Two Nations Issue Ultimatums To US

Leaders of two important African-Asian nations have issued ultimatums to the United States in an attempt to influence its policy.

President Habib Bourguiba of Tunisia has given the United States until Thursday to decide whether it will support his country or France in their dispute over the bombing of a Tunisian border village.

Premier Malik Firod Khan Noon of Pakistan has said that unless the United States supports his country in its dispute with India over the state of Kashmir, he may have to revise Pakistan's policy toward the West.

Both Bourguiba and Noon are supposed to be firmly on the Western side in the cold war with Soviet Russia.

Bourguiba is generally regarded as the best friend the West has in North Africa.

Make Policy Threats

Pakistan is a member of both the Middle Eastern and Southeast

Asian Treaty Organizations formed to defend free countries against Communist subversion and possible aggression. Lying as it does at the southwest corner of Asia, it is the connecting link between the pacts.

Bourguiba, in a radio speech, emphasized his friendliness toward the West. But unless the United States "supports and defends the right"—that is, supports him against France—he might have to decide he had been wrong in pursuing a pro-Western policy, he said.

Noon said in a speech to his parliament that by giving big amounts of economic aid to India, the U.S. was permitting that country to build up formidable armed forces which could only be used against Pakistan.

If Pakistan felt its independence in danger, Noon said, "we will break all pacts in the world and shake hands with those whom we have made our enemies for the sake of others"—that is, presumably, the Communists.

Noon warned that unless Dr. Frank P. Graham, the American

mediator for the United Nations in the Pakistan-India dispute, does something by the end of April to advance a settlement, he will consider revising his country's foreign policy.

A Familiar Pattern

It is highly unlikely that either Bourguiba or Noon will carry out their dire threats. There are indications that Tunisia and France may soon patch up their dispute with the aid of American mediator Robert Murphy. Noon certainly must know that the United States is not going to come out openly on its side against India.

Also both men know that friendship with the United States is valuable to them. In Noon's case, also, Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru is on the inside track in relations with Russia.

But the pressure which Bourguiba and Noon are trying to exert is all too familiar among leaders of the African and Asian countries which have won their independence from the "colonial" powers.

Indonesia has long complained that the United States favors the Netherlands against Indonesia's demand that it give up West New Guinea. It intimates that the West would do better in seeking Indonesian favor, if it changed its policy radically.

Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser has used the same

Texans Urged To Support Traffic Safety

AUSTIN (UP) — Texans were urged Saturday to embark on a campaign of "deathless days" on the highways, a rarity during the past 12 years.

Director Brad Smith of the governor's Highway Safety Commission said Texas drivers could bring about a tremendous reduction in the highway death toll if they were determined to drive day-by-day in such a manner that they kill neither themselves nor anyone else.

Smith said a study of Department of Public Safety records showed only 54 days in the past 12 years—a total of 4,383 days from Jan. 1, 1946 through Dec. 31, 1957—had been free of highway deaths in Texas.

start a new campaign of "deathless days," the list of "deathless days" could be lengthened," Smith said.

Smith said DPS records showed the year with the most "deathless days" was 1949, when eight were recorded. But deaths were listed every day in five months that year—June, July, October, November and December.

He said one of the deadliest periods in Texas driving history began on Sept. 21, 1949 and ended on Jan. 17, 1951, marking the longest continuous run of death in the highways in the state's history. The string of traffic deaths lasted 453 consecutive days.

Records showed the week of Dec. 17-23, 1950 was the deadliest in Texas history, with 90 persons killed in highway crashes during the week.

Smith said there were seven "deathless days" in 1946, four in 1947, seven in 1948, eight in 1949,

one in 1950, four in 1951, seven in 1952, three in 1953, two in 1954, three in 1955, five in 1956, and five in 1957.

He reported traffic deaths have declined thus far this year, with 339 during the first 11 weeks of 1958 against 403 for the same period in 1957, a decrease of 16 per cent.

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Man Falls To Death

LITTLETON, Colo. (UP) — A young man fell to his death Saturday while trying to rescue a fellow worker who had become entangled inside a secret project at the Martin Company where the Titan intercontinental ballistic missile is being developed.

The other man was injured critically.

Don Herron, Martin Company spokesman, said Frank McClain, 24, Denver, was injured fatally when he fell to the bottom of a huge tank used in connection with the missile project. He was trying to help James Saige, 37, Denver, whose foot had become entangled in a rope inside the tank, details of which are so secret Herron could not disclose how far McClain fell.

McClain died of a skull fracture while enroute by ambulance to Swedish Hospital in nearby Engle-

wood, Colo., where Saige was hospitalized, suffering from anoxia (lack of oxygen).

Both men were employed in the plant's general purpose laboratory as structural test mechanics.

Other employees removed the two men from the tank by cutting a large hole in its bottom with acetylene torches.

McClain is survived by a wife and 6-month-old child.

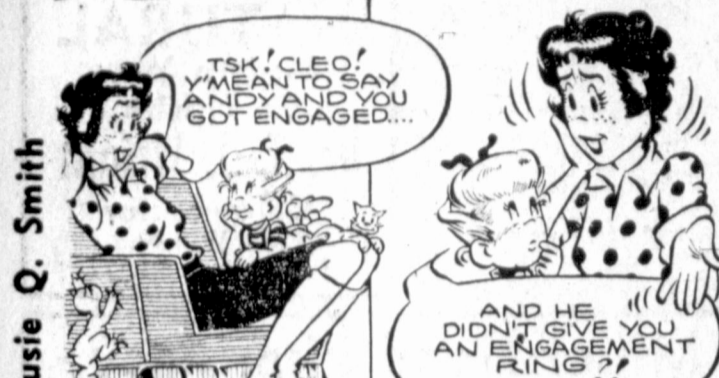

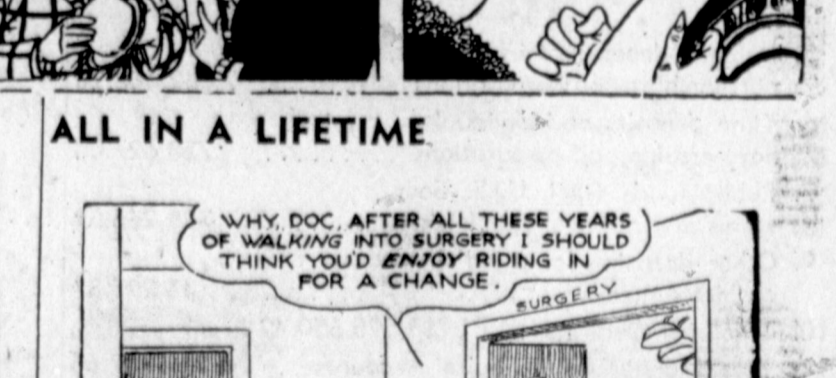

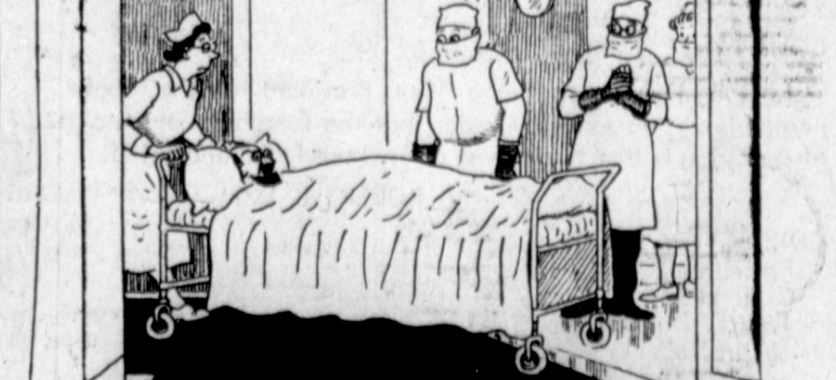

TAMPA, Fla. (UP)—The world champion Milwaukee Braves, who beat Cincinnati in 18 of 22 games last season, took advantage of loose play to score a 5-3 victory Saturday over the Redlegs.

The Redlegs helped the champions to the two runs that broke a 2-3 tie with two out in the seventh. Outfielder Pete Whelan lost Felix Mantilla's fly ball in the sun. It went for a double that sent in one run. Wes Covington followed with his third successive single to drive in another.

New Wax Bullet To Splash 'Gore' In The Movies And TV

United Press Staff Correspondent HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Gunsplay in movies and TV, be it horse opera or detective story, will be a great deal bloodier in the near future thanks to a new wax bullet that spatters "gore" like a cloudburst.

Invented by an ex-butcher, the bullets are filled with red dye, weighted and balanced to produce various types of wounds on human targets.

Bit player Dan Metzger, who left his chopping block a year ago to ham it up on screen, boasts, "My wife has shot me more than a hundred times with these bullets and hasn't hurt me once."

Wife Tested

"I've shot her a few times, too, for testing purposes, and she hasn't complained either," he said.

Metzger's paraffin slugs also ricochet off the ground in puffs of dust and give the effect of shattering glass and mirrors. He vows they can do everything a genuine bullet can do except disable or destroy a target.

Fired by compressed air and a small cap, the bullets fit any calibre gun.

"They make a loud report and give off enough smoke to look real," Metzger confided.

Metzger horrified patrons of the restaurant where he was having lunch by producing a series of targets.

"I make the slugs at home myself," he grinned. "I've already had a big order from one major studio, and the TV people are interested."

What A Difference A Year Makes!

United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON (UP)—What a difference a year makes!

In the pre-Sputnik, pre-recession days of March, 1957, prosperity had come around the proverbial corner and had been with us so long it seemed in little danger of slipping away.

Inflation (more money than goods to spend it on) was still a problem, and the Federal Reserve Board was holding a tight rein on credit.

With the economy booming, Congress was clamoring for sharp reductions in government spending to make way for a long-deferred tax cut.

Cut The Budget

Chairman Clarence Cannon (D-Mo.) of the House Appropriations Committee talked in terms of cutting the President's proposed \$71,800,000,000 budget by \$4,500,000,000. Even the President's own congressional leaders joined the economy cry.

Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland said the budget could be cut by "upwards of two billion dollars."

The pressure became so great the President responded. On March 7 of last year he told his news conference he had directed cabinet members to check whether some government projects "can't be slowed up in order to reduce our spending and take that much pressure off" the "rising curve" in living costs.

Later, in response to a House resolution demanding that he spell out how his budget might be cut, the President suggested amending other things.

—That 200 million dollars be trimmed from funds for military public works by "delaying less urgent projects."

—That 13 million dollars be cut from proposed funds for rivers and harbors work.

Stand Still In Housing

In response to his general economy order, the Pentagon ordered on March 14, 1957, what it termed a "virtual standstill" to its military housing program and a stretchout in military buying generally.

A week later, the Housing and Home Finance Agency asked Congress to trim 200 million dollars from its proposed \$1,200,000,000 appropriation. Other government departments followed suit.

Well, that was a year ago.

Now more than five million Americans are without jobs, two million more than at the end of February of last year, and recession has gripped the nation. The picture is completely reversed.

Last Monday, an administration spokesman told Congress that because of new programs and spending it could expect a Treasury deficit of possibly 700 to 900 million dollars.

What a difference a year makes!
