## Panhandle Escapes Threat Of Heavy Snow; Cold Coming

A low pressure system expected to bring heavy snows to the Texas Panhandle swung to the north today and eased Panhandle residents' fears of being snowed in.

Blizzard warnings were still in effect for the Oklahoma Panhandle and northeast New Mexico, however, and heavy snows were expected in the extreme northwest part of the Texas Panhandle.

All New Mexico highways as far south as Roswell were closed today by drifting snow, and the Weather Bureau at Amarillo warned of hazardous driving in the northwest Texas Panhandle late tonight.

Snow flurries fell as far east as Amarillo early today, but weather forecasters said the danger of another crippling Panhandle storm was about gone.

Temperatures of 15 to 25 degrees were expected in the Panhandle tonight, and most other sections of the state could expect

Isolation to crack down on persons who accept payoffs while doing nothing to punish those who offer it.

Reps. John B. Bennett (R-Mich.) and William L. Springer (R-Ill.) said they would press for legislation to impose criminal penalties against both the giver and receiver of such bribes.

"The music company which pays the bribe is certainly as guilty as the announcer or disc-jockey who accepts it," Bennett said.

Sen. A. S. Mike Monroney (D-Okla.) opposed Rogers' proposal on grounds it was "an indictment of the morality of the broadcasting field." He said the FCC could solve the problem by enforcing the intent of the Federal Communications Act.

Monroney said the industry should be given a further chance to clean house, with the government providing the "spur of exposure" as the House subcommittee has done.

## U.S. Has Confidence In Strength Of Mexican Peso

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The 75 million dollar stabilization agreement between the United States and Mexico will be 20 years old next year and has proved so successful that it probably will be carried on indefinitely.

The agreement was renewed for a two-year period last Monday to help maintain a free exchange system for the Mexican peso.

The extension was signed in a ceremony at the U. S. Treasury Department.

Treasury Undersecretary Julian B. Baird signed for the United States. Mexican Ambassador Antonio Carrillo Flores and Rodrigo Gomez, director general of the Bank of Mexico, signed for their country.

Carrillo Flores and Gomez said in a joint statement that there was complete confidence within Mexico and abroad regarding the strength of the peso.

The confidence is derived from the growing diversification of the Mexican economy and the financial policies carried out by the government of President Adolfo Lopez Mateos, they said.

The Mexican officials said Mexico is ending the current year with a favorable balance of payments position.

Carrillo Flores and Gomez declared the agreement also reflected the excellent relations and the spirit of cooperation which exist between Mexico and the United States.

Egler, Baird signed a one-year extension of a 50 million dollar exchange agreement with Argentina.

In announcing the renewal of the Mexican fund, the Treasury Department said:

"The agreement is designed to assist Mexico by providing up to a maximum amount of 75 million dollars if the occasion for use should arise, for exchange stabilization operations to aid in preserving Mexico's exchange system free from restrictions on payments.

"Any pesos acquired by the Treasury in these operations would subsequently be repurchased by Mexico for dollars.

"By today's action, the agreement is continued for a two-year period until Dec. 31, 1961. It will, as in the past, be operated in close coordination with the activity of the U. S. - Mexican agreement was signed in 1941. Mexico has not had to use the fund for several years.

A Treasury Department spokesman said the mechanics of the plan were simple. He explained that if the Mexican government thought the peso was under any strain it could deposit Mexican currency with the Federal Reserve Bank of the United States. American money would then be

Many farmers, especially along the coast, are taking advantage of the wet fields to soil test. In East Texas, the planting of pine seedlings is reaching a peak.

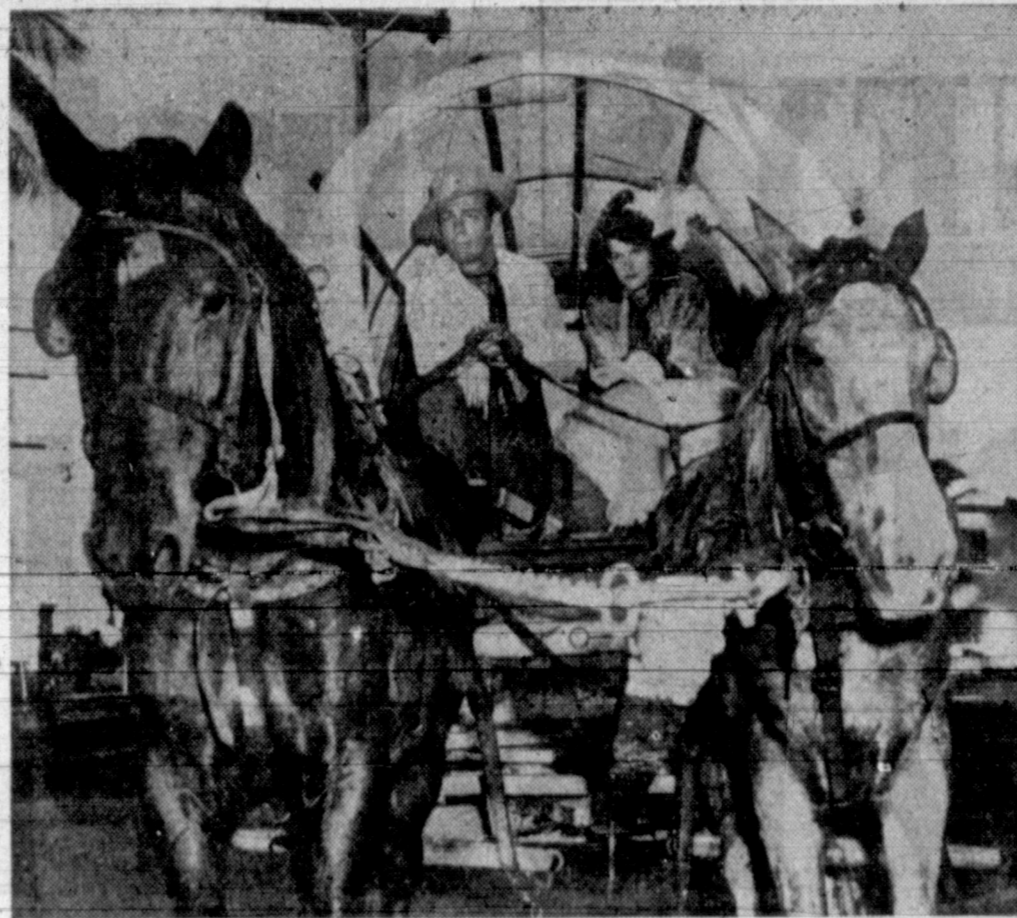

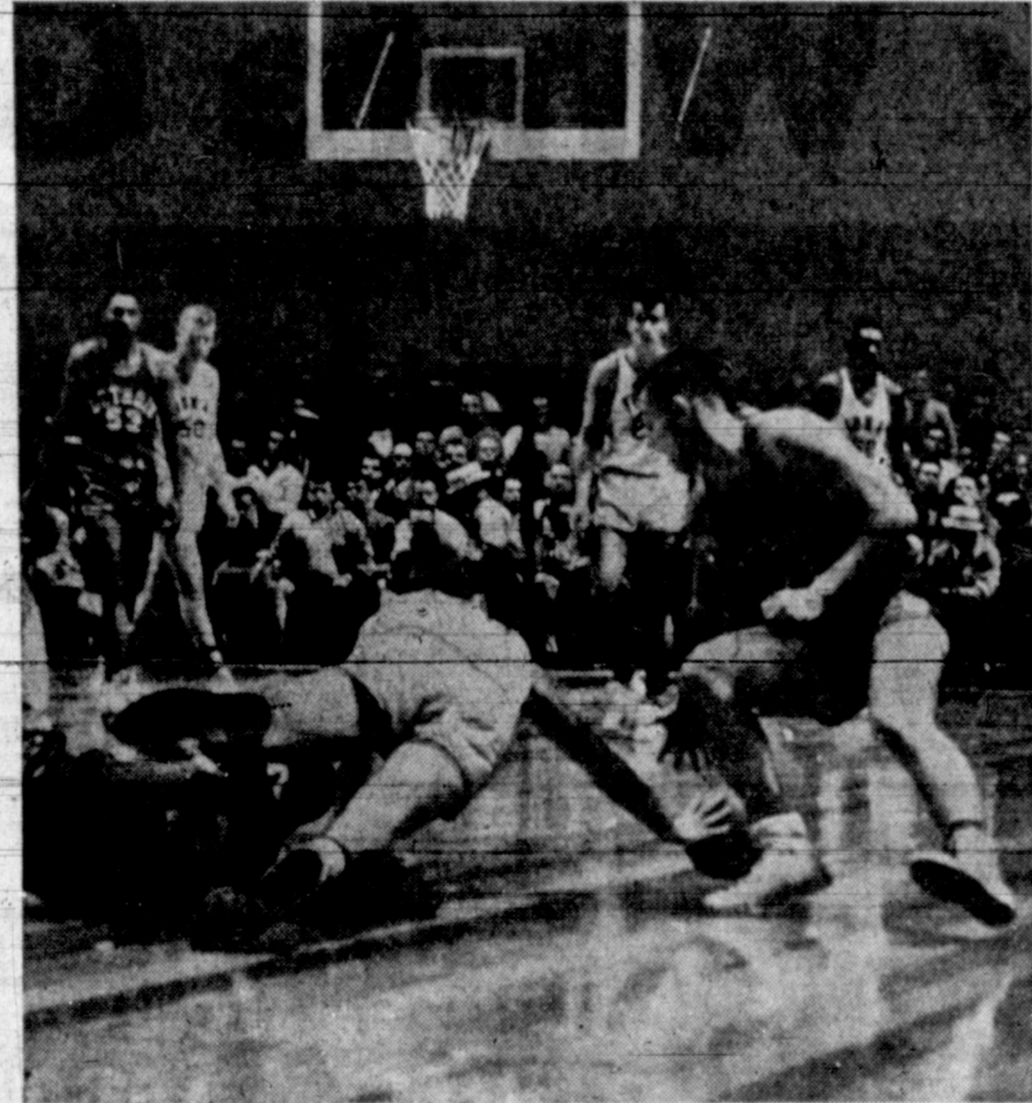

**Cook's Nook**  
**Resolved For 1960: Better Breakfasts For The Family**

 A hearty breakfast sends the man of the house and the children off to a good start. So why not resolve to pay more attention to good food for the first meal of the day? Here are two he-man suggestions:  
**OLD-FASHIONED SPICE PANCAKES**  
 (Makes 4 servings)  
 Two cups sifted all-purpose flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon allspice, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 2 eggs, slightly beaten; 2 cups buttermilk, 1/2 cup melted butter or margarine, dark or light corn syrup.  
 Sift together flour, salt, baking soda, allspice and cloves. Add eggs, buttermilk and butter or margarine. Pour mixture on hot griddle (allowing about 1-3 cup mixture for each pancake), until browned on both sides. Serve with corn syrup.  
**APPLE PANCAKES**  
 (Makes about 4 servings)

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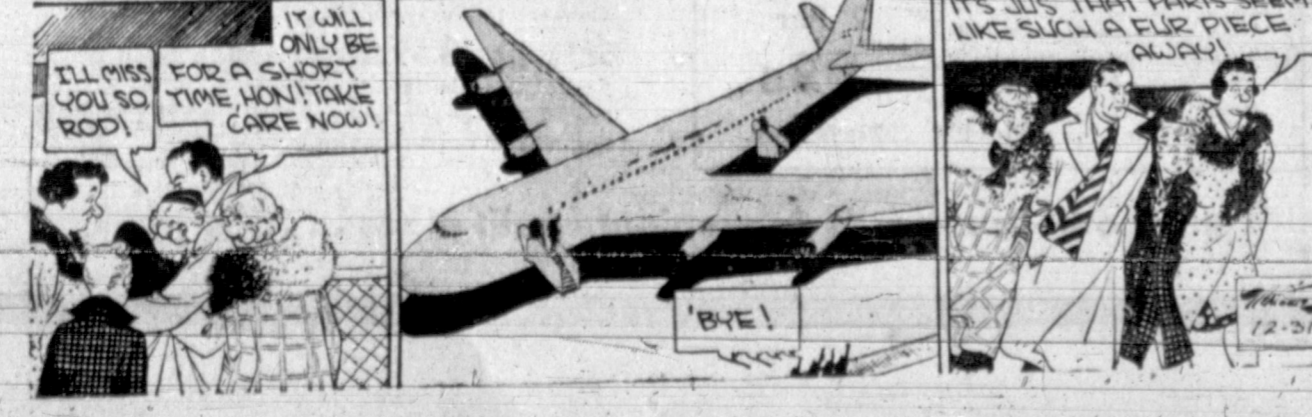

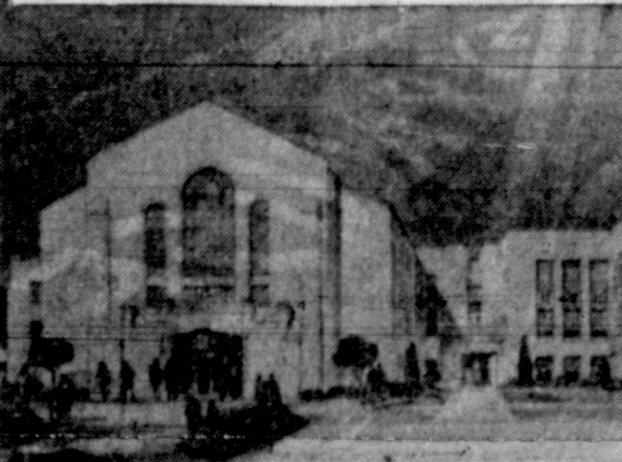

# Your Tax Primer

(Sixth of 12 Chapters)

Working work in 1959 on account of sickness or injury may have a tough blow for you, but it may have made you eligible for a break on your 1959 return.  
If your employer has a plan or agreement with his employees that will continue to pay them during absences on account of sickness or injury, and during 1959 you received pay under such a plan for a period you were absent from work on account of injury, then you can subtract from income so much of this pay as does not exceed a weekly rate of \$100.  
If you were paid while absent on account of sickness, you can subtract so much of this pay as does not exceed \$100 per week as has been sick for one full week.  
But, if your illness is such that you are hospitalized at least one day during the illness, you can deduct up to \$100 per week of pay from the first day of absence.  
The exclusion for sick pay cannot be claimed on Form 1040-A, a must use Form 1040 or 1040W, of which has a line on page 2 for deducting excludable sick pay, and a statement must be attached to the return showing the computation of the amount deducted.  
Some employers furnish statements which can be used by the employee to support the sick pay deduction. Most employers, however, do not supply such statements because to do so requires an employer to set up and keep detailed records. In such cases, it is up to the employee to make the computation of the amount deducted.

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**  
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas  
Individual Citizens New Year's Resolutions yet? With world affairs in their usual troubled state, it might be well to consider a few resolutions about being a good citizen during 1960.  
We have recently observed "Bill of Rights Day", and most of us are generally familiar with the unique rights and privileges which we enjoy as citizens of the U.S. Here is a "Bill of Responsibilities" prepared by the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar of Texas, which might serve as a background for our citizenship resolutions for the coming year:  
I. It shall be the duty of every citizen to render undivided allegiance to the Constitution of the United States, to work for its betterment and perpetuation, to respect the sovereignty of the people, and to defend the nation against all its enemies whomsoever.  
II. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be familiar with the Constitution of the United States and to be informed as to what rights and liberties are his, and to use these rights in such manner as is consistent with his own welfare and the welfare of his fellow citizens.  
III. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend with his life the rights and liberties granted to him and to his fellow citizens by the Constitution, to obey the laws of the land and aid in their enforcement, and to oppose vigorously any persons whose intention is to transgress the law or to oppose the rights of others.  
IV. It shall be the duty of every citizen to make honest, wise and courageous use of the free and secret ballot at every election; to exercise freedom of thought, speech, and worship; to protect the freedom of the press; to safeguard the right of trial by jury and to render willing jury service, when called upon; and to perform all other acts conducive to the perpetuation of the rights set forth in the Constitution.  
V. It shall be the duty of every citizen to protect and sustain the unwritten liberties and rights vested in him by custom and usage and to perpetuate the ideals of

CONGRESS WILL QUESTION LEGALITY OF U.S., RUSSIA NUCLEAR COOPERATION

WASHINGTON — The Joint Congressional Atomic Committee wants to know if there is more to the eye to that newly signed agreement between the U.S. and Russia to exchange nuclear information and scientists.

Senator Clinton Anderson (D., N.M.), chairman, and other committee leaders are frankly concerned about certain aspects of this agreement.

To get at the bottom of it, they are taking the following steps: Attorney General William Rogers is being asked for an official opinion on the legality of this agreement.

Atomic Energy Commission Chairman John McCone, who largely negotiated the exceptional pact, has been notified to prepare for detailed questioning on it at a series of private and public joint committee hearings when Congress reconvenes this month.

A key factor in this significant backstage challenge of the widely hailed U.S.-Soviet accord is the contention that Section 123 of the Atomic Energy Act is being disregarded.

Cuba Headed Down Road To Barbarism

One of the first steps out of barbarism into civilization is recognition of the right to own property. Without guaranty of that right, nations quickly decline into barbarism — or, as it is more popularly known today, totalitarianism.

John Adams warned the generation that was fashioning our Constitution: "The moment the idea is admitted into society that property is not as sacred as the law of God, and that there is not a force of law and public justice to protect it, anarchy and tyranny commence."

The latest illustration we have in Cuba where the Castro government has expropriated sugar lands and public utilities owned by people of this country.

Not long ago we had an interesting talk with a brakeman on passenger train out of St. Louis. His run was 185 miles. He worked a little more than three hours and received one and one-half days' pay.

Such practices are not confined to the railroad. We saw a student recently leading to a conclusion that houses cost at least 25 per cent more than they would if "featherbedding" in the building trades could be eliminated.

Continuing, this great philosopher declared: "A religious education is an education which inculcates duty and reverence. Duty arises from our potential control over the course of events. Where obtainable knowledge could have changed the issue, ignorance has the guilt of vice. And the foundation of reverence is this perception, that the present holds within itself the complete sum of existence, backward and forward, that whole amplitude of time, which is eternity."

Many other current illustrations could be cited—such as the progressive income tax, which forces one group in society to pay a performance for a banker.
