## Metropolitan Opera Plans Auditions

The 15th annual Metropolitan Opera National Council auditions finals for the southwest region will be held on Feb. 16 at McAllister Auditorium, San Antonio College.

Preliminary auditions for the West Texas - New Mexico district will be held on Feb. 2 at the University of Texas at El Paso. For all other areas within the region, preliminary auditions will be held in San Antonio on Feb. 14 and 15.

The auditions are locally sponsored by the Junior Leagues of San Antonio and El Paso in cooperation with San Antonio Junior College and the University of Texas at El Paso.

Public auditions for the metropolitan Opera began in 1935 with the Metropolitan Opera auditions of the air. Before that time, singers had

little opportunity to be heard in this country. The American singer went to Europe for training.

The auditions of the air gave these singers a chance to audition in the United States. Leonard Warren and Richard Tucker were discovered as a result of these auditions.

The regional auditions' program was created by the newly formed Metropolitan Opera National Council in 1953 to provide opportunities throughout the country for operatic talent to be heard. The National Council pays for the regional winners' trips to New York to audition in the semi-finals and provides many cash prizes which are used for further study and training.

The southwest regional winner in 1969, Miss Gilda Cruz-Romo, went on to win first place

in the national finals. Her resulting highly successful career testifies to the value of the National Council's program.

In the southwest region, Mrs. Edgar Tobin of San Antonio is the regional chairman of the Metropolitan Opera National Council. National Council member in Pampa is Mrs. Raymond Harrah.

**Catfish Capital**  
BROOKFIELD, Mo. (UPI) — This Linn County community claims to be the "Channel Catfish Capital" of the state because of a unique fishing project.

More than 4,000 yearling channel cats were put in the Brookfield Reservoir, after a community project to grow them in wire-mesh cages for the first year was finished.

## DST Affects Bicycle Habits

The switch to daylight savings time in January, occasioned by the energy crisis, has changed the living patterns for millions of Americans. None are more affected than school children and the nation's commuters who are now riding their bicycles in darkness or early morning dusk.

Concerned with the continuing safety of the nation's bike riders, the Bicycle Manufacturers Association of America notes that previous surveys point to a small percentage of accidents taking place at night because so few Americans ride at night. But now increasing numbers of children will be riding their bikes to school by moonlight.

Nearly two years ago, the Bicycle Manufacturers

Association of America developed a new voluntary safety standard for bicycles called BMA-6. All regular bicycles produced by members of the Association, which make more than 85 percent of the domestic total, conform to this standard, which is considered to be the finest standard in the world.

Although BMA-6 involves virtually every facet of bike making, one of its primary concerns is reflectivity. Since July 1, 1973, every BMA-6 has been sold to the nation's consumers with a 10-reflector system, including a front white reflector, a rear red reflector, four sides reflectors — two red to the rear and two amber to the front, and four pedal reflectors. All of these reflectors meet the

most rigid specifications for reflex reflectors of the Society of Automotive Engineers.

Of course most state laws call for the use of lights on bikes when used in nighttime situations. BMA-6 also provides for specifications for front white lights and rear facing red lights, which are recommended for all bikes used in hours of darkness.

Parents whose children's bikes are not equipped with the new BMA-6 reflective system, are urged to make sure their youngsters are given this additional reflective protection. Most bicycle retailers are offering inexpensive reflector kits which will bring old bikes up to current reflective standards.

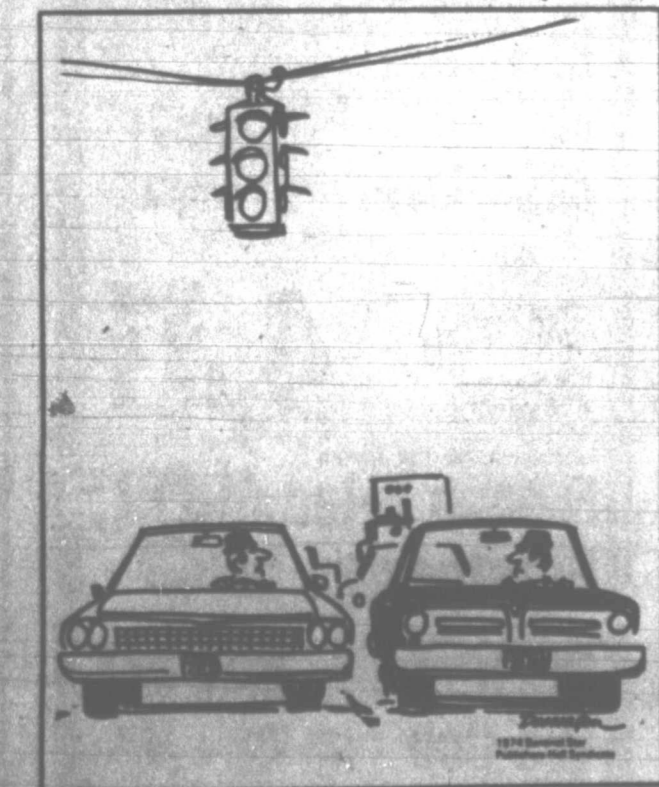

The classics win out in the end. I do not worry about them. But "TV Guide" had its priorities wrong because its argument was skewed. It would try to save "art," even if the trash must perish. But the trash of any period shows its taste most vividly, and least defensible. I don't know whether "Birth of a Nation" could still recruit a Klansman; but our dreary little war movies about the slant-eyed "dirty little Japs" provoke nothing but disgust for the white-skinned producers and consumers of such racist nonsense. And that is why there should be no attempt to suppress those films.

The results are worse than the first offense of historical distortion; a nation taught to think of itself as perfect cannot reform since it thinks there is nothing that needs reform. Critics are crackpots to be expelled ("America, love it or leave it"). Accounts of America's failures are false, malicious in intent, and not to be permitted. The reaction to reports and commissions that criticize America in any respect is usually anger at the compilers of the facts rather than indignation or remorse over the facts themselves.

# TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH How Serious Is Palpable Liver?

By G.C. THOSTESON, M.D.  
Dear Dr. Thosteson: What is "palpable liver" and how serious is it? What treatment would be recommended?

—J.L.M.  
A palpable liver is not, as you seem to fear, a disease. All the term means is that doctor can feel it. You have to know more than that before you can estimate whether it is a serious condition, or a harmless one or in between.

Generally speaking, a doctor cannot feel a person's liver. When he can feel it, it usually means the liver is enlarged — but not necessarily so. Some normal livers are palpable if they happen to be located lower than usual. A liver is more likely to be palpable in a lean person.

But if the enlargement is due to disease, a variety of possibilities may be involved: infection, cirrhosis, a tumor, heart disease.

So when your doctor found that your liver was palpable, that meant the next step would be other tests to learn whether something is wrong with it, and

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I suffered a severe heart attack some time ago. I have been placed on a salt-free diet among other things. I live in a well-managed apartment but the water which comes from deep wells for this city is run through a large water-softener. At times it even tastes salty.

Is the drinking water defeating the precautions taken by following a salt-free diet? Should I purchase pure bottled water?

—C.C.C.  
Water-softening often involves the substituting of sodium (salt) for the calcium and magnesium in the hard

water. Yes, using this water could defeat the purpose of your salt-free diet.

Whether you should use the bottled water is for you and your doctor to decide. The decision would be based on several factors — just how much sodium is used, how much water you drink and how stringent the diet you are on.

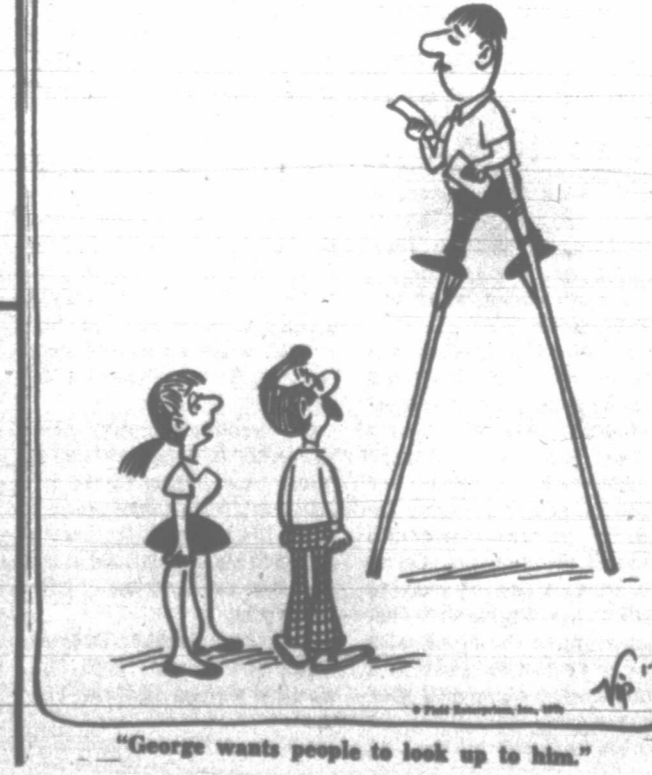
