Alcorn Raps Truman For Falsehoods

By RAYMOND LAHR United Press International

WASHINGTON (UPI)-Republican National Chairman Meade Alcorn accused former President Truman today of "falsehoods, distortions and partisan venom" in his 1958 campaign speeches.

Alcorn issued a new blast at the Democratic ex-president as the congressional campaign headed into its last five weeks with signs that leaders in both camps were ready to get down to bare-knuckle slugging.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon was slated to hit the campaign trail today with what was described as a "stay tough" defense of President Eisenhower's Formosa policy. He planned to speak twice today-at Muncie and Indianapolis, Ind.—then fly to the West Coast for five major speech-

Truman, not one to be deterred by GOP protests, will continue his "give 'em hell" punching at Republicans with speeches in six more states in the next two weeks -Wyoming, Ohio, Iowa, North Dakota, Minnesota and Michigan. He touched eight states during the last half of September.

Democratic headquarters also announced it is adding Gov. Edmound S. Muskie of Maine, who won a U.S. Senate seat in Maine's Democratic election sweep earlier this month, to its roster or campaign orators. He will make eight appearances in four states during the next two weeks.

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



By R. C. HOILES Basic Issues Of Life

I have always contended that what a man believes is what he wants his children to believe.

I read a very interesting article in "Science of Mind" under the heading of "Basic Issues of Life" written by William Ernest Hocking, so I bought a magazine for each one of my children, because what I believe is what I want my children to believe. I considered it a thought-provoking article. It is a chapter from Hocking's book,

"This Is My Faith." He puts it this way: "What religious values should be emphasized today?

"By religion I mean a passion for right living, and for the spread of right living, conceived as a cosmic demand

"The passion for right living is an ethical impulse; every man at some time or other finds it in himself. It may be transitory; it is likely to be a lonely and disturbing realization of the human situation - that there is a right way of taking hold of life, easily missed since there are numerous wrong ways; and that having but one life to live, there are a few issues more important than to take hold of this one by the right handle.

So far, ethics. "If this ethical impulse is joined with a sense that something in the world I spring from expects me to make a good job of it (as 'England expects every man to do his duty.'), ethics shades over into religion. Religion brings the universe into my private business as a party: it introduces a new responsibility into the situation, and a new horizon. It is the passionfilled carrying on of the effort to find and follow right ways, in the spirit of a responsible companion ship with the sources of my life - call them 'the cosmos.'

"The new responsibility adds a certain weight to the natural im-

pulse to share with others what one perceives of 'right living.' What the cosmos expects of me, it expects of all men. And one of the tests that I have discerned a right way is that I can get your corroboration. In fact, it is part, of the right way of living that it is a sharing of the right way! Religion thus tends, out of loneliness, to establish a mutuality; and if the joy in discovery is

great, one might find a group starting, persisting. And the members, not ceasing to explore the hard paths of 'right living,' might keep reminding each other of their beginnings, 'the old times we had together,' and incipient 'tradition." "This tendency to sharing, or

group-making, does not cancel the necessity that each person has to keep open his private path to his own insights. 

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

In many cases of diabetes, therefore, it is possible to give only one or two injections a day. Thus it is often somewhat easier on the patient.

Today some interesting studies are going on with preparations to control diabetes which can be given by mouth. These are in what we doctors call the "experimental stage" and are not yet recommended for general use.

tually. Even today people die of diabetes, but often this is their own fault because they have been careless about their diet or their insulin.

Sometimes the condition can be controlled merely by adjusting the diet so that the body does not have too much sugar to handle. In other cases if the diabetes is bad, dieting may not, be enough and it is necessary to inject some of the secretion which we call insulin (obtained from animal pancreas) to help use up the excess sugar.

In the early days, insulin injections had to be given before each meal in order to keep sugar from passing into the urine. Now, preparations of insulin have been developed which are slow acting and




