Nixon, Mitchell In **Role Of Mediators**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The great 1959 steel strike vas settled today after union and management negotiators bargained all night with the aid of Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell.

Both sides adopted a settlement recommended by Vice other chil- President Richard M. Nixon and Secretary Mitchell. "The contents of the settlement are being withheld

pending ratification by the appropriate bodies of the parties," Mitchell announced at a jammed news conference.

He said the agreement was reached as a result of behind-thescenes conferences over the past several weeks conducted by Nixon and Mitchell with top officials of the United Steelworkers of Amer-

ica and management, R. Conrad Cooper, chief management negotiator, said the agreement "represents a compromise which goes beyond what the companies had previously offered."

Cooper added the companies felt their "best course of action" was to accept the government recommendations. Steelworkers President David

J. McDonald said he would meet with the union's wage policy committee Tuesday to give them "& message of peace, prosperity and lasting happiness for the steelworkers.' "Their union is sound, safe and secure." McDonald said.





NEW YORK-The face is like a moon untouched by anything but sunlight. The voice that comes from it is modulated, British and warm. The hands move like dragonflies, flashing and darting. 


