Warned Not To Use Propaganda

WASHINGTON (UPI) - House influence investigators excused Bernard Goldfine, millionaire friend of Sherman Adams, from testifying today after his lawers pleaded he was suffering "physical and mental exhaustions

At the same time they warned Goldfine's attorneys that the one-day delay in his testimony was not to be used by the Boston textile tycoon for "propagandizing the

Roger Robb and two other Goldfine lawers appeared at the brief hearing, leaving Goldfine behind at his hotel.

Robb said that the fuss over the microphone found next to Goldfine's hotel quarters and the alleged burglary of his secretary's room "left Mr. Goldfine in a state of physical and mental exhaustion.

> He said he had "every expection" Goldfine could show up Wednesday but would not promise "categorically." Subcommittee Chairman Oren Harris (D-Ark.) granted the request after delivering a stern lecture to Robb on what he pictured as publicity excesses and a lack of cooperation on the part of his client.

"I can see that unless there is a change of attitude there is going to be a clash," Harris said. "The committee will be prepared to meet it."

Ike Signs Bill For 49th State S

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Only a referendum stood between Alaska and statehood today following signing by President Eisenhower of a bill to admit the territory as the 49th state.

The president late Monday signed the historic Alaska bill in a simple White House ceremony He later issued a statement hailing the Alaska legislation but adding he was "extremely disturbed over reports that no action is contemplated by the current Congress" on legislation to admit Hawaii as the 50th state.

The people of Alaska must hold a special election this fall to ratify the conditions under which their territory will become one of the states.



stood that Goldfine, despite his plea of exhaustion, had been able to talk to the press earlier today. He noted also that before delivering his opening statement to the subcommittee Goldfine had recorded it for nationwide broadcast.

Harris said, however, the subcommittee wanted to be completely fair and that under the circumstances he saw no other course but to grant the 24-hour delay as requested.

The House subcommittee on legislative oversight then adjourned until Wednesday.

The subcommittee is investigatng Goldfine's relations with Adams, assistant to the President, and his various troubles with government regulatory agencies.

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Ike, Adams And Korea

If the Republicans were not already in enough difficulties, the recent expose concerning Sherman Adams, his hotel bills, his relationship with Boston industrialist Goldfine, not to mention a fine vicuna ovarcoat, may have supplied the missing ingredients. The GOP has hit a snag, and a big one. It is entirely within the realm of possibility that the "old guard" is about to face its final changing.

In previous times, whenever some event of potential slander seemed brewing in the wings, it was enough to say that President Eisenhower was personally popular, and the various dissident factions and the separate fractious individuals were neatly corralled into mute and servile docility.

In the latest event, no such corralling appears possible. Democrats and Republicans alike are somewhat amazed at Ike's insistence that he "needs" Mr. Adams. Apparently Mr. Adams, in the President's mind, is the single indispensable ingredient of his regime. And we wonder just what that means

Mr. Eisenhower has taken numerous opportunities in the past to turn his back on Republican stalwarts who happened to cross his will. It is believed, by many, that not only did the leader of the Republican party turn his back, but that he actively assisted in ousting certain figures who were opposed to him-and this, despite a weakening in the ranks of the Republicans, thereby achieved.

So, irr standing firmly behind Adams, Mr. Eisenhower has departed from his custom. The departure from custom has fiery portents.

There are those whoninsist that Mr. Eisenhower has always been an enemy of the Republican Party despite the fact that he enjoys the position in it of nominal leadership. If this enmity is real, Mr. Eisenhower's defense of Adams is fully in character. Nothing futher should be needed to disabuse the public mind as to the frailty and lack of principle in the GOP

This is particulary important since Mr. Eisenhower rose to power while himself accusing Democrats of accepting mink coats, refrigerators and other favors from devoted party followers. The shoe is firmly on the other foot, and Ike, even more than Adams, has put it there.

I want to reproduce an article in the June 14 issue of "National Review" written by Mildred Adams McLearn under the above heading.

Mrs. McLearn uses the word "taxation" rather loosely because there can be no such thing as 'voluntary taxation." In the text of her article she talks about voluntary support, and, of course, that is what she means by taxation.

It does not seem to me that her theory is a new concept because the Declaration of Independence says that governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed. This concept was never put into practice as the Constitution permitted the Federal Government to have certain excise taxes and tariff taxes. Here is the way Mrs. McLearn

presents her case "So far, all of us have been attempting to combat Communism -and all forms of collectivism-by employing middle - of - the road ideas and policies. This strategy is producing defeat in the cold war, and loss of our domestic liberty. A winning strategy would require us to oppose the socialist principle of solving every problem with government force over the individual. We must face the elementary logic of the situation; either our way of life is effective enough to serve us now, or it is inadequate and we should give up the pretense that we are fighting for

"But no one has risen up to champion, wholly and unreservedly, the principle of individual liberty. Even the individualists, who stand for voluntary action, have left a great Trojan Horse in their system for the use of the collectivist worshippers of coercion. This is compulsory taxation. "The Founding Fathers tried to

solve man's eternal problem of liberty and government by conducting one of the noblest experiments in human history: But there was a fatal flaw in the Constitution



WASHINGTON --- The man who tried and executed former Hungarian Premier Imre Nagy and General Pal Maleter is Mikhail Suslov, Second Secretary of the Russian Communist Party.

That has been definitely established by U.S. and British Intelligence authorities.

Suslov, a dour, fanatical Stalinite, who has been a close henchman of Premier Khrushchev throughout his tortuous rise to power, 'was sent by him to Hungary early in June for the express_purpose of trying and slaying the two betrayed leaders of the tragic 1956 revolt.

During this period, foreign correspondents in Moscow reported the "mysterious" absence of Suslov. Some accounts went so far as to express the belief that he had fallen into disfavor and was being purged.

WASHINGTON - A young Army procurement officer is sadly wondering whether it pays to be honest!

He was removed from a choice East Coast assignment and sent overseas when he turned over to superiors a \$1,000 greenback that an Army contractor handed him in a sealed envelope at a dinner party.

This embarrassing bill is now in the hands of Assistant Army Secretary Frank Higgins, in charge of logistics, who is still undecided what to do with it.

Meanwhile, the contractor and his firm have been blacklisted by the Army.

Details of this curious affair, as so far uncovered by congressional investigators, are as follows:

The young procurement officer and his wife accepted a dinner invitation from this contractor. During the evening, the businessman handed the officer a sealed envelope and asked him to open it when he got home,

Later, when he did that, he was astounded to find a \$1,000 greenback and nothing else.

Early next morning, the young officer reported the matter to his superior

The superior immediately dispatched the \$1,000 bill, envelope and a full account of the affair to the Pentagon, which ordered an investigation. It produced two findings:

(1) The officer had never given the contractor any favors; (2) the latter had never asked for any. Afer much cogitating, Army authorities finally decided to take no legal action against the businessman. But he and his company have been barred from bid-

ding on orders. And apparently to be "impartial," the 'Army rewarded the young officer for his honesty by relieving him of his job and sending him abroad.

Disposition of the \$1,000 bill is still being pondered by Assistant Secretary Higgins.

Watch for a vice presidential boom next year for Senator Everett Dirksen, Ill., when he succeeds Senator William Knowland, Calif., as GOP Leader of the upper chamber. Intimates of Dirksen already are talking about him for second place on the 1960 ticket . . . Senator Karl Mundt (R., S.D.) has a Democratic presidential choice. It's Senator Estes Kefauver. Mundt told a convention of Kansas Young Republicans, "The only average American' the Democrats have to offer in their whole stable is my good friend, Estes Kefauver. They push him around and kick him around, and build him up till he gets close, and then tear him down at their conventions, because he doesn't have \$100,000,000."

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DEMO POLITICALS-The Democrats, as well as the Republicans, are having a hard time getting campaign contributions. Recently this column disclosed that Representative Richard Simpson, Pa., chairman of the House Republican Campaign Committee, had to borrow \$200,000 to meet election commitments. Now Representative Michael Kirwan, O., head of the House Democratic Campaign Committee, is telling party leaders his coffers are virtually empty." He reported, "Contributions are running far behind 1956. We're having a harder time raising funds than we had in many years." . . . The degree of hostility against Eisenhower arising over this issue is illustrated by a little heralded event which originated in Glenwood Springs, Colorado. In this mountain community, Captain Eugene R. Guild has headed up an organization known as "Fighting Homefolks of Fighting Men." It has been Guild's chief objective to cause a return or at least an accounting for of the American soldiers and airmen abandoned in Korea by both the United Nations and the United States. For all the years since the end of the Korean fighting, Captain Guild has labored in vain.

Now the Adams affair has set him off again, and it is possible that this time he may have struck a vital nerve.

Five parents of missing boys in Korea, who are all members of Guild's organization, have announced that they are mailing to President Eisenhower the coats of their sons, still missing and believed alive in Red Chinese prisons. A letter from Rita Van Wees, one of the mothers, which accompanies her son's coat, makes interesting reading;

Dear Mr. President:

"Your Mr. Hagerty says it's all right if people give you presents. Well, it seems logical insurance if someone gets in trouble later."

"Well, my son, Corporal Ronnie Van Wees got into trouble fighting the Communists in Korea. He is still missing in action, mabye still held alive by the Communists like the other 450.

"Now I haven't any vicuna coats or vicuna material to send you, so I am sending with this letter Ronnie's coat. It is of good material, and he did not wear it much."

"I hope that if a lot of mothers send you their missing boys' coats they will remind you that you forgot to do something about Mr. Zablocki's resolution last year, urging you to take action to liberate or get an accounting of our missing sons.

"Maybe you could help Ronnie and his buddies by picking up a telephone like Sherman Adams did."

Men have cooperated voluntarily to build our civilization: voluntary methods have financed great productive aggregations of capital, great universities, Rotary Clubs, works of charity, and our whole nationwide free market. All of these obtain their revenue by voluntary purchase or gift. Why not government

Linked To The Vote

"How might voluntary taxation work? Let's start with the franchise. The religious base of selfgovernment is the faith that each man is worthy of the dignity of personal responsibility. Efforts to implement this belief have led to the free universal franchise, which ignores the fact that there can be no such thing as something for nothing in any field, whether in economics or voting. It is precisely this false assumption that underlies the free vote, which demagogues can easily exploit for their own purposes. 'We declare by law that a man (or woman) has the right to vote, but we don't attach any responsibility for its exercise. We must learn that for every human right there is a corresponding duty or responsibility. And unless authority (the power of the vote) and responsibility (the obligation to pay the cost of the decisions) are commensurate, freedom dies, For that which is not responsible is not free. And that which is not responsible is not moral. Morality

presupposes the absence of power of one person over another. Every man must pay the price of his own decision. "Under voluntary taxation" the franchise would be based on the uncoerced willingness of the individual voter to pay his share of what is voted. This could take the form of a voluntary percentage

income tax. A man's decision to

vote (and to pay his share of

the cost of government) would be made at registration time. Registration day would be the due date for the previous year's income tax returns to be mailed, and registering would merely consist in filing a tax return, which would indicate the voter's decision to exercise his franchise. "If registration day were set sufficiently in advance of election day, the revenue department could total all the incomes of the pros-

pective voters and publish this figure along with the number of voters registered. This would permit the political parties to calculate what percentage of total income would be necessary to fitheir various proposed pro grams. This percentage would ap

Confronted with this inner party resistance in the satellites, Krush chev resorted to naked force. Soviet troops in Poland were reinforced, and took up threatening positions. Similar movements occurred in Czhechoslovakia. And Suslov suddenly arrived in Budapest and "took charge."

The murder of Nagy and Maleter followed soon thereafter. This was Suslov's second killer role in Hungary. In 1956 he played a leading part in crushing the revolt. When the Kremlin decided to smash the uprising Suslov was

Each party, when planning its program, would list its objectives in the order of their importance, with accompanying estimates of-the cost of each item (summarized briefly and simply enough for all to understand.) The cost estimates of each party's program would be presented to the voter in terms of a percentage of his income, thereby giving the individual voter an exact picture of what to expect from each party's program and what these programs would cost him in taxes. For example: The Democratic Party might announce that its pro gram, calling for X, Y and Z. would cost the voters 22 per cent of their income: The Republican Party, running on A. B. C. would need 15 per cent. The voters would choose, weighing program and cost. Payment of the tax after election would be voluntary, but failure to pay would forfeit a person's voting privilege until his tax account was squared."

Exactly what transpired at this mystery-shrouded Presidium meeting is still not fully known.
