To continue with what we are hopeful are helpful hints in assisting you with your important job as publicity chairman for your club, today we'd like to advise, "Be a Copy Cat."

It will surprise you how soon you will begin to develop a new sense, to know instinctively when a happening is news and when it isn't.

One of the best ways to develop this sense is to study your newspapers, notice the kind of stories used, which ones go on the front page, those used in the society and club columns and the sports page.

Try to adopt a simple pattern for writing your stories. Imitation can aid you greatly in developing skill in presenting the facts with a minimum of effort and training. Follow the style and construction of articles that have already appeared in print.

It might be helpful to cut out examples of various types of stories from the paper and follow their pattern when a similar situation arises for which you must prepare a story.

Tell your story honestly. The ABC of writing a news story is to tell, who, why, what, when, where and how. After you have written your story, check it against the five w's and the h's.

An editor wants all the facts and necessary details, including the full names of local persons involved and any identifying titles they have.

You naturally will want every story you give the editor to be as accurate and impartial as though it had been prepared by a news reporter. In fact, when you give a story to your editor, you in effect become a member of the reporting staff. The editor relies on you as a dependable and discriminating news source by publishing the material you prepare. Don't misinform and make mistakes that may appear in print and reflect adversely on the editor, the newspaper, yourself as the reporter, or on your organization. If We Only Hear Ourselves As Others Hear Us

The girl who's a beauty until she opens her mouth destroys, very painfully, the illusion of beauty.

And there are many such women. You encounter them every day. They have taste in choosing clothes, are careful about applying make-up, possess trim figures.

Then comes the voice, shrill and clattering to the nerves of the listener. For some reason, the things that such a voice says are usually not worth hearing. But in any case, what could have been something very lovely is completely gone.

A low and well-modulated voice has often been able to create the illusion of charm in a woman who was not really beautiful. It works both ways.

Reader mail shows that a columnist I did recently on a different method of giving a salon permanent presented an entirely new idea to women. In the column, I said that if you want a soft, naturally curly-looking permanent, you should ask your operator to give the permanent over hair which has not been shampooed. And the cutting should be done after the permanent, not before. This is a method used successfully by one of New York's top hairdressers.

The reason for shampooing after, not before, is that shampooing strips the hair of its natural oils. It's best to leave the oil in since a permanent tends to dry out hair. Your operator will, of course, ask you if you have a great deal of hair spray on your hair. He will also brush your hair to distribute the oils evenly.

Cutting after the permanent does a much better job of eliminating any possible look of frizz in the ends. It gives the hair a really naturally curly look with ends that are easily managed.

Looking cool in the heat of summer when you've got a job to get on with is no cinch, despite the claims that it's really a breeze. About the best way to go at it is to keep everything neat and simple.

Stick to dresses with simple lines, clean white cotton gloves, neat handbags and immaculate shoes. Get rid of all the clutter: the clashing bracelets, the dangling jewelry, the fussy trim.

Substitute neat ear buttons, a single bracelet and perhaps a pin. And wear hose; you can't possibly look neat without it.

Fall Suit Jackets Take High, Low, Mid-Road Lengths

NEW YORK (NEA) — High low and knee-length: these are the jacket lengths for autumn's new suits.

Generally, the "relaxed" look prevails in suit fashions. The easy jacket, resting just on the hip bone, is shown in all collections, but shown usually as the classic. The high version of the suit jacket is usually the little trapeze jacket worn with widely pleated or just plain wide skirt. Some of the skirts shown for the trapeze jacket actually are fairly narrow but are cut with the triangular shape and given added stiffening in lining form.

The walking suit appears in many collections and in its true form is a coat which is nearly knee-length worn with matching slim skirt. The coat itself may be slim and nearly straight, may be the high-waisted Directoire or may be the flared trapeze.

Many of these are done in big bold plaids or in a mixture of plaid and solid.

One of the newest suit looks comes when the high waistline is applied to the easy jacket, usually with a half-belt set just under the bosom.

Sometimes the easy jacket is finished off with a hipline belt. But almost always, the suit offers a tricky neckline. Usually, it's designed to be worn two ways, but if not, it may be cut with collar in front only.

Browns and reds, plums and blues, soft greens, and bronzy greens offer complete color choice. Often, these rich and royal colors are coupled with fur trim in the way of black beaver, ermine, lynx, or fox, raccoon, seal, leopard and sable.
