## Movie Theater Chain Tries New Ticket-Selling Method

BARTLESVILLE, Okla. (UP)—A big movie theater chain has picked this town of 25,000 for an experiment in whether families are willing to pay \$9.50 a month to have first-run Hollywood pictures piped into their TV sets.

The firm, Video Independent Theaters, operates more than 150 movie houses and drive-ins throughout the Southwest. It will invest some \$300,000 to test whether the public will pay monthly movie bills like they do the lights and gas.

Harry Griffing, head of Video, says the service will start in about six months. He said his firm picked Bartlesville after a market survey of the people here wanted it.

"We will run trailers on a coming attractions, but no commercials," Griffing said.

**Will Receive Color**

"People with color sets will receive color film in color. On all sets the picture will be better than ordinary TV because we will be using 35 millimeter film. Most are 16 millimeter."

Griffing said installing the cable would not be charged to the customer. He said the movie would be dialed on one of the channel stops put used in the area. The sets could be used for commercial television on the other channels.

"We expect to lose money for a while," he said, "but ultimately we believe 3,000 to 4,000 Bartlesville homes will have theater service. And the first subscribers will probably have lots of company from around their neighborhoods, just like in the early days of TV."

**May Close Two Movies**

Video operates the three movie houses here. It may close two of them if the new venture, labeled "Tele-Movie," goes over.

"This isn't pay-as-you-go television," said Griffing, "and it's not an experiment from a technical standpoint. Anyone can obtain the equipment we will use. Half a dozen companies make it."

For the \$9.50 Bartlesville subscribers will receive approximately 13 first-run movies each month. They will be carried by cable from a downtown studio. The show will

Here is the most interesting hand from this year's Winter National Championships, played in the qualifying round of the open pairs where everyone got a crack at it.

One pair got up to four hearts. A few reached six hearts or six no-trump. Another group went to seven hearts but the great majority tried for the grand prize of seven no-trump.

The seven no-trump contract certainly appeared proper to South. He had located two aces and a king in his partner's hand. Adding these three tricks to his seven hearts, two kings and an ace gave him a top count of 13.

In all instances the ten of clubs was opened and dummy came as a rude surprise; North had his two

aces and one king but the singleton king of clubs faced the singleton ace and would produce only one trick.

The standard play was to lay down the king of diamonds, and to continue with a diamond to the ace. The jack had dropped at trick one, maybe the queen would drop at trick two. When this did not happen South would take a deep breath, lead a low spade from dummy and finesse the jack. It would hold and the contract would be in.

A few super experts did not like the idea of going down seven or eight tricks and played for a squeeze instead. They simply ran their seven hearts. If West held both the queen and ten of spades or as many as five spades the squeeze would operate; otherwise they would only go down one trick. Needless to say the squeeze did not work and down one at seven was not a good score.

## Reds Are Facing Economic Troubles

Soviet Russia and its satellites are facing serious economic difficulties.

The situation stems from the rebellions in Poland and Hungary. Russia itself, East Germany, Czechoslovakia and Hungary are the countries chiefly affected. But the difficulties extend also to other Soviet satellite nations.

The Soviet government has disclosed some of the problems involved in a series of announcements that started in December with the dismissal of Deputy Premier Maxim Z. Saburov, its chief economic planner.

Russia has sharply cut back the rate of its industrial expansion. East Germany and Czechoslovakia are threatened by possibly the biggest shortage of coal since the end of World War II. Hungary's whole economic situation is little better than chaotic.

**Reasons For Troubles**

What has happened is that the tightly-interlocking economic systems of Russia and the satellites have been thrown out of gear.

For years, Russia was able to direct, exploit and loot the industries of its Communist satellites. Now Poland is directing its industry for its own good under Wladyslaw Gomulka, its independent Communist leader.

Poland's coal was used, for instance, for Russia's benefit until its rebellion. This coal was sold by Russian demand, at lower than world prices. Now the Soviet government has been compelled to agree to renegotiate its coal contracts, but even with that, Poland is getting first bid in its own production.

Hungary, which was a source of food, raw materials and industrial products for countries of the Soviet bloc, has become a liability instead of an asset and is crying for aid from Russia.

**Production Goods Missed**

On January 30, the Soviet government announced that there was a rise of 11 per cent in industrial production in 1956. But it disclosed that the basic industries of steel, coal and building materials, among others, had failed to meet their quotas for the year.

Last Saturday the Supreme Soviet, the parliament of the Soviet Union, approved a 1957 budget which provided for the biggest

cut back in 20 year in the rate of economic expansion.

The most serious immediate problem for the East German Reds is the coal shortage. Communist leaders have started to appeal to technicians and ordinary workers to volunteer for service in German mines to help make up the shortage.

**Worst Since War**

Western Intelligence sources in Berlin report that the coal shortage threatens to be the most serious since the war, and that lack of fuel has caused cuts in electric power to factories.

Amarillo and Pampa and they felt that these new commissions should not be bound to decisions made at this time.

Boyd reported that Pampa and Plainview would probably wait to see what action Amarillo would take before deciding if it was feasible to rejoin the authority. If Amarillo does not rejoin the group of cities it would be unwise for Pampa and Plainview to rejoin, he explained.

When asked how Pampa would go about rejoining the authority if such action was deemed advisable, Boyd stated, "It would require a vote of the residents of Pampa in a special election called by the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority will be the only way we can rejoin."

He explained further that before the election could be called a petition bearing at least 50 signatures of residents of Pampa who are qualified voters would have to be submitted to the authority.

The authority would determine if the city was willing to cooperate with the authority before the election would be called, Boyd reported.

In conclusion the mayor reported that he felt that Pampa should closely examine the proposals of the authority in order to protect our rights to water obtained from the Canadian River and that if water can be obtained from the authority at a reasonable cost, when needed by the city, that Pampa should consider rejoining the other cities in the authority.

He stated that the water obtained from the authority should only be considered as an emergency supply and should not be thought of as the main water supply for Pampa.

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## Senator Calls Soviet Talk Doctrine Boost

WASHINGTON (UP) — Sen. George D. Aiken (R-Vt.) said today that Russia's massive propaganda assault against the "Eisenhower Doctrine" makes Senate enactment of the President's Middle East plan "inevitable."

Aiken's comment came shortly before the Senate Foreign Relations and Armed Services committees met in hopes of completing their work on the President's resolution and reporting it out for Senate debate. The resolution already has passed the House.

Republican senators on the two committees appeared to be lined up solidly against one more determined Democratic effort to make a substantial change in the resolution.

"Approve" Not "Authorize"

The latest test shaped up over a Democratic move to reword the proposal so that Congress would "approve" rather than "authorize" presidential use of U.S. troops, if necessary to halt any Russian aggression in the Middle East. The change was proposed by Chairman Theodore Francis Green (D-R.I.) of the Foreign Relations Committee.

Some senators argue that Mr. Eisenhower is asking Congress to delegate some of its constitutional authority over the use of American forces in combat.

Chairman Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.) of the Armed Services Committee predicted that Green's proposed change might carry by a narrow margin.

Final approval of the resolution by the two committees appeared certain after this issue is settled. Senate leaders hope to begin floor debate on the President's plan before the end of the week.

**Soviets Claim Aggression**

With the resolution entering the last stretch of its route through Congress, Russia was pushing a broad-scale propaganda attack against the plan. Its latest move was a request that the United Nations brand the "doctrine" and other U.S. military policies as "acts of aggression."

Aiken, a member of the Foreign Relations Committee, said the propaganda assault indicates the Russians "fear the effectiveness of the President's plan." He said the Soviet attack "makes final congressional enactment of the plan inevitable."

The State Department declined immediate comment on the Russian UN move.

### Children Allergic To Polio Vaccine

NEW YORK (UP) — A carefully detailed study has shown that more children are allergic to the Salk anti-polio vaccine than had been supposed. Of course, there is absolutely no suggestion that children with allergies shouldn't be vaccinated. But the suggestion is that they should be given special attention.

Dr. W. H. Lipman of Kenosha, Wis., with the co-operation of the Kenosha department of health, found that out of 3,970 children who received one or more shots of the vaccine, 106 had unquestionable allergic reactions, a rate of 2.67 per cent. That, certainly, is a low rate, and no reaction could be classified as a major one.

His study served to replace fragmentary indications that the allergic reactions range from practical zero to considerably less than one per cent. In arriving at his 2.7 per cent rate, Dr. Lipman was conservative.

Of the 3,970 children, 490 had reactions of some kind. Of the 490, 384 reactions were like cold symptoms or sore arms and miscellaneous muscular aches. These he eliminated as non-allergic although no child was vaccinated who obviously had a cold.

Dr. Lipman suggested that it was "very possible" that the tiny amount of penicillin in each Salk shot was responsible for the truly allergic reactions, such as hives and skin rash. Some people, although not many on a percentage basis, are "sensitized" by the first penicillin put into them. A second introduction produces an allergic reaction.

He emphasized that "even at the risk of reactions," allergic children should have the vaccine. These children can get their shots in reduced doses spaced four to seven days apart, he said, and a small amount of an anti-histamine chemical can be injected along with the vaccine.

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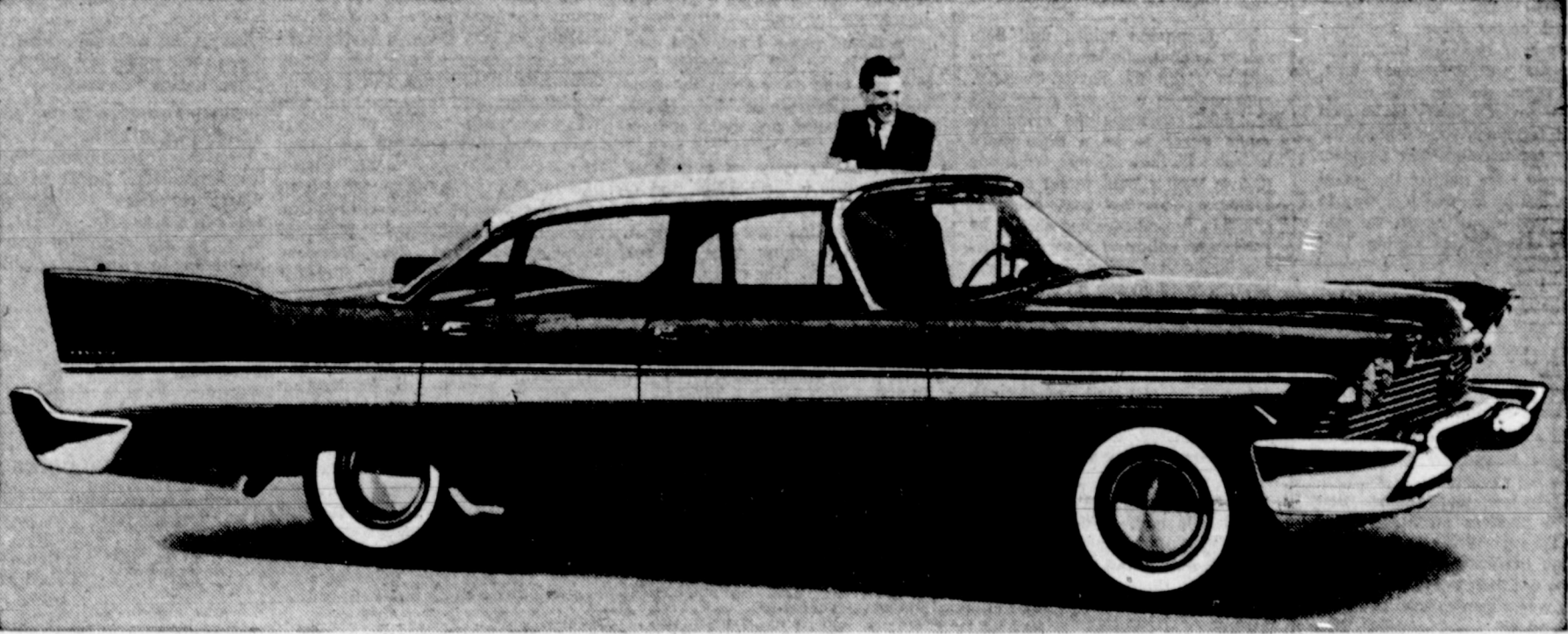

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## 'U.N. Cannot Work'

The cheers you hear are intended for Lord Cherwell, a member of the British House of Lords. Ever since the redoubtable Disraeli, we have heard so much about the British House of Commons that it may come almost as a surprise that there are any vocal members. But Cherwell is a Lord, a reasonable man, and his articulateness is apparent to any who will undertake to read his speech of December 11 last, which is now included as a copyrighted article in the February 1st issue of U. S. News & World Report, an independent news magazine published at Washington. Cherwell says the United Nations cannot work.

Never, since Dr. V. Orval Watts gave us "The United Nations, Road To War," have we found anything so completely logical and so utterly irrefutable as Cherwell's bitter denunciation of this international phantasmagora. "I hate living in a fool's paradise, and though, like everyone else, I wish U.N.O. could work, I have come reluctantly to the view that in its present form, it cannot. It is composed, of course, of men full of the best intentions and its admirers are equally well-meaning. But I cannot help feeling that people tend to overestimate its power for good and to underestimate its potentialities for evil. We know all too well how easy it is for people to fall victims to phrases, to be hypnotized by slogans, and I am afraid that that is what is happening in the case of U.N. 'Send it to U.N.' is becoming a sort of incantation. In many quarters it seems to be treated as a shibboleth. You have only to mouth the words and go through the ceremonial, and all will be well.

### "Social Security" Fraud

I recently made a statement about the "Social Security" fraud to which Burke Johnson, District Manager of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Social Security Administration at Odessa, Tex., took exception. He writes: "I wish to bring to your attention an error that appeared in the Friday, January 11th edition of your paper. (The Odessa American) In the column by your employer, Mr. R. C. Holles, he states, under the section labeled 'Social Security' Fraud, that 'in the case of a man and a wife both working, both pay, but only one benefits. This statement is not true. If a husband and wife work and pay the social security tax on each of their wages, each of them will draw a benefit based on his or her own wage record.

"Also, his statement about the government's handling of the social security trust fund is misleading. As you know, the Old Age and Survivors Insurance Trust Fund is invested in U. S. Government bonds and the interest paid by the government on these bonds accrues to this trust fund. "Articles on social-security arouse a great deal of interest these days, and I feel that it is my duty to point out any information that might mislead the public. Even though I know that you are opposed to the whole social security program, I know that you are interested in publishing information of interest to the general public. I wish to express my appreciation, on behalf of the Social Security Administration, for your publishing, in the past, the articles on social security prepared in this office."

I am glad to be brought the subject up because I want to reiterate that the working wife does not benefit by "Social Security" because she is working and her husband is also working. The only possible benefit she would get would be where her salary was more than her husband's salary and they both were less than \$4,200.00 a year. Her benefits would be measured by which worker had the highest average salary. If her salary was less than her husband's, she would not get a nickel additional because she is working, although 2 1/2 per cent is deducted from her salary and the employer is obliged to put up 2 1/2 per cent, which means, in reality, that the employer's deductions are either deducted from her salary or they are added to the cost of his product and paid by other "Social Security" consumers. So the working wife does not benefit by "Social Security." She would get the same amount of "Social Security," whether she worked or not, provided her salary was not more than his and his was less than \$4,200.00 a year.

### Alger Hiss Precipitated Disturbing Suggestions

WASHINGTON—The name of Alger Hiss has popped out in current discussions of proposals to internationalize the world's key waterways as a plan of solving the crisis of the Suez Canal. Hiss, who served a prison term for denying under oath that he had been a Communist agent, indirectly helped precipitate disturbing suggestions that the Panama Canal be included in any internationalization scheme. It was as far back as 1946, when he served as a trusted figure in the State Department, that Hiss made the American waterway the subject of international controversy. In that year, when Russia first began to charge that our encircling bases gave proof of our aggressive intentions, Hiss sent to the United Nations a list of what he called "occupied territories." He did so without any authority from high State Department officials. In the category of "occupied territories," he included the country of Panama, although our lease holdings there include only the narrow Canal Zone strip. Although President Truman and Secretary Acheson did not object to the Hiss interpretation, it infuriated Spruille Braden, then Assistant Secretary of State in charge of Latin-American affairs.

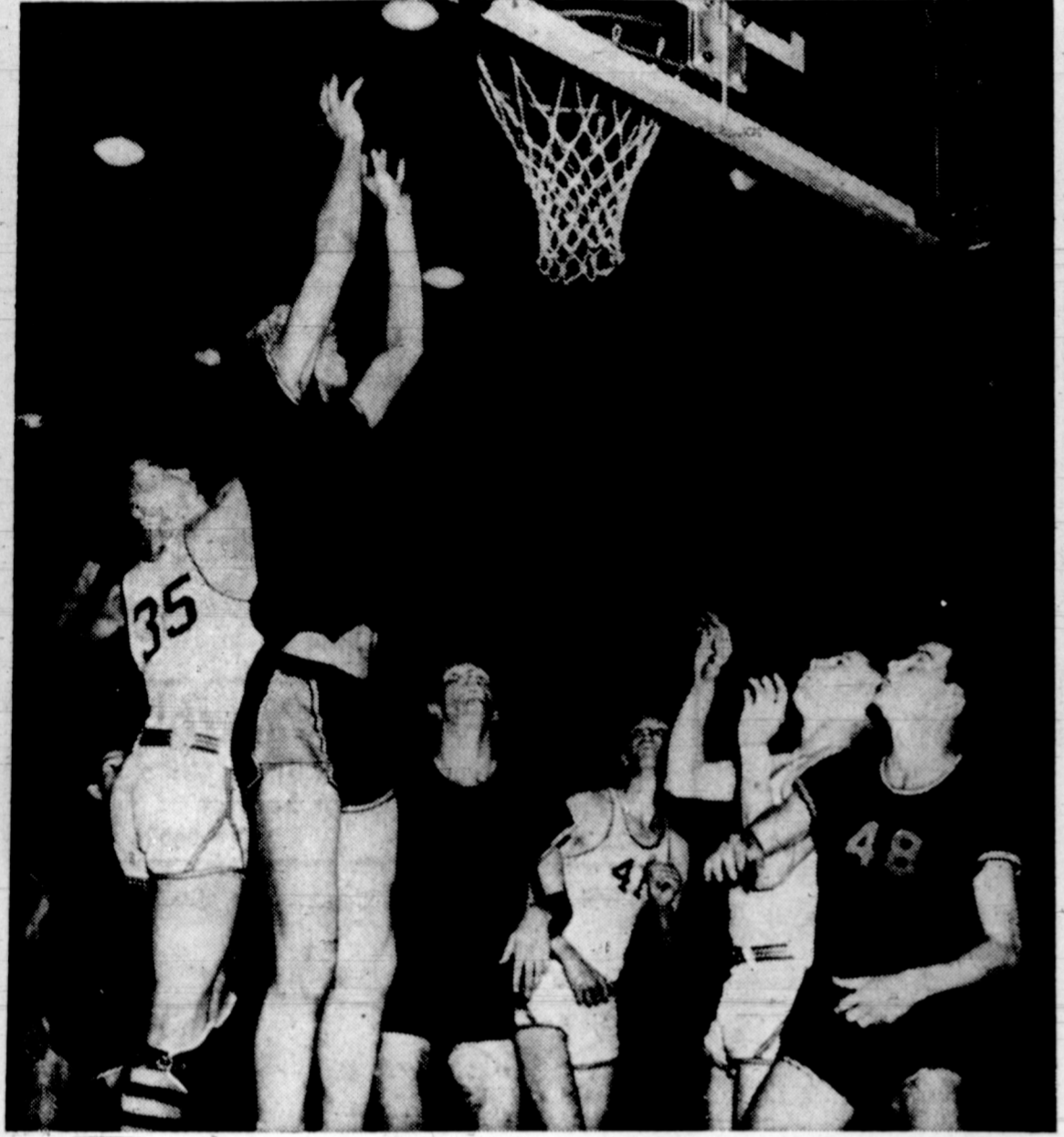

### New Elizabethan Age Is 5 Years Old This Month

LONDON (NEA) — The New Elizabethan Age is five years old this month, but as far as royal pomp and circumstance are concerned, it is a milestone almost unnoticed.

For Queen Elizabeth II the anniversary comes in the midst of crisis at home and abroad. In these trying months the Queen undoubtedly has missed the steady hand of her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh.

In the past four months, while the duke has been off on a tour on the royal yacht, the Queen has been without a husband, the royal children without a father.

The duke was away on Prince Charles' eighth birthday. He was somewhere in the South Pacific on the anniversary of his own wedding. He missed the family Christmas at Sandringham, the first Christmas the Queen has been without her husband since their marriage.

But if the pomp has been missing lately, these factors seem to have brought the Queen closer to the people she governs on a personal level.

It was undoubtedly with her absent husband in mind that the Queen spoke so feelingly of "the loving circle of a united family" in her Christmas broadcast to the Queen spoke so feelingly of "the Commonwealth nations."

"You will understand me when I tell you," she declared, "that of all the voices we have heard this afternoon none has given my children and myself greater joy than that of my husband."

This is the new Elizabeth, the Queen who is not afraid to show her heart.

The Elizabethan Age was five years old on Feb. 8, the anniversary of Queen Elizabeth's accession to the throne vacated by the death of her father, George VI.

There was no dancing in the streets, no stately drives by the Queen through the boroughs of London. The only public tribute to the Queen on her fifth anniversary as sovereign was a 22-gun salute fired from the wharf of the Tower of London.

It is one more instance of the human side of Queen Elizabeth, of which Britons are seeing more and more. Queen Elizabeth is no longer the uncertain, girlishly nervous, slightly pathetic figure who ascended the throne five years ago. She has acquired stature, digni-

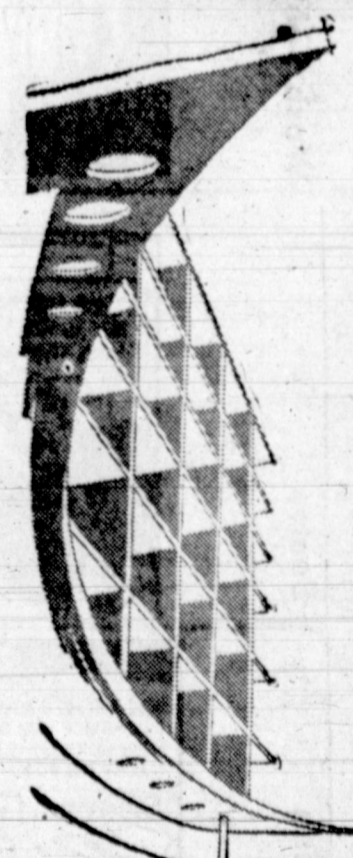

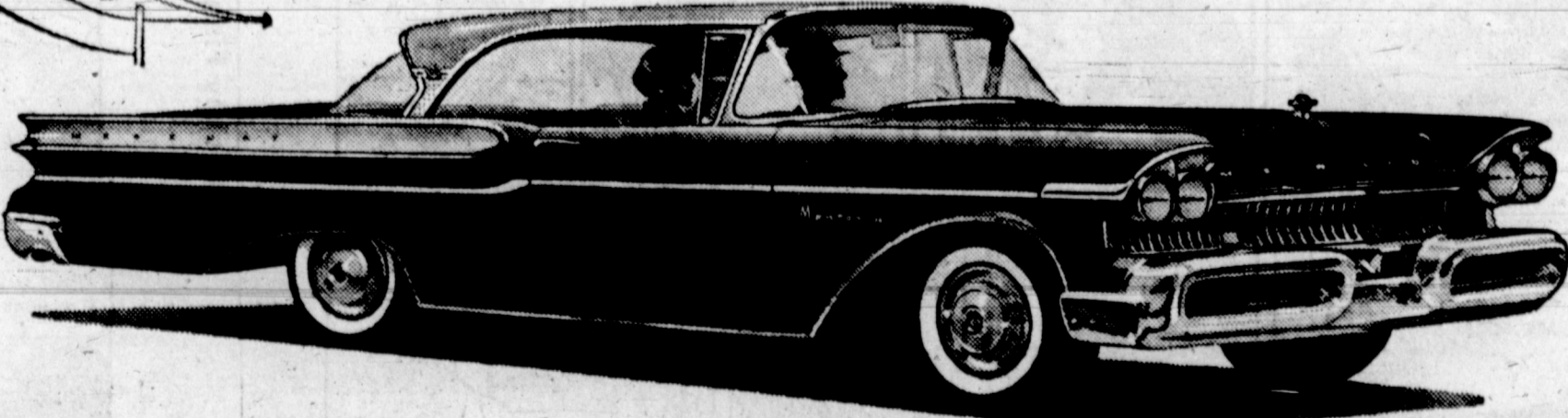

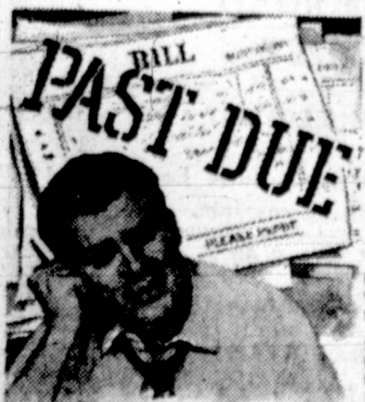

That is because Jesuit priest Aime Duval has taken a vow of poverty and turns his mushrooming millions in to his religious order.

Father Duval started strumming his guitar in the Bistros of Dijon six years ago. His songs were straight and simple. His following grew.

He made a record of "Seigneur, Mon Ami" (Lord My Friend). It has sold a preposterous 45,000 copies. Since then the singing priest has made at least three public appearances a week.

The United States may soon hear the crooning priest if his order gives permission.

And he has one talent which Elvis Presley will be hard pushed to match.

"I sing in nine languages," the mild-mannered priest said. "In Latin, French, German, English, Russian, Hawaiian, Spanish, Basque and Italian."

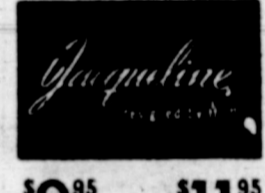
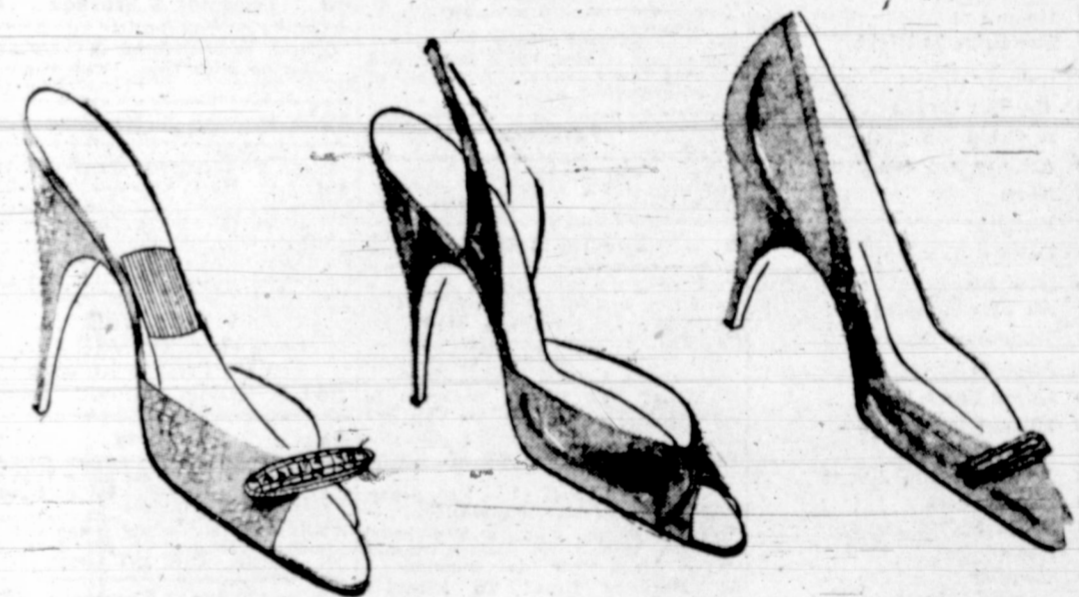

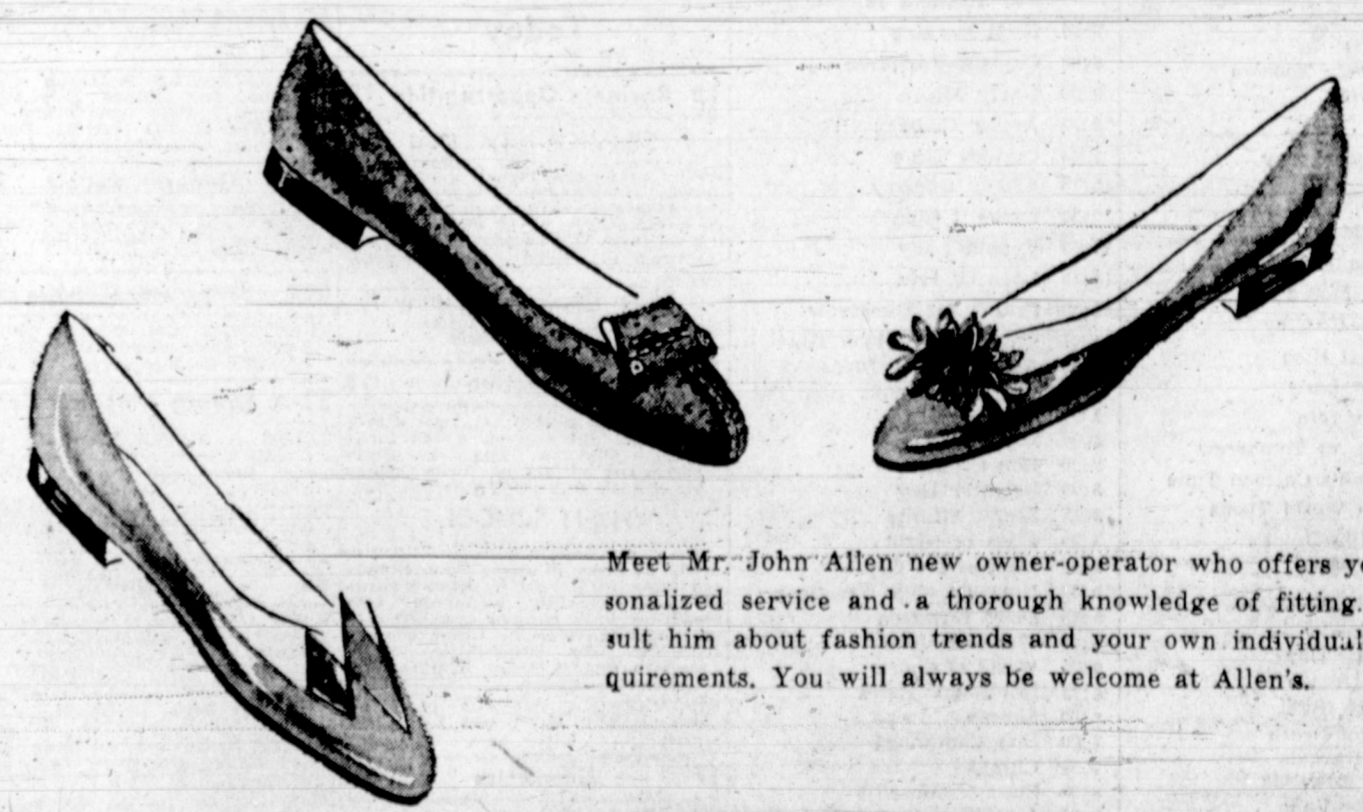
