Asserting Americanism

Americans have been going from day to day in the current world crisis wondering whether they are on the threshold of another terrible was Tragedy seems to lurk just around the corner.

The use of American troops in the Middle East is being pondered and debated throughout the nation. But there is a widespread feeling that American national self-respect called for a firm stand. If Lebanon was not the moment that all citizens would have chosen, nevertheless an end American temper these days. Perhaps the dangerous events

of the present period may be a turning point in American policy. Americans are sick of the financial burdens of bribery through foreign aid. They are sick of pouring out billions of dollars to dubious allies and tepid friends. They are sick of subsidies to states that side with the Soviets, gifts to greedy socialist nations that don't pretend to hide their contempt for the U.S.A

Americans are a plain, strightforward people. When they do a nation a good turn, they expect to be decently and respectfully treated. They know that the U.S.A. is a besieged fortress, and allies are not allies unless they rally round in time of crisis.

It is a tribute to the American character that at long last a stop has been called to subversion abroad. At least conservatives can hope that a halt has been called.

If the events in the Middle East have proven anything, it is that diplomatic victories cannot be won by dollars. Only the stern resolution of the republic impresses the forces of disorder.

No one, least of all an American conservative, believes that Marines and aircraft carriers should be fixed features of our foreign policy in the years ahead. But the latent power of the republic must be demonstrated to the world if the voice of America is to be heeded. It is our power that results in respect, not our misguided missionary efforts to provide tractors in lands that have never seen steel ploughs.

It is the spirit of firmness that this nation needs to regain in all its dealings abroad. And it is firmness against subversion at home and influences that weaken the fibre of American character and undermine our system that is most needed. A healthy spirit of self-assertion is the beginning of national health. The so-called underdeveloped nations may resent our well-being and our economic success, but that should not be cause for us to talk as though na tional prosperity were an affront

to the world. The average American is snowed under with talk of guilt guilt for bold action abroad and guilt for allegedly not giving away enough of their substance, guilt for having a free enterprise system that has made us rich. The task of conservatives is to be self-assertive, to combat the apostles of guilt who would have us retreat step by step from positions of power and success until we are so weakened and so apologetic that we are easy prey for communism at home or abroad.

The risks of self - assertiveness are real. Ine man or nation who asserts a right runs the risk of being attacked. But risk - taking is the prime ingredient of our free enterprise economic system and our republican form of government. It is the basis of our success. The risk - takers gain opportunities and win leadership.

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Test Your Character

Robert James McCracken, D.D., once came forward with a profound observation worthy of serious thought: "Get to know two things about a man," he said. "How he earns his money and how he spends it. Then you have the clue to his character, for you have a searchlight that shows up the inmost recesses of his soul. You know all you need to know about his standards, his motives, his driving desires, his real

Truer words were never spoken. And as a test of their veracity, ask yourself if you could afford to have someone, anyone, know exactly what you do to earn what you get, and also if you could afford to have that same someone know exactly what you do with what you get after you get it.

On the disposal end of things, most people fall dismally short of even their own most serious and worthy intentions. Many persons long to save money. Few there are, in comparison to all the wage earners, who long to save money sufficiently, in order to forego a great many foolish expenitures. Spending money foolishly, for some strange reason, gives a great many shallow persons a feeling of carefree joy.

With persons who are proverbially out of funds, there appears to be a psychological necessity to waste money. Those who have little seem impelled to demostrate that money has no value to them. If they can throw a little around in a grand demostration that they can afford to be careless, they derive some kind of satisfaction which they always hope will compensate for the fact that they are soon broke.

These persons will always tell you that the reason they never have any thing of value lies in the dismally small sums they recieve for their work. They always assure you that if their income were to be doubled they would have ample savings. But the evidence is that even if their incomes were doubled, the same ultimate situation would ensue.

Many of today's largest fortunes were started by men who earned as little as \$2 or \$3 per week. Yet, even with such paltry beginnings, these same men managed to save a little something out of each week's pay.

One bank president once told us that he could provide an absolutely reliable guide to determine whether a man would be a success or not. If the man could manage to save a little something each week regardless of what he earned, that man was headed for success. If he could not manage and again, the amount of his income had absolutely no bearing on the subject—he would not be a success. The banker was more right than wrong.

But when it comes to the business of earning money, there the most serious revelations as to one's character can be found. It is not much the KIND of job the person gets, as the manner in which he goes about doing his job that tells

Today's employment offices are crowded with persons in search of a pay check, who are actually hopeful of avoiding work. They do not want a job, they want to be rewarded whether they do a job or not. When they are interviewed, most of their interest seems to lie in such subjects as fringe benefits, retirement pay, coffee breaks, gutomatic raises, and a host of other bits and pieces of frosting which are supposed to lure them into performing at least a modicum of chores for the employer, whoever he may be.

Time was when a person went out looking for work, his major concern was related to the type of work he was to do and his own potentials in relation to that work. His questions when he was interviewed always revealed this. The job engrossed him. His rewards were of secondary interest to him, for he concentrated upon making himself worthy and valu-

This does not mean that a pay check held no interest for him. He worked for pay, of course. In fact, his purpose was to make himself completely indispensable so that it would pay the employer to reward handsomely. His idea was to earn all he could, not simply to be rewarded in a handsome manner whether he truly earned anything or not.

Answering Reader's Contention That Unions Raise Total Wages

I want to reproduce a letter written by F. E. Buck of Westminster, Calif. It follows: "Editor, Better Jobs:

"This is in answer to the question which Mr. Hoiles raised when ne quoted my letter in his 'Better Jobs' column, June 8th; 9th

MR. HOILES WRITES:

"I wish Mr. Buck would tell me the place where organized labor has ever succeeded in raising total wages.

MR. BUCK'S ANSWER: 'Any element in our society which tends to positively influence the trend toward an ever-higher standard of living for all can be truthfully said to be increasing total wages. Organized labor, down through the years, has been just such an element, and I here offer one very important aspect of organized labor's dynamic part in raising total wages - the stan-

dard of living. "By collective bargaining, organized labor has been able to crowd the wage scale of its members up toward a point where it becomes a constant threat to the profit so necessary for incentive in any industrial operation. Labor cost, as a threat to profits, has been by far the most potent force in influencing the industrialist to constantly seek better tools tools which will increase the effi-

ciency of creative energy. "In all the countries of the world where labor is cheap, very little effort is made to acquire better

"Mr. Hoiles is right when he says that the use of better tools has raised our standard of living. But he fails to give organized labor credit for its part in making this never-ending search for more efficiency imperative. Will Mr. Hoiles openly admit that this is a crystal clear case where organized labor has 'succeeded in raising towages?'

My Answer Mr. Buck's first contention that organized labor 'tends to positively influence the trend toward an ever-higher standard of living FOR ALL" is not based on fact. Mr. Buck nor anyone else, can explain how labor unions can increase total production and thus total wages when they limit apprentices, practice seniority, pay all workers in the same class the same wages unless the union gives consent for an increase, establish wages by strikes and threats of strikes that cause many employers to lose rather than make a profit and finally go out of business, by jurisdictional disputes, and by non-productive union organizers etc.

Iotal wages can not be than total production. And when striking unions reduce the incentive to take risks, they reduce the number of employers and their size and thus prevent them from bidding against each other to get help and competing with each other to sell their products. That is the way wages and the standard of living are raised, not by reducing production as do all labor unions. Besides incentive without savings can not increase total production

How would Mr. Buck arrive at just how high wages should be forced up by unions so as not to cause the employer to lose morey, but cause him to invest his former profits in better tools?

Mr. Buck uses about the same argument that a fire or cyclone or drought that destroys capital makes society more prosperous. It is just as rational to contend that striking labor unions can raise total wages as to contend that war that destroys billions of dollars worth of wealth and kills millions of people can be beneficial and promote the general welfare. Or it would be just as rational to contend that labor unions that greatly reduce production and thus profits could raise total wages, as that increasing taxes that make it tougher for business will im-

prove our general well-being. Labor unions, of course, misdirect capital, Capital does not go where it is needed the most where wages are low. It only shifts capital from one group of workers to a monopoly group. It is only increased capital and a free and unhampered market that raise wages. And it is much more likely that wealth that is acquired on a free market voluntary basis will be used for better tools than would be wealth that is secured by threats of strikes.

It is a law of economics that any practice that causes waste and increases cost is injurious to everybody, and it is a law of economics that wealth that is produced, benefits everyone. And the owner of profits has to benefit his fellowman in order to benefit himself with his profits. He either enjoys it himself, on which others make a profit or receive a better wage, or he gives it away, or he loans it, or he reinvests it.

Mr. Buck is in error when he says that "in all the countries of the world where labor is cheap, very little effort is made to acquire better tools." Then why did Eli Whitney invent the cotton gin n 1794? Then there was plenty of slave labor that owners believed was cheaper than free labor. There were certainly no labor mions here in 1794. Or why did Cyrus McCormick invent the reaper in 1833? Farm wages were low then and there were no unions to force farmers to invest in the binders. Why all the other inventions? And why did capital in crease in the U.S.A. before we had

"royal", "imperial" and "palace," we rob ourselves of an important right when we persuade ourselves that ordinary, ill - qualified politicians in the White House must be gentled as though they were kings. 

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Test Your Character

Robert James McCracken, D.D., once came forward with a profound observation worthy of serious thought: "Get to know two things about a man," he said. "How he earns his money and how he spends it. Then you have the clue to his character, for you have a searchlight that shows up the inmost recesses of his soul. You know all you need to know about his standards, his motives, his driving desires, his real

Truer words were never spoken. And as a test of their veracity, ask yourself if you could afford to have someone, anyone, know exactly what you do to earn what you get, and also if you could afford to have that same someone know exactly what you do with what you get after you get it.

On the disposal end of things, most people fall dismally short of even their own most serious and worthy intentions. Many persons long to save money. Few there are, in comparison to all the wage earners, who long to save money sufficiently, in order to forego a great many foolish expenitures. Spending money foolishly, for some strange reason, gives a great many shallow persons a feeling of carefree joy.

With persons who are proverbially out of funds, there appears to be a psychological necessity to waste money. Those who have little seem impelled to demostrate that money has no value to them. If they can throw a little around in a grand demostration that they can afford to be careless, they derive some kind of satisfaction which they always hope will compensate for the fact that they are soon broke.

These persons will always tell you that the reason they never have any thing of value lies in the dismally small sums they recieve for their work. They always assure you that if their income were to be doubled they would have ample savings. But the evidence is that even if their incomes were doubled, the same ultimate situation would ensue.

Many of today's largest fortunes were started by men who earned as little as \$2 or \$3 per week. Yet, even with such paltry beginnings, these same men managed to save a little something out of each week's pay.

One bank president once told us that he could provide an absolutely reliable guide to determine whether a man would be a success or not. If the man could manage to save a little something each week regardless of what he earned, that man was headed for success. If he could not manageand again, the amount of his income had absolutely no bearing on the subject—he would not be a success. The banker was more right than wrong.

But when it comes to the business of earning money. there the most serious revelations as to one's character can be found. It is not much the KIND of job the person gets, as the manner in which he goes about doing his job that tells

Today's employment offices are crowded with persons in search of a pay check, who are actually hopeful of avoiding work. They do not want a job, they want to be rewarded whether they do a job or not. When they are interviewed, most of their interest seems to lie in such subjects as fringe benefits, retirement pay, coffee breaks, automatic raises, and a host of other bits and pieces of frosting which are supposed to lure them into performing at least a modicum of chores for the employer, whoever he may be.

Time was when a person went out looking for work, his major concern was related to the type of work he was to do and his own potentials in relation to that work. His questions when he was interviewed always revealed this. The job engrossed him. His rewards were of secondary interest to him, for he concentrated upon making himself worthy and valu-

This does not mean that a pay check held no interest for him. He worked for pay, of course. But he had confidence that if he made himself invaluable to the firm which employed him, that firm could not help but reward him generously. In fact, his purpose was to make himself completely indispensable so that it would pay the employer to reward handsomely. His idea was to earn all he could, not simply to be rewarded in a handsome manner whether he truly earned anything or not.

Answering Reader's Contention That Unions Raise Total Wages

I want to reproduce a letter written by F. E. Buck of Westminster, Calif. It follows: "Editor, Better Jobs: "This is in answer to the ques-

tion which Mr. Hoiles raised when ne quoted my letter in his 'Better Jobs' column, June 8th, 9th and 10th

MR. HOILES WRITES:

"I wish Mr. Buck would tell me the place where organized labor has ever succeeded in raising total wages.

MR. BUCK'S ANSWER: 'Any element in our society which tends to positively influence the trend toward an ever-higher standard of living for all can be truthfully said to be increasing total wages. Organized labor, down through the years, has been just such an element, and I here offer one very important aspect of organized labor's dynamic part in raising total wages - the stan-

dard of living.

"By collective bargaining, organized labor has been able to crowd the wage scale of its members up toward a point where it becomes a constant threat to the profit so necessary for incentive in any industrial operation, Labor cost, as a threat to profits, has been by far the most potent force in influencing the industrialist to constantly seek better tools tools which will increase the efficiency of creative energy.

"In all the countries of the world where labor is cheap, very little effort is made to acquire better

"Mr. Hoiles is right when he says that the use of better tools has raised our standard of living. But he fails to give organized labor credit for its part in making this never-ending search for more efficiency imperative. Will Mr. Hoiles openly admit that this is a crystal clear case where organized labor has 'succeeded in raising toal wages?'

My Answer

Mr. Buck's first contention that organized labor 'tends to positively influence the trend toward an ever-higher standard of living FOR ALL" is not based on fact. Mr. Buck nor anyone else, can explain how labor unions can increase total production and thus total wages when they limit apprentices, practice seniority, pay all workers in the same class the same wages unless the union gives consent for an increase, establish wages by strikes and threats of strikes that cause many employers to lose rather than make a profit and finally go out of business, by jurisdictional disputes, and by non-productive union organizers etc.

than total production. And when striking unions reduce the incentive to take risks, they reduce the number of employers and their size and thus prevent them from bidding against each other to get help and competing with each other to sell their products. That is the way wages and the standard of living are raised, not by reducing production as do all labor unions. Besides incentive without savings can not increase total production.

Total wages can not be

How would Mr. Buck arrive at just how high wages should be forced up by unions so as not to cause the employer to lose money, but cause him to invest his former profits in better tools?

Mr. Buck uses about the same argument that a fire or cyclone or drought that destroys capital makes society more prosperous. It is just as rational to contend that striking labor unions can raise total wages as to contend that war that destroys billions of dollars worth of wealth and kills millions of people can be beneficial and promote the general welfare. Or it would be just as rational tocontend that labor unions that greatly reduce production and thus profits could raise total wages, as that increasing taxes that make it tougher for business will im-

prove our general well-being. Labor unions, of course, misdirect capital. Capital does not go where it is needed the most where wages are low. It only shifts capital from one group of workers to a monopoly group. It is only increased capital and a free and unhampered market that raise wages. And it is much more likely that wealth that is acquired on a free market voluntary basis will be used for better tools than would be wealth that is secured by threats of strikes.

It is a law of economics that any practice that causes waste and increases cost is injurious to everybody, and it is a law of economics that wealth that is produced, benefits everyone. And the owner of profits has to benefit his fellowman in order to benefit himself with his profits. He either enjoys it himself, on which others make a profit or receive a better wage, or he gives it away, or he loans it, or he reinvests it.

Why The Cotton Gin? Mr. Buck is in error when he says that "in all the countries of the world where labor is cheap. very little effort is made to ac-juire better tools." Then why did Eli Whitney invent the cotton gin n 1794? Then there was plenty of slave labor that owners believed was cheaper than free labor. There were certainly no labor mions here in 1794. Or why did Cyrus McCormick invent the reaper in 1833? Farm wages were low then and there were no unions to force farmers to invest in the binders. Why all the other inventions? And why did capital increase in the U.S.A. before we had

Patriotism Beginning To Be Looked Down Upon

However bitter the taste, we may as well gulp down the truth that Communism has won the political campaign against pure. Constitutional patriotism which was the ideal of this nation until not long before the advent of Roosevelt II and his wife. In these years we have seen the steady, impudent rise of disloyalty in the bureaucracy of Washington and a hundred scattered, inflamed spots such as Fort Monmouth, the higher educational centers of New York and New England and overseas outposts of our timid imperial design.

Congress has made awkward laws to harass a leering horde whose features were plain to them in their daily traffic at the capital. But the Supreme Court has nullified these laws in a positive expression of political policy since Eisenhower took power. This aggressive attitude is a mere substitute for wilfully negligent and inefficient prosecution by the Department of Justice under the Democrats. The result is about the same. Nowadays the Department can solemnly say it has done its best and was frustrated by the Court.

No lovalist, however ardent his contempt for Truman, would weaken his argument by accusing him of joining any apparatus of the Soviet party. But actually that puts Truman in even worse position. He leaves himself without excuse for his uncouth flippancy in the Alger Hiss matter, his suppression of information on Communist treachery which Congress tried to subpoena and his repeated promotions of Harry Dexter White, a historic rascal of this tragic dissolution after the FBI had notified him of White's guilt.

The incidents rush past and people forget. But Herbert Brownell nailed Truman with this episode and Truman himself acknowledged an unspeakable aspersion against him in his reiterated complaint that Vice President Nixon called him a traitor. For some reason, Nixon has denied that he said or intended to mean quite that. So the allegation, whatever it was, stands unadjudicated but also unfortunate-

Truman lives by a standard that endeared him to the late Tom Pendergast, who took his tithe of every brass check in every brothel in his barony in Truman's own time on the Kansas City County Board. Pendergast's conduct likewise endeared him to Truman. So, though it is futile to try to specify his ethical process, we may nevertheless move the pieces around on the board and draw our own conclusions. All this is sad enough, but the jovial attitude of the press toward Truman bespeaks another decline of the old ideal.

We may be mistaken in exalting the President, whoever he is into our own substitute for a royal figure. Descended from a monar chy and still given to naming hotels and dry - cleaning companies

Labor is cheap in some countries because capital does not accumulate. And capital does not accumulate in countries where it is not safe; where the government does not protect it. And the government is not protecting capital when it allows a conspiracy of working men to simultaneously quit working and claim they are still employed; when the government permits the majority to establish the wages for all workers.


Labor is cheap for only one reason - because of little amount of efficient tools per worker. Tools or capital accumulate because of hope of profit. And anything that retards the hope of profit, as do labor unions that interfere with a free market, retards the accumulation of tools and keeps total wages down. It is simply arithmatic. We cannot have more by having less, as is the practice of

"royal", "imperial" and "palace," we rob ourselves of an important right when we persuade ourselves that ordinary, ill - qualified politicians in the White House must be gentled as though they were kings. Of late we have even submitted to the proposition that the Supreme Court partakes of "majesty" because the law which it hands down with finality is said to be majestic. If that were so, all of us should uncover and kneel in the presence of all cops, but there, thank God, we maintain a fragment of our charming incoherence. Since Roosevelt recognized Mos-

cow in 1933 we have laggardly sensed a rising hatred of American principles in our own country. These principles were naive, to be sure, but our very own and a joy in our hearts. They were not at all inferior to the basic brutality and greed of the Communists whose massacres were waged for nothing finer than the lust for wealth that they pretend to hate in us. The Communist Party was a re-

liable jackal on which we could concentrate our loathing. Its dissolution has actually been a severe loss to us. Without labelled identity, the enemies of our ideals and of this culture and state now pass freely among us as Republicans and Democrats. George Sokolsky. at the mention of an audacious New York Red now high in the Eisenhower machine, remarked with a sorry laugh, "Oh yes: they are all Republicans now.'

This all happened in France and we looked on France with lofty pity. They put Petain on trial and degraded him in his old age for patriotic conduct. But they welcomed Tohrez back from his refuge in Moscow after the war. And in our country, Lindbergh was dishonored and Sidney Hillman, who had paid homage and tribute to Moscow, was, by Roosevelt's offhand decree, allowed to choose Truman to be President for almost eight years.

American temper these days.

Americans are a plain, strightforward people. When they do a nation a good turn, they expect to be decently and respectfully treated. They know that the U.S.A. is a besieged fortress, and allies are not allies unless they rally round in time of crisis.

It is a tribute to the American character that at long last a stop has been called to subversion abroad. At least conservatives can hope that a halt has been called.

If the events in the Middle East have proven anything, it is that diplomatic victories cannot be won by dollars. Only the stern resolution of the republic impresses the forces of disorder.

No one, least of all an American conservative, believes that Marines and aircraft carriers should be fixed features of our foreign policy in the years ahead. But the latent power of the republic must be demonstrated to the world if the voice of America is to be heeded. It is our power that results in respect, not our misguided missionary efforts to provide tractors in lands that have never seen steel ploughs. It is the spirit of firmness that

this nation needs to regain in all its dealings abroad. And it is firmness against subversion at home and influences that weaken the fibre of American character and undermine our system that is most needed. A healthy spirit of self-assertion is the beginning of national health. The so-called underdeveloped nations may resent our well-being and our economic success, but that should not be cause for us to talk as though national prosperity were an affront to the world.

The average American is snowed under with talk of guilt guilt for bold action abroad and guilt for allegedly not giving away enough of their substance, guilt for having a free enterprise system that has made us rich. The task of conservatives is to be self-assertive, to combat the apostles of guilt who would have us retreat step by step from positions of power and success until we are so weakened and so apologetic that we are easy prey for communism at home or abroad.

The risks of self - assertiveness are real. Ine man or nation who asserts a right runs the risk of being attacked. But risk - taking is the prime ingredient of our free enterprise economic system and our republican form of government. It is the basis of our success. The risk - takers gain opportunities and win leadership.
