense. The only real guarantee behind a wage in a free country is the productivity of the person who receives the wage.

Or, to put it another way, a man should be paid what he is worth. That is common sense. But that is not the philosophy of the advocates of government-fixed wages, who are also, of course, the advocates of a planned economy. They would first decide on the wage to be paid and then everyone get it, regardless of the value of his services.

At the present time, there are about 24 million workers covered under the Federal minimum wage law, which now requires payment of \$1 per hour. Generally speaking, this law is actually meaningless, because these workers average perhaps double that amount. The fact that it is meaningless has perhaps caused most people to pay little attention to it, even though they may recognize it is wrong in principle.

But even if we forget the principle, it is in the extension of the law that the real economic danger lies. There are about, 20 million other workers in the country that the national labor union says should come under the law, and it is advocating immediate extension to at least 10 million of them and an increase in the minimum wage to all those covered. Extension to the other 10

million would, of course be the next step. Such extesion would cause many employers to price themselves out of business. It would add enot mously to the dangers of inflation, which are great enough as it is. It would cause many employees whose services are simply not worth the minimum wage to become unemployed and therefore become wards of the government. It would prevent many youngsters from getting jobs and benefiting from learning how to make a living. The moral effect of preventing both groups-adults and youngsters-from realizing the satisfaction of earning their way in the world would be tremendous, as is already the case to some extent.

But the Administration is partially going along with this advocacy of increased coverage. In fact, both political parties advocated increased coverage in their 1956 platforms—when they were seeking votes.

The matter will soon come before Congress. Each member must decide for himself whether to vote as a statesman or a politician.

Crimes That Are Not Crimes

I am convinced that a great deal of our economic and political trouble comes from the fact that we have passed a lot of human laws that makes acts a crime that are not a crime if we use the Golden Rule and Ten Commandments and the Declaration of Independence as a standard by which to determine whether or not an act is a crime. When one human law is made that violates the above standard of right, invariably another manmade law is necessary to try to reduce the crime of such a law.

Now I want to mention a few human laws that make an act a crime that is not a crime if we use the Commandments, the Golden Rule and the Declaration of Independence as a standard of

It is a crime under some of our human laws to trade with people living in a foreign land without paving tribute to the United States Government for doing so. This is violating the First Commandment, according to the Catholic number and the First and Second, according to the Jewish and Protestant numbers. Remember, this Commandment says, "Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them or (other Gods) or serve them." Tariffs are putting human laws or man-made laws above God's laws.

Most men would perish if they were not permitted to exchange goods and services. Anything that pinterferes with them doing that to improve their lot is a crime, according to the principles of the moral laws mentioned above. Immigration quotas come under the same category.

No individual has a right to prevent another party from going onto a third party's land with the consent of the third party. And if no individual has a right to interfere, then it becomes a crime if the majority think they have a right to do things that would violate, if done by an individual, the Golden Rule, the Commandments and the Declaration of Indepen-

The government attempting to regulate the value of money and credit is another human law that is a crime. Men should have the right and do have the natural right, according to the guides mentioned, to trade for anything that men have a moral_right to own. For an individual to interfere with people freely exchanging gold for any commodity, or any commodity for gold, would be wicked and a violation of these moral eternal guides. It is also wicked when

The Federal Reserve System that interfered with individuals freely exchanging credit and borrowing and lending money is a mandments and the Golden Rule and the Declaration of Indepen-

dence are guides of righteousness. The minimum wage law is a crime because it takes away from an individual his right to use his energy and trade it the way he believes will benefit him the most.

The 40-hour-a-week law is a crime because it takes away from an individual his right to serve humanity and himself by working as many hours as he desires to work at a uniform rate. Would any individual contend that he, as an individual, had a right to use force to prevent another man from working as many hours as he wanted to at

The Clayton Amendment to the

Sherman Anti-Trust Law, the Norris-Laguardia Law, the Wagner. Law, the Tast-Hartley Law are all laws that make an act a crime that: is not a crime if we have any standard of rightness. They are all acts of some form of socialism or collectivism. They injure the individual who wants to use his own conscience and his own judgment in how long he wants to work and for what price he wants to work and with whom he wants to work. They are crimes because they are a conspiracy and collusion of men against individuals being free to improve their lot without interference. These laws are crimes because they produce bad results. These laws have produced long periods of unemployment, have greaty reduced production and thus have kept the standard of living

Crime Of Crimes

The crime of crimes is the law in most every state that requires the youth of the land to attend a school, usually until 16 or 18 years of age, sanctioned by the bureaucrats of the state who claim they are educators. These are the laws that make it difficult for the youth to get an understanding of the Commandments, the Golden Rule and the Declaration of Independence. They dare not teach these great moral, eternal laws because it would embarrass the professional "educators." And these laws giving the state

a monopoly in education, naturally produce a lot of beliefs in other crimes. They are the grass roots of crime because they are based on the right of the majority or their agents to use aggressive force against the individual who is not using aggressive force. Giving the various divisions of the government the right to use aggressive force to collect money is the master crime. It has been believed in for thousands of years, just as slavery was believed in for thousands of years, and it is one of the primary causes, if not the sole cause, of the government always getting bigger and bigger and more tyrannical, and more criminal. The Doctor Says

I find a letter from R. S. puzzling. He says that he has been a victim of hypertropic arthritis since he was a young man and can find no information about it.

The puzzle is that hypertropic arthritis (also called degenerative joint disease and osteoarhritis) is not ordinarily a disorder of youth. Be that as it may, I shall discuss this change

I do not like to call it a disease. Actually, it is not an inflammatory disorder of the joints and its course is generally mild, not disabling and requiring comparatively little treat

WHAT REALLY HAPPENS is that there is a slow degeneration of the cartilage of some of the joints leading to an overgrowth of the bony tissue around them. These changes may appear in any one of several different locations, but are particularly common in the end joints of the fingers (where they are called weight - bearing joints, particularly the knees).

The exact cause or causes of degenerative joint disease are not too well understood: There probably is an hereditary factor, however, since it appears that these changes are much more common in some families than in others. It is also true that repeated injury to a joint seems to favor the development of these changes.

Poor posture, fat and disturbances of blood circulation are other conditions which contribute to the development of osteoarthritis.

Because so many people with the difficulty are overweight, reducing is often advisable. This is especially important if the knees are involved. If they have to carry more weight than they are built for, there will be too much wear and tear of the joints.

PEOPLE WITH osteoarthritis are rarely incapacitated and can usually move around, though often with some discomfort. They do need frequent rest periods, as this seems to relieve some of the stiff feeling. The use of heat, massage or special supports depends on what joints are involved, the age and physical condition of the person and the severity of the condition. Occupational strains should be eliminated when ever possible and bad posture should be

corrected. OSTEOARTHRITIS is almost always a mild disorder which should be considered as an ailment rather than as a serious or dangerous disease. It does not cause serious crippling as some other forms of arthiritis do.




