### Having a shot and a beer

FRESNO, Calif. — It wasn't a shotgun marriage, but a husband and wife shot it out in church during a marriage counseling session after he arrived late and drinking a beer.

Both were wounded.

Holding a beer in one hand and a gun in the other, Michael Martin shot his wife Wednesday as she tried to walk out of the meeting at St. James Episcopal Cathedral. A bleeding Bonnie Martin pulled a pistol from her purse and shot her husband in the shoulder.

The two took the gun battle outside where it continued until Michael Martin ran out of shots.

"It's a good thing he had been drinking because he could have hit her more," said the minister who ran the counseling sessions. "He was a lousy shot."

Bonnie Martin has filed divorce papers against her husband three times since 1989.

Bailey County Sheriff Coy Plott said he is thrilled to get an officer with Kemp's impressive credentials.

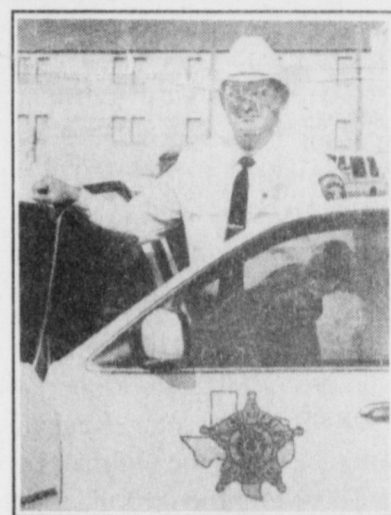
"Finding somebody with his experience and diverse background is not something you find every day in

a small town like Muleshoe," Plott said.

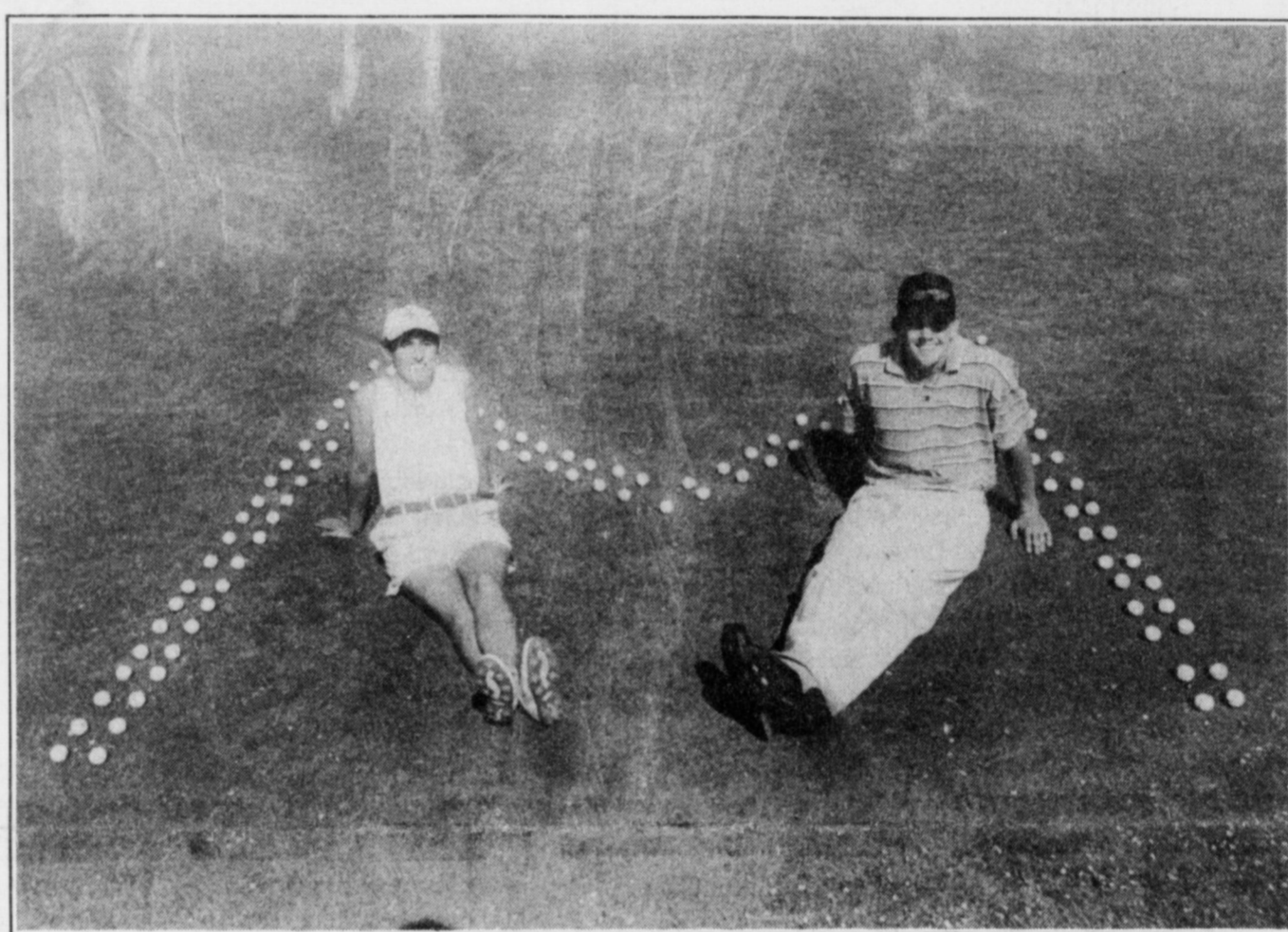
Among other duties, Kemp was a supervisor and lead investigator with the APD. Living in a city where major crimes are a daily occurrence takes its toll, Kemp said.

## Ready FORE regionals

Muleshoe golfers Whitt, Hodge chase state berth at Ratliff Ranch

Ryan Hodge is making the first of what figures to be several appearances at the regional golf tournament.

Keisha Whitt is hoping to punctuate her prep golf career with a strong showing when the two Muleshoe High School golfers play in the Region 1-3A golf tournament Monday and Tuesday at Ratliff Ranch Golf Links in Odessa.

"The key for both of them is to keep their poise," Muleshoe golf coach John Irwin said. "But the main thing is, I want them to feel like they've played the best they could when they walk off the course."

The top two teams and individuals advance to the Class 3A state tournament next month.

Hodge plans a conservative approach to the short, links-style course that features huge, undulating greens and more than 70 sand traps. From the men's tees, the par-72 course plays 6,243 yards.

"I'm going to have to be conservative off the tee," the long-hitting sophomore said. "I'm only going to use my driver when I have to. Otherwise, I'm going to use my 5 wood."

Hodge also switched to a lighter, blade putter this week in anticipation of Ratliff's slick greens.

"I'm going there to win it," Hodge said. "Anybody who is a competitor goes there planning to win. But really, I just want to play well."

Hodge qualified for the regional tournament by finishing fourth at district, firing a second-round 76 for a two-day total of 154.

"Ryan grew up a lot at district," Irwin said. "He's starting to learn to not let the bad shot or hole bother him."

Whitt, a senior, is making her third-straight regional appearance. Her first two trips were as a team-member. She earned a regional berth this spring

## Council updates building codes

The Muleshoe City Council Tuesday approved updated building and plumbing codes during its regular monthly meeting. A motion to add mechanical codes to city regulations was tabled.

City Manager James Fisher told the council that it was necessary to adopt official codes because "they help ensure the safety of our citizens, making sure that items being built and placed in their homes meet the latest safety standards."

The council unanimously adopted the 1997 edition of the Uniform Building Code to regulate repairs and construction to all buildings and structures within the city limits. The Council also adopted 1997 edition of the Uniform Plumbing Code to regulate the design, construction, repair and maintenance to any of the plumbing system in the city of Muleshoe.

The Council voted to exempt government entities and homeowners making repairs from the codes. However, compliance with the regulations is required for new construction or residential additions.

Copies of the codes are available at Muleshoe City Hall and at the Muleshoe Area Public Library.

Although the codes were updated, the Council did not increase the building permit fees, which have been the same since 1982.

The Council also considered adopting uniform mechanical codes, which would regulate control over the installation and repair of heating, refrigeration, and incinerator units. Currently the city does not have mechanical codes.

After a lengthy discussion, the Council tabled the decision concerning mechanical codes and requested the city manager to provide further information at the next meeting.

Councilman Juan Chavez asked City Manager James Fisher to examine if Muleshoe

## Lazbuddie students helping make wish come true

students could purchase a \$2 ticket which allowed them to wear a hat for the day.

Fifth-graders paid 50¢ each Friday to be allowed to chew gum or wear a hat for the day.

Elementary students participated in the "Coins for Wish Kids."

First-graders were each given a goodie bag for their efforts in collecting the most money. The class was also presented with a certificate from the foundation for their hard work.

"The kids really did excep-

tionally well in this project," said Cindy Spanel, coordinator for Make-A-Wish Foundation of the Texas Plains, who was received the check from LISD last week.

"Valentin really wanted to come and meet everyone here. He is so appreciative and thankful for what the kids have done. He was feeling bad and just couldn't travel right now. But he wanted me to tell everyone how thankful he is for everything they have done, and he is hoping that he has a chance to come and visit."

Spanel said that the Kids for Wish Kids program provides young people with a valuable learning experience about life-threatening illnesses and how they can help make a difference to another child.

The foundation grants wishes to children from ages 2 1/2 to 18 who are dealing with a life-threatening illness.

The Texas Plains chapter has granted 457 wishes since opening in 1984 and is currently working on fulfilling 26 wishes for children in the Panhandle.

**Ag Secretary's safety net proposal draws cool reception**

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman's announcement earlier this month of a proposed series of steps USDA will take to improve the safety net is receiving a cool reception from American Farm Bureau Federation and some other commodity groups who don't want to rock the farm bill boat.

The agriculture department's proposed initiatives include making it easier to expand in-

surance to new crops and new areas, moderating insurance rate adjustments, developing a pilot program to give farmers increased protection and re-examining USDA's prevented planting coverage.

Glickman also indicated he is seeking congressional approval of the Administration's proposal to allow him to extend commodity loans during periods of weak markets, as

well as authority to allow farmers more planting flexibility when their first crop fails.

While the initiatives may sound good, Mary Kay Thatcher, senior director of governmental relations in AFBF's Washington, D.C. office, said, "We're not very crazy about any of the provisions. We are opposing both extending the marketing loan and raising the cap. We don't believe the farm bill should be reopened."

Texas Farm Bureau's associate legislative director, Gary Joiner, indicated that the state farm organization also has reservations about tweaking the existing program.

"We will always support ef-

orts to ensure financial stability with farmers and ranchers. The one area in which we're hoping they will not change or jeopardize is the FAIR Act provisions," Joiner said. "We want those contracts for transition payments to remain intact, as well as the flexibility provisions — the things they have allowed growers to take advantage of that have been positive. We don't want to see those things abandoned in an effort to achieve some other goal."

Central Texas grain farmer Hope Huffman of McGregor, who represents District 8 on the TFB board of directors, emphasized that the generalized approach with respect to crop insurance hasn't worked in the past and will not work now.

even needs such regulations, which tend to be oriented toward large commercial industries.

Fisher, who was in favor of adopting the codes, told the Council that Lubbock and Clovis have adopted mechanical codes. However, none of the smaller neighboring towns in the area have mechanical codes, Fisher reported.

In other business, the Council voted to solicit bids for a real estate broker to help sell 4,873 acres of city-owned land known as the east city well fields.

The city has unsuccessfully solicited bids for the sale of the land on two occasions in the past. No bids were received either time.

The broker will be responsible for gathering potential buyers and soliciting their bids to the council for a final decision.

During the meeting, the Council also made changes to the city's swimming pool policies and rates for the 1998 season.

The pool will be closed on Mondays and Tuesdays. Hours

of operation have been extended for Wednesday through Friday to 1 p.m. to 7 p.m and Saturday and Sunday from 1-5 p.m.

Fisher said he hopes the extended weekday hours will give parents more of an opportunity to go to the pool with their children after work.

In order to encourage more families to come to the pool together, Fisher also proposed to the Council that the admission rates be decreased.

Children 12 and under will now pay \$1 for daily admission; 50 cents less than last year. Anyone 13 or over will pay \$1.50. A family season pass, for up to five people, will be available for \$75. An individual pass will be available for \$30 and swimming lessons will cost \$20 per child.

In final business, the council approved a \$750 donation to Comite Patriotico for the annual Cinco De Mayo celebration. The funds will come from the hotel/motel tax fund and must be used for advertising purposes.

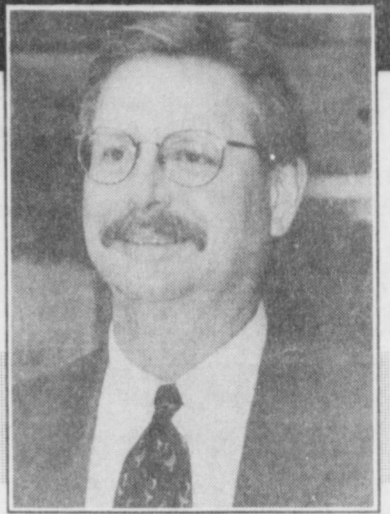
New Councilman Eugene "Peanut" Hawkins was also sworn in at the meeting.

**Conner family earns library award**

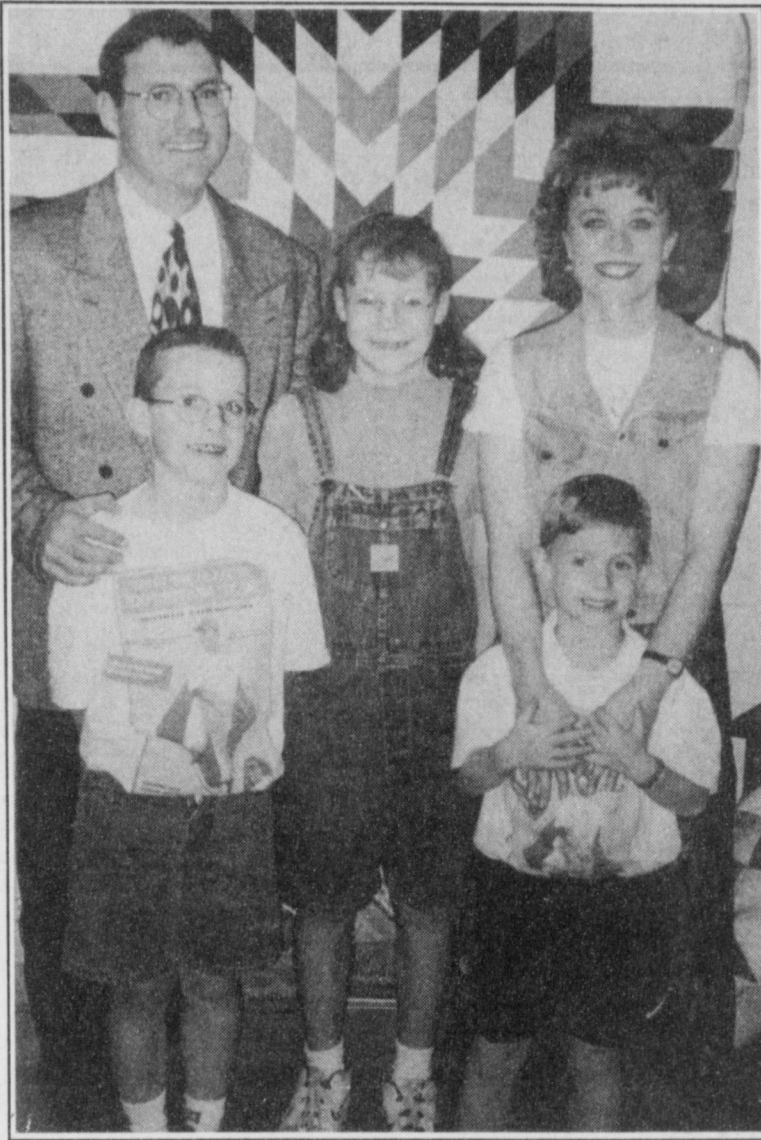
The Stacy Conner family of Muleshoe was named the 1998 Muleshoe Public Library's Family of the Year.

**USDA purchases beef roasts**

WASHINGTON — Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman today announced that USDA has purchased \$2 million of beef roasts to help improve prices to cattle producers.

The buy was part of a \$30 million bonus beef purchase announced March 24.

Glickman said this first purchase of high-quality beef roasts will help bolster prices for the fed beef industry which is currently operating at below break-even levels. Traditional purchases of ground beef products conducted by the department generally benefit the cow segment of the beef industry.

"This latest purchase reflects USDA's continuing support for the entire cattle industry, especially those sectors most impacted by current economic conditions," said Glickman. "In addition, this meat cut will be enthusiastically received by recipients of the department's food and nutrition assistance programs."

Next offers are due under Invitation 39 on April 24. Purchases of beef roasts will continue into late May, with deliveries made throughout the summer.

USDA will begin traditional purchases of ground beef items

for delivery in the National School Lunch Program in early July for delivery in August.

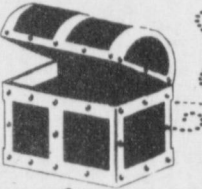

For the last two years, Kemp worked for as a police officer in Corrales, NM, a bedroom community just outside Albuquerque.

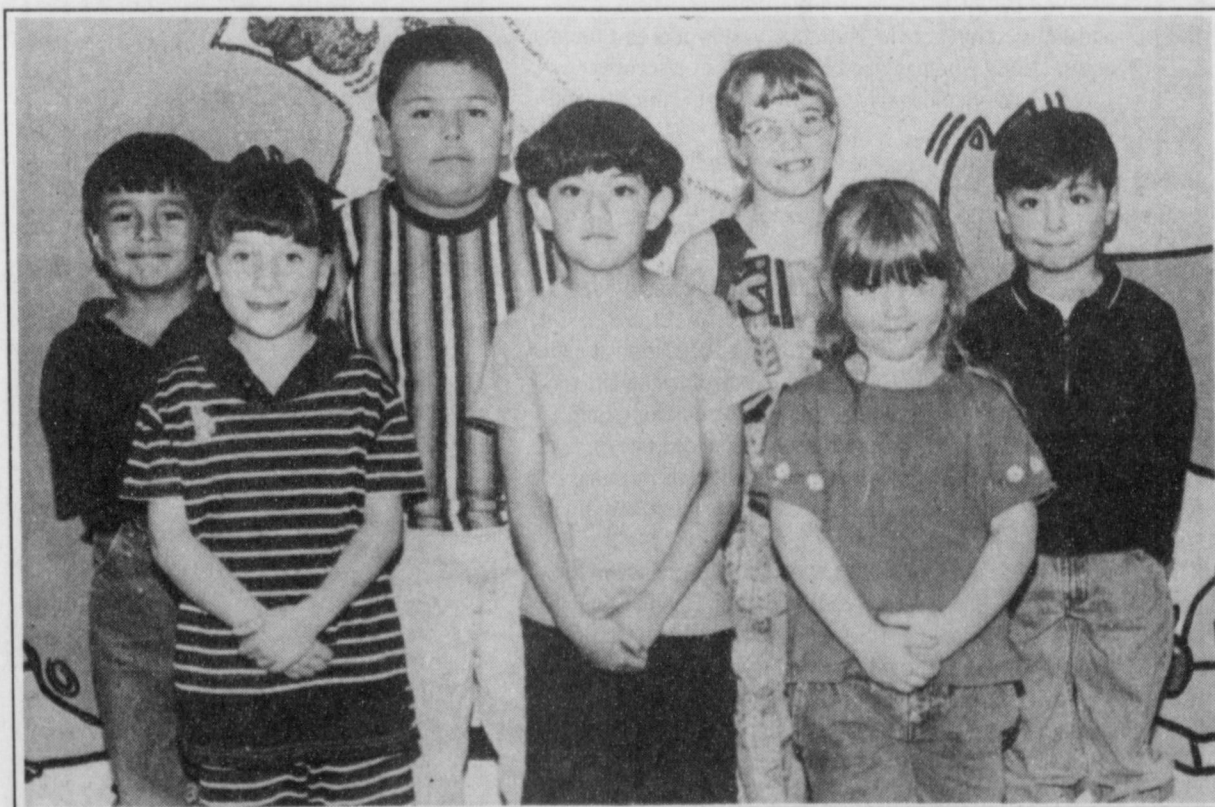
A lot has changed in Muleshoe since Kemp packed all his belongings in the back of truck and headed off to college in

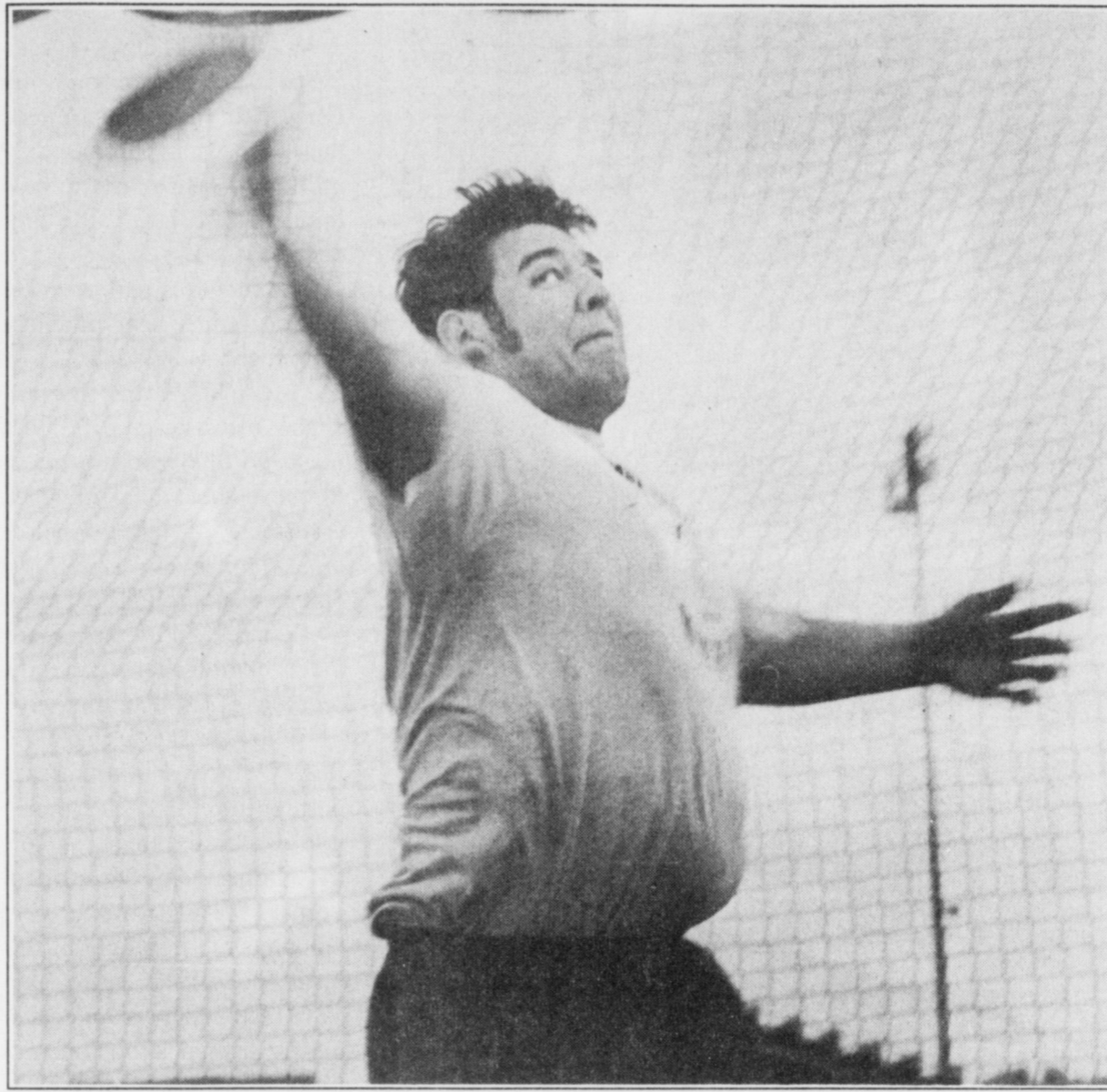

The treasury report showed about \$1900 thanks to the donations from the Channel 17 bake auction on April 4, which resulted in about \$1257.

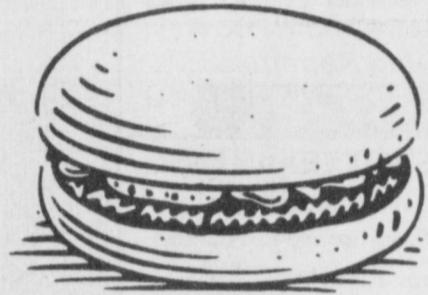
