Syria Would Be Aided By China

Communist China said today it would go to Syria's aid if Syria is attacked.

A Peiping Radio broadcast heard in London said Chinese Communist leader Mao Tse-Tung pledged that the Peiping regime would "resolutely support the joint

struggle of the Syrian peoples to defend their independence and peace."

Peiping Radio warned the United States was "risking the danger of starting a war" and said "in the era of intercontinental guided missiles... it would not escape heavy blows as it did during the last two world wars."

"America's allies also may be the targets of these guided missiles—and this is something which they should seriously consider," Peiping said.

BULLETIN Oil Field Firm Will Move Plants Here

The moving of manufacturing plants from Oklahoma City, Okla., Tulsa, Okla.; and from Borger to Pampa was announced today by A. E. Hickman, president of Crall Products, Inc.

The moving of the manufacturing facilities will bring approximately 15 employees of the firm to Pampa.

The firm is transferring the equipment and personnel of the Paramount Equipment Co., a subdivision of the firm, from Tulsa. This branch of the company manufactures production items for the oil industry, Hickman said.

Being moved from Oklahoma City are the facilities that manufacture Crall Spiral Paraffin Scrapers. This plant is a division of Petroleum Specialty Co., which operates a plant at 902 W. Brown.

Also being moved to Pampa is a new branch of the company. Hickman reported that Crall Products Inc. had recently purchased the Producers Products Co. of Borger. The firm manufactures Shux All-Purpose Handcleaner.

The three divisions of the parent firm will be located in temporary quarters at 760 W. Wilks until a modern building can be built, Hickman said.

FLU KILLS 150
FRANKFURT, Germany (UP)—The Asian flu epidemic sweeping Europe has caused at least 150 deaths and hospitalized thousands of Germans in West Germany, health officials reported today.

The U.S. Air Force in Europe reported 8,096 cases of the illness, and the U.S. Army said 9,500 soldiers have been hospitalized with the flu. There have been no deaths among American forces personnel in Europe as a result of the illness.

Ike Asks Scientific Alliance

Would Make Use Of NATO's Resources

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower called on free nations to create a super scientific alliance that would far outstrip anything the Russians can produce in technological and missile achievements.

"... We have the power," the president said last night. "The only thing to do is put it together."

Eisenhower appealed specifically for a grouping of the scientists of North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) nations. But he also had in mind the total scientific manpower and resources of the free world.

"NATO should not be thought of merely as a military alliance," he said. "NATO is a way of grouping ability—of our manhood, our resources, of our industries and our factories."

Ike Speaks At Dinner
Eisenhower issued the call for scientific unity at a glittering White House dinner for Queen Elizabeth II. He also stressed ties binding the United States and Commonwealth countries in these troubled times.

Meanwhile, a high-ranking government scientist indicated the administration is in the process of stepping up its missile and satellite programs.

There were these other developments in the missile-satellite field:

—Informed sources said scientists at Cape Canaveral, Fla., may test fire today the rocket that is to carry the U.S. satellite into space. The second and third stages of the three-stage rocket will be dummies, however, and no attempt will be made to send up a U.S. moon.

—Eisenhower planned to meet with his cabinet at a regularly scheduled session today. The satellite-missile issue was almost certain to come up for discussion.

Picture Taken of Rocket
—Scientists at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in South Pasadena, Calif., reported they have successfully photographed Sputnik's rocket.

—British astronomer Dr. A. C. B. Lovell said the end of the rocket is "imminent."

While Eisenhower did not go into details on his plans for scientific alliance, he apparently favored an international organization set up along NATO lines.

Wire Will Be Placed At Bridge
The hazards to small children crossing the new Cook street bridge will be removed next week, John Koontz, acting city manager, said today that a heavy mesh wire would be placed on the outside of the guard rail on the pedestrian walks on either side of the bridge.

The city manager reported that the rails on the outside of the bridge allowed enough space for children to fall between the rails and fall into the creek.

The wiring will be continued past the ends of the rails, Koontz said, so that children cannot fall down the steep slopes at either end of the bridge.

Stolen Items Reported By Officers

Stolen items were the only business reported by the police department and sheriff's office this morning.

The theft of tools from a pickup owned by Brooks Electric Co., 1101 Alcock, highlighted the activities at the police department. Jim Conner, chief of police, said that the tools were taken from the truck sometime yesterday.

Tools taken were: two sets of knockout tools, valued at \$25 each; one thread set, valued at \$25; one set of indutone tools, valued at \$5; and one set of pipe bending tools, valued at \$5.

According to information given to the police department, the employee of the firm that was using the tools apparently left the job at 10 yesterday morning. The pickup was found in the 500 block of S. Barnes by officers last night, after being reported missing.

When the truck was returned to the firm the discovery of the missing tools was made, Conner said.

At the sheriff's office this morning, a report on the theft of a tire and wheel from a pickup belonging to Frontier Perforators Inc. was received by Sheriff Rufe Jordan.

The manager of the firm, George Crow, told the sheriff that the tire and wheel were removed from the pickup on either Oct. 4 or 5. The size of the tire was reported to be 800 by 17.

Paratroopers 'Frisk' Youths At School

LITTLE ROCK (UP)—Paratroopers searched and broke up a crowd of 12 or 14 white boys on the Central High School steps today as seven Negro students arrived for classes.

They slapped their jackets, as if looking for weapons and made one boy turn his pockets out. After checking the identification cards of the boys, they ordered them to move on.

The paratroopers chased off the white boys as seven of the nine Negroes who integrated Central High on Sept. 25 were pulling up at the curb in an Army station wagon escorted by one jeepload of soldiers.

Two of the Negroes—Elizabeth Eckford and Terrance Roberts—stayed at home with flu. After the white boys were run off, the Negroes walked through the entrance of the school without incident, escorted by one officer.

A lawyer for a segregationist "Mothers League" asked Congress to impeach a U. S. district judge who dismissed a petition for an injunction ordering 101st Division paratroopers to leave Little Rock.

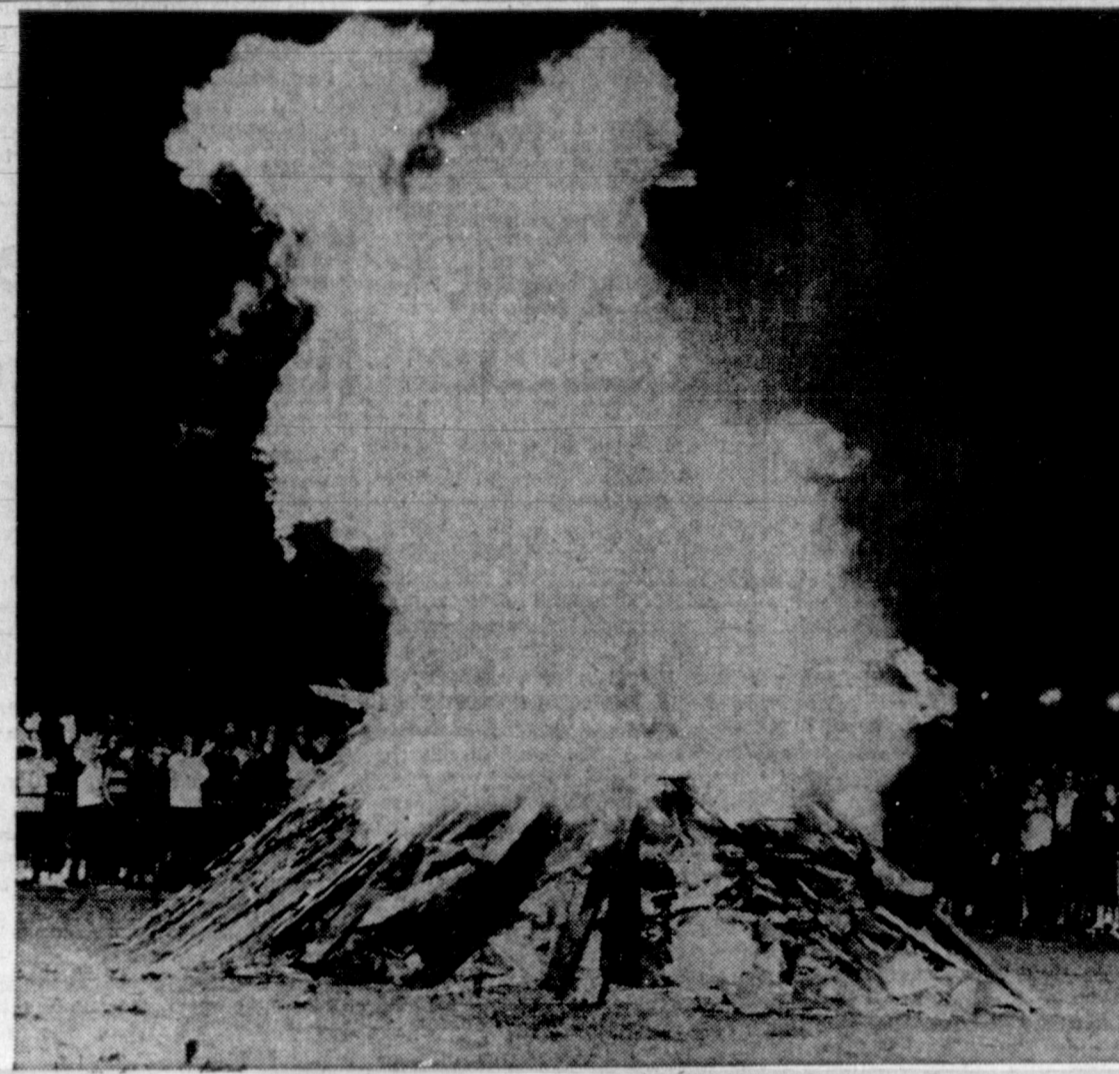
The petition was filed by Attorney Kenneth Coffelt for Mrs. Margaret Jackson, 36, vice president of the Central High School Mothers' League.

Mrs. Jackson complained that the troops were violating the U.S. Constitution by protecting nine Negro students who were integrated with Central High Sept. 25 after a series of near riots.

U. S. District Judge Ronald N. Davies, now in Fargo, S. D., dismissed her suit "since it presents no substantial federal constitutional issues cognizable by a three-judge court."

Coffelt had asked that a three-judge court hear the case.

"Because of the fact that Judge Davies dismissed the Jackson suit without a hearing and without notice to anyone and while the chief judge of the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals was preparing to convene a three-judge court to hear the case on its merits, pursuant to law, Judge Davies should be impeached and this should be the first order of business in the next Congress," Coffelt said.

Intent To Murder Trial Set Monday

The trial of Duff L. Lewis, on a charge of assault with intent to murder, is scheduled for 10 a.m. Monday in the 31st District Court of Gray County.

Lewis has been on a \$5,000 bond, set by the court, after being charged with the shooting of Edward Tiffin on April 30, 1955.

The case had been set for trial twice, according to Bill Waters, district attorney, but has been continued on the motion of the defense attorneys.

Scheduled to follow the Lewis case is the hearing on whether the children of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Foster of Pampa are dependent and neglected children.

The case resulted from investigation by local officers and County Attorney Don Cain of reports that the living conditions of the children were below standard and that the Fosters had given beer to one of the girls.

District Judge Lewis M. Goodrich today set the trial of Orville Gosnell Keith, charged with murder while committing an unlawful act, for the week of Dec. 2.

Keith is charged with the murder of Clark L. Ayers which resulted when Keith's car struck the Ayers car while Keith was under the influence of alcoholic beverages, according to records in the office of the District Clerk. Keith is on a \$2,000 bond at the present time.

Also set for trial during the week of Dec. 2 were the cases of Alfred Lloyd Miller, of Central Texas, on two charges of driving while intoxicated and the case of Norville Hatfield of Pampa on a charge of swindling with a worthless check.

Fire Chief Announces Promotions

With the opening of the new fire sub-station at Aspen and 17th expected tomorrow, Fire Chief Ernest Winborne announced the promotion of two firemen to captains.

A. W. Ferguson and Elmer Darnell have been promoted to captain and will be in charge of the two shifts at the new station.

Chief Winborne stated this morning that it is not known at this time if the two new captains will remain at the new station. "We will not know what captains will be at the three stations until the new sub-station on S. Barnes is opened," the fire chief said.

Winborne stated that he hopes to move into the other new station in about a month.

Plans call for one of the Boardman pumps to be placed at the north station tomorrow if the plumbing work is completed today, Winborne said.

The other Boardman will be placed at the south station when it is completed.

This morning the problem of installing the radio antenna on the top of the water tank, located between the two stations, was discussed.

Ike And Queen Break Up Formal Dinner Over Song

WASHINGTON (UP)—Queen Elizabeth II and President Eisenhower broke up a very formal state dinner at the White House early today by joining in an impromptu songfest with their guests.

The dinner in the ornate East Room of the mansion was proceeding along very proper lines as had been expected. In attendance was a glittering assemblage including Cabinet members and some of the most socially prominent persons in the nation.

Fred Waring and his orchestra which supplied the dinner music had concluded, so they thought, and were taking their bows.

"Just a minute," Eisenhower interrupted. "Haven't you forgotten something?"

It was the final number—the "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Waring explained to the President that the number had been scheduled but had not been rehearsed.

"But we'll sing it if you will all sing it with us," said Waring.

So the Queen and the President, with Mrs. Eisenhower and Prince Philip joining in, lifted their voices in song.

"You all sing terribly," Waring interrupted. "Let's try it again." This time it went off without a hitch.

Brisk Round Of Activities Set For Queen

WASHINGTON (UP)—Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip, basking in the welcome given them by the heart of democracy, set out today on a brisk round of activities that include lunch with Vice President Nixon and dinner with Secretary of State Dulles.

It was the second day of the royal couple's four-day state visit to the nation's capital. Already they had found this city, basked about most visiting celebrities, warmed to a pretty queen and a handsome prince.

Rain greeted the royal couple this morning for the start of their busy schedule, but the weatherman predicted clearing skies in time for a large diplomatic reception outdoors this afternoon at the British Embassy.

The President, toasting the British sovereign and her husband at the sumptuous dinner, said this country's respect for Britain was "epitomized in the affection we have for the royal family."

And Eisenhower took the occasion to make what may become the West's answer to Russia's earth satellite. Labeling the scientific and cultural assets of the free world far greater than those of Communism, he called for a new scientific alliance within the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to meet the threat of Russia's missile and space achievements.

Toasts Ike
The gorgeously gowned young Queen, who toasted Eisenhower and wished him "every possible health and happiness," also did not ignore the scientific excitement caused by the Soviet "Sputnik." She pledged Britain's cooperation in the "new age of discovery and exploration in the world of human knowledge and technology" beginning to unfold.

Her majesty, incidentally, unwittingly contributed to the first snafu of her visit to the New

Water Storage Tank Is Nearly Ready For Paint

Construction work on Pampa's new million gallon overhead water storage tank is nearing completion.

The construction crew of the Chicago Bridge and Iron Company is in the final stages of the work with the workmen removing the more than 300 boards used in scaffolding on the tank yesterday afternoon.

Albert Bergstad, construction foreman, said that as soon as the derrick in the center of the tank is removed, probably today, the remaining plates and the vent will be placed on the top of the tank.

"We expect to complete the construction work next week," Bergstad said.

With the completion of the tank, the painting crew is expected to begin work about Oct. 25. If everything goes according to schedule, the foreman said, the tank should be completed before Thanksgiving.

Scientists Slated To Test Fire Missile Today

WASHINGTON (UP)—Scientists launch this country's full-instrumented satellite.

These sources said the projected test, third in a series of seven, would not be designed to hurl either a satellite or a rocket into an orbit. President Eisenhower has said the first attempt to put a test satellite in the skies will come in December.

The rocket to be used in the forthcoming test will resemble the actual launching vehicle. But except for some test instruments, the second and third stages will be dummies.

Fraternity Stripped Of Privileges

LINCOLN, Neb. (UP)—A University of Nebraska fraternity has been stripped of its social privileges because several members delivered a laundry bag to a sorority house. There was a naked fraternity pledge inside. The incident was barred Wednesday but a school secrecy lid covered the story's details much better, apparently, than the pledge was covered when squealing coeds opened the bag. According to one report, the hapless young youth was seized by his future fraternity brothers, tied up, stripped of his clothes, and put in the laundry bag which was then tied to the door of the sorority house. The incident happened last week. The co-eds, so the report goes, reacted with swift, if misdirected justice. They gave the unfortunate pledge a pummeling, then sent him packing in a pair of girl's slacks. The incident became known when university officials said they had turned the matter over to the Inter-Fraternity Council. The IFC's decision bars the fraternity, identified as the local chapter of Theta Chi, from participating in University Social events. University officials, who regarded the prank as something less than amusing, said it was not a part of "Hell Week" hazing which takes place in a couple of months. But they were reluctant to bare any more details. Neither university nor fraternity officials would identify the students involved. The coeds weren't talking either.

Paper In Effort To Conceal Source's Name

NEW YORK (UP)—The New York Herald Tribune said today it would take to the Supreme Court, if necessary, a case involving the right of one of its columnists to refuse to identify a news source. Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan threatened Wednesday to sentence radio-TV columnist Marie Torre to 30 days in jail because she refused to give the name of a Columbia Broadcasting System executive who gave her a story about singer Judy Garland. Miss Torre contended she had a constitutional right to withhold the source's name. Ryan ordered her to show cause as to why she should not answer or be punished for contempt. He left the way open for an appeal that could go to the U.S. Supreme Court. Such an appeal would mark the court's first consideration of the question of whether a reporter has the right to refuse to divulge the source of information for a published article.

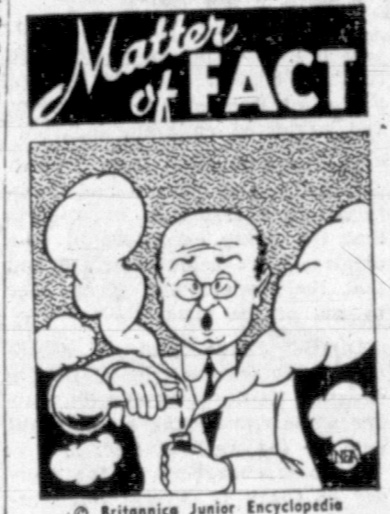

Arthur Larson Is Replaced As Information Agency Chief

WASHINGTON (UP)—Arthur Larson, one of the bright young men of the Republican Party, is being replaced as Chief of the U.S. Information Agency in an apparent move to placate congressional budget cutters. Larson's shift to a new post was disclosed at a time when the USIA is faced with one of its greatest challenges in countering the tremendous propaganda victory scored by Russia in announcing its Sputnik and other scientific advances. The White House announced Wednesday that Larson, whose agency's funds were severely cut last year after a bitter congressional budget battle, will be replaced by George V. Allen, one of

Governor Hits Aid To Schools

Austin (UP)—Gov. Price Daniel told a public school study committee Wednesday federal aid to public schools would destroy Texas' "one last bulwark of local self-government." Daniel addressed the 24-man committee at its organizational meeting. He said Texas needs a public school program second to none and financed by Texas funds. Sen. A. M. Aiken Jr. was named chairman of the committee. The committee was created by the legislature last spring, and will report back to the lawmakers on four topics: curriculum, teacher supply, classroom facilities and financing. The governor said Texas school districts will spend an estimated average of 127 million dollars per year in the next five years for school buildings. He told the committee, "I hope you will recommend means of additional local or state action. We must not look to Washington for federal aid if we want to retain local control of our public schools." "If there is to be one last bulwark of local self-government, it should be the operation of our public schools," Daniel told the committee. Daniel also pointed out the expected rise of students attending public schools within the next five years will bring the total attendance to 2.5 million. He said 93,000 new teachers will be needed by 1962.



CARRIER WORK DELAYED
WASHINGTON (UP)—Completion of the 60,000-ircraft carrier Kitty Hawk may be delayed "by several months," the Navy has announced. It blamed the delay on installation of equipment to handle and launch guided missiles and incorporation of "improved facilities" to handle aviation fuel. A fixed date for completing the carrier has not been established, but it may not be ready for sea until late 1959. The Kitty Hawk, fifth of the Forrestal class, is being built by the New York Shipbuilding Corp., Camden, N.J.

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Gets New Job
Sometimes called the philosopher of "Modern Republicanism," Larson will become a special assistant to the President. He will be in charge of "special projects in international affairs relating to United States Propaganda efforts." Allen, a career diplomat and presently U.S. ambassador to Greece, headed the original "Voice of America" radio project that later was expanded into the USIA. His appointment, which is subject to Senate approval, was hailed by Republicans on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty gave no reason for the switch Wednesday. He refused to say if it was connected with the Soviet space success.

West Expresses Concern That Reds May Trigger War

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UP)—Western diplomats expressed concern today that Russia might blunder into World War III over the Syrian situation. Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko charged late Wednesday that the United States is "prodding" Turkey to attack Syria after Turkey's Oct. 27 elections. He pledged Russian aid to Syria and said war might break out "at any moment." Western diplomats said Gromyko's accusations, couched in the bluntest language, indicated the Soviet Union felt it was dealing from a position of power because of Sputnik. Such overconfidence could cause the Russians to stumble over their own propaganda and provoke a world war that even they might not want, the diplomats said. Gromyko's charges were contained in a letter to Sir Leslie Munro of New Zealand, president of the U.N. General Assembly. He called on the United Nations to demand armed assistance from all its members for Syria if it is attacked by Turkey. U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge was understood to have been in close touch with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles for more than two hours after Gromyko's message was made public. Apparently the United States was content to stand on a statement by Dulles in Washington earlier in the day. He said that in case of a Soviet-Syrian attack on Turkey, the United States would take offensive action that would not leave Russia a "privileged sanctuary." This obviously was a reference to the Korean War's "sanctuary" for Chinese Reds north of the Yalu River where U.N. forces were forbidden to bomb.

Official Has Evidence Against GM

NEW ORLEANS (UP)—Evidence that General Motors Corp. overcharged the government two million dollars on a jet plane contract is in the hands of the U.S. attorney general, Rep. F. Edward Hebert (D-La.) said Wednesday.
Hebert said U.S. Comptroller General Joseph Campbell forwarded the evidence in a letter to Attorney General Herbert Brownell. The letter brought up a question of civil fraud and added, "you may also wish to consider the possibility of criminal liability."
"It is our belief that there was a misrepresentation of material facts to the Air Force" in connection with a contract between General Motors and the Air Force for production of F-84 jets in GM's Kansas City plant, the letter said.
(Campbell's wife in Washington said that he is out of town and she did not know his whereabouts. A spokesman for the Justice Department said no comment would be made until today.)
Hebert is head of a House Armed Forces Subcommittee that conducted a hearing on the contract comptroller general notified him earlier this year. He said the comptroller general notified him of the forwarding of evidence so the Justice Department could take "appropriate action."
The subcommittee had reported earlier that profits to General Motors on the contract ran 17 million dollars over what had been anticipated, according to evidence produced at the hearings.
A Democratic member of the subcommittee commented during the hearings that there was evidence of "taxity on the part of the Air Force and cunning on the part of General Motors."

Arthur Larson Is Replaced As Information Agency Chief

WASHINGTON (UP)—Arthur Larson, one of the bright young men of the Republican Party, is being replaced as Chief of the U.S. Information Agency in an apparent move to placate congressional budget cutters.
Larson's shift to a new post was disclosed at a time when the USIA is faced with one of its greatest challenges in countering the tremendous propaganda victory scored by Russia in announcing its Sputnik and other scientific advances.
The White House announced Wednesday that Larson, whose agency's funds were severely cut last year after a bitter congressional budget battle, will be replaced by George V. Allen, one of

Governor Hits Aid To Schools

Austin (UP)—Gov. Price Daniel told a public school study committee Wednesday federal aid to public schools would destroy Texas' "one last bulwark of local self-government."
Daniel addressed the 24-man committee at its organizational meeting. He said Texas needs a public school program second to none and financed by Texas funds.
Sen. A. M. Aiken Jr. was named chairman of the committee. The committee was created by the legislature last spring, and will report back to the lawmakers on four topics: curriculum, teacher supply, classroom facilities and financing.
The governor said Texas school districts will spend an estimated average of 127 million dollars per year in the next five years for school buildings.
He told the committee "I hope you will recommend means of additional local or state action. We must not look to Washington for federal aid if we want to retain local control of our public schools."
"If there is to be one last bulwark of local self-government, it should be the operation of our public schools," Daniel told the committee.
Daniel also pointed out the expected rise of students attending public schools within the next five years will bring the total attendance to 2.5 million. He said 93,000 new teachers will be needed by 1962.

West Expresses Concern That Reds May Trigger War

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UP)—Western diplomats expressed concern today that Russia might blunder into World War III over the Syrian situation.
Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko charged late Wednesday that the United States is "provoking" Turkey to attack Syria after Turkey's Oct. 27 elections. He pledged Russian aid to Syria and said war might break out "at any moment."
Western diplomats said Gromyko's accusations, couched in the bluntest language, indicated the Soviet Union felt it was dealing from a position of power because of Sputnik.
Such overconfidence could cause the Russians to stumble over their own propaganda and provoke a world war that even they might not want, the diplomats said.
Gromyko's charges were contained in a letter to Sir Leslie Munro of New Zealand, president of the U.N. General Assembly.
He called on the United Nations to demand armed assistance from all its members for Syria if it is attacked by Turkey.
U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge was understood to have been in close touch with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles for more than two hours after Gromyko's message was made public.
Apparently the United States was content to stand on a statement by Dulles in Washington earlier in the day. He said that in case of a Soviet-Syrian attack on Turkey, the United States would take offensive action that would not leave Russia a "privi-

Fraternity Stripped Of Privileges

LINCOLN, Neb. (UP)—A University of Nebraska fraternity has been stripped of its social privileges because several members delivered a laundry bag to a sorority house. There was a naked fraternity pledge inside.
The incident was barred Wednesday but a school secrecy lid covered the story's details much better, apparently, than the pledge was covered when squealing coeds opened the bag.
According to one report, the hapless young youth was seized by his future fraternity brothers, tied up, stripped of his clothes, and put in the laundry bag which was then tied to the door of the sorority house. The incident happened last week.
The co-eds, so the report goes, reacted with swift, if misdirected justice. They gave the unfortunate pledge a pummeling, then sent him packing in a pair of girl's slacks.
The incident became known when university officials said they had turned the matter over to the Inter-Fraternity Council.
The IFC's decision bars the fraternity, identified as the local chapter of Theta Chi, from participating in University Social events.
University officials, who regarded the prank as something less than amusing, said it was not a part of "Hell Week" hazing which takes place in a couple of months. But they were reluctant to bare any more details.
Neither university nor fraternity officials would identify the students involved. The coeds weren't talking either.

Paper In Effort To Conceal Source's Name

NEW YORK (UP)—The New York Herald Tribune said today it would take to the Supreme Court, if necessary, a case involving the right of one of its columnists to refuse to identify a news source.
Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan threatened Wednesday to sentence radio-TV columnist Marie Torre to 30 days in jail because she refused to give the name of a Columbia Broadcasting System executive who gave her a story about singer Judy Garland.
Miss Torre contended she had a constitutional right to withhold the source's name. Ryan ordered her to show cause as to why she should not answer or be punished for contempt.
He left the way open for an appeal that could go to the U.S. Supreme Court. Such an appeal would mark the court's first consideration of the question of whether a reporter has the right to refuse to divulge the source of information for a published article.
WILKES BARRE, Pa. — William H. Alden, 94, who at his retirement in June was believed to be the oldest baker in the country, died Wednesday. Alden was a baker for 78 years.

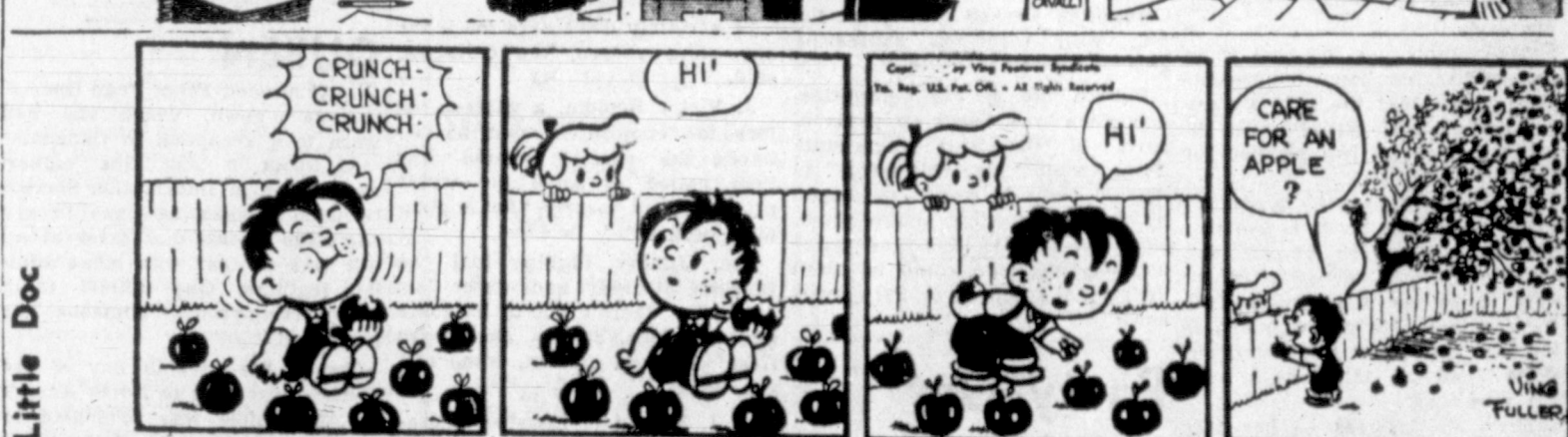

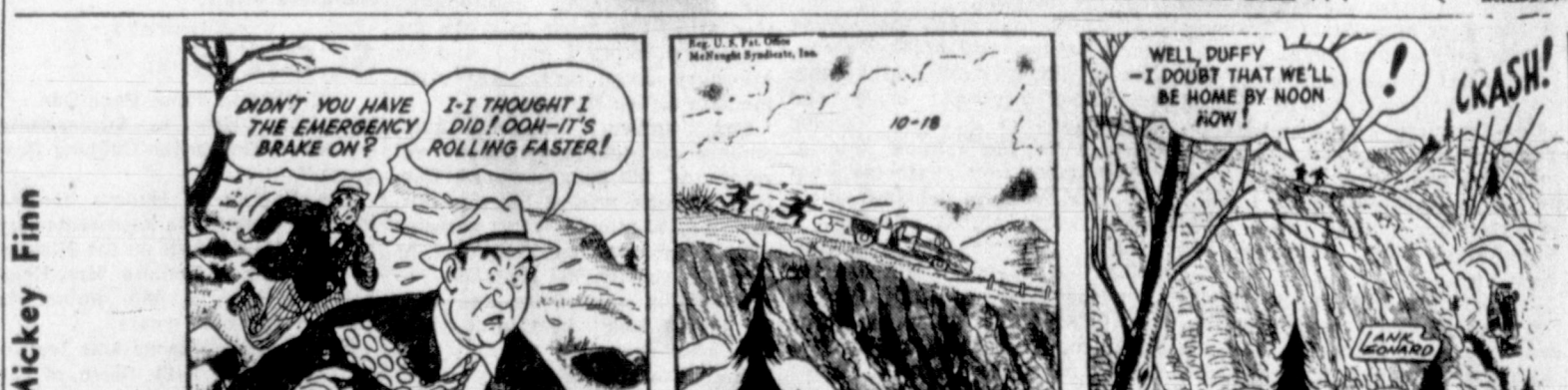

COOK'S NOOK

Methods Of Preparing Food Can Lower Calorie Count

The calorie count of a meal can usually be lowered by the methods used to prepare the foods.

This is especially true in meat cookery, according to Beth Bailey McLean, home economist and author of books on meat cookery.

Roasting, broiling, water cooking and modified braising are all suitable methods for use in a high-protein, low-calorie diet. This wide choice makes possible variety in the reducing menus. It also makes possible the inclusion of almost all cuts of meat.

Of course, the meat must be well trimmed of visible fat, or else the fat must be "cooked out" in the preparation process.

Broiling and roasting are suitable for more tender cuts of beef and lamb. Large veal and pork cuts are roasting pieces also. For the low-calorie diet, slow broiling to well-done stage can be used even for veal and pork chops, even though these meats are not usually broiled.

When braising pot roasts, round steak, pork chops and steaks, omit the prepping in flour and pre-browning in fat. During the long, slow cooking in a small amount of liquid such as water, tomato juice or bouillon, some of the fat in the meat will melt and become part of the gravy. Only the lean should be served on the low-calorie meal.

Omit the rich gravy. Vary the seasonings on meats in the reducing menu. Lemon and tomato juice and herbs are especially recommended. Most doctors advise that salt should be kept at a minimum. This means that cooking methods and that the meat should be served with a variety of low-calorie vegetables and fruits.

Instead of the usual recipe for lamb kabobs, broil sizable squares of lean trimmed meat, unmarinated, and season only with lemon or tomato juice and a very little thyme. Serve with low-calorie vegetables.

MATURE PARENT

"My mother-in-law doesn't like how I handle my children," writes Mrs. O. "She criticizes me in front of them and orders me around. Should I tell her how I resent this? For my youngsters' sake, I want to overcome the fear and tension her presence arouses in me."

Has Mrs. O. discussed this relative's belittling treatment with Mr. O? If so, did he support her right to say, "Please don't interfere in my discipline of the children? If you don't like something I do, wait to tell me about it until we are alone."

I think he didn't — or she'd have made this demand for respect for her maternal authority. And having proved her power to resist her mother-in-law's domination, she'd have lost much of her fear of being overwhelmed by it.

So perhaps Mrs. O.'s problem isn't her mother-in-law's domination at all — but her husband's fear of challenging it. Perhaps she maintains resentful silence under it because she dares not risk offending her husband.

If this is the truth, it's better to know it than to go on imagining that her mother-in-law is the problem.

"My mother-in-law has performed many helpful acts of kindness to us," Mrs. O. goes on. "What's wrong with me that I cannot feel calm and grateful around her? I literally begin to squirm the moment she enters the house."

It is usually by "acts of kindness" that tyrants maintain their power over us. Their purpose is to punish us with a guilty conscience for wanting freedom and self-direction. We feel their false kindness. Our own intuition tells us that they are not interested in kindness at all but in their own power.

So when we squirm in the presence of a tyrant, it's the right, not the wrong thing to do. We want to get away from them. Our squirms are our preparations for flight from their disintegrating wishes.

I expect that Mr. O. has been doing a lot of unconscious squirming himself under his mother's domination. He may need more help than his wife can give to discover this truth about himself. So I suggest that she seek her clergyman or her local Family Service Association for assistance with his fear of his mother.

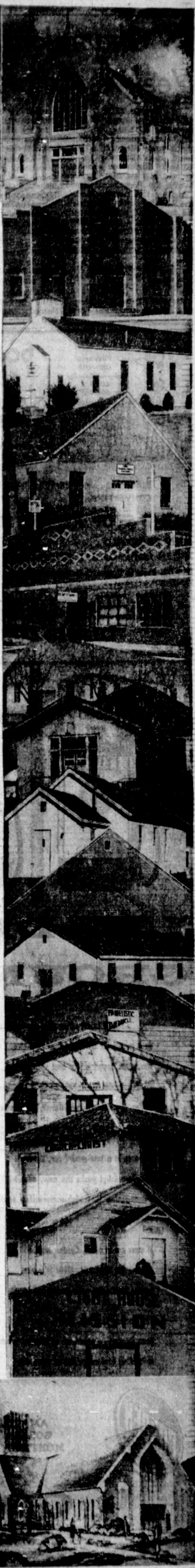

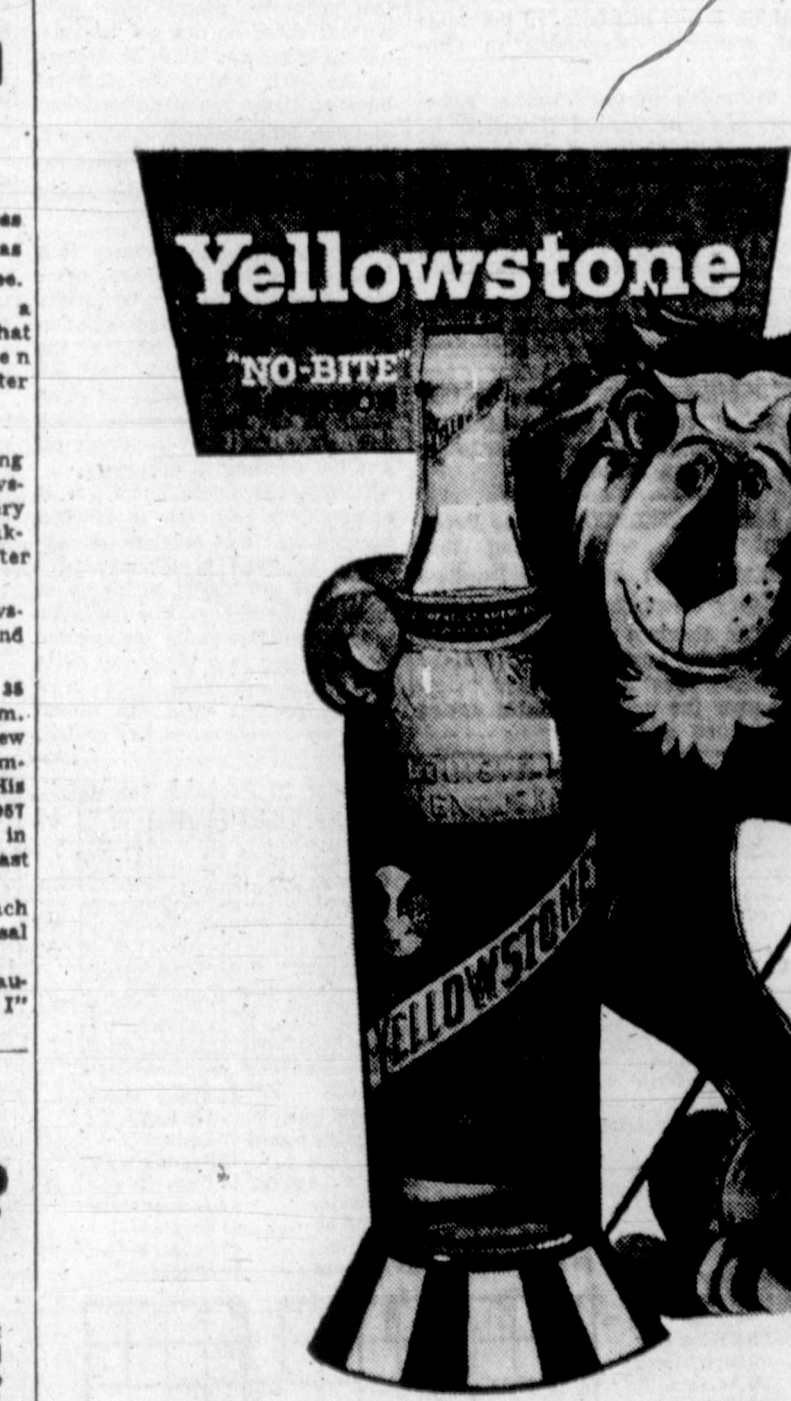

Co-Star Of 'Wagon Train' Tripped Along Oregon Trail

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Bob Horton, co-star with Ward Bond on TV's "Wagon Train," made a bid for authenticity—this summer by following the Oregon Trail in a new sports car.
The actor covered the ground leisurely. In five days. But the old covered wagon trains managed the 1,600 miles from St. Joseph, Mo., to the promised land in five months.
Young Horton admits he was disappointed in not finding any traces of the historic trails.

"Nearest thing to historical landmarks are the cities along the route," he said. "Almost every town I passed through was celebrating its centennial. And a lot of the places were settled by pioneers who dropped out of the wagon trains to tame the land."

Horton is a handsome newcomer and first-of-the-torn T-shirt school of actors from New York's Actors Studio to climb into the saddle on a fulltime basis. Though he plays an uncomplicated western scout in the series, Bob delves deeply into the wonders of psychiatry and its effects on sensitive-type actors.

He even frets about the people who originally came west. "I can't understand what their motivation was," he frowned. "I studied the countryside carefully."

and it's hard to believe anyone could survive a trip like that.
"The desert region around the Great Salt Lake was worst of all. I never saw anything so bleak."

"On a good day, three hundred wagons could make 15 miles from dawn 'til nightfall," he went on. "Our NBC series is paced along the same line. The whole 39-week series is based on a single wagon train, telling about individuals making the trek."
"I found what I was looking for on my trip," he concluded. "I got the feel of the land and a sense of the rugged people who settled it. But there's little true evidence that wagon trains ever passed that way."
