





They are making it difficult for an individual to be a steward of his life. They cause him to waste his energy in supporting the waste of the govern-

Such things as protective tariffs, immigration quotas and all laws that interfere with a free and unhampered market where values are determined by all persons and goods are freely exchanged, are stupendous wastes. United States was and is more prosperous than any other country because we did not have the

waste we have today due to government interfering with human initiative. We are rapidly adopting the old-world philosophy of a planned economy by a ruler or by the agents of the majority. In short, by bureaucrats. This is always wasteful because no man is wise enough to be permitted to be to use aggressive force to plan

are not clay to be molded. Waste Of Labor Unions There are few groups of people that are more wasteful than labor unions. They are wasteful because they interfere with individuals using all the talents God gave them to serve themselves and mankind. They, thus, retard production and cause people to waste energy by not having better tools. They discourage initiative and promote the caste system. 




