This would mean that because of its chaotic nature none of us would know from one minute to the next just what would occur. The sun might rise in the east today, and in the south tomorrow. Or it might rise in the east only to change its course and direction in mid-heaven. Or, perhaps, one day it would forsake us and go off somewhere else. This would not only be true of the sun, it would be true of everything else.

There would be no human species as such. There would be no fixed laws governing any species. Nor could we safely determine the nature of anything, since even, in the midst of such determining, what we were seeking to learn would be altered by forces beyond our ability to fathom.

We might, for example, begin to manufacture a lead pencil. But it might turn out to be an electric light, an alligator or a pear tree. In fact, if the universe were chaotic we could manufacture nothing. Nor could we survive for 30 much as five minutes. Everything we do is based upon predictable certainty. In short, all science, all understanding, all logic is based upon prediction. It is manifest nonsense to presume an unordered universe. Such a conclusion is an absurdity.

But see what that does for us. If we do not have a chaotic universe, then our universe is ordered. This means that what occurs, assuming identical circumstances a second time, will re-occur. This is prediction. By means of this self-apparent fact, we have learned much of the nature of life on this planet. We can even suppose what life might be like on other planets.

Most of all, we learn that there are certain fixed laws by means of which our existence is a fact and will continue to be a fact. We may not be able to prove our existence. But our existence, if it cannot be proved, can at least be demonstrated. We are. We have been. We will continue to be.

There are tew would care to take the opposite side to this argument.

Yet, while it is apparent that so far as the physical universe is concerned prediction is not only possible but desirable, we immediately run into a problem when we claim that there are moral laws as absolute and as enduring as physical laws. The physical laws can be observed and demonstrated. But moral laws are related to our own desires, our own sense of what is good and right, and therefore come under serious question. This is true because it is difficult to predict a specific result from a specific failure to obey moral law.

If an object is extended above the ground and released, it will fall. If the object is fragile, it may be broken by the fall. We can observe the entire procedure. We can safely predict the result.

But what happens when an individual breaks the moral law by using aggressive force against one of his fellows in some manner? We cannot see the entire procedure. We cannot predict the result with certainty. But, despite our inability to witness the phenomenon with our own eyesight or with others of our physical senses, we sense that the result must be there. Our sensing is a moral sensing. This causes us to look closely at what we call moral law. What is it?

Moral law is simply a recognition that all men belong to the same species. We hold it to be no violation of the rules governing species for a man to commit an act of violence against a rock, a tree, a shrub or an animal. We do not consider such an act of violence an immoral act. And this is true providing that ownership of the rock, tree, etc., does not come into the question. Ownership creates a moral issue. A rock or a tree in itself does not create a moral issue. If a man forms an act of violence against another man or against another man's possessions, we consider this an act of immoral-

This is true because we recognize either consciously or unconsciously, that the following facts create the base for moral law:

1. Every man, has a right to life. 2. Every man has a right to sustain his life. 3. In order to sustain his life, every man has a right to earn something by means of his own energy which he can use to sustain his life. 4. This means that since man has a right to life, he has a right to property for without property he could not live. 5. Therefore, he has a right to earn property; to keep property until tomorrow (save, or to dispose of (spend) property according to his own wishes, provid-

These are the basic premises of all moral law. Any act of violence against any man which would abridge any of these rights would be an abridgement of his rights to life. And if any person abridges the right of one man to life, it must follow that by such abridgement, his own right to life is placed in jeopardy.

This is another way of saying that the Golden Rule is the working hypothesis at the moral level. And this is a logical extension of the fact of our ordered universe, into the relam of mortality. It is Igoical

to suppose that since the physical universe is one which functions on absolute laws, morality as it relates to the desirability of living, also functions by means of absolute

pend" Consisting of those who do not believe each American citizen is capable of working out his own

destiny and must be wet-nursed through life by swarms of bureau cratic masters - who feed on the very dollars that are wrung from the citizens themselves at the federal tax grinder.

Mr. Heinsohn explains that wages cannot come out of profits because profits are necessary in order to have jobs. He puts it this

"Let's figure it out. It takes money to start a business or to buy a farm. This money comes from savings, and people who have saved money invest in a business or a farm because they hope their investment will be successful, and that they will get some profit. If they guess wrong and the venture fails, their savings are lost. Consequently, every person investing his savings takes a chance, whether it is in a big business, a little business, or a

"The living scale of the American worker will be the best in the world only so long as his production is superior to the production of the other workers in the world. American savings have given to these better tools, better management, better workmen's skills and an abundant supply of natural resources that the American worker is way ahead today.

"If, through shortsightedness and the desire to get something for nothing, the American worker kicks over this winning combination by voting into office politicians who ignore the natural laws, his scale of living will fall just as surely as the sun rises and sets. Regardless of how many more paper dollars he may receive each week as a result of his government's man-made laws, they will buy for him less and less of the things he wants because the things he wants will cost him more and more of his paper dol-

"What does the worker gain by having more and more paper dolprofits and that selling prices need not be advanced. Nothing could be farther from the truth.'




